The meeting was called to order by Chairman Crumbaker.

The chairman opened hearings on <u>SCR 1630</u>, a resolution urging school districts to establish business-education partnerships.

Denny Apt testified in favor of \underline{SCR} 1630. Ms. Apt quoted from the governor's State of the State address when he said he strongly endorsed the potential for partnership between business and education. (Attachment 1)

Mr. Jim Edwards spoke in support of <u>SCR 1630</u>. Mr. Edwards pointed out there are partnership programs in existence in Kansas already and gave examples of Pizza Hut's reading program and Bauersfeld's school grant program. Mr. Edwards said <u>SCR 1630</u> would assist in fostering business/education partnerships in those districts that do not have current programs. (Attachment 2)

Mr. Burnett testified on behalf of nine school districts and organizations (Attachment 3). Mr. Burnett said business involvement in education is an important element in school improvement in any district.

The chairman closed hearings on \underline{SCR} 1630.

Hearings on $\underline{\text{SB }564}$, concerning a midwestern higher education compact, were opened by the chairman.

Representative Bowden testified in favor of <u>SB 564</u>. He said <u>SB 564</u> is like <u>HB 2811</u> which was heard in committee earlier except for the composition of the five members who would represent the state of Kansas should the Commission be activated. Representative Bowden said initially a member of the Board of Regents was to be a member of the Commission but the State Board requested it to be changed so the State Board could select someone to represent the Board of Regents. Mr. Bowden also pointed out if Kansas is the first of the states to join the compact by passing legislation this session it would put Kansas in a favorable position to have the Commission located in Kansas.

Hearings on SB 564 were closed by Chairman Crumbaker.

The chairman opened discussion on <u>SB 607</u> and reviewed what had been done last year in regard to increased credit hour aid for community colleges. The bill last year

provided for a \$1.00 increase for 5 years taking the minimum from \$14.00 to \$19.00 and took the lid off the top. \underline{SB} 607 is different in that it raises the top from \$22.00 to \$24.00. Chairman Crumbaker recommended that a \$2.00 increase be made on the minimum, an additional \$2.00 increase be made next year, and \$1.00 increase the following year to make the minimum \$19.00 and take the lid off the top. The chairman asked for discussion.

Representative Empson moved to amend SB 607 to increase \$2.00 this year, \$2.00 next year and \$1.00 the following year to \$19.00 minimum in a 3-year time and take the lid off the top. Representative Larkin seconded the motion. During the discussion Representative Reardon offered a substitute motion to leave SB 607 in the present form as presented by Representative Empson but allow the ceiling cap to be maintained as in the present bill passed by the Senate. Representative Ramirez seconded the motion. Motion carried. Representative Empson moved to pass favorably SB 607 as amended. Seconded by Representative Larkin. Motion carried.

The chairman opened discussion on $\underline{\text{SB }659}$, concerning school districts, expenditures for purchases occasioned by loss covered.

After a long period of discussion Representative Blumenthal moved to pass SB 659 favorably. Seconded by Representative Pottorff. Motion carried.

The chairman asked the committee if they wished to act on SCR 1630 and SB 564.

Vice-chairman Empson moved to pass SCR 1630 favorably. Representative R. D. Miller seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Representative Bowden moved to pass SB 564 favorably. Seconded by Representative Wiard. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned by the chairman at 4:30 p.m.

I believe that when leaders with different interests sit down to talk, common goals may be achieved."

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee:

I am Jim Edwards and I appear before you today representing KCCI in their support of SCR 1630, a resolution which would encourage school districts to form business/education partnerships.

The Kansas Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KCCI) is a statewide organization dedicated to the promotion of economic growth and job creation within Kansas, and to the protection and support of the private competitive enterprise system.

KCCI is comprised of more than 3,000 businesses which includes 200 local and regional chambers of commerce and trade organizations which represent over 161,000 business men and women. The organization represents both large and small employers in Kansas, with 55% of KCCI's members having less than 25 employees, and 86% having less than 100 employees. KCCI receives no government funding.

The KCCI Board of Directors establishes policies through the work of hundreds of the organization's members who make up its various committees. These policies are the guiding principles of the organization and translate into views such as those expressed here.

There are many partnership programs in existence in Kansas today. Some, such as Pizza Hut's reading program, are between the business and a student. Others, such as


