Chairman Miller called for hearing on HB 2966.

HB 2966 - Act concerning the conveyance of certain property in Wichita County.

Chairman Miller recognized Representative Harold Guldner who requested the bill. Representative Guldner stated that Wichita County would like to give the old hospital to the city of Leoti. The city wants to make a group home out of it for children. The county received a deed from the owners of the property. The county will deed the property to the city.

The Chairman closed the hearings on HB There were no opponents. 2966.

The Chairman called for hearing on HB 2894.

HB 2894 - Act relating to counties; concerning the enforcement of county codes and resolutions; concerning fines and penalties.

Chairman Miller recognized Representative Heinemann, sponsor of HB 2894. Finney County experienced problems over proposals made by resolution to control wild animals running loose throughout the They hired a person to be in charge of capturing these county. The resolution provided for a fine of \$50 to \$500. fine was levied to help cover the costs of enforcement. A district judge issued an opinion that disallowed the county to solve their problem by resolution.

Discussion followed - No fiscal note - Statewide application.

Mike Heim, staff, gave a brief overview of present law. Discussion followed.

Beverly Bradley, Kansas Association of Counties, appeared proponent and provided written testimony. (Attachment I)

No opponents. The Chairman closed the hearing on HB 2894.

The Chairman called for hearing on HB 2943.

 $\frac{\rm HB~2943}{\rm and}$ - Act concerning drainage districts; relating to maintenance and repair of ditches; declaring certain discharges to be nuisances and providing remedies therefor.

Chairman Miller recognized Representative Sprague, primary sponsor of $\frac{HB}{2943}$. Representative Sprague stated the purpose of the bill is to assure proper maintenance and repair of ditches. There appears to be a problem with executing maintenance and repair due to the ditches being too wet to work. Representative Sprague introduced Harry Schrag.

Harry Schrag appeared before the Committee in support of $\underline{\text{HB 2943}}$. (Attachment II) Discussion followed.

There were no opponents. The Chairman closed the hearing on HB 2943.

The Chairman turned the Committee's attention to HB 2965.

HB 2965 - Act concerning certain drainage districts; relating to the governing body thereof.

Theresa Kiernan, staff, stated this was a clean-up bill to correct 24-605. A drafting error substituted the word director for the word supervisors. This bill corrects this error.

No questions. The Chairman closed the hearing on HB 2965.

The Chairman turned the Committee's attention to $\underline{\text{HB 2847}}$. (concerning the collection of delinquent property taxes) $\underline{\text{A motion}}$ was made by Representative Patrick to pass HB 2847 favorably and place on the consent calendar; seconded by Representative Holmes. The motion carried.

The Chairman turned the Committee's attention to $\underline{\text{HB}}$ 2966. A motion was made by Representative Graeber to pass $\underline{\text{HB}}$ 2966 favorably and $\underline{\text{put}}$ on the consent calendar; seconded by Representative Holmes. The motion carried.

The Chairman turned the Committee's attention to <u>HB 2965</u> (technical amendment). <u>The motion was made by Representative Williams to pass HB 2965 favorably and put on the consent calendar; seconded by Representative Graeber. The motion carried.</u>

A motion was made by Representative Samuelson to approve the minutes of February 13, 14, and 15; seconded by Representative Holmes. The motion carried.

The Kansas Association of Counties has no formal position on this issue, however it appears to be a proposal that would benefit counties in that it would enable the fines derived from the enforcement of county codes and resolutions to be paid to the county treasurer and deposited in the county general fund. With the current proposals of tax lids and roll backs, it is appropriate to use alternate sources of income to fund county activities.

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Public Water Supply: Some Predictions About

On November 8, 1989 President Bush signed into law PL 101-140, which contains a provision repealing the Section 89 nondiscrimination rules for employee benefits, which were put in place as a result of the 1986 Tax Reform Act. Employers should note that in repealing the federal mandate, Congress reinstated rules that had been in effect prior to the enactment of the 1986 act. The pre-1986 Tax Reform discrimination rules apply to self-insured health plans (Internal Revenue Code Section 105(h)), cafeteria plans (Section 125) and group term-life insurance plans (Section 79).

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EPA Funds Waste Management Program

To help cities and states find solutions to waste management problems, the Governmental Refuse Collection and Disposal Association (GRCDA) and the National Recycling Coalition (NRC) have established a peer matching program, funded by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The program matches experts in various fields with governmental officials throughout the United States who

would like to aid in solving municipal solid waste problems. The peer match program will provide advice on all aspects of solid waste management issues, including planning, waste reduction, collection, recycling, composting, combustion and landfilling. Finney County to Control Animals

Animals in Finney County will be subject to regulation beginning January 1, 1990. A new animal control resolution adopted by the board of county commissioners was prompted by complaints over the years of packs of dogs attacking livestock and even children. The resolution makes it illegal for an animal owner in the county to willfully allow an animal to roam loose. Violators are punishable by fines from \$50 to \$500.

The county has budgeted money in 1990 to hire an animal control officer, who will operate under the sheriff's department. In addition, the county intends to house impounded animals at the Garden City animal shelter. The county has contributed money for remodeling that building, and city officials expect the remodeling to be completed in February.

The resolution states that it will be unlawful for owners to willfully allow dogs, horses, mules, hogs, sheep, and goats off of the owner's property. The animal control officer may impound dogs that do not have county tags. Dog tags are to be purchased at the county clerk's office at the start of the year and the fee is \$2 for dogs that have been spayed or neutered and \$5 for those that have not been. A certificate from a veterinarian is required to show current shots and whether the dog is spayed or neutered.

Animals that are impounded and have not been claimed within 72 hours are considered abandoned animals and may be adopted or euthanized. To claim an impounded animal, the owner must pay a fee for the animal's boarding.
