MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS

Chairman Sallee called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

Hearings were held on <u>SB-59</u> during the 1989 legislative session. Ron Thornburgh presented a balloon of <u>SB-59</u> showing suggested changes. He explained to committee members that the changes focus on third party requirements of the state and noted the proposed amendment meets state standards and sets the required numbers for third parties at a reachable level. The petition process would require signatures totaling 1 percent of the total vote cast for all candidates in the last preceding election. The previous requirement was 2 percent. To remain on the ballot they must receive 1 percent of total votes cast in the election. Mr. Thornburgh told the committee the change was deemed necessary since there has not been a single application for third party recognition since 1982 Attachment 1)

Bill Earnest, Libertarian Party, spoke in support of  $\underline{SB-59}$  as well as the proposed amendment.

Senator Phil Martin moved to accept the amendment. Senator Lee seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The subcommittee report amending  $\underline{SB-417}$  was presented to the Committee by Senator Bond, chairman of the subcommittee noting recommendation of the report. (Attachment 2)

Senator Martin moved, with a second from Senator Fred Kerr, adoption of the subcommittee report. The motion carried. Senator Johnston requested his NAY vote be recorded.

Senator Johnston moved, with a second from Senator Fred Kerr, to recommend <u>SB-417</u> as amended favorable for passage. The motion carried.

It was suggested consideration should be given to the statutes regulating political parties which were passed during the 1989 legislative session and which the Attorney General has advised are probably unconstitutional following the findings of the United States Supreme Court dealing with similar California statutes. The motion was made by Senator Fred Kerr, seconded by Senator Lee, to request a bill repealing statutes that are directly applicable to the California case. The motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 1:50 p.m.
