The Chairman opened the meeting by distributing to the members a current listing of the Judiciary Committee bills. (ATTACHMENT I)

The Chairman opened the hearing on the bills in committee addressing juvenile offenders by stating that with the changes addressed in these bills the committee would like as much input as possible from the public.

- SB 743 concerning corrections; comprehensive plans for correctional services and corrections advisory boards including juvenile offenders advisory boards.
- SB 741 concerning juvenile offenders; relating to their release at the age of 21; providing for a hearing to allow the department of social and rehabilitation services to retain custody.
- $\underline{\mathtt{SB}}$ 521 concerning juveniles; creating master planning commission for juvenile affairs.
- SB 526 concerning juvenile offenders; relating to prosecution as an adult; notice to victims of release or discharge of certain juvenile offenders.
- <u>SB 641</u> concerning payment of the cost of transportation of alleged juvenile offenders to and from hearings.
- <u>SB 742</u> concerning juveniles; prohibiting detention in adult jails; development of alternatives to detention.

Terry Showalter, Kansas Association of Court Service Officers, testified on the juvenile offender matters. He stated his group feels juvenile justice issues need to be dealt with as a package; over the years they have been dealt with in a piecemeal fashion resulting in a disjointed nonsystem. Therefore, he addressed the bills being heard in the context of a package with SB 521 as the foundation to set the goals and mechanism of a juvenile justice system plan equal to the adult system. He continued by saying that their support of the bills would deteriorate if funds are not appropriated to fully support the measures.

District Judge John White, Iola, testified in support of SB 742. (ATTACHMENT II)

Terry Fuller, Kinsley, testified in support of SB 741. (ATTACHMENT III)

Written testimony was submitted to the committee from Thomas Jones, Thomas County Sheriff, supporting <u>SB 742</u> if funds are also appropriated. (<u>ATTACHMENT IV</u>)

The Chairman announced that the hearing would be continued to the following day. The meeting was adjourned.

RE: Senate Bill No. 742

I am appearing before you at the request of the Advisory Commission on Juvenile Offender Programs. My comments are directed to the provisions of Senate Bill No. 742. Senate Bill 742 is a juvenile jail removal bill.

For the past several years the State of Kansas has received federal funds through the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act. These funds are to be used in establishing programs which will remove juveniles from adult jails and lockups. The Advisory Commission has been delegated the responsibility for determining the programs eligible for JJDP funding.

To continue to be eligible for JJDP funds a state must show that it is in substantial compliance with federal regulations concerning removal of juveniles from adult jails and lockups. In 1989 Kansas received a waiver from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP). The regulations established by OJJDP provide for a waiver by the Administrator when a state

Senate Judiciary Committee 3-20-90 Attachment II page 1013 exhibits (a) partial compliance and (b) makes an unequivocal commitment to achieving full compliance with the jail removal requirements. To demonstrate Kansas' commitment to full compliance Governor Hayden signed a Proclamation in 1989 indicating he would support legislation requiring removal of juveniles from adult jails and lockups. With this Proclamation a waiver of compliance was received for that year.

Kansas is eligible for \$457,000 in JJDP funds for the year 1990. The information which has been provided to the Advisory Commission leads us to believe that Kansas will not be granted another waiver absent legislation requiring removal of juveniles from adult jails.

The Advisory Commission recognizes that the issue of juvenile jail removal presents many problems. We have had many disagreements among the members of the Commission in our discussions regarding jail removal. I am not here to speak in support of the proposed legislation or in opposition to it. The Advisory Commission believes that the State's continued participation in JJDP funding in the future is a policy decision to be made by the legislature, not by our Commission. For that reason the Advisory Commission asked that I appear here today to bring to your attention that Kansas is in jeopardy of losing

(3-20-90) II 2/3 future JJDP funding unless Senate Bill No. 742 is enacted, and to request that you give the matter your consideration and determine whether the State should continue to seek JJDP funding.

SUMMARY OF PRESENTATION

- 1) Extending custody of juvenile offenders beyond 21 years of age provides significant prospects to reduce youth crime.
 - Research and statistical analysis indicates that teenagers and young adults "commit crimes far in excess of their proportion of the population."
 - The peak rate for property offenses is the late teens while the peak rate for violence is in the early twenties.
 - Many young offenders carry the following burdens:
 - a) lower intelligence;
 - b) poor sociol-economic status;
 - c) no moral system of response;
 - d) impulsivity and inability to see future sequence of events or consequences.
 - As a result, without strong supervision:
 - a) They can't hold jobs;
 - b) They don't maintain relationships;
 - c) They are susceptible to drug and alcohol problems which in turn lowers inhibition against bad conduct;
 - d) They can't manage letdown or stress;
 - e) They pass these problems to their own children through ineffective parenting, abuse, or abandonment.
 - Depending on the blend of the above factors, many of these offenders will be evaluated to be anti-social (sociopathic) or
 passive aggressive. The prevailing view is that a violently
 anti-social person will not begin to become less violent or to
 have insight into his behavior until he reaches the mid-thirties.

- As such, it is not particularly surprising that many youth offenders in the Juvenile Justice System graduate to more serious criminal offences.
- As such, a Juvenile Justice System which ends custody at or prior to age 21 years of age is somewhat out of focus.

SB No. 741

- A major problem is that presumeably a District Magistrate Judge could sentence a 21 year of age to life in the custody of the S.R.S. at a State Youth Center.
- Limiting SB No. 741 to A and B Felonies, excludes crimes such as Aggravated Battery; Indecent Liberties; Robbery; Aggravated Indecent Solicitation of a Child; Attempted Poisoning; Sexual Exploitation of a Child; Aggravated Assault; Aggravated Burglary; Arson.
- Violent Felony Offenders should have definite minimum and maximum terms. At age 18, a comprehensive evaluation should be prepared. Court disposition should be required. Courts options should include transfer to Secretary of Corrections.
- Other Felony Offenders should be subject to custody to age 23 or 25. Evaluation at 18 should also be prepared. Courts options should have probation options; halfway house options; and transfer to community corrections or Secretary of Corrections. Offenders should earn release through achievement and stability.

Dear Senator Winter:

With regard to SB 742, I would like to voice my concerns with respect to juveniles in jail. My first and foremost concern is that of liability. Secondly, juveniles in jail pose a tremendous jail management problem as they are required to be housed out of sight and sound of adult immates. This is virtually impossible considering the limitations of facilities in rural communities. Another factor is the increased risk of suicide among juvenile detainses.

Thomas County has one of the longest stretches of I-70 traversing through its jurisdiction than any other county in the State. Between 25 and 30 juveniles per year are arrested along this stretch on the average. These juveniles are brought in and detained for serious offenses as well as simply being runaways who must be detained until they can be turned over to another jurisdiction. These figures do not even include juveniles domiciled in our jurisdiction that we must deal with as well.

With the assistance of SRS Youth Services, we have established an Attendant Care Program in Thomas County. This program has become an important tool in dealing with the number of juveniles that enter the facility and it is our hope that funding continues to be available for this program.

Although Attendant Care is a qualified alternative to jail for a large number of juveniles, it is not appropriate for every instance in which a juvenile is arrested. At the time of this writing, I have two juveniles in jail who are wanted out of Georgia. One is wanted for assault and battery and the other is a juvenile running away from a Juvenile Detention Facility. Circumstances such as these leave me no alternative under the present system but to keep them incarcerated in the jail facility.

For the type of problems these juveniles create when detained, the regional concept of a juvenile detention facility appears to be the best solution.

I strongly request your support in appropriating a share of the money derived from gaming statutes being used to facilitate the construction of these facilities.
