Senator Bogina called the meeting to order at 11:12 A.M. He announced that Attachment 1 was distributed to correct an error in Attachment 1 of the January 9, 1990 Committee meeting. The error in the previous attachment was that all of the money for the commercial breaker was listed under FY 1990 rather than split between FY 1990 and FY 1991.

Senator Bogina requested that the Committee move to reconsider SB 442 in order to consider emergency supplemental appropriations for Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS). Senator Feleciano moved and Senator Winter seconded that the Committee reconsider action on SB 442. The motion carried on a roll call vote. Senator Bogina asked Senators Winter and Allen to withdraw their motion and second to pass <u>SB 442</u> favorable as amended. Discussion followed as to how <u>SB 413</u> and <u>SB 442</u> were related. Senator Allen noted that his concern in reconsidering <u>SB 442</u> is the appropriation for Sheridan Coliseum which is needed by February 15, 1990. Senator Bogina assured the Committee that hearings will be held as early as possible during the week of January 15, and Senators Winter and Allen withdrew their motion and second.

Senator Bogina introduced staff members to the Committee: Diane Duffy and Leah Robinson, Kansas Legislative Research Department; Norm Furse and Gordon Self, Revisor of Statutes Office; Judy Bromich, Administrative Assistant; and Ronda Miller, Committee Secretary.

Ed Ahrens, Kansas Legislative Research Department, gave an overview of the status of the State General Fund based on the Governor's budget Mr. Ahrens told the Committee that the Governor did not recommendations. include the numbers regarding acceleration of certain tax collections which will affect FY 1990 and FY 1991 in the budget. The 1988 Legislature amended the budget law directing the Governor not to include in his regular budget any additional resources to the State General Fund, but to indicate those on a supplemental basis. The schedules found in Attachment 2, however, are comprehensive with respect to the circuit breaker as far as the State General Fund is concerned.

In answer to a question, Mr. Ahrens stated that 1.7% is the increase o receipts over the concensus estimate of FY 1991 over FY 1990.

The question was posed as to what ending balance is sufficient to get through a year without issuing certificates of debt. Discussion followed with agreement that that depends upon cash flow and the gap between expenditures and receipts, and that whether \$128 million is sufficient is debatable. It was noted that if expenses and revenues stayed the same for FY 1992 (as FY 1991), the ending balance for FY 1991 would be \$7 million, assuming concensus estimates are accurate.

Mr. Ahrens explained that the \$3.4 million reduction in the Salary Plan Reserve (page 2 of Attachment 2) was derived from changes in the state pay plan (approved by the 1989 Legislature with passage of HB 2553), which exceeded the amounts that were contained in the agencies' budgets. It was asked if agencies were required to obtain extra monies for longevity in the salary plan from within their own agency rather than using the money that was set aside by the Legislature, or if the amount was overestimated. Mr. Ahrens stated that if there had not been an effort to cut back in the Governor's recommended budget, he would have anticipated seeing part of the \$3.4 million as a supplemental appropriation to the agencies. He noted that he did not know where the agencies were getting the money to pay the benefits. Senator Bogina noted that the budgets would be more fully elaborated in subcommittees and that he anticipates appeals from most of the agencies. Senator Feleciano expressed concern that the Committee might not comprehend the problems of the agency budgets if the agencies don't appeal.

In regard to the Mental Health/Mental Retardation (MH/MR) hospitals, Mr. Ahrens noted that the budget assumes that Title XIX and patient receipts will be less than estimated, meaning that General Fund monies must be used to replace those monies.

Senator Bogina announced a request from the Board of Regents for the introduction of bills. Senator Doyen moved that draft bill RS 1714 (lease of land at Fort Hays State University), draft bill RS 1716 (nurses in unclassified service at the University of Kansas Medical Center), draft bill RS 1730 (insurance for the KU-band uplink truck and mobile television production vehicle), and draft bill RS 1715 (sale of real estate at Emporia State University) be introduced. Senator Feleciano seconded, and the motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:06 P.M.
