The Chairman called the meeting to order and stated that he is a member of a select committee currently in session; therefore he requested Vice Chairperson, Denise Everhart, to chair the January 17, 1991, House Judiciary Committee Meeting.

Hearing was conducted on HB 2011.

Department of Corrections General Counsel, Chuck Simmons appeared in opposition to the portion of the bill which reduces the amount of resources available to the DOC, letter dated 1/17/91, from Steven J. Davies, Secretary of Corrections, was distributed (Attachment #1). Dennis Williams, DOC, pointed out that funds cut would need to be replaced from the State General Fund or reduce projects.

Sen. Nancy Parrish appeared as a proponent for HB 2011. Sen. Parrish distributed (Attachment #2) from Advisory Committee on Juvenile Offender Programs. Sen. Parrish said the goal of the legislation is to assist in getting juveniles out of county lockups and city jails; that Federal funds have been received over about a decade for that purpose; that last session legislation was passed to get juveniles out of adult jails; that HB 3021 and SB 770 provided additional funds; that detention facilities are badly needed throughout the state. Sen Parrish explained Region Recommendations set out on (Attachment # 2) (page 2-2) that Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund and Juvenile Detention Capital Improvements Fund be combined and that control over the distribution of those funds be given to the Juvenile Offender Advisory Commission; that part of Gaming Revenue Funds be distributed to the Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund; that these funds would be used for debt retirement and operational costs of facilities; that it is both a Federal and State mandate to get juveniles out of adult jails; that an annual appropriation of the Gaming Revenue Funds would be desirable.

Sen. Richard "Dick" Bond appeared as a proponent of $\underline{\text{HB 2011}}$. Sen. Bond said in order to meet the Federal mandate, additional facilities must be built; that building should be done regionally; that counties should have interlocal agreements; that multiple counties must assume debt retirement; that several counties that have new facilities have been paying for them so to be fair, the State might help them with their operational costs;

that use of 10% of the Gaming Revenue Funds was provided by legislation in 1986; that funds remaining after allocation to Juvenile Corrections go to the Department of Corrections.

Sen. Parrish noted good juvenile detention facilities are needed as some juveniles are as dangerous as adults.

A Committee member inquired if operational cost is restricted to physical plant or whether it could include programs. Sen. Parrish said both would be included.

A committee member asked if any thought had been given to consideration of larger distribution to poorer counties.

Ann Smith, Kansas Association of Counties, appeared in support of the HB 2011, generally, but does not give stamp of approval to any plans for juvenile detention facilities; that number, location, cost of construction and maintenance, travel costs, transporting juveniles, etc. of these facilities are concerns.

Ms. Smith stated written testimony will be furnished and concerns included in the written testimony. (See Attachment #3)

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M. The next meeting of the committee is scheduled for Thursday, January 22, 1991 at 3:30 p.m. in room 313-S (Old Supreme Court Room).

House Bill No. 2011

Section 1(a)(1) of House Bill No. 2011 would require that five percent (one-half of 10 percent) of the moneys credited to the State Gaming Revenues Fund be credited to the Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund for fiscal year 1992.

Currently, the full 10 percent amount of State Gaming Revenues Fund moneys is being credited to the Correctional Institutions Building Fund (CIBF) and is being used to finance capital improvements at the state correctional facilities. The impact of House Bill No. 2011 would be to reduce by half the amount of State Gaming Revenues Fund moneys credited to the CIBF, thereby reducing the amount of resources available to finance capital improvement projects at the state correctional facilities in fiscal year 1992. Until the Governor's budget recommendations become available, which will include estimated receipts and recommended expenditures for fiscal year 1992, it is not possible to provide an official estimate of what this reduction in receipts and the impact on the CIBF will be.

It is the Department's understanding that section 1(c) of the bill is a technical amendment to abolish the Juvenile Detention Facilities Capital Improvements Fund, which is duplicative of the Juvenile Detention Facilities Fund.

While the Department of Corrections certainly supports the concept of increased funding for juvenile detention facilities, it is not in favor of providing this increased funding by reducing the amount of resources available in the Correctional Institutions Building This would reduce the funding for capital improvement projects at the correctional facilities or would require that State General Fund financing be provided to offset the loss in CIBF receipts.


