The meeting was called to order by Chairman Rezac at 7:35 a.m.

The Chairman called on Richard Ryan of staff to present HB 2103, 2094 and 2095 for hearings.

HB 2103 - concerning KPERS relating to postretirement benefit increase.

The first proponent on $\underline{ ext{HB 2103}}$ was Basil Covey of Kansas Retired Teachers Association. He testified from material previously handed out (Attach- $\underline{\text{ment } \#1}$). He was in favor of this bill especially for the teachers who taught in the early years for less money and possibly all their years were not credited account lost records.

Questions were then asked of Mr. Covey by the Committee members.

The next person to testify on HB 2103 was Chuck Stuart of United School Administrators. He testified from material previously handed out (Attachment #2). He felt that the funding for this bill should be borne by the state rather than KPERS, therefore he was against the bill as proposed.

Ernie Mosher of League of Kansas Municipalities then testified against HB 2103. He felt the real need was for an increase in participating service benefits which would tend to reduce the need for postretirement increases in the future. (Attachment #3).

Questions were then asked of Mr. Mosher by the Committee members.

Hearings were then concluded on HB 2103.

The Chairman announced that hearings on HB 2094 would proceed.

HB 2094 - concerning KPERS relating to lump-sum death benefit.

The first proponent of this bill was Basil Covey who testified from material previously handed out (Attachment #4). He was in favor of this bill due to increased costs for funerals.

The next proponent to testify was Chuck Stuart of United School Administrators who said they support this recommendation.

Hearings were then closed on <u>HB 2094</u>.

Hearings were then opened on HB 2095.

HB 2095 - concerning KPERS relating to postretirement benefit adjustment.

Basil Covey of Kansas Retired Teachers Association was the first to testify on this bill. He supports this bill that increases the retirement benefit 3% for retired teachers and all members of KPERS. (Attachment #5)

Chuck Stuart of United School Administrators was the next proponent. He was in favor of the 3% increase in retirement benefits but not in favor of an immediate increase at retirement. He said the effective date should be moved back to July 1, 1990. He didn't think it should come immediately at retirement.

The Chairman then called on Craig Grant of Kansas National Education Association. He agrees that those who retired before 1990 should have this increase.

Marshall Crowther of KPERS then made a few comments on the three bills.

Hearings on HB 2095 were then closed.

Chairman Rezac entertained a motion to approve the minutes of previous meeting. Representative Amos made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 27 meeting, seconded by Representative Watson, motion carried.

The Chairman reminded the committee that Wednesday's meeting would be in Room 521-S.

Members of the House Pensions and Investments Committee:

My name is Basil Covey and I represent the Kansas Retired Teachers Association.

We support HB 2103 that calls for an increase of \$15 to the monthly benefit for those retired teachers who retired prior to 1977.

These retired teachers are in late 70's, eighties and early nineties. These teachers served their school districts, never receiving much, nor asking for more. Most never heard of "reimbursed expense" as they furnished many school supplies and made visual aids for their students. In essence they subsidized the school district. Many have never received credit for all their service years. Some school board records were lost or destroyed.

When teachers came into KPERS in 1971 from the old KSRS their service records used .Ol times their average low salaries.

Members of KPERS are School and Non-school. School members include cooks, bus drivers, secretaries, custodians and teachers.

To determine the benefit status of retired teachers a survey was undertaken. They were to report their 1989 benefit, year of retirement, and years of service without their name. The average service-year benefit is determined for comparison with other member groups in KPERS. KPERS furnished information for both School and Non-school groups.

These earlier public retirees are deserving of help to retain their dignity for serving in the teaching profession.

We ask that you consider HB 2103 for passage.

Testimony presented before the House Committee on Pensions, Investments and Benefits by Charles L. "Chuck" Stuart, Legislative Liaison United School Administrators of Kansas

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, United School Administrators of Kansas appreciates the opportunity to comment on these three bills today. For the sake of brevity, I am taking the liberty of putting our testimony on all three bills in one written testimony.

HB 2103 increases benefits by \$15 per month for those who retired prior to July 1, 1977. Although we realize benefits for these retirees is low, we do not feel these special benefits should come from the KPERS fund. Such funding should be borne by the state. We therefore do not favor HB 2103 as proposed.

We support HB 2904 which raises the death benefit from \$2,500 to \$3,000. This should cover part of the inflation associated with burial costs which have arisen since the \$2,500 benefit was established.

We believe HB 2095, which calls for a 3% increase in retirement benefits for those who retired prior to July 1, 1991, is more nearly in keeping with the inflated cost of living. We would recommend that the effective retirement date for this benefit be set back to July 1, 1990. This would be more in line with the practice of not improving retiree benefits until at least one year after retirement. With this proposed change, we would enthusiastically support HB 2095.

By action of the Governing Body of the League, I somewhat reluctantly appear in opposition to HB 2103 and HB 2095, which would provide for KPERS post-retirement benefit increases. We have taken the position of "no position" on HB 2094, to increase the amount of the lump-sum death benefit under KPERS and KP&F.

Our position in opposition to post-retirement benefit increases is simply to focus attention on what we think the real need is, and that is an increase in participating service benefits, tending to reduce the need for post-retirement increases in the future. We have some problems with the fairness and equity of KPERS, particularly as to local government employees, whereby the employee contribution vastly exceed the employer contribution for participating service. As you know, in 1992, local employees will contribute 4% of their salary, while the employer contribution for participating service will be .115% of payroll.

Our opposition in principle should not be construed that we think retirants do not need an increase. Perhaps they do--we don't know! We do know that significant increases have been granted in the past, as shown on the attached report. We also know--or think we know-that existing employees are not now getting a fair deal. Until this basic issue of fairness is resolved, we think it appropriate to stop further increases to present retirants.

Members of the House Pensions and Investments Committee:

My name is Basil Covey and I represent the Kansas Retired Teachers Association.

We support HB 2095 that increases the retirement benefit 3% for retired teachers and all members of KPERS.

We appreciate enhancements passed by this Committee in the past, but recognize that legislation for increases is an ongoing process.

The federal government established legislation for Social Security recipients to receive percentage increases annually. The states must assume responsibility for its retirants. Adjustments in the cost of living must be made to retain purchasing power and not diminish the standard of living of retirants.

The 1988 AARP bulletin giving retirement programs for teachers in the 50 states is as follows: 27 states, or 54%, grant automatic COLA increases; 21 states, or 42%, have ad hoc increases, and two states, or 4%, grant infrequent increases.

It is standard procedure to consider economic conditions in relation to inflation in determining the COLA for each particular year. Reports from economists state the rate of inflation ranges between 7 or 8%.

We urge your Committee to give consideration for passage of HB 2095.
