Chairman Joseph C. Harder called the meeting to order. He welcomed visitors in the Old Supreme Court Room and extended a welcome to conferees from Greenbush, Ulysses, Coldwater, and Oakley, KS. Calling attention to the two-way interactive video network hookup between Topeka and the participating cities, the Chairman expressed appreciation to the Education Technology Fair contributors (Attachment 1) who made possible this technological demonstration of the Committee meeting which is a part of the Education Technology Fair (Attachment 2) on display today in the Statehouse.

The Chair explained that the purpose of today's meeting is to hear testimony on two school finance bills, \underline{SB} 26, recommended by the Special Committee on School Finance, and \underline{SB} $\underline{110}$, recommended by the Governor. He then directed attention to Greenbush and called upon the first conferee, Dr. Robert Hull, superintendent, USD 367, Osawatomie.

Dr. Hull, stating that he will address SB 26, described the bill as one which tries to deal fairly with the issues of school finance in order to provide quality education in Kansas schools. Dr. Hull referenced his remarks to four particular points of \underline{SB} $\underline{26}$: 1) District wealth. Dr. Hull described as prudent the Committee's efforts to establish district wealth as a one year sum of assessed valuation plus 24% of taxable income. Budget limitations. Dr. Hull said he agrees with the Committee's adoption of 102% - 106% budget controls, because budget controls of 101%-103% would not be sufficient for districts which want to improve or just catch up.

3) 30-mill minimum levy. Dr. Hull said he appreciates the efforts of the Committee in its attempt to equalize the tax effort and to more equally distribute the revenue. 4) Categorical Aid. Dr. Hull urged support for 100% reimbursement and pointed out that approximately half of the school districts would have to use General Fund money to support transportation districts would have to use General Fund money to support transportation costs if they are not fully covered by the state. He said he also favors SB 26 as it relates to special education reimbursement. Dr. Hull asserted that the most important thing to remember in a school finance formula is to make sure state aid for students is not dependent upon geographical location or district wealth.

The Chairman next called upon Mr. Charles Mansfield, superintendent, USD 365, Garnett, also speaking from Greenbush.

Mr. Mansfield noted that there are two main issues which relate to school finance: funding of the School District Equalization Aid formula and property tax relief which, he said, has appeared in the school finance picture this year. He recommended that these two issues be dealt with separately. Speaking to SB 110 and the budget control limitations of 101%-103%, Mr. Mansfield said that although the budget controls might be sufficient to keep up with inflation, they are not enough to allow districts to move forward as the Legislature is suggesting. He said he does support efforts to merge the 4th into the 5th Enrollment Category, as the the 4th Enrollment Category schools have been handicapped financially. Mr. Mansfield supported the concept for district wealth, because, he said, it is more responsive to shifts or changes in valuation. He stated that although his district has not gained or lost as a result of averaging, it appears wealthier with two-year averaging in effect. He stated that although the School District Ad Valorem Tax Reduction Fund is a good concept to provide property tax relief, he termed it disequalizing.

Mr. Mansfield said he believes 100% of transportation cost should be funded and pointed out that it does not fully fund those schools above the median. Mr. Mansfield also stated his support for transportation funding to schools which bus students to parochial schools and for special education funding, so that money will not be transferred from the General Fund to pay for these costs.

During the five-minute break before the next conferees, Mr. Mansfield, replying to a question regarding the 30-mill minimum levy, said that due to low valuations in his area, the property owners in his district are paying considerably more than the people in two contingent districts which have higher valuations. Dr. Hull also replied that a student's educational opportunity should not be dependent upon where a student lives.

In further response, Mr. Mansfield said that excess cost is a difficult term to define when working with a student who has a special problem or handicap.

Regarding continuance of gifted education programs, both conferees indicated their desire to continue the program if both the mandate and funding should be revoked.

The Chair directed Committee attention to Ulysses, which is a member of the High Plains Educational Cooperative. Mr. Bruce Kienapfel, superintendent, USD 314, Ulysses, expressed appreciation for the second opportunity to participate in this two-way interactive video conference and expressed confidence that through this technology proximity will become less of an issue to people in our part of the state, as they will have the same opportunity for input as people near the Topeka area have had historically. He then introduced Superintendent Ernest McClain of Lakin, USD 215.

Mr. McClain said he would address his remarks mainly to New Sec. 8 of SB 26, relating to the 30-mill minimum levy. He described the financial straits of his district because of the low budget controls that have been placed upon it for the last several years. He said it appears that lack of General Aid is leaving property tax control up to the local school board. Mr. McClain also expressed concern that since cattle, farm machinery, aircraft and business inventories have been removed from the tax rolls, a need for additional revenue might be collected from districts which have natural gas or other utilities and upon which the state already is collecting a severence tax. He felt that the amount of money (\$30M) that might be derived from this source would be very insignificant when divided among 280 school districts, but it would be detrimental to the small town business people in the communities involved.

Mr. McClain felt that the formula punishes students whose district is above the median budget per pupil, and he recommended the minimum amount of budget control increase be equal to the rate of inflation. Mr. McClain recommended a budget increase that would be equal to whatever their costs might increase.

Mr. Bruce Kienapfel, superintendent, USD 214, Ulysses, congratulated those who composed the formulas found in \underline{SB} 26 and \underline{SB} 110 and noted that both concepts were very similar. He also noted that the 30-mill minimum levy gives new meaning to property tax relief in southwest Kansas and indicated that area would be affected adversely. He pointed out that any gas property tax increase would be passed along to the buyers, many of whom live in other areas throughout the state. He stated that actual payment of a 30-mill levy will not be borne by the community which you think will pay for it.

Replying to a question, Mr. McClain said that the issue of exceeding the budget limits will be on the April ballot. Mr. McClain testified that school districts are being penalized for being efficient. Other factors which he felt should be considered include the salary schedule and noted it is more expensive to attract teachers to western Kansas.

The Chair called upon Mr. Jim Chadwick, superintendent, USD 300, in Comanche County, who was speaking from Coldwater.

Mr. Chadwick said he would address both <u>SB 26</u> and <u>SB 110</u>. He stated that he supports budget controls of 102%-106% to allow school districts to deal with mandates and reforms being initiated by the State. He agreed with the budget control ratios of 1 to 3. He noted the increased funding that will be absorbed by obtaining and maintaining increased technology in the schools in terms of equipment and teachers and to accomplish the necessary reforms needed for the 21st century. He said that SB 110 appears to come closer to achieving equity between the 4th and 5th Enrollment Categories. Mr. Chadwick supported the definition of District Wealth but said that he does not have a position on the minimum tax levy. Mr. Chadwick urged serious consideration of the School District Ad Valorem Tax Reduction Fund as found in SB 110 and said it appears to be a step towards equity. Mr. Chadwick urged 100% funding of the formula for transportation aid and pointed out that in his district the formula funded only 78% of the operational costs of transportation. He also agreed that special education should be funded at 100% of excess cost. He rejected both proposals regarding revocation of the gifted mandate and funding but stated that his district would attempt to maintain the program.

The Chair directed Committee attention to Oakley and recognized Mr. Peter O'Brien, superintendent of USD 432, Victoria. Mr. O'Brien acknowledged the similarities of SB 26 and SB 110. He stated his support for full funding for excess costs of special education but recommended eventually mainstreaming both the learning disabled and gifted who could work with resource people in order to conserve funds. Mr. O'Brien had some reservations regarding the SDAVTRF and thought it might be more equalizing to put the money back into the formula. Citing, for example, the doubled cost for text books over the past five years, he illustrated the need for 102%-106% budget controls. He also felt that equalization is not working satisfactorily if budget lids cannot be increased sufficiently.

In response to a question, Mr. O'Brien said that school districts are responsible for buying the textooks, and they are not standardized among districts. Mr. O'Brien also responded that a combination of sales and income tax might be a good mix for increasing taxes.

The Chair then changed the Committee focus to conferee Mr. Gary Stotts, Topeka, Acting Budget Director for Kansas, who testified in support of $\underline{SB\ 110}$, as proposed by the Governor.

Mr. Stotts pointed out that Governor's plan is to put \$161M in general aid and \$70M in additional state aid into the SDAVTRF. He described the four amendments in \underline{SB} $\underline{110}$ as, hopefully, being patterned pretty closely to those in \underline{SB} $\underline{26}$. The major distinction, he explained, is that the Governor's bill is designed to provide substantial and meaningful property tax relief. Mr. Stotts said that general estimates statewide indicate that \$215M would provide for an average of 15.3 mills reduction fund. Mr. Stotts pointed out that under the Governor's proposal state aid to schools would increase from approximately 45% to 56% of general budget costs. Mr. Stotts reiterated that the Governor's plan is designed primarily to offer property tax relief and does not offer a great deal of program enhancement with its 101%-103% budget lids. He emphasized the need for prioritization.

The Chair thanked Mr. Stotts and the conferees from Greenbush, Ulysses, Coldwater, and Oakley for their participation in today's hearing. He again thanked the sponsors of the two-way interactive video and Mr. Dale Dennis, Assistant Commissioner of Education, who, he said, had expended so much time in organizing today's meeting.

The Chair announced that the hearings on \underline{SB} $\underline{26}$ and \underline{SB} $\underline{110}$ would continue at 1:30 p.m. Monday in room 123-S and adjourned the meeting.




