MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE

The meeting was called to order by CHAIRMAN ROY M. EHRLICH at Chairperson a.m. Appxn. on March 25, 1991 in room 526-S of the Capitol.

Chariman Ehrlich called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. and announced the minutes of March 18, 19, 20 and 21, 1991, were distributed to the committee for review.

HB 2073 - Pharmacy act amendments.

Tom Hitchcock, Kansas State Board of Pharmacy, submitted written testimony and appeared in support of $\underline{\text{HB 2073}}$. The bill encompassed four pharmacy statutes and included changes which were requested by the Board of Pharmacy to clarify compliance enforcement portions of the statutes. (Attachment 1)

Bob Williams, Kansas Pharmacists Association, submitted written testimony and appeared before the committee in support of HB 2073. Mr. Williams stated the Kansas Pharmacists Association supports the changes in existing law as proposed in the bill. HB 2073 would allow the Board of Pharmacy appropriate authority to deny, revoke or suspend licensure to an applicant, if the applicant had been censured, denied licensure, or had other disciplinary action taken in another state. (Attachment 2) Fee changes were discussed, and the Chairman asked for the wishes of the committee on HB 2073. Senator Walker made the motion to recommend HB 2073 favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Hayden. No discussion followed. The motion carried. Senator Walker will carry the bill.

HB 2128 - Qualifications of physicians' assistants.

Richard Gannon, Board of Healing Arts, submitted written testimony and appeared in support of HB 2128. The bill was requested by the Board to correct inadvertent errors which had been made in the adoption of K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 65-2896a and 65-2986b as enacted by the 1989 legislature. Amendments by the House were also discussed. (Attachment 3) Discussion followed regarding concern with suggested language by W.S.U. dealing with traditional delegation problem. The wishes of the committee were asked on HB 2128. Senator Walker made the motion to recommend HB 2128 favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Langworthy. No discussion followed. The motion carried. Senator Walker will carry the bill.

The Chairman announced an error was made regarding re-referral of <u>SB 82</u>. The wishes of the committee were asked on <u>SB 82</u>. Senator Anderson stated action should be the same as taken at the committee meeting March 21, 1991, which was to table the bill. <u>Chairman Ehrlich announced SB 82 would be tabled.</u>

Senator Hayden distributed an article regarding AIDS from the March 22, 1991, Hutchinson News. (Attachment 4)

The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m.

MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE, MY NAME IS TOM HITCHCOCK AND I SERVE AS THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF PHARMACY. I APPEAR BEFORE YOU TODAY ON BEHALF OF THE BOARD IN SUPPORT OF HB 2073.

THIS BILL ENCOMPASSES FOUR PHARMACY STATUTES AND INCLUDES CHANGES WHICH ARE REQUESTED BY THE BOARD TO CLARIFY COMPLIANCE ENFORCEMENT ON PAGE 1, LINES 29 AND 30 INCLUDES THE FACT PORTIONS OF THE STATUTES. THAT VIOLATIONS OF RULES AND REGULATIONS OF FEDERAL OR STATE FOOD, DRUG COSMETIC ACT THE CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES ACT OF AND OR KANSAS ARE PUNISHABLE THE SAME AS UNDER THE ACT. ON PAGE 2, LINES 6 THROUGH 13 WOULD ALLOW THE BOARD TO DISCIPLINE A DUAL LICENSED PHARMACIST IN LIKE MANNER AS ACTION TAKEN IN ANOTHER JURISDICTION OR TO DISCIPLINE A PHARMACIST FOR SELF-ADMINISTERING CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES. ON PAGE 4, LINES 17 THROUGH 19 WOULD ALLOW THE BOARD TO DENY A RECIPROCAL LICENSURE FOR ANY OF THE REASONS THEY COULD DISCIPLINE A LICENSEE.

THE NEXT TWO REOUESTED CHANGES WOULD FIRST STRIKE THE VERBAGE ON PAGE 6, LINE 1 "BETWEEN JULY 1 AND AUGUST 1" WHICH RELATES TO THE TIME FRAME WHICH EACH LICENSEE SHALL RENEW. THIS IS UNNECESSARY AND CONFUSING BECAUSE IN THE SAME STATUTE, IT ALREADY CORRECTLY DENOTES ON PAGE 5, LINE 31 THAT THE LICENSE EXPIRES ON JUNE 30 AND ON PAGE 7, LINE 2 THAT IF NOT RENEWED BY AUGUST 1 THE LICENSE IS VOIDED. ALSO ON PAGE STRIKE THE VERBAGE ON LINE 4 AND AGAIN ON LINES 12 AND 13 WHICH Senate P H&W Attachment #1 3 - 15 - 91

RELATES TO THE LATE PENALTY FEE. IT IS DESIRED THAT THE BOARD HAVE THE FLEXIBILITY TO CHANGE THIS PENALTY FEE BY RULES AND REGULATIONS TO BETTER EFFECT COMPLIANCE OF PHARMACISTS.

THE FINAL TWO CHANGES WOULD ADD VERBAGE ON PAGE 7, LINE 42 THROUGH PAGE 8, LINE 1 WHICH WILL BRING THIS REGISTRATION INTO CONFORMITY WITH SUCH REGISTRATION FOUND ELSEWHERE IN THE STATUTE. THE LAST REQUESTED CHANGE ON PAGE 8, LINE 7 WOULD INCREASE THE MAXIMUM, NOT THE SPECIFIC FEE, WHICH COULD BE SET BY REGULATION TO CHARGE AN APPLICANT IN TAKING THE LICENSURE EXAM. THIS IS REQUESTED BECAUSE THE BOARD WISHES TO REINSTATE A PORTION OF SUCH EXAM WHICH WAS ELIMINATED TWO YEARS AGO.

FINALLY, THE HOUSE COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS MOVE FOUR OF THE FEES INTO THE FEE SECTION OF THE STATUTE ON PAGE 8, LINES 10 THROUGH 13. THE BOARD APPRECIATES THIS CHANGE BECAUSE THE FEE SECTION IS WHERE THEY BELONG.

THE BOARD OF PHARMACY RESPECTFULLY REQUESTS THE FAVORABLE PASSAGE OUT OF COMMITTEE OF HB 2073.

Madam Chairperson and Members of the Committee, thank you the opportunity to appear before you as a proponent of House Bill 2128. This bill, as amended, passed the House by a vote of 124 to 0.

This bill was requested by the Board primarily to correct inadvertent errors which had been made in the adoption of KSA 1990 Supp. 65-2896a and 65-2986b as enacted by the 1989 Legislature. However, amendments made by the House on page one at lines 23 through 27 would also make the language for Board approval of physicians' assistants educational programs similar to that which exists for other professions regulated by the Board such as occupational, physical, and respiratory therapists.

Man who beat gays contracted **DS virus**

A man who says he spent six years beating up gay males may have contracted the AIDS virus from the blood of his victims, according to his personal physician.

In a report published Friday in the British medical journal Lancet, a Nebraska doctor describes the case of a 49-year-old married man who claims to have had no possible exposure to the AIDS virus, or HIV, except for a stint as a truck driver in New York when he and his colleagues beat up gay males "too many times to count."

The account, which drew immediate skepticism from a wide variety of AIDS experts, said the man drew substantial quantities of blood from his victims and also sustained cuts on his own hands, which his doctors speculated allowed the virus to pass into the attacker's bloodstream. The man's doctor, University of Nebraska AIDS specialist Paul Carson, said he hoped the experience would serve as a "deterrent" to the "dreadful practice of bashing people because they belong to a particular minority.

But Carson stressed in an interview that his conclusion was only a "possiblity." Other experts said the chances of contracting HIV simply by contact with infected blood through a cut were remote.

For example, David Henderson, a HIV-tranmission expert at the National Institutes of Health, said that in only three cases out of 1,000 does direct, accidential "needle stick" with a syringe containing HIVinfected blood result in infection with the AIDS virus.

Other kinds of less-direct exposures, like blood on a open cut or ? scratch, "are likely to be associated with substantially less risk," he said.

More likely, said AIDS experts, was that the truck driver had engaged in other, riskier behaviors like unprotected sex or intravenous drug use - to which he was not admitting.

"Someone that violent and that full of hate is simply not trustworthy," said Tom Stoddart of the irely be relied upon ought not be the basis for a published account in a major medical journal. ... This story could do a lot of damage. It could once again summon up irrational fears about AIDS."

Few experts agreed with Carson that the truck driver's condition would serve as a deterrant to the increasingly common practice of "gay bashing."

"My first thought was that maybe they will stop beating us up," said Larry Kramer, the New York city playwright who founded the AIDS activist group ACT-UP. "But then again maybe they won't. Maybe they'll just start using guns."

"It serves him right," Kramer added.

Carson said that the case arose because the truck driver, who had recently moved from the New York area, found out that he was HIVpostive during a routine blood test. The man had been married for 25 years and had three children. His wife did not test positive for HIV.
