MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS.

The meeting was called to order by Senator August "Gus" Bogina, Chairperson at 7:38 p.m. on April 29, 1991, in Room 123-S of the Capitol.

The Chairman noted that the full commmittee would meet the following morning at which time he would identify his recommendations to lower SGF expenditures. He stated that after the full committee made decisions as to which aspects of his proposal to adopt, subcommittees would meet to determine the amount of cuts to be made in agency budgets. He distributed subcommittee assignments (Attachment 1) and charged the subcommittee members with reviewing those budgets. He distributed copies of Attachment 2, a memorandum prepared by the Kansas Legislative Research Department illustrating the comparison between the House subcommittees' recommendations and the recommendations of the Senate. In answer to an inquiry, Senator Bogina noted that all agencies were candidates for possible cuts and stated that one agency indicated that cuts were acceptable if the agency had the choice of where to make them.

Senator Rock moved, Senator Feleciano seconded, the introduction of bill draft 1 RS 1668 - an act relating to taxation; concerning individual income and sales and compensating use tax rates; imposing sales tax upon the rendering or furnishing of certain services; amending K.S.A. 79-32,110, 79-3603 and 79-3703 and repealing the existing sections. The motion carried on a voice vote.

The meeting was adjourned by the Chairman at 7:58 a.m.
