MINUTES OF THE House COMMITTEE ON Select Committee on Election Contest.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Bill Roy at 9:00 a.m. on January 25, 1991 in Room 254-E of the Capitol.

The Chairman called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

Ballots 529, 530, 531, and 533 were considered. Rep. Solbach moved that none of these ballots be counted and two votes be removed from the vote count of each party. The motion was seconded by Rep. Sawyer. The judge ruled to count these ballots. During discussion, it was noted that ballot 532 would not be included for consideration with these ballots because the facts concerning it were different. Ballot 532 is a signed absentee ballot and ballots 529, 530, 531, and 533 are absentee ballots that were not signed. Members examined all five ballots. During further discussion, concern was expressed that if members gave reasons for their action on the ballots, this might prejudice arguments made later regarding other ballots, and a motion ought to be accepted or rejected without explanation. Action then was taken on the motion. The without explanation. motion to not count ballots 529, 530, 531, and 533 carried unanimous vote.

Ballot 123. The Chairman said that ballot 123 was a challenged ballot involving a person who had married, changed her name, and then did not re-register to vote. Rep. Solbach made a motion that the ballot not be counted. The motion died for lack of a second. Rep. Snowbarger moved that ballot 123 be counted. The motion was seconded by Rep. Shallenbarger. In discussion, the Chairman pointed out that the ballot had never been opened. Concern was expressed that the current statute is discriminatory in its application as it most often affects women because they are the ones who are likely to change their names. A need to change the statute to remove any potential discrimination against women was noted. A member opposing the motion said that presumptions are being made without facts as to the circumstances involving the The suggestion was made that ballot 123 should be opened issue. for discussion in order to determine if it was spoiled. suggestion was made that the committee should recommend to the House that this ballot's envelope be opened on approval of a majority of House members. Rep. Snowbarger, with approval of his second, changed his original motion to recommend to the House that, with the approval of a majority of House members, the envelope to ballot 123 be opened and counted if the ballot is properly cast and otherwise valid. The motion carried by a vote of five to one. For those members requesting that their votes be recorded, the vote was as follows: Reps. Shallenburger, Sawyer and Roy voted in favor of the motion.

Ballots 492 and 493. When the identifying numbers on these ballots were clipped, other parts of the ballots also were removed. cut for each of these ballots was made in such a way that part of the ballot containing a box beside the name of a candidate in a race not at issue here also was cut off. According to counsel, the judge said that these ballots were mutilated. The judge also ruled to count these ballots. Rep. Snowbarger moved to continue to include these ballots in the present count. The motion was seconded by Rep. Shallenburger. In discussion, it was noted that there is no doubt that the ballots are mutilated. However, it is clear how the voter of each ballot intended to vote. The question was raised if the judge's interpretation of K.S.A. 25-3002 (b)(1) was correct when he said that these ballots were mutilated. pointed out that a voter should not be disenfranchised because election workers were negligent in handling ballots. A member stated that the cuts made to these ballots affected the voting boxes for the Insurance Commissioner's race and not the voting boxes for the 59th House seat. It was noted that K.S.A. 25-3002 (b)(1) is the statute which affects Rep. Shallenburger's motion. The motion to continue to include ballots 492 and 493 in the count carried by a vote of five to one. For those members requesting that their vote be recorded, the vote was as follows: Reps. Shallenburger, Sawyer and Roy voted in favor of the motion.

Ballot 426. The Chairman noted that ballot 426 was not originally counted. It was not properly strung and was found within a manila envelope. The manila envelope was within another envelope for storage of challenged ballots. Rep. Solbach moved that the ballot not be counted. The motion was seconded by Rep. Sawyer. A member requested that ballot 62 be pulled from the file in case it was In discussion, it was pointed out that each of the two ballots needs to have its own committee recommendation. Questions were raised in regard to whether the election board knew how to handle ballot 426. There is no way to know why it was challenged, why it was put in the envelope, or if the voter of this ballot also voted another ballot. No comparison has been made with the voter list and voter roll. A member opposed to the motion said that if ballot 426 was not counted, there is no other ballot to replace it. Therefore, the count would be off. It was noted that ballot 62 was placed in the spoiled ballot envelope and might have been replaced with a challenged ballot. A member said that ballot 62 had been separated out by election officials before the count and that the ballot had been clipped. The point was made that there was evidence from the election board regarding ballot 62 as to why it was separated from the other election ballots, but that there was no testimony by election officials in regard to why ballot 426 was separated. It is unknown as to how this ballot was handled, but the judge ruled to count it. The motion not to count ballot 426 carried by a vote of four to two. For those members requesting that their vote be recorded, the vote was as follows: Reps. Sawyer and Roy voted in favor of the motion. Rep. Shallenburger voted against it.

The committee recessed at 10:20 a.m. and was reconvened by the Chairman at 11:40 a.m..

Ballot 428 is at issue because it may not have been Ballot 428. properly preserved after the vote had been cast. The Chairman stated that the ballot was found after inspectors appointed by the judge could not justify the count. Rep. Solbach moved not to count ballot 428. The motion was seconded by Rep. Sawyer. Rep. Solbach said he made the motion on the same principle as his motion on ballot 426. The committee does not know the circumstances surrounding this ballot. Mr. Miller stated that the ballot envelope, by order of the court, was supposed to be sealed and its contents not divulged to anyone. He questioned if it was still sealed. The Chairman said the confidentiality of the voter's name was to be protected, but there was no confidentiality attached to the ballot. Mr. Hein said it was not opened by the inspector

because he was ordered not to open it. Members noted that ballot 428 is not a sealed ballot. Following the examination of ballot 428 by members, the point was made in further discussion that it was not known if the ballot was challenged. There had been no testimony from the election board in regard to this matter. A member pointed out that nothing in the statutes indicates that testimony from election board members makes any difference, and unless the committee's resolution regarding ballots 426 and 428 was consistent with that of ballot 62, he could not support the motion. He further noted that he would support the motion if the committee was consistent in its actions. The motion not to count ballot 428 carried by a vote of three to two, with one members abstaining. For those members requesting that their vote be recorded, the vote was as follows: Reps. Sawyer and Roy voted in favor of the motion; Rep. Shallenburger voted against it.

Ballot 528. Ballot 528 is a telefaxed ballot. Rep. Sawyer moved that the ballot be counted. The motion was seconded by Rep. Solbach. During discussion, the Chairman requested Mr. Miller to furnish members with copies of the letter from the Defense Department pertaining to faxed ballots (Attachment 1). Mr. Miller said this was a post trial document which was part of the court record. Mr. Hein pointed out the letter should be considered with the entire affidavit. The motion to count ballot 528 carried by a unanimous vote.

The Chairman stated the committee would meet at 8:30 a.m., on January 28. He adjourned the meeting at 12:00 noon.

(The count as a result of actions taken on ballots at the end of the January 25 meeting was 3481 for Wells, and 3478 for Christesen-Jones. Actions by the committee also affected 19 rebuttal ballots. Rebuttal ballots 272, 403, 424, 495, 598, 616, 623 were brought at issue in regard to ballot 59. Rebuttal ballots 50, 79, 87, 173, and 381 were brought at issue in regard to ballot 166. Rebuttal ballots 568, 570, 613, 632, 635, 639, and 644 were brought at issue in regard to ballot 552.)

# ADDITIONAL AFFIDAVIT AND ARGUMENT CONCERNING TELEFAXED BALLOT (#528)

COMES NOW the Contestee by and through her attorney Ronald R. Hein of Hein and Ebert, Chtd., and provides the additional factual evidence and arguments in support of the validity of ballot #528, colloquially referred to as the telefaxed ballot.

Contestee has just discovered additional information from Mr. Henry Valentino, Director of the Federal Voting Assistance Program, with regards to material previously sent to counsel for Contestee and submitted to the court in support of the validity of ballot #528. Mr. Valentino has submitted an additional affidavit with regards to the validity of ballot #528. A copy of such affidavit is attached hereto and is incorporated herein by reference as Exhibit "A".

Mr. Valentino has reviewed the factual situation involved in ballot #528 to the extent that such factual situation has

been ascertained. Based upon the information available to the parties giving the difficulty of communicating with personnel stationed at Operation Desert Shield, he has indicated that the federal program implemented in conjunction with 49 of the 50 states, including Kansas, on a voluntary basis, and implemented in the state of Tennessee by virtue of a court order, permits ballot #528 to be cast and counted to the full extent of any other lawfully cast ballot.

Contestee requests a reservation of right to call witnesses, including Mr. Valentino and any potential participants in Operation Desert Shield who might have cast ballot #528 as soon as Operation Desert Shield is concluded if such evidence would be neessary in order to sustain the validity of ballot #528.

Counsel for Contestant has once again suggested that there may have been some inappropriate conduct with regards to ballot #528, but, for the record, counsel for Contestee reminds the Court that there has been no allegation of fraud in this matter, and further that no evidence of fraud has been forthcoming from Constestant. In the absence of any such allegation of fraud, contestee submits that it is not necessary to obtain additional factual evidence from the person actually casting ballot #528. Contestee submits that a program was implemented by the federal government, was consented to by the State of Kansas, that ballot #528 was cast in accordance with the program as implemented by the federal government, as evidenced by Mr. Valentino's affidavit, that ballot #528 was

not challenged, objected to, ruled void, or ruled invalid by either the first special election board or by the recount board, and that ballot #528 should be ruled valid by the Court, and the votes determined thereon and counted for the candidates properly voted for thereon, including the contestee.

Counsel notes that Mr. Valentino's affidavit addresses other points raised by Contestant's response, so counsel for Contestee will not belabor the point by repeating those rebuttals in this memorandum.

#### AFFIDAVIT

I, Henry Valentino, being first duly sworn, do swear and allege as follows:

A telefaxed ballot is at issue in the State of Kansas, within Osage County. My understanding of the facts of same are as follows:

- 1. That the original ballot was telefaxed to a soldier in Operation Desert Sheild from Forbes Field, Topeka, Kansas.
- 2. That the telefaxed ballot was voted as the original and voting marks in ink were made.
- 3. That the telefaxed ballot with voting marks was returned by mail to the County Election Office in Osage County, Kansas, prior to the closing of the polls on November 6, 1990.
- 4. That the telefaxed ballot was in an original envelope with the name, address and signature of the absentee voter.
- 5. That the original ballot was not received by the election office in addition to the telefaxed ballot.
- 6. That this ballot was not questioned, or objected to, at the original counts.
- 7. That each absentee ballot voted was accountable to an equal number of absentee ballots registered. (There were no conflicting numbers of ballots.)

In accordance with the above facts, affiant further states as follows:

That my letter dated October 3, 1990, which was sent to all secretary of State offices outlined the original process to be followed. A toll-free 800 number was provided by the federal government to simplify the system, as well as relieving the local county of the expense of telefaxing. It was not mandated tonly the election official must telefax the ballot, nor was it mandated that all telefaxing must occur through this was it mandated that all telefaxing must occur through this toll-free 800 number. A ballot telefaxed from a military base is clearly within the contemplation of this program (Federal Assistance Voting Program).

That the original process set out in my letter of October 3, 1990, was subsequently modified such that telefaxed ballots were treated as originals.

That our process contemplated the validity of telefaxed ballots whether such ballots were telefaxed to the soldier or telefaxed from the soldier reflecting his or her vote.

In the absence of fraud, all telefaxed ballots are considered valid as per the policy of this office.

The unique circumstances requiring rapid deployment of large numbers of military personnel for Operation Desert Shield required that our policy be adjusted to include telefaxed ballots and to treat such ballots as a valid exercise of the right to vote.

## CONTESTANT'S RESPONSE TO CONTESTEE'S ADDITIONAL AUTHORITY AND ARGUMENT CONCERNING TELEFAXED BALLOT

COMES now the contestant, by and through her attorney, Victor W. Miller, and makes the following argument and cites the enclosed authority in opposition to inclusion of the "telefaxed" ballot, Ballot #528, in the final count of this contested race.

Contestant urges the court to carefully scrutinize the October 3, 1990 letter of Henry Valentino directed to the respective Secretaries of State (attached to contestee's memorandum as Attachment 1-G). Paragraph 1 of that letter makes clear that the only individuals entitled to utilize telefax balloting are those military personnel assigned to Operation Desert Shield. (See also Paragraph 3 of contestee's Attachment 1-E.)

Likewise, Attachment 1-G makes clear that any telefax communication is to be <u>initiated</u> by the local election official. Testimony of the Osage County Clerk that she had absolutely no knowledge of anyone utilizing a telefax ballot certainly indicates she did not initiate any such process. Without the involvement of the local election official there is no way of knowing whether the copied ballot was properly cast by a person eligible to do so.

Indeed, in this instance, it appears the "ballot" was not cast by an eligible individual. Contestee notes that "one absentee voter lists their current residence as Operation Desert Shield." If the implication is that this voter, William Hodge, was the individual casting the telefaxed ballot, this is not consistent with the records of the Osage County Clerk. As noted by Attachment 1 hereto, William Hodge's ballot was received in the very envelope issued by the Osage County Clerk at the time the ballot was issued. There is absolutely no reason this ballot would need to have been on a telefaxed copy since the original ballot would have been received by the voter at the time he received <u>and signed</u> the ballot envelope.

Again, as indicated by the October 3, 1990 letter of Mr. Valentino, the "faxed materials" were to be placed in a special envelope and delivered by military mail. "Citizens receiving absentee ballots in this matter will use the official Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot Security Envelope and Transmittal Envelope to return the voted ballot by mail to the local election official."

The person attempting to substitute the telefaxed copy for the original ballot does not appear to have utilized any of the authorized procedures to perfect this process. The person did not work with the local election official to establish the right to utilize this procedure. Since none of the required steps in the process were followed, the court is left with no evidence that the copied ballot was cast by an individual qualified to do so.

contrary to the conclusion of contestee, there is no evidence that the telefaxed ballot was "properly handled and submitted." All evidence supports the conclusion that it was submitted by someone not authorized to utilize the process or at the very least, by someone not complying in any way with the authorized procedure.

## ADDITIONAL AUTHORITY AND ARGUMENT CONCERNING TELEFAXED BALLOT

COMES NOW the contestee, Elaine L. Wells, by and through her attorney, Ronald R. Hein, and provides the court the following additional argument and documentation with regard to the validity of the telefaxed ballot, ballot no. 528.

Ballot 528, which is an original voted ballot, voted on a telefaxed copy of a ballot, was received by the Osage County Absentee Board, and properly counted at the original count and at the recount. Ella Hoover was on the absentee board in Osage County, and has advised counsel for Contestee by phone that she remembers the telefaxed ballot coming in, and it was within an internal absentee ballot envelope inside the external absentee ballot envelope. She recollects that they determined that the person submitting the absentee ballot was entitled to vote, and they removed the internal envelope from the external envelope,

removed the telefaxed ballot.

Counsel for Contestee has also received information from Henry Valentino with the Federal Voting Assistance Program in the Office of the Secretary of Defense in Washington, DC. Attached to this Memorandum is a copy of the material that he sent to counsel for Contestee by telefax, (Attachments 1-A through 1-G). The United States government obtained a court order against the state of Tennessee in U.S. District Court in Nashville, and a copy of the Temporary Restraining Order and Preliminary Injunction is enclosed. Tennessee was the only state in the nation to refuse to voluntarily comply with the telefaxed ballot program. Counsel would also call the court's attention to the copy of the letter which was sent by the Federal Voting Assistance Program to the State Election Office of every state (Attachment 1-E). Although the letter attached in the material from Mr. Valentino is to Mr. James B. Ellisor of Columbia, South Carolina, counsel understands that Bill Graves, Secretary of State of Kansas, received a similar letter.

Also enclosed with Mr. Valentino's statement is a declaration made by him with regards to the history behind the utilization of telefaxed ballots for the November 6, 1990 election only (Attachment 1-F). This was a temporary program that was set up just for Operation Desert Shield.

There is also an additional letter from Henry Valentino to the State Election Officials dated October 3, 1990 which further explains the program (Attachment 1-G).

Counsel for Contestee has also attached to this Memorandum an Affidavit from Secretary of State Bill Graves (Attachment 2) with regards to the utilization of telefaxed ballots for the November 6, 1990 general election, expressing his agreement to abide by the federal mandate. Mr. Graves also notified all the county election officials about this program, as was testified to earlier by Osage County Clerk Virginia Kersten.

Counsel for Contestee has also spoken with Virginia

Kersten, who advises that she was not aware of the telefaxed
ballot because she does not serve on the absentee board, and
would not have seen the ballot. She indicated that she had not
been informed by anybody about that ballot, provided Ella
Hoover's name. In order to get this Memorandum submitted to
the court in a timely manner, counsel has not had an
opportunity to get an affidavit from Ella Hoover, but has
advised her that it might be necessary for her to submit an
affidavit or testify with regards to her independent
recollection of receipt of the absentee ballot in the
appropriate absentee ballot envelopes.

Also attached to this Memorandum is a list of the absentee voters (Attachment 3). One absentee voter lists their current residence as Operation Desert Shield (Attachment 3, last page). Since the ballots have been commingled, it is impossible to tell whether the telefaxed ballot is that individual's or not, or whether it might be another individual whose residence might be listed at their home voting address. However, Contestee understands that the number of absentee

ballots received and properly recorded on this registry match with the number of absentee ballots actually received by the election officials in Osage County, and there apparently is no allegation of any additional ballot, nor of a mis-match of the numbers of people voting with the number of ballots. would seem to indicate that there was not any inappropriate insertion of a telefaxed ballot into the absentee ballots.

In conclusion, it appears that the telefaxed ballot is not only permitted by law, but was specifically approved by the Chief Election Officer of the state, that being Secretary of State Bill Graves, that the ballot was properly received and counted by the Election Board, that the ballot was properly handled and submitted, and should be counted by the contest court in the same manner that the ballot was originally counted by the Election Board and by the recount board.

TEMPORARY RESTRAINING ORDER AND PRELIMINARY INJUNCTION

The Court, having considered the Application of the United States for a Temporary Restraining Order and Motion for Preliminary Injunction and the declarations filed in support thereof, and after service and notice to the State of Tennessee, and having heard counsel for the parties, hereby finds that:

- necessary to ensure that certain overseas citizens who are duly qualified to vote absentee in the November 6, 1990, general election and who have applied in a timely fashion for absentee ballots by electronic transmission, will be given a reasonable opportunity to execute and return such ballots before the polls close on Tuesday, November 6, 1990.
- 2. There are reasonable grounds to believe that defendants' failure constitutes a violation of the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 U.S.C. 1973ff et seq.

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3. Military personnel deployed in the Middle East as the result of Operation Desert Shield who are eligible to vote in the State of Tennessee under the aforementioned Act will be irreparably injured by defendants' failure because these military personnel have not been given a reasonable opportunity to apply personnel have not been given a reasonable opportunity to apply for, execute and return absentee ballots before the polls close on Tuesday, November 6, 1990 and, as such, they will effectively be denied their right to vote in the November 6, 1990 general election.

MANAGEMENT CONTRACTOR AND THE CONTRACTOR OF THE

- 4. Issuance of this order will serve the public interest by protecting the right to vote of American citizens overseas, specifically Operation Desert Shield personnel, as that right is specifically Operation Desert Shield personnel, as that right is set forth in the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting set forth in the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens absentee Voting act.
- 5. The degree of harm, if any, that may be suffered by defendants as a consequence of this order is insignificant and, in any event, is cutweighed by the irreparable injury which overseas military voters would suffer if this Order were not entered.

WHEREFORE, it is hereby ORDERED, ADJUDGED, and DECREED THAT:

[a] The defendants, their agents, officers, and employees, and all those persons in active concert or participation with them, are restrained and enjoined from failing or refusing to take such steps as are necessary to ensure that military personnel, deployed as part of Operation Desert Shield, who are duly qualified to vote absentee in the November 5, 1990 general

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election and who have applied in a timely fashion for absence ballots by electronic transmission ("fax"), will be given a reasonable opportunity to execute and return such ballots and have their ballots counted. Specifically, defendants shall transmit via fax or some other expeditious means of mailing an absence ballot to those military personnel deployed as part of operation Desert shield who have sent, via electronic transmission, a timely absence ballot application to the defendants or agents thereof. If such absence ballots are received by defendants or agents thereof on or before the close of business on November 21, 1990 (and such ballots would have been counted as validly cast ballots if they had been received by the close of the polls on November 6, 1990), defendants shall count those ballots as validly cast ballots.

- [b] It is further ORDERED that the defendants shall notify the Director of the United States Department of Defense's Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) as soon as this order has been signed and request that the FVAP take such action as is necessary to notify these voters of the extension of time for receipt by Tennessee election officials of such ballots. The state shall assist the FVAP in whatever way necessary to publicize such extension of time.
- [c] It is further ORDERED that within 60 days after the November 6, 1990 general election, defendants shall file a report with this Court which sets forth the action taken by the defendants pursuant to this Order. A copy of this report shall

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be served on counsel for the United States of America. Such report shall include the details respecting those military personnel deployed as part of Operation Desert Shield and who have requested in a timely fashion via electronic transmission (i.e., fax) an absentee ballot for the November 6, 1990 election.

Dear Mr. Ellisor:

This is further to my letter of October 3, 1990, concerning use of electronic transmissions of absentee ballots and election related materials to and from military personnel in Operation Desert Shield.

The Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution states that, "No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens...," and the intent of Congress and the purpose of the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 USC 1973ff, is to permit absent uniformed services voters to use absentee registration procedures and to vote by absentee ballot, and the Act also requires that States accept and process any valid voter registration application from these citizens. In addition, the Presidential Designee has the authority to prescribe the registration application and absentee ballot application form and to administer the Act.

Therefore, under the authority given the Presidential Designee in the above referenced Act, the referenced letter of October 3, 1990, authorized electronic transmissions of absentee ballots and election related materials because of the exigency of Operation Desert Shield. This authorization is only for the November 6, general election and only for citizens covered by the Act who are in the Desert Shield area because the emergency conditions related to Desert Shield may dony those citizens their right to not Shield may deny these citizens their right to vote.

This action supersedes any State law which limits electronic transmissions of absentee ballots or election related materials to or from these citizens. Your expeditious implementation of this action is needed.

## DECLARATION OF HENRY VALENTINO

- My name is Henry Valentino. I reside in Fairfax Station, Virginia. I am Director of the Federal Voting Assistance Program in the Department of Defense, and have served in that capacity for 12 years.
- 2. Acting pursuant to the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, the President of the United States on June 8, 1988 (in Executive Order 12642) designated the Secretary of Defense to coordinate and facilitate all actions required to discharge federal responsibilities under the Act. The Secretary of Defense has in turn assigned his authority to the Director of the Federal Voting Assistance Program.
- 3. The Federal Voting Assistance Program, through consultations with the states and the appropriate departments and agencies of the federal government, and through the dissemination of information to potential absentee voters, has sought to essist persons, both military and civilian, protected by the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, who seek to vote absentee in federal elections. Pursuant to the provisions of this Act, the Program obtains information on absentee registration and voting procedures in each state and every two years publishes it in a handbook entitled the Federal Voting Assistance Guide, which is disseminated to American citizens around the world. The Program also reviews state procedures to determine if they offer any impediment to persons seeking to vote absentee. When problems are discovered, the Program frequently has

consulted with the states and suggested changes that might be made to promote greater participation in elections. On occasion, the Program has recommended to the Department of Justice that suit be brought to protect the right to vote guaranteed by the Act. The Program has worked with the United States Postmaster General and the Military Postal Service to assure the availability of expedited mail delivery of absentee balloting material. The Program also acts as an ombudsman for both voters and local election officials when problems arise. The Program also directs the voting assistance actions of military commanders through senior military voting officers of general or flag rank in each military Service.

- 4. The invasion of Kuwait by Iraq, the rapid deployment of U.S. military units to the Middle East as a part of Operation Desert Shield and the subsequent callup of Reserve and National Guard members caused the Program to initiate several actions to ensure citizens affected by these military operations would not be deprived of their constitutional right to vote.
- 5. On August 13, 1990, the Program brought to the attention of the senior voting officers of the military Services that the movement of new military units from the U.S. to the Middle East might affect the voting opportunities for these citizens because many citizens might have planned to vote in person and those that had already requested absentee ballots might have to make arrangements for the ballots to be forwarded to them. The Program also outlined the conditions for use of the Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot and directed that adequate supplies of Federal Post Card Application (FPCA) forms and Federal Write-In Absentee Ballots be available.

6. The Program coordinated with the Military Postal Service Agency to determine the problems of mail delivery and transit time to and from the Desert Shield area. The Program directed the Military Postal Service Agency to instruct all mail clerks to handle absentee balloting material as priority mail with expeditious handling. The Program was advised that daily mail service was being implemented and that 40 additional postal units were being established in the Desert Shield area. The military mail services (known as the Army Post Office, or APO, and the Fleet Post Office, or FPO) are utilized almost exclusively by members of the military stationed overseas. These mail services operate as follows: mail originating in the United States travels through the regular domestic mails to a gateway or dispatch center where it enters the APO or FPO system and then is transported to its ultimate destination; mail originating overseas travels the same route in reverse. The Military Postal Service Agency advised that regular first class mail one way transit time from major headquarters locations in the Desert Shield area to the postal gateway in New York City was five to seven days. The United States Postal Service has advised the Program that average one way transit time from the military APO/FPO gateway in New York City to locations within the 48 states is three to five days. The Program was also advised that express mail service of two to three days was also available between the major headquarters locations in the Desert Shield area and cities in the U.S.

- 7. As callup of Reserve and Guard units increased, on September 13, 1990 the Program directed commands to take the following actions:
  - a. Each reservist called to active duty should be advised of his or her right to vote and how to do it.
  - b. The reservist should be given an FPCA and be provided assistance to register and/or request an absentee ballot.
  - c. The return address used for the reservist should be where he/she will be during the first part of October. If that is unknown, arrangements should be made to forward election materials expeditiously to the individual.
  - d. Any reservist who can register and vote before reporting to active duty should be advised to do so.
  - e. If orders to report to active duty appear to disenfranchise a reservist, i.e. he/she has no time to register and vote or deadlines have passed to request a regular absentee ballot, provide the Program immediately with the reservist's name, SSN, and legal residence address and an attempt will be made to resolve the problem.
- 8. On September 17 and 18, 1990, I advised the chief election official in each state of the actions taken by the Department of Defense to facilitate voting by citizens affected by Operation Desert Shield and asked that they devise possible alternatives to ensure that these members of the military would have the opportunity to vote and that their votes would be received in sufficient time to be counted. See attachment 1.
- 9. By October 1, 1990, it became apparent that the voluntary efforts by the states would not be adequate to overcome the problems being encountered by voters in the Desert Shield area and that many citizens would likely be disenfranchised if immediate action were not taken. For example, military personnel were arriving in the Desert Shield area without the opportunity to register or request absentee ballots prior to their departure from the states.

Upon their arrival in the Desert Shield area, personnel found that logistical and support facilities were being utilized almost exclusively for command needs and little or no time was available to address personal matters.

Accordingly, I arranged for electronic transmission of voting materials to and from those military personnel who did not have the opportunity to use the normal process to request, receive and return absentee ballots.

10. On October 3, 1990, I advised the chief election official in each state that under the authority given the Presidential Designee in the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 USC 1973 ff, the use of electronic transmissions of absentee ballots and election related materials including applications for registration and requests for absentee ballots was authorized for citizens covered under the Act. See attachment 2. During October 18 - 23, 1990, I provided additional clarification of my October 3rd letter to those states, including the Secretary of State of Tennessee, that requested it. See attachment 3.

11. As part of my regular duties as Director of the Federal Voting Assistance Program, I conducted a survey of the various states to determine whether they would accept an electronic transmission of requests for absentee ballots from Operation Desert Shield personnel. As the result of that survey, I have determined that every state that has received such applications for absentee ballots has honored the requests, with the exception of the State of Tennessee. Attachment 4 is a record kept in the course of regularly conducted business of this office and is a summary of the electronic transmissions sent by the states as of November 1, 1990.

12. If Tennessee did not want to electronically transmit the ballot to the three citizens in the military in Operation Desert Shield who had made a valid and timely request for absentee ballots, the ballots could be sent by express mail and be received by the voter within 72 hours and returned the same way.

13. I have asked the unit voting assistance officers for the Tennessee voters whose requests for absentee ballots were rejected to have the voters complete a Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot and return it by express mail to the appropriate local election official in Tennessee.

14. The primary reason electronic transmission of requests for absentee registration and ballots was authorized is because of the unique situation in the Desert Shield area with the rapid deployment of personnel and support facilities coinciding with a major constitutional event in our democratic process—a general election involving all members of the U.S. House of Representatives, 35 U.S. Senators, 38 Governors and thousands of other state and local offices as well as major state and local ballot questions. Without the authorization for electronic transmission of absentee ballots, it is highly unlikely that these citizens would have the opportunity to vote. They would be disenfranchised as a result of service to their country. While Operation Desert Shield has affected almost all members of the armed forces and some members of the Guard and Reserve, there are adequate support facilities to allow these citizens to vote through the normal process if they are stationed in other areas.

I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct.

Dear Secretary Edmisten:

This office has arranged for high speed electronic transmission of absentee ballots to military personnel in Operation Desert Shield. In cooperation with AT&T and with the assistance of Office Technology Corporation, local election officials may fax ballots to military personnel in the Middle East. This option is provided at no additional cost to local election officials or to the voters. It is offered solely to ensure that all military personnel in the Middle East are able to exercise their right to vote.

In order to implement the above and under the authority given the Presidential Designee in the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 USC 1973 ff, the use of electronic transmissions of absentee ballots and election related materials including applications for registration and requests for absentee ballots is hereby authorized for citizens covered under the Act. Please advise all local election officials of this authorization.

Election officials should use the fax service if they believe the regular absentee ballot cannot be received, voted and returned in time to be counted. Absentee ballots with round trip transit time of less than 30 days should be considered for this service. In all instances, the regular absentee ballot should be sent by mail and normal procedures followed. If the regular absentee ballot is received in sufficient time to be counted, it should be counted in lieu of the faxed or other special ballot.

Local election officials will be able to fax election materials to an 800 number where the transmission will be routed through the AT&T Desert Fax Service to the Middle East. The faxed materials will then be placed in a special envelope and delivered by military mail to the addressee. The estimated delivery time should not exceed 48 hours. Citizens receiving absentee ballots in this manner will use the official Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot Security Envelope and Transmittal Envelope to return the voted ballot by mail to the local election official. The return mail transit time is estimated to be five to seven days. This special service will be available only to those addressees with APO/FPO zip codes in the attached list.

The attached cover sheet must be used with any election materials transmitted to a voter via this fax network. Normal ballot completion instructions must also be provided including any special instructions that must be followed by the voter.

There may be some instances when the Federal Post Card Application form, (FPCA) will be routed through the fax network to the local election official to request registration and/or an absentee ballot. In such instances the original application will also be mailed to the local election office. The faxed application should be used as the basis for complying with the requested action.

Please forward to all local election officials in your state a copy of the fax transmission sheet and also ask them to call or fax as soon as possible the name of a contact person, address, telephone number and fax number to Office Technology Corporation at (800) 966-VOTE or fax # (800) 368-VOTE. If the local election official does not have a fax machine, they may send the fax free of charge at any AT&T phone center or they may make other arrangements which may be more convenient. If they have any questions or problems pertaining to the procedures or operation of the service, they should call (800) 966-VOTE.

Policy or legal questions concerning this action will be handled by my office. If you have any other questions, please do not hesitate to call me.


