The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Rick Bowden.

Consideration of HB 2963:

Representative Wiard provided a balloon of the amendments to <u>HB 2963</u>, as was briefly discussed in yesterday's meeting. Representative Wiard reported to the committee that he had discussions with Dr. John Poggio and Revisor of Statutes staff to determine proper language to use in the bill. He discussed the proposed changes with his committee colleagues. (See <u>Attachment #1.)</u>

Representative Wiard moved to adopt the amendments to HB 2963 with the inclusion of amending Page 1, line 9, strike the word "essential" and insert "Kansas," and Page 2, line 15 strike " Essential" and insert "Kansas"; Representative Crumbaker seconded the motion.

Representative Blumenthal made a substitute motion, on Page 2 strike lines 27 through 30, encompassing the amend and on Page 4 lines 35 through 42 encompassing the amendments; seconded by Representative Hackler. Motion lost.

Representative Blumenthal made a second substitute motion to insert into Page 2 and Page 4 of HB 2963 "if deemed appropriate by the State Board and the local Board of Education;" Representative Hensley seconded the motion. Motion lost.

The original motion to adopt the amendments by Representative Wiard passed.

Representative Wiard moved to pass HB 2963 out favorably, as amended; seconded by Representative Pottorff. Motion passed.

Chairman Bowden gave a brief overview of the Senate school finance plan. Upon completion of its business, the meeting adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

AN ACT concerning education; providing for an essential skills assessment program; amending K.S.A. 72-9402, 72-9404, 72-9406, 72-9407 and 72-9408 and K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 72-9401 and 72-9403, and repealing the existing sections.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 72-9401 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-9401. The legislature hereby declares that it-is the purpose of the educational system in Kansas to ensure that each pupil is afforded similar equal opportunities for learning without regard to local geographical differences or varying geographic location, school enrollment size, economic factors, or variant pupil characteristics. In striving for equality of educational opportunity, the educational system should emphasize effective and meaningful educational experiences designed to give provide pupils competency in with the skills necessary to function successfully and to survive in today's society. Therefore, it is the intention of this act to provide for a minimum competency an essential skills assessment program under which the state in cooperation with schools may shall determine whether the declared purpose of the educational system in Kansas is being accomplished through preparation and administration of an examination for assessing the attainment by pupils of minimum competency objectives literacy in basic essential skills and may shall ensure accomplishment of the declared purpose through utilization of the results of the examination to identify pupil failures inadequacies in the attainment mastery of minimum competency objectives so that such pupils may be given remedial instruction essential skills, to evaluate and upgrade curriculum redesign curricula, to develop more effective instructional materials, strategies and techniques, and to devise action and implement improvement plans for improving pupil achievement pupils identified as not having attained literacy in essential skills and to recognize the achievement of pupils identified as having mastered essential skills.

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Sec. 2. K.S.A. 72-9402 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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72-9402. As used in this act:

- (a) "Board" means the board of education of any school district and the governing authority of any accredited nonpublic school maintaining any of grades one through 12.
 - (b) "School district" means any public school district.
- (c) "Accredited nonpublic school" means any nonpublic school accredited by the state board.
 - (d) "State board" means the state board of education.
- (e) "Pupil" means any person who is regularly enrolled in any of the grades one through 12 of a school district or an accredited nonpublic school.
- (f) "Parent" and "person acting as parent" have the meanings respectively ascribed thereto in K.S.A. 72-1046, and amendments thereof thereto.
- (g) "Minimum competency Essential'skills assessment program" means a program based upon the identification and specification of minimum competency objectives literacy standards in basic essential skills, the attainment of literacy in which skills individual pupils can demonstrate through assessment.
- Sec. 3. K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 72-9403 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-9403. (a) The state board shall adopt rules and regulations for the administration of the provisions of this act and shall: (1) Prescribe a minimum eompetency an assential skills assessment program to be conducted in the 1988-89 each school year in every school district and in every accredited nonpublic school in the state; and
- (2) design a special honors designation and insignia for affixation on high school diplomas of pupils who demonstrate mastery of essential skills to the extent necessary to enable the pupils to function competently and successfully in adult society.
- (b) During the interim between the 1988 and 1989 regular sessions of the legislature and during its 1989 regular session Periodically, but not less often than bienially, the legislature shall:

 (1) Study, review and consider the data and other information disseminated by the state board to determine if pupils in attendance in schools are satisfactorily attaining minimum competency objectives in the basic demonstrating mastery of essential skills; and (2) evaluate the effectiveness of the statewide minimum competency essential skills assessment program; and (3) consider the question of utilization of the results of the examination as a determinant for grade to grade promotion and for graduation from high school.
 - Sec. 4. K.S.A. 72-9404 is hereby amended to read as follows:

and outcomes of mastery of the essential knowledge base and those skills abilities which include subject matter proficiency problem together with reasoning, thinking, solving, conceptual and communication and understandings, the procedural attainment of which standards and outcomes

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(h) "Assessment grade levels" means and includes grade levels three or four, designated as deemed appropriate by the state board, grade levels seven or eight, designated as deemed appropriate by the state board, and grade level 10.

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?-9404. In order to comply with the requirements of K.S.A. 72-03, and amendments thereof thereto, the state board shall: (a) Identify, specify and distribute to each board in the state minimum competency objectives literacy standards in basic essential skills. Reading Communications and mathematics are the basic essential skills for which minimum competency objectives literacy standards shall be identified and specified. The objectives standards shall be related to those levels of competency in basic essential skills which are necessary to enable pupils in each of the grades 2, 4, 6 and 8 three and seven to achieve academically in school at their respective grade levels and to enable pupils in each of the grades 8 and grade 10 to function competently and successfully in adult society;

- (b) prepare and distribute to each board examinations for assessing the attainment by pupils of the minimum competency objectives literacy in basic essential skills which examinations shall be administered by boards to pupils in attendance in each of the grades 2, 4, 6, 8 three, seven and 10 in the schools governed by such boards;
- (c) study, review and evaluate the results of the minimum competency essential skills assessment program to determine if pupils in attendance in schools are satisfactorily attaining minimum competency objectives in the basic demonstrating mastery of essential skills;
- (d) disseminate appropriate information and summary data concerning the minimum competency essential skills assessment program to boards, the governor and the legislature; and
- (e) give technical advice and assistance and make recommendations to boards concerning the administration of the minimum competency essential skills assessment program.

Sec. 5. K.S.A. 72-9406 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-9406. (a) The provisions of this act do not apply to: (1) Any pupil determined to be exceptional under the provisions of article 9 of chapter 72 of Kansas Statutes Annotated if the special education program in which the pupil is enrolled provides only for nonacademic and nonvocational activities; or (2) any pupil who, upon determination by mutual agreement of the board and the parent or person acting as parent of the pupil, is not able to effectively participate in the minimum competency essential skills assessment program because the inability of the pupil to read, understand and speak the English guage.

(b) Each board shall report to the state board the number of pupils enrolled in the school district or the accredited nonpublic

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school, whichever is applicable, who are exempt under the provisions of this section from participation in the minimum competency essential skills assessment program. Such reports shall be made in the manner and at the times specified by the state board.

Sec. 6. K.S.A. 72-9407 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-9407. (a) The state board shall consult with various groups of school board members, school administrators, teachers, parents and other persons who are representative of the public in the identification and specification of minimum competency objectives literacy standards in basic essential skills and in the preparation of examinations for assessment of attainment thereof by pupils.

(b) The state board may make appropriate revisions or modifications of minimum competency objectives literacy standards in basic cocential skills and in the examinations for assessing attainment thereof by pupils of literacy in such skills.

Sec. 7. K.S.A. 72-9408 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-9408. Upon request, (a) A board shall make available to any every pupil who participates in the minimum competency excential skills assessment program, or to the parent or person acting as parent of the pupil, the results of the examination administered to the pupil, and, if the pupil has not attained 18 years of age, such results also shall be made available to the parents or a person acting as parent of the pupil. The results of the examination administered to a pupil who has attained 18 years of age shall be made available to the parents or a person acting as parent of the pupil upon written consent of the pupil.

(b) In the case of any pupil who does not demonstrate satisfactory progress toward mastery of essential skills so that such pupil will be able to meet specified literacy standards upon exit from third, seventh or 10th grade, whichever is applicable, the board shall arrange a conference between the parents or a person acting as parent of the pupil and school district personnel familiar with the pupil's progress to discuss the results of the examination and a recommended plan to improve the pupil's progress.

(c) In the case of every pupil who demonstrates mastery of essential skills upon examination at the 10th grade level, the board shall provide for recognition of the pupil as having qualified for a high school diploma to which is affixed the special honors designation and insignia designed by the state board. Every pupil shall be given numerous opportunities to demonstrate mastery of essential skills and to qualify for the special honors designation and insignia on the pupil's high school diploma.

Sec. 8. K.S.A. 72-9402, 72-9404, 72-9406, 72-9407 and 72-9408

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The state board shall establish criteria for determination of qualification of pupils for the special designation and insignia.

(2) The provisions of this subsection shall be operative for school years commencing after June 30, 1995, if the state board determines that recognition of pupils by affixation of a special designation and insignia on diplomas and transcripts is appropriate.

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and K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 72-9401 and 72-9403 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.
