The House Legislative, Judicial and Congressional Apportionment committee was called to order by Joan Adam, Chairperson, at 5:15 p.m. in room 519-S on Wednesday, February 19th, 1992 with all members present.

The Chair stated the purpose of the meeting was to have hearings on a proposed House redistricting plan. Maps and some reports describing that plan were distributed to House members earlier. Additional copies of maps and reports were available at the meeting. (Attachment 1)

She explained the procedure for the meeting. The committee would first have an explanation of the proposed plan by the sub-committee chairs and then the public hearing portion of the meeting would begin.

The Chair first called on Representative Kent Campbell who spoke on the western portion of the plan. He had been assisted in working this portion of the plan by Representative Keith Roe. He went over the western portion of the state district by district explaining any changes that were made, stating that district 110 had the most changes.

Following his presentation the Chair opened the floor for questions.

There being no questions, the Chair called on Representative Ken Grotewiel who presented the Sedgwick County portion of the map. Representative Wanda Fuller had worked with him on this map. He stated a new district, District 101, (District 103 now) had been created in the Wichita area as a result of increased population according to the 1990 census. The new District was 21% Hispanic. He stated that District 84 had been redrawn to have a 50.6% black voting age population and a total black population of 54% and meets the guidelines of Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act. District 89 had been redrawn to have a 55% black population and a 49.9% black voting age population. Following this presentation the Chair opened the floor for questions. There were no questions.

Next to present the southeast portion of the state was Representative Jim Garner. He had been assisted with this map by Representative Rochelle Chronister. Because of population shifts District 9 was consolidated with District 60. He said that this map does a good job of maintaining a community of interest in Southeast Kansas. Following this presentation questions were called for. There were no questions.

The Chair called on Representative Bill Reardon to present the maps for Northeast Kansas. He was assisted in the work on these maps by Representative Vince Snowbarger and Representative Gary Blumenthal. He stated Districts 33 and 34 were redrawn in Wyandotte County to distribute more evenly the black population. He also stated that Leavenworth had a population growth of 14,500 people when the families of military personnel were included in the census, and because of this population growth a new district was created, mainly in Fort Leavenworth and surrounding areas. Following the presentation, questions were called for. There were no questions.

Representative Gomez presented a description of the Shawnee County district. He told the committee two years ago this area lost a district and so at this time only minor changes were needed. The Chair called for questions. There were no questions.

Mary Torrence, Revisor, was called on to present the overall guidelines of redistricting. She stated there were three factors to keep in mind during the redistricting process. lst, population deviation with a 10% deviation being acceptable. 2nd, gerrymandering in drawing districts and 3rd, not violating the Federal Voting Rights Act. Under the Voting Rights Act whenever there is over 50% minority voting age population, and that population is in an area compact and contiguous enough to form a district, a minority district needs to be drawn. Questions were called for. There were no questions.

Mary Galligan, Research, presented testimony in regard to the compliance of numbers. She stated currently there are 62 districts that are not in compliance with the 10% deviation but with the proposed plan all districts are in compliance. She further stated that with the proposed plan there are 48 split counties, currently there are 50. She highlighted the issue of racial composition stating that under the proposed plan there are four districts that have over 50% minority population, 2 in Wyandotte and 2 in Wichita. Currently there are three. She stated all districts in the proposed plan are contiguous but that any comparison of compactness would need more study. She stood for questions. There were no questions.

The Chair then opened the public hearing portion of the meeting for testimony on the proposed plan from any interested parties.

Representative Doug Lawrence asked to address the committee. He stated he had not been in the House long enough to try and tell the committee how to draw the maps but that he felt the community of interest in his district had been ignored. He also stated that with the Wolf Creek Nuclear plant in his district, low level waste disposal and school finance would be future areas of concern and he felt it was necessary to keep the community of interest intact.

Ruth Wilkin, League of Women Voters, appeared before the committee, thanking the committee for the time spent on preparing this plan. She stated the League had been involved and concerned about reapportionment for 20-25 years and had seen former plans passed and then taken to court and the court knock them down. She further stated the committee should feel proud to have come up with a plan that was generally acceptable to the Legislature. She also stated the minority party, in years past, didn't have much imput into developing the plan but it has now evolved into a fine way of making the map with both parties working together.

Representative Reardon made the statement that the groundwork for implementing the current process was actually begun two years ago when Representative Snowbarger was the Chair and this process has continued on.

As there were no further conferees to appear before the committee the Chair closed public hearings.

The Chair then opened the floor for amendments and action on the plan.

Representative Robert Krehbiel offered an amendment which would reverse the numbers of District 101 and 103. District 103 in the proposed plan is in Northeast Reno County. District 101 is currently in Sedgwick County. He requested reversing these numbers. Representative Wanda Fuller seconded and the motion carried.

Representative Rochelle Chronister proposed an amendment which would delete Murdock township from District 74 and add it to District 75 and delete 3 townships (Lone Tree, King City and Groveland) from District 73 and add them to District 74. (Attachment 2) This motion was seconded by Representative Reardon and the motion carried.

Representative Snowbarger offered an amendment on the part of Representative Vancrum requesting removing Johnson County VTD 207B from District 27 and adding it to District 29. Also, Johnson County VTD's 1820 and 207A would be switched from District 29 to District 27. This was seconded by Representative Chronister and the motion carried. (Attachment 3)

Representative Reardon offered an amendment which would change the numbering of districts in Wyandotte County. They are currently numbered 31 to 38 and 40. He requested taking 39 from Leavenworth, making it 40, giving it to Wyandotte so the numbering would run 31 to 39. This was seconded by Representative Krehbiel and the motion carried.

Representative Mead offered an amendment on behalf of Representative Dawson. Her amendment would affect District 110, District 111 and District 117. She stated the numbers would be more consistent if District 117 gave up 658 people to District 110 and District 111 would gain 538. The numbers would then stand at District 117 - 19,181 (now 19,839); District 110 - 19,317 (now 20,197) and District 111 - 19,275 (now 18,837). This motion was seconded by Representative Chronister. Representative Grotewiel asked if Representative Gross was at the hearing and it was reported he was not. A vote was called for and the motion failed on a vote of 9 yeas and 9 nays.

A motion was made by Representative Blumenthal to introduce a bill implementing the maps and plans as amended by the committee and recommend it favorable for passage to the Committee Of The Whole. This was seconded by Representative Grotewiel and the motion unanimously carried.

The meeting was adjourned by the Chair at 6:45 p.m.


