Chair called meeting to order noting she would alter the scheduled agenda in order to accommodate Senator Oleen who was scheduled to Chair another meeting at this same time.

HEARINGS BEGAN ON SB 603.

Senator Oleen spoke in support of **SB 603.** She noted this bill was amended in Senate Committee and on the Senate Floor. She noted continued education is essential as referred to in **SB 603.** She asked that she be allowed to present written testimony in support of **SB 603** which was being prepared as she spoke. (Note:-this testimony was never provided for the record.)

On a point of personal privilege, Rep. Praeger introduced her two Pages serving today in the House.

Chair drew attention to two sets of minutes and requested members to read them over. Rep. Wiard moved to accept minutes for March 6th, and 16th, 1992, as presented, seconded by Rep. Bishop. No discussion. Vote taken. Motion carried.

Chair drew attention to Fiscal note on **HB 3172** that was provided to members, (see Attachment No. 1).

BRIEFING ON SB 603.

Ms. Correll gave a comprehensive explanation of **SB 603.** This proposed legislation will allow an out-of-state licensed dentist to practice in Kansas when involved in continuing education. She detailed exemptions, and answered questions.

HEARINGS CONTINUED ON SB 603.

Dr. David Sager, President, Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies, Inc., (Non-Profit), provided hand-out (Attachment No.2). He detailed requirements for continuing education for licensed dentists in Kansas noting much of this is done via slide/show presentations. It is believed hands-on demonstrations and hands-on dental training is the best way to obtain this continuing education. Currently, dentists from other states cannot touch the patient in Kansas. The proposed SB 603 would allow this hands-on education for the out-of-state dentists. He noted there is a balance in the language proposed to protect the dental student and the dental patient. By allowing superior dental education for Kansas dentists, Kansas consumers will benefit from dentists' superior knowledge. He noted the Kansas Dental Board earlier had concerns with the bill as did the Midwestern Institute. These two groups have worked together on an acceptable compromise. He noted the Dental Board still proposes further amendments which they have conferred together on, and Dr. Sager stated approval of those amendments that will be discussed later.

Representative Glasscock offered hand-out (Attachment No. 3). He noted SB 603 would assure practitioners from other states that they could be given a Kansas educational opportunity fully to learn new techniques in order to be able to offer a higher degree of care for patients. Learning the newest techniques for their patients depends on quality education. SB 603 will allow that kind of quality hands-on education to occur in Kansas. He urged support.

Dr. Timothy McVaney, licensed to practice dentistry in Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado, and Kansas, specializing in periodontal dentistry provided (Attachment No. 2). He stressed the importance of continuing education in the dental field, most especially the hands-on education. He has spent a lot of time/money to be licensed in Kansas in order to be able to obtain hands-on continuing education. He noted topflight clinicians can be attracted to Kansas to demonstrate the most advanced dental techniques. By allowing licensed dentists from other jurisdictions to participate in these seminars, there would be a significant number of dentists who could benefit, and more patients would benefit also. Dentistry is changing rapidly, therefore oral health providers need to keep current with the ever-changing procedures. The hands-on concept is a valuable learning tool. He urged support.

Dr. Sager and Dr. McVaney both answered questions. They noted this is not self-serving legislation. The fees charged for continuing education at their facility are used to defray costs i.e., dental equipment must be brought in, set up, teaching staff hired or procured. It was also noted the visiting dentists must provide their own patients.

Phil Elwood, Kansas Dental Board, offered hand-out, (Attachment No. 4) and then drew attention to balloon offered in hand-out. It was noted the amendment recommends language be added in line 32, page 1, "to conduct or lecture at a course of instruction approved by the Board"; language in lines 32-39 is deleted after the word "clinicians"; on page 2, line 20, delete "a clinician", and add "a Kansas licensed dentist or a clinician qualified under the provisions of subsection (d), above,". He noted with these changes, the Board could approve the passage of SB 603. He answered numerous questions.

HEARINGS CONTINUED ON SB 603.

Carl Schmitthenner, Kansas Dental Association, provided hand-out (Attachment No. 5). He noted the Kansas Dental Association believes that licensing laws exist to protect the people of Kansas, therefore, strongly opposes **SB 603**, to allow unlicensed persons to supervise other unlicensed persons outside a dental school recognized by the Kansas Dental Board. He noted that out-of-state or foreign dentists are unlicensed persons for the purposes of Kansas Law. There is no provision for reviewing or regulating these individuals. These unlicensed persons should not be permitted to perform dental surgery procedures in Kansas.

Dr. Hocutt, noting that he represented Michael Reed, Dean of the University Medical Center Kansas School of Dentistry, spoke on **SB 603**. He detailed the educational curriculum in Dental education that has been accredited by the American Dental Association. These schools are best informed on the dental school guidelines on education and have many years of experience in instructing and evaluating education.

HEARINGS CLOSED ON SB 603.

BRIEFING ON HB 3172.

Mr. Furse gave a comprehensive explanation of **HB 3172**, noting new law would establish a designation of visiting clinical professor license applicable to a person who is qualified for license to practice medicine and surgery under the Healing Arts Act. Forms will be provided by the Board of Healing Arts, and will be accompanied by a statement from the Chief Administrative officer of the University of Kansas School of Medicine that the person applying for this license is engaged by the University for patient care/clinical training.

Bob Wunsch, KU Medical School, provided hand-out (Attachment No. 7), and drew attention also to the balloon provided, (see Attachment No. 8). He noted the amendment requires the Medical Center to verify that the information on the application is correct. He noted that this proposed legislation would be beneficial, not only to medical students, but to patients as well. He cited specific situations in high technical areas where a visiting physician could come in to the Medical Center to teach or provide surgical expertise. Physicians from other states are at times needed in emergency room situations as well. He detailed the procedure whereby the Medical Center had been working cooperatively with the Board of Healing Arts and the Department of Insurance to create the proposed visiting clinical professor license. It is his opinion now that the Medical Center, the Board of Healing Arts, and the Department of Insurance are all in full support of **HB 3172**. He urged favorable consideration. It was his understanding that the Insurance Commissioner is not prepared to say that liability insurance, such as contemplated by this Act, is readily available. On the other hand, the Commissioner does not want to stand in the way of passage of the bill, realizing that if such insurance is available, the bill will undoubtedly be beneficial to the Medical Center in a variety of ways and on a number of occasions. He answered numerous questions. A lengthy discussion in reference to liability coverage ensued.

Mr. Wunsch detailed proposed changes provided in the balloon in hand-out (Attachment No. 8).

HEARINGS CONTINUED ON HB 3172.

Larry Buening, Kansas Board of Healing Arts stated the position of the Board is, that with the amendments suggested for renewal of licensure and the physician meeting the requirements of K.S.A. 65-2809, (continuing education), the Board has no problem with HB 3172. He answered numerous questions from staff.

HEARINGS CLOSED ON HB 3172.

Chair noted time allowance is a problem this date and requested those who were scheduled to testify on SB 343 and SB 709 to return tomorrow, if possible.

Mr. Phil Elwood stated he could not return tomorrow and was invited by Chair to make a brief comment now. He stated SB 343 originated from the Kansas Dental Board and the Board supports the bill. The Kansas Dental Association will propose an amendment on page 4 lines 39-on, and the Board does favor that change, i.e., the deletion of sec. 15.

Mr. Furse asked questions of Mr. Elwood regarding professional conduct, and would this affect a change in current law. Mr. Elwood replied he would need to study the language.

At this point, Chair requested Mr. Elwood and Mr. Furse confer on this concern prior to the meeting tomorrow at 12:30 p.m. They both agreed to do so.

Mr. Schmitthenner will return tomorrow offering comments on SB 343. Mr. Buening and Mr. Riehm will return tomorrow offering comments on SB 709.

Chair noted the meeting would convene at 12:30 tomorrow and requested that members be prompt in order that hearings could be conducted on the final bills scheduled, and discussion can be held on all bills previously heard.

Chair adjourned the meeting at 3:07 p.m.

SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 3172 by Committee on
Appropriations

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 3172 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

HB 3172 creates the visiting clinical professor license under the Kansas Healing Arts Act. The bill provides that the Board of Healing Arts may issue a visiting clinical professor license upon receipt of an application accompanied by a statement from the chief administrative officer of the University of Kansas School of Medicine stating that the person requesting the license is engaged by the University of Kansas Medical Center, or one of the affiliated private practice foundations of the Medical Center, to provide patient care and clinical teaching at the University. The application must also be accompanied by proof that the person has the same level of professional liability insurance required of other health care providers. A visiting clinical professor license would be valid only for the practice of medicine and surgery at the University of Kansas Medical Center. The Board of Healing Arts is authorized to charge a sum of not more than \$25 for a visiting clinical professor license.


The Board of Healing Arts indicates that the number of individuals who would be licensed as visiting clinical professors cannot be determined. The Board currently issues visiting professor licenses and currently has licensed 12 individuals in that category. The Board indicates that if the visiting clinical professor license category were to include 12 individuals \$300 in additional revenue would be realized. The

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Board also indicates that expenses would be involved in preparation of the application and processing of the applications for the license. The Board indicates that the provisions of the bill can be implemented and carried out within existing operating expenditure levels. Therefore, the bill is characterized as having no fiscal effect.

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TESTIMONY OF DR. R. DAVID SAGER

I am Dr. David Sager, a licensed Kansas dentist, and I come before the Committee seeking approval of Senate Bill 603. I am the President of the Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies, Inc., a non-profit organization dedicated to providing participatory or "hands on" continuing education for dentists in Kansas and throughout the Midwest Region.

Currently, dentists are trained at dental schools and then allowed to operate on patients. There are no dental schools in Kansas. Practicing dentists are required by some states, including Kansas, to obtain continuing dental education to maintain their licenses. Most continuing dental education is obtained by slide show in dark hotel meeting rooms and even on cruise ships. Dentists belonging to the Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies consider this "education" inadequate to teach the new techniques required to serve the needs of Kansans.

Institute dentists believe that "hands on" dental training is the best way to learn the latest dental techniques. "Hands on" training allows the dentist to touch the patient. "Hands on" training is the type of training that students receive in dental schools every day, but is rarely available after graduation day.

Under current Kansas law dentists licensed in another state are unable to come to Manhattan to receive "hands on" dental training from another dentist. Even a world renowned licensed dentist would have to just watch the proceedings. If the dentist touches the patient receiving care that dentist would violate Kansas law. If convicted the dentist licensed in a another state could be sentenced to one year in jail and fined \$1,000.

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Senate Bill 603 would allow a dentist licensed in another jurisdiction to come to Kansas to receive "hands on" dental training under the supervision of a clinician or a Kansas dentist. The bill gives the Kansas Dental Board guidelines to follow in regulating "hands on" continuing dental education. The bill allows the dental board to enact rules and regulations designed to protect the patients, the student-dentist and the clinician. The bill is adequately balanced to protect the dental clinician, the dental student and the dental patient. When Senate Bill 603 is passed Kansas will be a leader in offering the best continuing dental education experiences in the world.

Senate Bill 603 is intended to provide Kansas dentists with the ability to receive superior "hands on" dental training. By allowing dentists licensed in other states to participate in educational seminars, different medical opinions will be shared. Currently, it is difficult to attract top flight training programs to Kansas because of the legal consequences to out of state dentists and the relatively small number of Kansas dentists available for these programs in the state. By allowing superior dental education to Kansas dentists Kansas consumers will benefit from dentists' superior knowledge.

The Kansas Dental Board had several concerns about this bill. The Kansas Dental Board's concerns are also the concerns of the Midwestern Institute. The Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies has worked with the Kansas Dental Board during the legislative process attempting to work out the language of the bill so that it is acceptable to the Board and the Institute. The version of Senate Bill 603 which has been passed by the Senate addresses many of the concerns of the Kansas Dental Board. There

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are further amendments that the board would like to see in this bill. The Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies supports the improvements the board proposes.

Senate Bill 603 is legislation that will improve the educational possibilities available to Kansas dentists which will translate to superior dental service to consumers. Senate Bill 603 will not allow the wholesale importation of unlicensed dentists to practice dentistry in the state. Senate Bill 603 is a measured law which will allow Kansas dentists access to superior dental education while allowing adequate supervision by the Kansas Dental Board through its existing powers and rule and regulatory authority conferred upon the Kansas Dental Board. The Midwestern Institute is for protecting the health of consumers and the best way to protect patients' health is to allow superior education. If the legislature does not pass Senate Bill 603 dentists will continue to receive dental education in hotel conference rooms with clinicians showing slides to participants much to the horror of the country as portrayed on "60 Minutes" about a year ago. The dentists will not have the benefit of having "hands on" training on the most current dental techniques.

Senate Bill 603 will benefit dentists and, most importantly, patients and we strongly support the passage of this legislation.

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TESTIMONY OF DR. TIMOTHY MCVANEY

I am Dr. Timothy McVaneY. I am a dentist licensed in Nebraska, Iowa, Colorado and Kansas. I have completed specialty training for the practice of periodontal dentistry. I am the Treasurer of the Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies and the Director-designate of Continuing Education for the Creighton University School of Dentistry in Omaha, Nebraska. I teach Periodontics and Geriatric Dentistry at Creighton University Dental School two-half days per week and maintain a private dental practice four days per week. I am before you to advocate the passage of Senate Bill 603 which is a bill intended to increase the dental education potential in the Midwest and which will benefit Kansas dentists and patients.

Although I am a licensed Kansas dentist, my primary practice is in Omaha, Nebraska. I believe that "hands on" continuing dental education is vastly superior to receiving education by lecture alone. Because of this philosophy, I have expended significant time and money in obtaining a Kansas dental license so that I could participate in "hands on" dental education in Kansas. Although obtaining a Kansas dental license has been a significant burden, it was worth the expense. These costs were not small and the vast majority of dentists will not seek licensure in another state in order to receive periodic continuing dental education offerings.

I support Senate Bill 603 because it will allow dentists to come to Kansas and receive a quality "hands on" continuing dental education. This will be beneficial to Kansas dentists and their patients for numerous reasons. The foremost reason is that top flight clinicians can be attracted to Kansas to

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demonstrate the most advanced dental techniques. To be able to attract these clinicians it must be possible to have a sufficient number of dentists interested in any particular dental procedure. Kansas and Nebraska do not have a large number of practicing dentists and it is difficult to obtain the full spectrum of continuing dental education at home, although Kansas and Nebraska residents have a full spectrum of dental problems and their dentists must have adequate education to address those needs. By allowing licensed dentists from other jurisdictions to participate in such seminars there would be a sufficient number of dentists available to underwrite these educational offerings. Kansas dentists and patients will further benefit from the interaction of medical and dental opinions and ideas from other dentists in their region. Medical and dental education should have no state borders.

Senate Bill 603 allows for adequate supervision of dentists by the Kansas Dental Board. The bill provides the Kansas Dental Board with guidelines to follow in regulating "hands on" continuing dental education. The bill allows the Dental Board to enact rules and regulations designed to protect the patients, the dental practitioner - student, and the clinician. The bill is adequately balanced to protect all participants.

The bill before the committee will not allow unlicensed dentists to set up a dental practice without obtaining a Kansas license. The bill specifically provides for continuing dental education opportunities. Unamended portions of the Kansas Dental Practices Act should protect Kansas citizens from unlicensed dentists.

The Kansas Dental Board had some concerns regarding issues brought up by

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Senate Bill 603. The members of the Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies have worked closely with the Kansas Dental Board to resolve those differences. The Institute's primary concern is improving oral health care and the well being of its members' patients. The Kansas Dental Board has proposed changing some of the language of Senate Bill 603. The Institute supports the changes proposed by the dental board.

Senate Bill 603 will enhance educational opportunities for Kansas dentists. These improved educational opportunities will allow dental practitioners more experience in the clinical delivery of oral health care. It will improve their ability to learn of new techniques and how to use new devices to deliver improved oral health care for their patients. It is our belief that this added clinical experience improves the quality of care delivered by dentists. Patients will benefit from these improved services through the delivery of a higher quality of oral health care. It is our hope that this bill will allow educational opportunities that will assist dental practitioners to provide improved oral health care for the citizens of Kansas and the Midwest.

I have been so impressed with this approach that I developed this hands-on approach for an implant course at Creighton. I arranged to send the participants from this course at Creighton to Dr. Kirsch's presentations in Manhattan at Midwest Institute meetings. This approach with direct instructor participation in oral health care delivery is unique to continuing education but it is not unique in this country. As an educational institution, we have begun to develop this 'hands-on' concept for other continuing education courses. Our first group has completed the Implant Fellowship. This first group even included a dentist from Denver, Colorado, who had flown in with a patient from his practice so that he could learn the implant procedures.

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Your constituents deserve access to the best oral health care available. Dentistry is changing so rapidly that your oral health care providers deserve access to the accessible, affordable, and meaningful continuing education that can be offered with this 'hands on' concept. Please accept my endorsement and encouragement for this bill. I know that I will benefit. I can assure you that the citizens of Kansas and the Midwest will benefit. Senate Bill 603 is a bill which will enhance the possibilities for "hands on" continuing dental education in Kansas. I urge you to support the passage of this legislation.

Representative Sader:

I am writing in favor of S. B. 603. One of the best ways to learn is by hands-on (actual patient) treatment. I have experienced hands-on education both in Kansas and in other states. It has proven to be safe and effective. I believe that it is important for the state of Kansas to allow graduates of accredited dental schools licensed in other states to be allowed to participate in courses that provide actual patient care while training as a dentist under the supervision of a qualified instructor. Kansas has no dental school, but there are two institutions in Kansas which allow the practice of dentistry by non-licensed persons under the supervision of an instructor - The Wichita State University and Johnson County Community College, both of which have dental hygiene programs. I am not aware of any problems with these programs and believe they are an advantage to consumers and through the years have caused no harm. I have served for twelve years as an examiner for the Central Regional Dental testing Service, Inc. This testing service has provided the entrance level minimal competency examination for all dentists and hygienists seeking licensure in Kansas. Most of these candidates for licensure practice on patients without holding a license. They take the licensure examination without even the aid and supervision of an instructor. This is not an unusual activity as currently eleven states accept the results of this testing agency for use in licensing. There are also other Regional testing agencies that examine non-licensed dentists using live patients. This practice has gone on for years and I am not aware of any problems associated with it.

I believe that the Kansas Dental Board is supporting S. B. 603 (see attached letter from H. Philip Elwood attorney for the Board). I wrote to Senator Lana Oleen on February 21, 1992 concerning S. B. 603 and am enclosing a copy of the letter I wrote to her.

I would be more than happy to supply you with the rosters of each of these organizations if you thought they might be of value to you.



This letter is written in response to Senate Bill 603, which I strongly support and hope for its passage into law. Recently, I presented a hands-on continuing education course in dentistry for the Midwestern Institute for Advanced Dental Studies. I was greatly dismayed because of the inability of non-Kansas residents to participate in the course involving patient treatment. In essence, their role was relegated to bystanders in a non-contributory manner. The nature of this course requires a clinical hands-on approach in order to completely benefit from the educational experience. Indeed, it was a pity that competent practitioners from other, adjacent jurisdictions could not be given the opportunity to fully learn new techniques and apply them in their dental practices. The individuals who attended this course should be commended for their willingness to expand their horizons and offer a higher degree of care to their patients, even though the potential for learning could not be completely fulfilled.

It is my belief that the State of Kansas can significantly benefit from the passage of this bill because of the enhanced aspirations for patient treatment that these non-Kansas residents possess. Wouldn't it be advantageous for the image of the State of Kansas to have non-resident professionals leave with a positive experience, eager to have other individuals return because of the outstanding training? I am thankful of the efforts of those enlightened legislators, like yourself, who can rise above the discord and petty disagreement to help the community at-large by enhancing the quality of oral health care.







Testimony in Support of SB603
 Public Health and Welfare Committee
 March 30, 1992
 Given by Representative Kent Glasscock

Madame Chair and members of the committee. I appreciate the opportunity to appear today in support of SB603, a bill which would cure a curious flaw in the act which governs the continuing education of dentists in our state.

Under current law, a trained dentist licensed and practicing in another state cannot fully participate in hands-on continuing education courses in Kansas.

These dentists must be complete observers in advanced dental courses which include patient treatment even though they would be allowed to perform these same procedures in their own states. The nature of the advanced courses in question requires a clinical, participatory approach to completely benefit from the continuing education experience. Our laws needlessly preclude this.

SB603 would assure that competent practitioners from other states would be given a Kansas educational opportunity to fully learn new techniques in order to be able to offer a higher degree of care to their patients.

The ability of practicing dentists - both those in and outside our state - to stay current and provide the most up to date techniques for their patients depends on quality continuing education. SB603 would allow just that kind of quality hands-on education to occur in Kansas. I urge your favorable consideration.

A. What will the current law permit?

1. Workshops, study groups, seminars and other continuing education courses
 - Taught by a non-Kansas licensed dentist.
 - a. The "meeting" at which the teaching occurs must be of the -
 - i. Kansas Dental Association, or
 - ii. A like organization approved by the Kansas Dental Board.
 - b. The Board has within the past year interpreted the current law to allow a Manhattan based organization to conduct a continuing education course taught by a Foreign Licensed Dentist.
2. The Board has been able to discharge its duty to protect the public health, safety and welfare by:
 - i. Reviewing and approving the organization which sponsors the course;
 - ii. Reviewing and approving the course conduct; and
 - iii. Reviewing and approving the qualifications of the course presenter (clinician).

B. What will the Proposed Amendment do?

1. Persons who have no Kansas license will be permitted to practice dentistry in Kansas on Kansas residents.
2. There are requirements for participation in the course of instruction--
 - The "student" must hold a license in another state or country
 - The student must have professional liability insurance coverage

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3. Some issues have not been resolved ...

No requirement as to previous education or professional qualifications to participate in the course (may be addressed through regulations)

No limit on the duration of practice in the state (may be addressed through regulations)

4. In the current Bill, supervision of the students in the course is to be provided by "a clinician." Several issues are unaddressed;

- The supervising clinician need not have a Kansas dental license;
- The clinician may not be the "clinician" who is teaching the course;
- The concerns in No. 3 above, as to "students", can be repeated here as applied to the supervising "clinician."

C. Some General Concerns

1. An argument can be made that this change is like the laws of states which have dental schools where the law allows dental practice by students without addressing their qualifications.

--But, Kansas has no dental school and the organizations which propose to sponsor continuing education courses or seminars are not subject to the rigorous standards imposed on dental schools.

2. If this Bill is passed in the current form, the Kansas Dental Board believes it will be prevented from doing its job of protecting the public health, safety and welfare.

- D. The Kansas Dental Board respectfully requests that S.B. 603 be approved, but only with the changes set out in the balloon amendments attached.

--It is in the public interest to foster high quality continuing education in dentistry, but this does not mean that good purposes should become a cloak for a course of conduct which is potentially harmful--

--If the proposal can be modified to address the Board's concerns, the Board has indicated it could support concept.

Chairman and members of the Committee, my name is Carl Schmitthenner. I am the Executive Director of the Kansas Dental Association, which represents nearly 1200 dentists, or 80 percent of Kansas Dentists. I appear before you today in opposition to SB 603.

The Kansas Dental Association believes that licensing laws exist to protect the people of Kansas. Therefore, we strongly oppose allowing unlicensed persons to supervise other unlicensed persons outside a dental school recognized by the Kansas Dental Board pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1426.

It should be noted that out-of-state and foreign dentists are unlicensed persons for the purposes of Kansas law. The Kansas Dental Board has no means of reviewing or regulating these individuals. These unlicensed persons should not be permitted to perform dental surgery procedures in Kansas.

Thank you for your consideration of our opposition to SB 603.

I am writing you relative to Senate Bill #603.

As a practicing Oral and Maxillofacial surgeon in Kansas since 1981, I am opposed to this bill for the following reasons.


First: There is no mechanism for determining the qualifications of the "clinician" created in Line 20. The amendment would create a "clinician" who would be the judge and jury regarding what procedures are performed, and the success or failure of that procedure. The current law, specifically Section d, addresses this issue and provides a mechanism for review by either the Kansas State Dental Association or the Dental Board.

Secondly: In the brief it is stated, "The committee amendment would allow the exception to apply only when the visiting dentist has met requirements substantially the same as Kansas requirements in the jurisdiction in which such dentist is licensed". However, in removing lines #37-39 of the present statute this protection would be removed. I feel strongly that the clinician must be able to show evidence of expertise relative to the procedure they are "teaching and/or supervising".

Finally, I feel the "background" provided in the supplemental note on Senate Bill #603 is very misleading and in fact untrue. It states "Under current Kansas laws, a dentist who is licensed in another state could not attend continuing education in Kansas and receive "hands on" training, i.e., participate in the dental procedure as part of the training without being in violation of Kansas law". As clearly addressed by Section d of the current law this is possible as long as the course has been approved as specified.

It appears the proponents of this amendment simply want to circumvent the Kansas State Dental Association, its component societies and the Dental Board. Therefore, I strongly urge you to oppose this amendment and stay with the current law.

**Testimony Before the House Public Health and Welfare Committee
House Bill 3172**

Thank you, Chairperson Sader. I am appearing on behalf of the Kansas University Medical Center as a proponent of House Bill 3172.

This bill provides that a visiting clinical professor license may be issued by the Board of Healing Arts to a physician who is qualified for a license to practice medicine and surgery under the Kansas Healing Arts Act. Such physician might be a Kansas resident who now exclusively practices medicine out of state or a non-resident practicing exclusively in his/her state of residency.

An application for a visiting clinical professor license would be accompanied by a statement from the Medical Center that the applicant is under contract with the Medical Center or one of the affiliated private practice foundations to provide patient care and clinical teaching at the Medical Center. In a proposed balloon amendment which is attached, the Medical Center is required to verify that the information on the application is correct. This verification will be of assistance to the Board of Healing Arts in the issuance of a license.

The applicant is to further provide proof that he/she has the same level of professional liability insurance required of a Kansas Health Care Provider. In this connection it is the intent of the Medical Center to require of the applicant maximum coverage. Such liability insurance would be maintained during the time the visiting clinical professor's license is valid. A visiting clinical professor by definition is not to be considered a health care provider as the term is used in KSA 1991 Supp. 40-3401. The teaching and practice of such visiting clinical professor would be restricted to the Medical Center or one of the affiliated private practice foundations at the Medical Center. Full-time physicians at the Medical Center would not be eligible for this visiting clinical professor license.

Currently there are a number of physicians, residents and non-residents, who presently do not practice in Kansas but are interested in helping with the clinical and teaching programs at the Medical Center. Their assistance would be beneficial, not only to medical students but to patients. The Medical Center does not now have the availability of these physicians because under current law the cost of liability insurance which these physicians would have to obtain to be able to teach and practice part-time at the Medical Center is prohibitive. The cost of this liability coverage, in effect, denies the Medical Center a source of physicians practicing in other states that would otherwise be available to teach and practice part-time at the Medical Center.

The Hospital Administration at the Medical Center advises that there currently are

physicians in Missouri, Colorado, as well as in Louisiana who would be interested in applying for this visiting clinical professor license to assist in our emergency department. There has been and continues to be a need in our emergency department for services such as these physicians would provide. The Medical Center would utilize the provisions of this Bill outside the emergency department as well. As an illustration, when the Medical Center conducted it's first liver transplant we obtained the assistance of a physician from Canada to be present as a "backup". Qualifying this physician was ultimately accomplished but not without considerable effort and cooperation from the Board of Healing Arts and others involved. If the provisions of this bill had been law at the time, this would have occurred with dispatch and ease.

For almost a year now, the Medical Center has been working in conjunction with the Board of Healing Arts and the Department of Insurance to create the proposed visiting clinical professor license. The Board of Healing Arts is the author of some of these suggested amendments on the proposed balloon. I believe that you will be advised that if these proposed amendments are adopted, the Board of Healing Arts is in full support of the Bill.

As I understand it, the Insurance Commissioner is not prepared to say that liability insurance such as contemplated by this act is readily available. On the other hand, the Commissioner does not want to stand in the way of the bill's passage, realizing that if such insurance is available the bill will undoubtedly be beneficial to the Medical Center in a variety of ways and on a number of occasions. It is the Medical Center's understanding, based upon contacts previously made by the former Director of our Emergency Department, that coverage limited to a visiting clinical professor's services at the Medical Center or at one of the affiliated private practice foundations is available and that the cost thereof is not prohibitive.

We sincerely seek the support of you, Chairperson Sader, and your committee in the passage of this bill. Although this bill was only introduced this month, it was approved for introduction by the House Appropriations Committee in January. Your holding this hearing, today, is very much appreciated. If there are any questions in connection with the bill or the proposed balloon, I would be happy to try to answer them.
