## Hearing on House Bill 2885 - Amateur radio license plates, lessee.

Chairman Dillon introduced Representative Arthur Douville, sponsor of the bill. He testified that obtaining an amateur radio license plate is limited to persons who own their vehicles. He explained that persons who lease a vehicle cannot get a license plate that reflect their amateur radio call letters. He introduced Dave Hueben who also testified in support of <a href="House Bill 2885">House Bill 2885</a>. (Attachment 1)

Concludes hearing on House Bill 2885.

Hearing on <u>House Bill 2986</u> - Accessible parking for persons with disabilities.

Chairman Dillon introduced Representative Sandy Praeger, sponsor of the bill. She stated that the bill would strengthen the Kansas Law in the area of parking for the disabled. The bill if enacted, will give law enforcement officials the means to better enforce laws pertaining to parking for disabled persons. (Attachment 2)

Chairman Dillon called on Bob Burke who testified in support of the bill. He enumerated various shortcomings associated with the current law.

Chairman Dillon called on Mary Jane Stattelman who expressed support for the bill. She noted that the bill provides a mechanism to permit various law enforcement agencies to better enforce unlawful parking by unauthorized persons in parking areas reserved for the disabled. (Attachment 3)

Penny Sue Johnson stated she supports the above testimony.

# TESTIMONY ON HB 2986 HOUSE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE FEBRUARY 26, 1992

House Transportation Committee Re: House Bill No. 2986 February 26, 1992

On behalf of Attorney General Stephan, I am here to testify in favor of House Bill No. 2986.

The Attorney General's office supports House Bill No. 2986 because we believe this is a mechanism to allow the various law enforcement agencies to stop abusive parking practices without being burdensome.

One change mandates the return of an identification card when a disabled person dies. Currently, identification cards have been required to be returned when it was discovered upon the renewal date that the applicant was deceased. Since the purpose of the cards and the rights attached to the card were for the benefit of the disabled person, a law mandating their return upon the person's death is not unreasonable.

House Transportation 2-26-92 ATTACHMENT3 3-1 Another change prohibits the recognition of identification after 60 days by out-of-state residents who have become Kansas residents. Since a person should already have transferred their tags within 30 days of moving to this state this does not require anything more stringent or burdensome.

However, the change which we believe can help disabled individuals the most is the requirement of an access aisle between or beside a designated accessible parking space. This is crucial for anyone who uses a lift. The lift extends out from the side of the vehicle 4-6 feet. Therefore, if there is a car parked next to the handicapped parking space that space is unusable by the disabled person. Therefore, for the parking space to be of assistance to disabled individuals the access aisle is a necessity.

The Attorney General's office hopes that you will favorably pass House Bill No. 2986 out of this committee and therefore stop the abuse of handicapped parking and increase the ability of the handicapped population to access which in turn increases their independence. Thank you.
