The Senate Committee for Apportionment met at 4:00 p.m. in Room 521S in the Capitol on March 5, 1992 with the following members present: Chairman: Senator Ben Vidricksen, Senator Dick Bond, Senator LeRoy Hayden, Senator Nancy Parrish, Senator Ken Francisco, Senator Jerry Karr, Senator Jack Steineger, Senator Eric Yost, Senator Alicia Salisbury and Senator Dan Thiessen.

The Chairman opened the meeting by presenting an agenda to the group. He advised the members that the agenda would consist of two sections, one dealing with Congressional Apportionment and the second a review of alternative maps prepared by Steve Goodman and Harlan Priddle in response to problem areas throughout the state. (Exhibit A)

The Chairman advised the committee members of his intention to introduce a proposed congressional map into bill form in order to get the process moving.

Areas of concerned were expressed by Senator Thiessen as well as Senator Karr. Senator Karr indicated the new map would probably not receive the support of the committee and asked for a discussion of the objectives intended by the introduction of such a map. The Chairman indicated the map being proposed was not new but one that had been discussed and introduced originally on November 6th. Since no decision has been made on any of the maps, it was believed advisable to proceed with at least a starting point. Senator Steineger inquired about the purpose of the map at this time and was advised by the Chairman that it was intended to bring it to everyone's attention so that committee members would be advised in the event the map is introduced.


Senator Karr also advised the Chairman of his original understanding that the Chairmen of the House Committee and the Senate Committee would be attempting to limit discussions to 2 to 4 maps in the future. Proceeding with discussion of maps which were not considered appropriate or advisable was not believed to be an effective use of time.

Attention moved to the discussion of alternative maps that had been prepared as a collaborative effort between Senator Karr's office and Senator Burke's office. These maps were intended to highlight the differences in the Republican and Democratic maps previously presented. Senator Karr indicated these maps were very tentative and based on theories of Sedgwick, Wyandotte/Johnson and unassigned areas in Montgomery and Allen Counties to accommodate the decision process for the differences of opinion between inclusion of Coffeyville and the 14th or 15th Districts. Other maps including Wyandotte and Johnson County alternatives and Sedgwick County alternatives were also reviewed with some committee discussion. Senator Steineger indicated that one of the guidelines for redistricting was to maintain existing political boundaries as much as possible. He also made a motion which was seconded by Senator Karr and carried, to include the maps discussed at this meeting as a part of the record.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:06 by the Chairman.
