Hearing and Action on <u>HB 2669</u> - Sunset law, state board of healing arts, continuation. Re: Proposal No. 10.

Larry Buening, Board of Healing Arts, expressed support for <u>HB 2669</u> and stated the House Governmental Organization subcommittee studied the Board of Healing Arts in detail, and a report would be provided to the Committee if desired.

Chip Wheelen, KMS, and Harold Riehm, KAOM, both submitted written testimony and appeared in support of **HB 2669**. (Attachment 1 and 2)

The Chairman asked for wishes of the Committee on <u>HB 2669</u>. <u>Senator Walker made a motion to recommend HB 2669</u> favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Vidricksen. <u>Senator Burke made a substitute motion to amend SB 691 into HB 2669</u>, seconded by Senator Hayden. No discussion followed. <u>The substitute motion carried.</u> <u>Senator Burke made a motion to recommend HB 2669 as amended favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Kanan.</u> Senator Burke will carry the bill.

Hearing and Action on <u>HCR 5049</u> - Designating March, 1992, as Developmental Disabilities Awareness Month.

Glen Yancey, Rehabilitation Services, SRS, submitted written testimony in support of the Resolution which would recognize people with disabilities - they should be afforded the same fair chance to work and participate in their communities as people without disabilities. (Attachment 3)

<u>Senator Walker made a motion to adopt **HCR 5049**, seconded by Senator Burke.</u> No discussion followed. <u>The motion carried.</u> Senator Ward will carry the Resolution.

The Chairman asked for wishes of the Committee on the following bills:

Action on <u>HB 2800</u> - Transition planning services for individuals with disabilities enrolled in secondary special education programs.

<u>Senator Burke made a motion to recommend</u> <u>**HB 2800** favorably for passage, seconded by <u>Senator Ward.</u> No discussion followed. <u>The motion carried.</u> Senator Langworthy will carry the bill.</u>

Action on <u>HB 2964</u> - Agreements and obligations under the nursing student scholarship program.

Senator Ward made a motion to recommend **HB 2964** favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Walker. After saff briefing and Committee discussion on the bill, the motion carried. Senator Walker will carry the bill.

Action on HB 2566 - Assessment and referral service prior to admission to an adult care home.

Senator Ward made a motion **HB 2566** be amended and a provision added that would not allow new assessment forms be developed by SRS, and that old assessments be used. Because of the number of amendments offered at the hearing on **SB 2566**, the Chairman appointed a Subcommittee consisting of Senator Langworthy, Chairperson, Senator Walker and Senator Reilly.

Action on <u>HB 2702</u> - Adult care homes must admit or treat AIDS/HIV individuals for grounds to suspend license.

Staff briefed Committee on amendments offered by the Department of Health and Environment. Senator Walker made a motion to strike language on page 1, lines 23 and 24, "who receive federal or state money from any federal or state agency", seconded by Senator Ward. No discussion followed. The motion carried. Senator Walker made a motion to recommend HB 2702 as amended favorably for passage, seconded by Senator Kanan. No discussion followed. The motion carried. Senator Ehrlich will carry the bill.

Action on HB 3102 - Podiatry, establishment of review committee by state board of healing arts.

Staff briefed Committee on the bill and recommendations offered by Board of Healing Arts.

<u>Senator Walker made a motion to recommend **HB 3102** be reported adversely, seconded by Senator Strick. No discussion followed. The motion carried.</u>

Pages assisting at the Committee meeting were sponsored by Senator Strick.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:50 a.m. The next meeting is scheduled for March 30, 1992, 10:00 a.m., Room 526-S.
