## HOUSE PUBLIC HEALTH AND WELFARE COMMITTEE

MINUTES: JANUARY 21, 1993

All Committee Members present.

Chair called meeting to order asking members to read over one set of Committee minutes.

Rep. Bishop moved to approve minutes for January 19 as presented, seconded by Rep. Morrison. Motion carried.

Chair welcomed Director Sally Finney and invited her to begin her presentation.

Director Finney used an overhead projector to detail graphs and diagrams, showing percentages of male/female/ infected with HIV/AIDS in Kansas; a graph indicating growth of cases diagnosed since 1981; HIV/AIDS in Kansas by race. (Attachment No.I) includes the charts discussed.

She detailed the virus, noting there is still limited treatment procedures. There still is no cure, and this is not expected to change before the turn of the century. HIV is a spectrum disease, a blood born virus. This disease is contracted by unprotected vaginal or anal sex, by transfusion of blood, by sharing of needles. She noted it is very sad that there are persons with diabetes who are sharing their insulin needles in order to save on costs.

She discussed the continuing process of better educating the public. She elaborated on these programs. New data has revealed that about I/4 of cases now reported are from rural Kansas. The fastest growing numbers are women and children. Growing numbers are also showing up in the young pregnant teen age group. All of this is startling data.

Director Finney answered numerous questions. The Department has found that voluntary reporting to sexual partners is better than having reporting mandated. She agreed sex education in the schools is very important. An aggressive education program will continue. There is some progress in programs for caregivers of HIV/AIDS patients who reside in nursing home facilities, but still there is a fear by many of the caregivers. Again education plays a vital part in the progression and success of this program. It was noted there are 89 counseling service sites in the state, many of those are through the local Health Departments. There have been budget cuts, thus some programs can not be expanded; a lot of funding is going for research.

She emphasized, there continues to be a need to educate about prevention, abstaining, parents informing their children they are at risk and they must learn to protect themselves.

Chairperson Flower thanked Director Finney for her enlightening presentation, and noted it is evident Committee members are very inquisitive.

Meeting adjourned 2:35. Next meeting to be held January 25, 1993.

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
#### HIV/AIDS SURVEILLANCE IN KANSAS


#### JANUARY 1993

- Through December 1992, 722 AIDS cases have been reported in Kansas. That does not include persons reported in other states but now living and receiving care in Kansas. However, Kansas requires reporting of all AIDS cases by physicians and hospitals. (K.S.A. 65-6002 (1).)
- In 1992, Kansas more than doubled the number of AIDS cases reported in 1991.
- As of September 1992, Kansas showed 7.6 reported AIDS cases per 100,000 population compared with 4.3 per 100,000 in Nebraska, 7.1 in Oklahoma, 12.4 in Colorado, and 12.6 in Missouri.
- Since HIV-antibody positive cases became reportable in Kansas in July of 1990, 656 cases of HIV infection have been reported. This is an average of 22 per month. Kansas requires reporting by physicians and laboratories. (K.S.A. 65-6002 (a).)
- Women make up 12% of Kansas HIV positive reports and only 6% of Kansas AIDS case reports.
- Blacks make up 27% of Kansas HIV positive reports and only 13% of Kansas AIDS case reports.
- Teens comprise 3% of Kansas HIV positive reports and less than 1% of reported Kansas AIDS cases.
- Persons ages 20-29 make up 40% of Kansas HIV positive reports and only 19% of Kansas AIDS reports.
- Fifteen Kansas counties have 5 or more cases of AIDS. Sedgwick County has reported 185 AIDS cases (26%); Johnson County, 151 (21%); Wyandotte County, 119 (16%); and Shawnee County, 66 (9%).
- Eighty (76%) of Kansas counties (105) have been affected by HIV or AIDS in some documented capacity: reported HIV infection or AIDS, hospital care, death certificate, etc.
- Less than 10% of Kansas physicians are caring for more than 50% of the patients with HIV infection or AIDS in Kansas.
- Less than 10% of Kansas hospitals are serving more than 50% of the patients with HIV infection or AIDS in Kansas.
- Since KDHE began collecting data from the double-blinded HIV survey of childbearing women in 1990, less than 10 tests per year in Kansas have been positive for HIV. However, 50% of those in 1991 were black. The positives indicate the mother's antibody status, and it is now anticipated that 25-30% of their babies will truly also be infected.

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# HIV/AIDS in Kansas by SEX October, 1992






