MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Lana Oleen at 11:05 a.m. on March 23, 1994 in Room 254-E of the Capitol.

All members were present except: Sen. Hensley was excused

Sen. Oleen opened the confirmation hearing for James E. Butler for appointment to the Human Rights Commission and introduced him, as he is one of her constituents. Mr. Butler made a statement to the committee, and Sen. Oleen referred to background information distributed to the committee (Attachment 1). Sen. Gooch stated he also has been a member of the Civil Rights Commission, now known as the Human Rights Commission. He asked Mr. Butler, since he has previously served on the commission, how he feels the commission functions today. Mr. Butler responded by referring to segregation problems in 1953 and allegations of discrimination among state employees. He recalled that a group was formed to investigate those allegations, which were based mainly on race. He stated the group now has expanded into nine categories, encompassing discrimination complaints from all walks of life. Mr. Butler explained the group was named Civil Rights Commission, which seemed to have negative connotations and was later changed to the Human Rights Commission. He stated he believes it is doing a lot of good things. Sen. Gooch stated it seems we have reached a point when laws cover all people and it is possible we no longer need the services of such a commission to provide a protective barrier. Mr. Butler responded the time will never come when we don't need a group who will hear complaints of discrimination from citizens and a place to seek those remedies. Sen. Oleen asked Mr. Butler if the focus of the commission has changed and if he has observed differences now as opposed to when he served on the commission years ago. Mr. Butler responded his support for the commission and stated the continuing training provided by the commission as well as the professional staff of people who are committed are positive changes. Sen. Oleen asked Mr. Butler how long he has served on the commission, and he responded he was appointed to fill an unexpired in 1979 by former Gov. Carlin and reappointed for another term by former Gov. Hayden. The committee had no other questions, and Sen. Oleen closed the confirmation hearing.

Sen. Oleen announced the hearing for HB 2824, concerning alcoholic liquors, relating to reciprocal agreements between class A and B clubs. Mary Torrence briefed the committee on the bill, and explained the situation in Garden City where members of a class B club wish to be reciprocal with other clubs. Ms. Torrence explained the Class A clubs are not for profit clubs, and that reciprocity would have to be in the form of an agreement with other clubs. Sen. Oleen stated she has not received a fiscal note on the bill and asked Jim Conant, of Alcoholic Beverage Control, if the result would be that the clubs would have to file with ABC and if ABC would be required to check on reciprocal cards. Mr. Conant stated there would be no fiscal impact by passage of this bill; that his agency does not anticipate checking on reciprocal cards; that there are only 18 class B clubs in the state and he does not anticipate problems regarding the agreements which would be required if this bill were to pass. The sponsor of the bill, Rep. David Heinemann, was not able to be present because of commitments in the House; however, he did appear later in the meeting to give brief testimony (Attachment 2) and stand for questions. Sen. Gooch stated his concern for forcing reciprocal agreements between clubs and asked if that is what the bill will do. Ms. Torrence responded that the agreements would be voluntary. Sen. Oleen asked how many reciprocal club agreements the ABC has on file, and Mr. Conant responded it would not exceed 40; he stated, theoretically, all class A Clubs, which number approximately

364, could enter into such agreements. However, the limiting factor is that most Class B clubs do not have enough food sales to qualify. There were no opponents to the bill, and Sen. Oleen closed the hearing.

Sen. Oleen called the committees' attention to <u>HB 3055</u>, abolishes division of emergency preparedness and establishes the division of Emergency Management and called attention to the one year time period before the Adjutant General's involvement, which was discussed during the hearing. She also stated the bill is amendable to include <u>SB 827</u>, relating to emergency interim successors to the office of governor, which will not be scheduled for hearing in the House due to time limitations. <u>Sen. Praeger made a motion to amend the bill to include SB 827</u>, and the motion was seconded by Sen. <u>Tillotson</u>; the motion passed. After clarification as to the effective date, <u>Sen. Jones made a motion to amend the bill to include provisions for the city to petition</u>, as previously discussed. <u>Sen. Praeger seconded the motion</u>, and it passed. <u>Sen. Praeger made a motion the bill be passed favorably as amended, and it was seconded by Sen. Gooch; the motion passed.</u> (Committee Report, <u>Attachment 3</u>)

Sen. Oleen recognized Sen. Tillotson, who introduced government students from St. Mary College and the mayor of Leavenworth. Pages from Sen. Hensley's district were also introduced.

Sen. Walker referred to SB 826, requiring permits for licensees and persons mixing, serving or selling alcoholic beverages, and asked the chairman for committee consideration of the bill. Sen. Walker made a motion the bill be passed favorably, and Sen. Praeger seconded the motion. Sen. Gooch requested that staff brief the committee on the bill. Sen. Oleen stated she had made a time commitment to committee members and would have to adjourn, but the committee will meet tomorrow when the motion made by Sen. Walker will be considered and discussed.

Meeting adjourned at 11:40.

A VERY BRIEF OVERVIEW OF A LIFE

18 March 1994

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

My name is James Edmond Butler. I was born in Kansas City, Kansas on September 19, 1913. Although I did not realize it at the time, I lived in a ghetto in Kansas City, Kansas. The area extended seven blocks from north to south and nine blocks from east to west. I attended school in Kansas City, Kansas to include Sumner High School, the only all-black high school in the history of the state of Kansas. I graduated from Sumner in 1931, the same year that the Star Spangled Banner became the official National Anthem of the United States. The country was in a depression at the time and I went to Chicago in search of a job. Failing to find a job, I attempted to join the Army. I had hoped to become a Buffalo Soldier. The Army had four black units at the time - the 9th and 10th Cavalry and the 24th and 25th Infantry units. My hopes were dashed when I was unable to qualify in one of three specialties. I was not a blacksmith, I was not a barber and I was not a cook. I returned to Kansas City, Kansas and worked for the Works Progress Administration (W.P.A.) for \$3.20 per day. Later, I worked for the Wilson Packing Company. I was working for Wilson at the time of the attack on Pearl Harbor. My wife and I heard the announcement on the radio at 2:20 p.m., on December 7, 1941. I waited to be drafted but was not, I then volunteered on August 28, 1942. I was sent to Fort Belvoir, Virginia for Basic Training. After Basic Training, I was sent to the Aleutian Island where the Japanese were trying to establish a base of operations. I served for three years, four months, and was placed on reserve status in November 1945. I attended Kansas State University and re-entered the Army in March 1948. I retired from the Army in 1974, graduated from K-State in 1976, and attended Law School at Kansas University in 1981.

Dear Representative Heinemann:

Thank you for meeting with Mr. David Johnson of Brookover Companies recently about Southwind's continuing operating problems as a result of the wording in Kansas Statues and Kansas Alcoholic Control Regulations concerning Liquor Licenses.

Kansas Alcoholic Beverage Control Regulation Articles 19 and 20 provide:

- a. Class "A" Clubs Every corporate applicant shall be a Kansas domestic not-for-profit corporation.
- b. Class "B" Clubs Every corporate applicant shall be a Kansas domestic for-profit corporation.

These regulations and Kansas statues prevent Class "A" clubs from reciprocating with Class "B" clubs. In other words, during your numerous stays in Topeka, you are prohibited from utilizing the Topeka Country Club as a reciprocal member from Southwind Country Club simply because the Topeka Club is member-owned (not-for-profit) and Southwind is owned by Brookover Companies (for-profit). This obviously, prevents us from providing full value to our members by entering into reciprocal agreements with all bona fide Country and City Clubs in Kansas. We have no problems securing reciprocal arrangements with many prestigious clubs throughout the United States, except in our own state.

In my opinion the Kansas Statues and Alcoholic Beverage Control regulations should be changed to recognize bona fide private Country Clubs and City Clubs and allow all of these corporations to carry the same license regardless if they are "not-for-profit" or "for-profit".
