#### MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Al Ramirez at 1:30 p.m. on February 1, 1995 in Room 531-N of the Capitol.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Ramirez at 1:40 p.m. He asked for action on the minutes of January 24 and January 25, 1995. <u>Vice Chairperson Reynolds moved the minutes of January 24 and January 25, 1995 be approved.</u> Senator Lee gave a second to the motion. The motion carried.

The Chairman welcomed Frank D. Gaines to the Committee. Mr. Gaines, a former Senator, was present for the Confirmation hearing for the State Civil Service Board. Copies of Mr. Gaines' questionnaire (<u>Attachment 1</u>) and Statement of Substantial Interest (<u>Attachment 2</u>) were distributed to the committee.

Mr. Gaines began by giving some background on how he was approached for the position. Late last summer former Senator Mike Johnston called him and asked him if he would serve. Mr. Gaines responded that he was happy with what he was presently doing. Mr. Johnston told him it would be very helpful if he would do it, but Mr. Gaines replied that he would pass. Mary Holliday, liaison to Governor Finney, also asked Mr. Gaines to take the position.

Mr. Gaines stated that he had not been all that knowledgeable about what the Board did; essentially it is due process; the court of last appeal. Employees are disciplined or terminated. Mr. Gaines mentioned John Collins, Department of Administration, who was present at the hearing, and said he was doing a good job of running things. Mr. Gaines said he had no vested interest one way or another and no preconceived opinions about the position. He had also not seen anything of a partisan nature. Mr. Gaines the burden of proof is on the employee to prove his case. The offset of this is that the state has to move forward with the evidence first. This promotes a kind of balance.

Mr. Gaines stated he had been a fiscal conservative when he was in the Senate and had worked very hard. He feels this is a carryover into this position and stated that most terminations are justified. He is the only attorney on the Board, although the Department of Administration has access to lawyers they can call in. Mr. Gaines commented that they had made a change to hold costs down in that they would require no mandatory appearances on the Board unless the penalty was a suspension of ten days or greater. By this he meant that it would require a couple of members to be present for a three-day suspension or a termination where someone is going to lose his job. Generally on a suspension, it is already done when it is heard, but the Board hears it anyway. It was felt to be a waste of money for the Board to get together for those suspensions. This has finally been turned around by policy. It should save some money.

Mr. Gaines stood for questions.

Mr. Gaines was asked if there had to be three members present at a public hearing. The reply was that only two are needed for a hearing, but it takes three to take any type of action.

On being asked who the Chairman was, the reply was Downer Tyler, Second Congressional District, Topeka.

Mr. Gaines was asked about the caseload. In 1979 the Board met 17 days; in FY 94, the Board met 90 days, with the Board hearing more than 90 appeals.

The questions was asked of Mr. Gaines how the Board handled cases with two people when it takes three people for final action on a case. Mr. Gaines said there had always been three people present and there had never yet been a problem. A committee member used the example of the Parole Board where one person holds a hearing, but the majority of the Board vote on the parole.

The question was posed to Mr. Gaines that with the Board meeting so often, would he be willing to put in the time and stick with the job. Mr. Gaines replied in the affirmative and said that he would probably be tested.

Mr. Gaines stated that the big case they had last year was a case that he was involved in when he was in the Senate. The appropriation for the Highway Patrol had been cut. He voted "no" on the vote to cut. The Legislature changed the state law which said that a person could retire from the an agency and go back to work for the same agency. Mr. Gaines was very opposed to this law. When the Highway Patrol reorganized and federal funds were coming down, a new troop was organized. The Department of Revenue transferred the responsibility of truck inspection to the Highway Patrol. When the Patrol was forced to take on truck inspection the new troop was established. When this happened, three captains immediately retired and then were reemployed as lieutenants in the new troop. When the Highway Patrol appropriation was cut, the Superintendent had to do something so he picked out all the older men who had state pensions that had been paid on and laid those off before anyone else. All the old captains sued the state for unlawful termination. The case has not yet been decided. It was a well presented case by the lawyers from both sides.

In response to a question from a committee member, Mr. Gaines stated that it is an exception when a case goes to the district court; most cases are settled by the Board. Mr. Gaines noted that the Board had heard sexual harassment cases.

Mr. Gaines told of a case in which the chief of police had terminated one of the K.U. campus patrolmen. When all the facts were in, the decision was reversed and the man reinstated.

One of the members asked if there was some type of balance requirement for the Board. The reply was there has to be a 3-2 balance.

Another response by Mr. Gaines stated that the state provides the attorney for its side of the case; the employee hires his own attorney.

Referring back to the Highway Patrol case, Mr. Gaines thought the attorney for the patrolmen was working on a contingency basis. The men are seeking back pay from the day they were allegedly unlawfully terminated.

In response to a question, Mr. Gaines stated that if an agency terminates an employee and the Board overturns that termination, the agency involved would have to pay the employee back pay to the date the termination took place.

Mr. Gaines clarified his date of birth as being 1934. After a few humorous comments, Mr. Gaines responded in a serious vein that something needs to be done with respect to the checks done and what people have to go through that are asked to serve. Common sense needs to prevail.

It was commented that \$332,000 was spent on KBI checks last year on Racing Commission persons. A cabinet level position would require in depth checking, but some of the other checking is ridiculous.

The Chairman thanked Mr. Gaines for his appearance, gave the agenda for next week, and adjourned the meeting.

The next meeting is scheduled for February 7, 1995.
