### MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Joann Flower at 9:00 a.m. on March 8, 1996, in Room 423-S of the Capitol.

# Continuation of hearing on Sub SB 705 - Amendments to statutes regarding weights and measures devices.

Allie Devine, Secretary, Kansas Department of Agriculture, was present to answer committee questions concerning <u>Sub SB 705</u>. She said this bill will put the tools in place to better monitor and enforce the Department's weights and measures program. Through increased, uniform data collection, she said the Department will be looking for trends to identify those that are consistently abusing the law. She thought noncompliance figures would probably go up as better, more complete data is collected.

The Secretary said there will be fifteen state employees in the weights and measures program. They will also be contracting for six full-time fuel inspectors. She said the current \$675,000 budget was sufficient to pay for the scales portion of the program, but does not provide the money for equipment upgrades. She reported that the Governor's Budget Amendment includes over \$200,000 for equipment and personnel upgrades in the weights and measures program. (Attachment 1)

Committee discussion ensued concerning companies that self-inspect their scales. The Secretary responded that their inspectors will have to be licensed the same as all other service companies. If problems are found with these scales or scanners, the Department through rules and regulations intends to issue double fines. She mentioned Dillons, Amoco, and IBP as companies that currently self-inspect their measuring devices. The state does not have the money or manpower to do these extra annual inspections. She thought it would take at least a year to get everyone into their computer system and make any accurate estimates of how the new weights and measures program is working. She said the advice the Department has received from the experts and weights and measures departments in other states is to start with a small group of programs, then add as necessary.

The Secretary reported that they have not formulated procedures on a numbering system for seals to be used after a measuring device has been inspected and verified to be accurate. The committee was concerned whether violators names and noncompliance information was public information and would it be published.

There was still some committee concern regarding scales found out of compliance, but left in operation until repairs could be made. Page 14, line 9 of <u>Sub SB 705</u> indicates this could be as long as 30 days. Should it be posted that the scale is out of tolerance and adjustments made accordingly to protect both the consumer and owner. The Secretary said they are still working on this problem, but she would hope that 48 hours would be the maximum time allowed for repairs. She said if a scale were found seriously out of tolerance, it would be red tagged and shut down immediately.

Chairperson Flower closed the hearing on **Sub SB 705**.
