<u>Hearing on HB 2874 - Professional liability insurance for teachers and law enforcement officers</u>

Representative Darlene Cornfield noted in her testimony that law enforcement personnel and teachers are forced to join professional organizations in order to afford professional liability insurance and then it is limited to the provisions of their particular policy (Attachment 1). The professional liability insurance that is available on the open market is extremely expensive. This legislation would set up a pool for buying such liability insurance. Representative Cornfield suggested that fire fighters be added to those being served by the pool, add the option of million dollar coverage, and offer the insurance premium as payroll deductible. All companies who offer such liability insurance would be involved in the pool. The difference in prices between private and pool insurance was not known.

Helen Stephens, Kansas Peace Officers Association, reviewed all the professions involved in the Association and stated that they were in support of the bill (Attachment 2). This bill will not erode their present entitlement through their agency or the claims tort act. Officers want supplemental coverage and the bill may have to be expanded to meet their needs.

Sue Chase, Kansas National Education Association, spoke in opposition to the bill because they feel it is unnecessary for the teaching profession (Attachment 3). She informed the Committee of the availability of the low risk product which has two major suppliers in Kansas. Teachers functioning in their professinal capacity are covered by insurance carried by the school districts. Members of their association are offered additional liability coverage as a benefit of membership. This secondary insurance kicks in after the school district's insurance. Teachers can also purchase professional liability insurance as a rider on their home owners policy at a very reasonable rate. Some other professional groups (such as English, Math Assoc., etc.) offer liability insurance.

Tom Wilder, representing the Insurance Department, said they had no position on this proposed legislation .

Bill Curtis, KASB, explained that 160 school districts supply their own professional liability insurance and 75 get their insurance through KASB. He also reviewed the errors and omission policy of KASB. This is not the same as liability and is limited to rendering of a professional service. Professional liability does not involve property damage or bodily injury.

Representative Landwehr moved to approve the minutes of February 7. Representative Cox seconded the motion. The motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 p.m. The next meeting is scheduled for February 13, 1996.

Sue Chase Testimony Before House Financial Institutions and Insurance. Monday, February 12, 1996

Thank you Mr. Chairman and members of the committee for allowing me to address the Committee on HB 2874. I am Susan Chase and I represent the Kansas National Education Association. We are here to speak in opposition to this bill as it applies to teachers.

When this bill came to our attention, we were truly puzzled as to the neccessity of this measure as we had not heard of any problems relating to this issue. After further investigation, we still have not uncovered the need for this bill among the teaching profession.

In talking to members of the insurance industry and the Insurance Commissioner's office, we discovered that professional liability insurance for teachers is a very competitive market and a fairly low risk product for the industry. In Kansas there are at least two major competitors in this market who are more than willing to write policies in this area.

We also know that teachers, as well as all professional employees in school districts, are covered by professional liability insurance obtained by the school district. If an employee is functioning in their capacity, they are covered by the insurance carried by the school district. Secondly, all members of our association, which comprise over two-thirds of the teachers employed in the public schools in the state of Kansas have additional liability coverage as a benefit of their membership. Finally, it is my understanding that teachers can also purchase professional liability insurance as a rider on their home owners policy at a very reasonable rate.

With all of this information, it does not make sense to establish a risk pool for professional liability insurance for teachers; since it is my understanding that these pools are set up to handle very high risk insurance such as flood or earthquake insurance.

I would like to thank the committee for listening to our concerns and ask that you give consideration to not including teachers in this piece of legislation. Since I am not able to speak to the issue of law enforcement officers, I cannot pass judgment on that section of the bill. We see the inclusion of teachers in this type of pool as unnecessary and contrary to the needs of the professional in the classroom.
