Upon motion by Senator Jordan, seconded by Senator Reynolds, the Minutes of the February 7, 1996 meeting were unanimously approved.

SB 555: Establishing end-user support fund

Michael Byington, Wichita Industries & Services for the Blind (WISB), testified in favor of SB 555. Mr. Byington stated WISB requests an amendment in Section 1, line 19, following the word "services" to add the words "and adaptive equipment". Mr. Byington stated individuals who are sight impaired have specialized for the adaptive equipment that prints out information in various forms such as speaking or Braille.

In response to the Chairman's question, Mr. Byington stated he understands the financing mechanism for the end-user support fund proposed in SB 555 and has no disagreement with a surcharge.

Tom Bell, Kansas Hospital Association, referred to written testimony submitted to the Committee at its February 7, 1996 meeting. Mr. Bell testified the Association supports the bill. The Association is concerned about the charges associated with the use of telemedicine equipment. The ongoing costs could be more onerous than the cost of the equipment itself. Neither the costs of the equipment nor the ongoing costs are considered reimbursable by health insurance companies. This legislation does provide a vehicle to help make needed health care services available in areas where access is a problem.

The Committee agreed providing telecommunication services to all Kansans is a goal to which it aspires. However, there was no consensus regarding the manner of paying for the services.

The Chair appointed a telecommunications subcommittee consisting of the following: Senator Salisbury, Chair; Senators Vidricksen, Steffes, Downey and Feleciano. The Chair announced the subcommittee would meet at 8:00 a.m., Friday, February 16, 1996, in Room 123-S.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 a.m.

The next meeting is scheduled February 9, 1996.

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SUBJECT: S 555

We rise in support of this Legislation. We want to thank Committee for including the finance telecommunications services for Kansans with special needs among the items the end user fund will support. We have been advocating before several committees of the Legislature this session that "universal access" must include the concept of full access and usability of by persons having disabilities. equipment legislation represents the first evidence we have seen that our concerns on this subject are being considered.

A not-for-profit agency providing employment & services to people who are blind.

We would, however, strongly recommend an amendment. The issue is often not so much that Kansans who have special needs require unique or specialized telecommunications services. Equally or more often the need is for specialized adaptive equipment so that Kansans who have special needs, including Kansans who are blind, visually impaired, or otherwise disabled can have independent access to the same telecommunications services which are needed by or used by other segments of the general population. We would thus request that the words, "and adaptive equipment" be added between the "telecommunications services" and the word "for."

Thank you for your work on this legislation. Access to telecommunications and the information available therethrough will be essential in order for persons having disabilities to be able to live and work independently in the near future and from now on.

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
