MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON ELECTIONS, CONGRESSIONAL & LEGISLATIVE APPORTIONMENT AND GOVERNMENTAL STANDARDS.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Janice Hardenburger at 1:35 p.m. on March 5, 1996 in Room 529-S of the Capitol.

Senator Hardenburger asked for a motion to adopt the Senate amendment for the bill.

Senator Ranson made the motion to adopt the amendment. Senator Sallee seconded. The motion carried.

The committee discussed the cost of implementing this bill and studied a document stating the revised estimate total implementation costs (<u>Attachment 1</u>). This is a review of implementation costs taken from a survey conducted by the Secretary of State's Office. These estimates are based on implementing <u>HB 2079</u> in a combined manual and computerized system and not as a totally computerized system. Presently, this is all done manually.

Betty McBride, of the Department of Revenue, described the process involved and the time needed to implement the bill. She testified that it would be more time consuming; taking an additional one to three minutes per person, to complete the voter registration application process, at a driver's license examination station. She also stated that the normal wait time now is approximately thirty minutes. An amendment was submitted for consideration regarding Section 7 of the bill (Attachment 2).

The Secretary of State's Office was asked to re-read the NVRA requirements and compare them to current state law requirements to see if it creates any problems and report back to committee at the next meeting.

There was discussion about how to keep duplications from occurring on the voter registration lists since the information asked for on application cards don't provide for information that may have been submitted at an earlier time, such as the applicants former name and/or former address. This determination is now the responsibility of the county clerk's office.

Brad Bryant, representing the Office of Secretary of State, explained to the committee that there are provisions in the NVRA to clean out and update lists, but he stated that his office does not know, as yet, how effective these provisions will be.

Senator Ranson made a motion to remove Section 15 from the bill. Senator Clark seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Senator Bond moved to recommend passage the bill favorably as amended. Senator Parkinson seconded the motion. The motion passed.

HB 2088 relating to state officers and employees; concerning political activity by officers and employees in the classified service

An amendment to the bill was offered and discussed.

Senator Parkinson moved to adopt the amendment. Senator Wisdom seconded the motion.

There was more discussion on the language of the amendment. Senator Bond wondered why township and county elective offices, and an elective office in the judicial branch of government were mentioned in the bill but not state elective offices. There was also discussion concerning the differences between "classified" and "unclassified" employees.

Senator Wisdom withdrew his second to the motion on the floor.

Senator Hardenburger stated that further discussion was needed and that the hearings would continue on the bill.

The meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for March 6, 1996.

SENATE ELECTIONS 3-5-96 ATTACHMENT 1

A review of implementation costs, by the Division of the Budget, of the survey conducted by the Secretary of State's Office indicates that costs may total \$221,609 \$120,421 for state agencies and \$695,675 for county offices. This represents a reduction of \$432,042 to state agencies and \$191,825 to counties when compared to the information contained on the survey. The revised estimates are based on implementing HB 2079 in a combination manual and computerized system and not as a totally computerized system. The estimate costs to state agencies are as follows: Department on Aging, \$500; Department of Human Resources, \$605; Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, \$42,816; Secretary of State, \$72,500. The Human Rights Commission anticipates that 4.0 FTE positions of Office Assistant II will need to be hired, as current staff is not available to handle the requirements of HB 2079. The estimated costs to Sedgwick County has been reduced by \$191,825, as the original estimate was based on a fully computerized system.
