MINUTES OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON ENERGY & NATURAL RESOURCES.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Don Sallee at 8:00 a.m. on January 24, 1996 in Room 254-E- of the Capitol.

The chairperson opened the floor to requests for bill introductions.

Ron Hein requested introduction of a bill asking the Secretary of KDHE to set no different schedule of fees for facilities that burn hazardous waste unless and until the federal EPA adopts a "clean fuels" specification and in that event the secretary may assess a lower fee for such wastes as the secretary determines are in compliance with such "clean fuels" specifications (<u>Attachment 1</u>).

Senator Lawrence moved, with a second from Senator Hardenburger, to approve the request for introduction of the bill. The motion carried.

Senator Christine Downey requested introduction of <u>HB 2662</u> due to passage in 1995 of a bill allowing development of sand and gravel pits without applying and working through the water permitting process. The bill is requested by local entities that are in charge of monitoring the quality and quantity of that same water and asks that development be allowed to take place just as the law was passed except in the following instances:

1. In areas monitored by a ground water management district

2. Within the boundaries of an intensive ground water use control area

3. When the chief engineer determines that it is necessary to manage and protect the beneficial use of the state's water, preserve the rights of priority of appropriation and to protect the public interest and use of water.

A committee member questioned whether a dialogue was going on between the water district and the aggregate people concerning this issue rather than the committee being asked to act as mediator. Senator Downey stated a meeting was scheduled and it was possible some contact had already been made with one or two areas remaining to be discussed.

Senator Hardenburger made a motion to introduce the bill. Senator Martin seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Steve Williams, the Governor's appointee as Secretary of Wildlife and Parks appeared for his confirmation hearing (Attachment 2).

Mr. Williams told committee members he was honored to be selected for the position of Secretary of Wildlife and Parks. He stated the opinion that substantial progress has been made in the past months of solving the ongoing problem of Wildlife fund diversion, progress in restructuring the way the department does business and refocusing efforts on those activities that really substantiate and contribute to the mission of the department.

Mr. Williams related his education and working experience to the committee as provided in Attachment 2.

A member stated concerns about the difficulties encountered by the department concerning funds since the Wildlife and Parks had been combined and asked what plans had been or were being developed to insure the department is in compliance with the audits by the Federal Fish and Game department.

Mr. Williams stated in the past two or three years diversions occurred because of the inability to predict direct costs for Wildlife and Parks and apportion that out administratively. Changes in both organization and administration have been developed. A review request concerning reorganization was recently presented to the Governor which would split the Division of Public Parks and Lands creating a separate division of Parks and placing public lands within the division of Wildlife and should establish clearer lines of authority. The cost accounting system has been completely revised to reflect which department an employee is working for on any given date.

In answer to the question of whether the department is satisfying all government requirements Mr. Williams re plied affirmatively. He stated that by the end of February all processes will be in place and the department had been coordinating with Fish and Wildlife. Mr. Williams explained steps taken concerning cost accounting and monthly reconciliation reports to account for funds expended in various areas and noted indications that good progress is being made.

A member requested Mr. Williams' vision for the department. He replied that the potential to bring hunting, fishing and camping in Kansas to the national forefront was his major vision. In terms of the department he listed priorities: 1) sorting out diversion 2) the process of refocusing on what is essential and define what should be occurring 3) reorganization suggested to the governor as a minor priority 4) looking at methods to promote opportunities in Kansas.

Another member requested Mr. Williams thoughts on the endangered species act. Mr. Williams stated that both state and federal problems concerning endangered species has come from unreasonable actions concerning private individuals. The department has drafted an operational directive that defines for the public what constitutes "intentional taking". The development of common sense, practical guides for people in the department to understand what is in the law and regulations should guide both employees and the public. It is hoped the species can be protected and still let people have their livelihood.

Another member stated difficulties caused by the state's adopting the Sharp system, namely 207K employees expected to work an 86 hour every two weeks while others work only an 80 hour schedule for two weeks. Mr. Williams told members his department had drafted a letter suggesting a way to deal with this situation but the state had replied the suggestions were unacceptable. The next step will be further recommendations. Part of the difficulty is attached to annual leave or vacation time. Mr. Williams stated he was trying to respond to the 207K employees, especially since the conservation workers were paid the same wages for working 80 hours each two weeks. Essentially the 207K employees received a pay cut.

Senator Morris moved to report favorably Steve Williams for confirmation as Secretary for the Department of Wildlife and Parks. Senator Tillotson seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The minutes for the week of January 16, 17, 18 and 19 were placed before the committee for correction or approval.

Senator Lee moved to approve the minutes of January 16, 17, 18 and 19. Senator Tillotson seconded the motion and the motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 a.m. The next meeting is scheduled for January 25, 1996.

APTUS PROPOSAL FOR AMENDMENT TO K.S.A. 65-3431

K.S.A. 65-3431. Duties and functions of secretary; standards; permits; fees.

The secretary is authorized and directed to:......

(x) (1) Adopt rules and regulations establishing a schedule of fees to be paid to the secretary by off-site hazardous waste treatment and disposal facilities. In establishing fees, the secretary shall give consideration to the degree of hazard, quantity of waste, costs of treatment or disposal, and estimated future receipts. Fees shall be in an amount not to exceed \$.01 per pound of hazardous waste treated, except that in no event shall the fees established under this subsection for treatment of hazardous waste exceed a total amount of \$200,000 per year for any single facility. Fees shall be in an amount not to exceed \$.01 per pound of hazardous waste burned by any facility which recycles and utilizes hazardous waste primarily to recover useful energy or materials to be used in the manufacture of a product, including but not limited to the burning of hazardous waste in kilns to recover energy or materials for use in the commercial production of cement, except that in no event shall the fees established under this subsection for burning of hazardous waste by any such facility exceed a total amount of \$50,000 per year for any single facility. The secretary shall not set a different schedule of fees pursuant to this subsection for facilities that burn hazardous waste unless and until the federal Environmental Protection Agency adopts a "clean fuels" specification, and in that event, the secretary may assess a lower fee for such wastes as the secretary determines are in compliance with such "clean fuels" specification. In all other cases, fees shall be in an amount not to exceed \$.05 per pound of hazardous waste disposed of except that in no event shall any fee be established under this exception prior to July 1, 1996, and which exceeds \$50,000 in any 12-month period for the treatment or disposal of hazardous waste at any facility if such facility: (A) Operates under a permit or permits granted by the secretary pursuant to K.S. 65-3430 et seq., and amendments thereto; (B) treats or disposes of hazardous waste generated by such facility or a single generator located on property contiguous to such facility, or both; and (C) was treating or disposing of hazardous waste generated on such contiguous property as of July 1, 1991, with the knowledge of the secretary. In establishing the amount of fees pursuant to the immediately preceding exception, the secretary shall base the same upon the degree of hazard, quantity of waste, costs of treatment or disposal, estimated receipts for disposal services and waste reduction efforts of such facility.

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Article 8.—DEPARTMENT OF WILDLIFE AND PARKS

ORGANIZATION AND POWERS

32-801. Establishment of department; secretary; application of K-GOAL. (a) In order to reorganize the administration, planning and regulation of the state's parks, wildlife and other natural resources, there is hereby established within the executive branch of government the Kansas department of wildlife and parks, which shall be administered under the direction and supervision of a secretary of wildlife and parks who shall be appointed by the governor, with the consent of the senate as provided in K.S.A. 75-4315b and amendments thereto.

(b) The secretary shall be fully qualified by education, training and experience in wildlife, parks or natural resources, or a related field, and shall have a demonstrated executive and administrative ability to discharge the duties of the office of secretary. The secretary shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. The secretary shall be in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act and shall receive an annual salary to be fixed by the governor.

(c) The provisions of the Kansas governmental operations accountability law apply to the office of secretary of wildlife and parks and the Kansas department of wildlife and parks, and the office and department are subject to audit, review and evaluation under such law.

32-802. Assistant secretaries; employees; offices; wildtrust program. (a) The secretary shall appoint an assistant secretary for administration and an assistant secretary for operations. The assistant secretary for administration shall be fully qualified by education, training and experience in administration. The assistant secretary for operations shall be fully qualified by education, training and experience in wildlife, parks or natural resources, or a related field. Both assistant secretaries shall have a

demonstrated executive and administrative ability to discharge the duties of the office of assistant secretary. The assistant secretaries shall serve at the pleasure of the secretary. The assistant secretaries shall be in the unclassified service under the Kansas civil service act and shall receive an annual salary fixed by the secretary with the approval of the governor. The secretary also may appoint such other staff assistants and employees as are necessary to enable the secretary to carry out the duties of the office. Except as otherwise provided in this section, K.S.A. 75-2935 and 32-801, and amendments thereto, such staff assistants and employees shall be within the classified service under the Kansas civil service act.

(b) The assistant secretaries and such other staff assistants and employees shall have such powers, duties and functions as are assigned to them by the secretary or are prescribed by law. The assistant secretaries, staff assistants and employees shall act for and exercise the powers of the secretary to the extent authority to do so is delegated by the secretary.

(c) The assistant secretary for administration shall maintain an office in Shawnee county, Kansas. The assistant secretary for operations shall maintain an office in Pratt county, Kansas. The secretary may maintain offices and facilities to carry out the functions of the department in other locations in this state.

(d) The secretary shall supervise the wildtrust program which shall be responsible for the receipt and expenditure of moneys through gifts and donations.

32-803. Department and secretary continuation of fish and game commission. (a) Except as otherwise provided by law, whenever the Kansas fish and game commission, or words of like effect, is referred to or designated by a statute, contract or other document, such reference or designation shall be deemed to apply to the department.

(b) Except as otherwise provided by law, whenever the director of the fish and game commission, or words of like effect, is referred to or designated by a statute, contract or other document, such reference or designation shall

be deemed to apply to the secretary.
