Dr. Stephen Jordan appeared before the Committee on behalf of the Board of Regents and presented his written testimony in support of SB 669, SB 670, and SB 714 (Attachment 1). He told members that the Board went through careful consideration of the issues proposed in these bills before presenting them to the Legislature. In answer to Senator Karr, Dr. Jordan stated that he did not believe that SB 669 would permit the lease of land to an endowment association as proposed in 1995 SB 350. Senator Karr moved, Senator Morris seconded, that SB 669, SB 670, and SB 714 be recommended favorably for passage. The motion carried on a roll call vote.

Medical student loan act, approved postgraduate residency training **SB** 723: programs

Jerry Slaughter, Kansas Medical Society, appeared in support of the bill and thanked the Committee for introducing the bill at the request of the Medical Society. He noted that the proposal adds the specialty of general surgery as an approved postgraduate residency training program under the Medical Student Loan Act. Mr. Slaughter distributed copies of a proposed amendment which he stated would limit the application of the bill to the five populous counties named and to communities of less than 12,000 persons (Attachment 2).

Dr. Craig Concannon, an internist from Beloit, appeared before the Committee in support of SB 723 and told members that the physicians in his group rely on one another's expertise to deliver medical care and believe that the availability of surgeons enhances their practice and makes it more affordable for the community and

the state. Dr. Concannon stated that the surgeon in his group splits his time between performing surgery and providing primary care. He testified that since the surgeon injured himself in 1992 and has made plans to retire, Dr. Concannon has become aware of the difficulties of recruiting a surgeon as his replacement.

Dr. Dennis Tietze, President of the Kansas Academy of Family Physicians (KAFP), presented his written testimony in support of SB 723 (Attachment 3). He noted that his testimony included a letter of support from Dr. Rick Kellerman, Director of the Smoky Hill Family Practice Residency Program and information from the Legislative Division of Post Audit regarding repayment of medical student loans. Dr. Tietze stated that KAFP has supported the purpose of the loan program to provide primary care physicians in rural underserved communities and, after discussion with rural practitioners over the last few months, has come to believe that "several family physicians supported by a general surgeon can provide a higher, more comprehensive level of service to the rural community." He told members that there are models all over the state where this arrangement is working well. He tempered his support for the inclusion of general surgeons in the program with a statement that the Academy's hope is that the primary purpose of providing family physicians in rural, underserved areas is supported by the Legislature or at the administrative level of the Medical Center.

Dr. Tietze noted that there is no request for additional financial support of the program, but pointed out that the reason funding is becoming an issue is because the program has been successful in locating physicians in rural areas. In answer to Senator Morris, he stated that the proposed amendment to limit the service application area to incorporated cities of less than 12,000 persons would make the program focus on more rural, underserved areas. Senator Morris noted that one suggestion that had been made for saving state dollars was to not include the first year of residency training. Dr. Tietze stated that, in his opinion, that would make it easier for students to buy their way out.

Senator Rock stated that it had been suggested to him that psychiatrists be included as an approved residency training program and inquired whether Dr. Tietze believed that this should be done. Dr. Tietze stated that it would be his preference that the bill not be modified on a yearly basis and, given the fiscal concerns, the Academy would not want to dilute the program further. Senator Karr asked if the need for psychiatric care in rural communities would increase with the recommended hospital closure and downsizing of treatment for mental illness. Dr. Tietze stated that, as a family physician, he believes that common psychiatric disorders are being managed well by family physicians, and those who are either acutely psychotic or acutely suicidal can receive services from other communities or be placed in a controlled situation. He added that rural physicians are able to talk about and treat psychiatric symptoms without referring the patient to a psychiatrist which oftentimes is met with some resistance. Dr. Tietze again stated that he did not believe the purpose of the Medical Student Loan Act would be further served by adding psychiatrists to the list of approved residency training programs.

Dr. Linda Warren, President of the Kansas Medical Society and a family physician from Hanover, KS, testified in support of <u>SB 723</u> and stated that if the emphasis is on quality of care for rural communities, general surgery should be included as part of the program (<u>Attachment 4</u>). The Chairman noted that the original legislation has been altered over time and asked if general surgery was the single highest priority of the Kansas Medical Society and, if so, if it would be the last. Dr. Warren stated that she believes that general surgery is the last specialty that needs to be added to the program.

Mr. Bob Wunsch, Legislative Liaison for the University of Kansas Medical Center, appeared before the Committee and reviewed his written testimony on <u>SB 723</u> (<u>Attachment 5</u>). He commented that he had not seen the balloon and would have concerns if the restriction were not limited to general surgery. He also expressed concern about Dr. Tietze's statement that KUMC deal administratively with the requests made by family practictioners and general surgeons for receipt of loans because he believes the proposal makes the program more difficult to administer. He requested that the Legislature address whether the proposed legislation would be retroactive or prospective, explaining that the Medical Center receives requests on a regular basis for forgiveness of loans and would not welcome the responsibility of making these decisions administratively.

The Chairman stated that the bill would be held in Committee for further consideration.

Senator Vancrum moved, Senator Brady seconded, that bill draft 5 RS 2439 as requested by the Department of Administration be introduced. The motion carried on a voice vote.

It was moved by Senator Salisbury and seconded by Senator Brady that bill draft 5 RS 2457 as requested by Senator Salisbury be introduced. The motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Brady moved, Senator Morris seconded, that bill draft 5 RS 2454 be introduced as requested by

Senator Brady. The motion carried on a voice vote.

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Committee

I. Appreciate the opportunity to appear before the Committee to discuss Senate Bills 669, 670 and 714. Regent Hiebert, Chairman of the Board of Regents, asked me to give you his apologies for not being here today, but he is actually tending to patients this week.

II. Background on the Bills

- In May 1994 the Board of Regents asked the Council of Presidents to 1. review the Board Policy Manual and make recommendations for simplifying Board Policy and for further delegation of responsibility from the Board of the presidents and chancellor. The Council of Presidents referred the matter to both the Council of Business Officers and the Council of Chief Academic Officers. On February 15, 1995 the Council of Presidents scheduled a special meeting of review the recommendations of the Council of Business Officers and the Council of Chief Academic Officers with the staff of the Board of Regents. The discussions resulted in amendments to some items, several items were referred back to the Councils and several items were dropped from further consideration. Both the Council of Presidents and the staff concurred in the policy changes which were then forwarded to the Chairman of the Board for review and consideration. The Chairman asked two other members of the Board for comments and, as a result, several additional changes were suggested and incorporated, particularly in the areas of out-of-state travel for chief executive officers, internal auditing, use of private funds to support capital construction and discretionary funds provided to chief executive officers from affiliated corporations.
- (2) At the June 1995 meeting of the Board of Regents, the Board adopted the proposed changes to the Board Policy Manual, and also recommended that three statutory changes be sought to:
 - (a) Change KSA 75-3728a to permit delegation of write-off of uncollectible accounts receivable to the chief executive officers;

- (b) Change statutes to permit delegation of easements to the chief executive officers; and
- (c) Change statutes to permit delegation of parking and traffic regulation to the chief executive officers.
- (3) The three bills before you today, Senate Bills 669, 670 and 714 would accomplish these three objectives.
 - (a) SB 669 amends KSA 74-3264 to permit the Board to delegate to the chief executive officers the authority to grant or convey right-of-way easements. Any easement granted would still be subject to being submitted to the Attorney General for approval as to form.
 - (b) SB 670 amends KSA 75-3728a to include the chief executive officers along with agency heads such as the Secretaries of Administration and Social and Rehabilitation Services and other agency heads approved by the Director of Accounts and Reports for the purpose of writing-off accounts receivable. This authority would not change the requirement for these accounts to go through the state's collection process prior to being written off.
 - (c) SB 714 amends several sections of the Kansas Statutes Annotated to permit the Board to delegate to the chief executive officers the authority to regulate parking and control of traffic on various campuses of the universities.

III. Conclusion

The Board believes that these three statutory changes are consistent with its desire to provide its chief executive officers with the authority to mange the daily operations of the campuses while the Board focuses its attention on matters of policy. Two of the bills, SB 669 and SB 714, are delegations from the Board to the CEO's, which permits the Board to specify the conditions of the delegations, and if necessary for any reason, to modify or withdraw those delegations. The third bill, SB 670, simply entrusts the presidents and chancellor with the same authority as several other state agency heads. Mr. Chairman, I would be pleased to respond to specific questions the Committee may have.

SENATE BILL No. 723

AN ACT concerning the medical student loan act; relating to approved postgraduate residency training programs; amending K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 76-381 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 76-381 is hereby amended to read as follows: 76-381. As used in K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 76-380 through 76-386 and amendments thereto:

- (a) "Act" means the medical student loan act;
- (b) "approved postgraduate residency training program" means a residency training program in general pediatrics, general internal medicine, general surgery, family medicine, family practice or emergency medicine;
- (c) "service commitment area" means (1) any community within any county in Kansas other than Douglas, Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee or Wyandotte county, (2) any state medical care facility or institution, (3) any medical center operated by the veterans administration of the United States, or (4) the full-time faculty of the university of Kansas school of medicine in family medicine or family practice; and
- (d) "state medical care facility or institution" includes, but is not limited to, the Kansas state school for the visually handicapped, the Kansas state school for the deaf, any institution under the secretary of social and rehabilitation services, as defined by subsection (b) of K.S.A. 76-12a01 and amendments thereto or by subsection (b) of K.S.A. 76-12a18 and amendments thereto, the Kansas soldiers' home and any correctional institution under the secretary of corrections, as defined by subsection (d) of K.S.A. 75-5202 and amendments thereto, but shall not include any state educational institution under the state board of regents, as defined by subsection (a) of K.S.A. 76-711 and amendments thereto, except as specifically provided by statute.
 - Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 76-381 is hereby repealed.
 - Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its blication in the Kansas register.

It is with sincere honor and respect that I stand before you today as representative of the Kansas Academy of Family Physicians in support of the modification of the medical student loan program to include general surgeons as a qualified specialty for participation. The KAFP the Kansas Medical Student Loan program as a measure to help provide medical care to rural The addition of general surgery to this Kansas. program would enhance the ability of rural communities to have access to comprehensive care. It has already been demonstrated in several communities that several family physicians supported by a general surgeon can provide a higher, more comprehensive level of service to the rural community. The general surgeon can provide certain surgical skills for the care of abdominal surgery, traumatic and emergency events, cesarean section, and certain endoscopies. Council Grove and Clay Center are two examples where a large group of family physicians can provide enhanced services by the presence of a general surgeon in the community. The obstetrical care and emergency trauma care would be compromised in both of these communities without the presence of a general surgeon.

I have attached a letter of support from the director of the rural family practice residency The provision to add surgeons program in Salina. to this program raises some concerns. We at the KAFP still believe 85% of the communities' medical needs are served by well trained family The addition of surgeons to the rural physicians. community probably raises this level to 95%. However, the most urgent need for undeserved rural Kansas is the provision of primary care. included a copy of a letter from the Legislative Division of Post Audit that gives an historical perspective on the performance of the primary care specialties in the loan program. Seventy two percent of the family physicians versus 30% of general internists and 57% of pediatricians completed their service in compliance with the program. We are concerned that the addition of surgeons to the qualifying pool will potentially lower opportunities for communities to obtain family physicians. We would urge the legislature to continue to fund the medical student loan

program to support the presence of family physicians in rural undeserved areas - that the addition of general surgeons not be to the detriment of family physicians. The governor's budget retains 25 medical student loans. As you look at the proposed bill before you to add general surgery to the qualifying specialties, I would urge you to consider measures to insure the current participation of family practice residents not be compromised. This could be accomplished by either adding more loans to the budget or by maintaining the proportion of family practice positions awarded.

Dear Dennis:

Thank you for asking my opinion about whether the Medical Student Loan Program should be opened up to general surgeons. Our residents and faculty heard about this proposition through the KMS Kansas Physician Newsletter and it stimulated a lot of discussion and debate. The following are my own thoughts (which differed from some of our residents). My own thoughts are developed from my experience in Plainville, Kansas where I practiced solo for six years.

It has been my long standing belief that the vast majority of rural health care could be provided by a cadre of family physicians and a few general surgeons. The family physicians provide the vast majority of "cognitive skills" in a rural area, in addition to various procedural skills including obstetric care, medical emergencies, hospital care, and day-to-day medical practice.

The value of general surgery in rural areas is in the provision of certain surgical skills for care of general abdominal surgery, certain traumatic and emergent events, C-sections, endoscopy, etc.

There are certain towns, such as Clay Center, which could be used as an example of a group of family physicians who work with one surgeon to provide healthcare for a community.

Based on this, I would be in support of expanding the medical student loan program to include general surgeons.

I realize this will be met with a negative reaction by many family physicians who believe in the sanctity of the Medical Student Loan Program being solely for "primary care". In my opinion, the addition of general surgeons would only help the rural health problem in Kansas and, in fact, would contribute to "keeping patients at home" and in their hometown hospitals, and take certain burdens

off of rural family physicians (the C-section dilemma, for example). The Medical Student Loan Program, in my opinion, is a "rural healthcare program" - not just a "primary care program". However, because it is rural it is predominately "a family practice program" and that is the way it should always be.

A separate question is whether internal medicine and pediatrics should be part of the program. There are certainly examples such as Craig Concannon in Beloit who are general internists who practice in small towns. As I review a western Kansas map, however, nearly all internists and pediatricians are located in towns the size of Hays, Dodge City and Garden City. This does not address the problems of the Oberlin's, Tribune's and Greensburg's.

My only concern about the potential change in the Medical Student Loan Program is that the program has been "fiddled with" off and on for many years. "Fiddling" with it again may only encourage other medical specialty groups to attempt to "horn in" on a program that otherwise would work well given appropriate expectations of what the program can accomplish, adequate funding by the legislature, appropriate administration by the University of Kansas Medical Center, and emphasis on production of family physicians.

I would like to apologize for taking so long to respond to your letter. I was about to write to tell you that I didn't have anything that would answer your questions because we didn't get good information about respondents' specialties from our surveys. However, I just came across a printout from the Medical Center that had some of the information you asked for. The following table is for all recipients who graduated between 1979 to 1991 and were in practice in February 1992.

The Medical Center has this information computerized so they should be able to supply you with exact numbers. I had to count these by hand so I cannot guarantee the table is 100 percent accurate. If you want to try to get the information from the Medical Center I would suggest you contact Billie Jo Hamilton, Director of Student Financial Aid; or Ron Spangler, Director of Institutional Research. Both of them have access to the database on scholarship recipients. Ms. Hamilton's phone number is (913) 588-5170. Mr. Spangler's number is (913) 588-4870.

I have also enclosed a copy of a document called the <u>Kansas Medical Scholarship Program: Review of Data</u>. I believe this report is done every year by Billie Jo Hamilton. Table Two of that document shows statistics for the combined classes of 1979 to 1987. (Note that this is a slightly different time period than my table.) It shows that 51.2 percent of those recipients who practice in Kansas and 32.8 percent of recipients practicing in other states entered a primary care specialty.

I hope this information helps. If you have any other questions, please call or write. I promise I'll try to be a little quicker responding the next time.

KANSAS MEDICAL SOCIETY STATEMENT ON SENATE BILL 723 March 4, 1996

I am Dr. Linda Warren, a family physician from Hanover, Kansas in Washington County. I appreciate the opportunity to address you today on this important topic as I have long held the opinion that general surgery is essential to the existence of quality medical care to the rural community.

I feel there are three basic issues that should be considered on this topic:

The first is the fact that it is entirely a falsehood to feel any form of quality medical care can be provided without access to a general surgeon. This does not mean subspecialty surgery, but rather a broad scope of general basic surgery.

Until a few years ago, we had "general practitioners" across the state who had been well trained to perform basic general surgery adequate to cover the needs of their practices.

As medicine has progressed and the amount of material presented in training has increased, it has became impossible to train generalists in the discipline of general surgery. It is therefore absolutely necessary that for a quality physician to practice primary care in the rural area he or she will require that a general surgeon be part of their team.

The second issue is that it is not in the best interest of the patient to travel long distances to major metropolitan areas when in need of general surgery. A rural general surgeon usually covers several rural communities and can far more readily go to the patient and provide better care more expediently than transporting the patient in need of surgery.

The third issue is one of survival of the rural hospitals. If we believe that the citizens of rural Kansas deserve access to medical care then we must have our hospitals maintained. With the increasing age of our rural population the hospitals are more and more dependent on compensation from Medicare. This compensation is frequently far under the cost of what it costs to provide the care to the Medicare patient - especially the elderly patient with a serious pneumonia or other complicated medical problem requiring a lengthy hospital stay and high cost drugs. The general surgery patient is usually a briefer stay, gets well quicker and is a better source of reasonable income for the hospital. If our hospitals are to exist to treat all our rural citizens then they need to have the benefit of the income from all the services of the residents they serve.

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE SENATE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE Senate Bill 723

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. My name is Bob Wunsch and I am here today representing the University of Kansas Medical Center to testify concerning Senate Bill 723.

The original medical student scholarship program was enacted by the 1978 Legislature. The legislative purpose for the program was to provide financial incentives to medical students in return for a period of obligated service in Kansas upon completion of all post-graduate training. Physicians were required to practice medicine in an eligible service area within the state one year for each year they received financial aid while in medical school.

The 1992 Legislature enacted the Medical Student Loan Program which was designed to increase the attractiveness of the program. The focus on primary care was continued with the requirement that students who participate must apply for, enter and complete an approved residency training program in general pediatrics, general medicine, internal medicine, family practice, family medicine or emergency medicine.

SB 723 would add "general surgery" to the list of residency training programs to be entered and completed in order to be in compliance with the requirements of the loan program. Upon completion of a general surgery residency a student would be eligible to practice general surgery in any county other than Douglas, Johnson, Sedgwick, Shawnee or Wyandotte. It clearly is a policy decision as to whether or not there is a need for general surgeons in the remaining 100 counties sufficient to support allowing loan recipients to enter and complete general surgery residencies in satisfaction of their loan obligations.

The intent of the bill is unclear as to any current recipient who is now out of compliance because of his/her being in a general surgery residency.


As always I conclude with the assurance that we will administer the program in keeping with statutory guidelines and legislative intent. I will try to answer any questions.



Senate Appropriations Update as of February 29, 1996

The Senate has completed work on six FY 1997 appropriations bills during the first half of the 1996 Session. The Senate has completed consideration of 21.2 percent of the amended Governor's FY 1997 State General Fund budget, and 35.5 percent of the amended Governor's FY 1997 All Funds budget.





Highlights of the Senate Recommendation

FY 1997. The Senate has made a number of adjustments to the Governor's amended budget recommendations for FY 1997. As a policy decision, funding for the state employee pay plan has been removed from individual agency budgets and will be placed in a separate pay bill. Thus, deletions of the pay plan from individual agency budgets are not reflected as reductions to the Governor's budget in this update.

Excluding the pay plan adjustments, the Senate adjustments to the Governor's FY 1997 recommendations represent:

- a **reduction** of \$1.6 million in State General Fund dollars from the Governor's recommendation, and a **reduction** of \$7.1 million from all funding sources from the Governor's recommendation.
- a 1.4 percent (\$47.9 million) increase in State General Fund expenditures from FY 1996.
- a 1.2 percent (\$93.5 million) reduction in expenditures from all funding sources from FY 1996.
- **a reduction** of 7.8 FTE positions from the Governor's FY 1997 recommendation, and a **net reduction** of 334.6 FTE positions from FY 1996.

FY 1996. For FY 1996, the Senate action to date represents a reduction of \$250,357 from the State General Fund and a reduction of \$2.1 million from all funding sources below the Governor's amended budget for FY 1996.
