Minutes of the January 22 and January 23 meetings were presented for corrections or approval. Representative Dillon made a motion to accept the minutes as written, seconded by Representative Dreher, and the motion carried.

Chair called on Judy Moler, General Counsel and Legislative Services Director, Kansas Association of Counties, who requested introduction of a bill that would allow for borrowing authority to finance county road, bridge and culvert improvements to be in excess of \$250,000. (Attachment 1)

Representative Powers made motion to introduce the bill, seconded by Representative Correll and the motion carried.

HB 2073 - Driver's licenses and nondriver identification cards, expiration there of

Hearing was opened. The Chair called on Betty McBride, Director, Kansas Division of Vehicles, Department of Revenue, who presented testimony in support of **HB 2073** that would extend the renewal cycle of driver license for qualifying individuals from four to six years. **HB 2073** permits individuals over the age of 21 and under the age of 65, and individuals with no reportable medical conditions, to qualify for the six-year license. The bill also extends the non-driver identification card and duplicate licenses from four to six years. The intent of the bill is to reduce lines and waiting time at all driver license stations throughout the state. (Attachment 2)

The Chair called on Mary E. Turkington, Executive Director, Kansas Motor Carriers Association, requesting an amendment to <u>HB 2073</u>. The amendment, as outlined in the balloon, would retain the Commercial Drivers License (CDL) as a four-year license and would be uniform with other states on its 4-year cycle. (Attachment 3)

Betty McBride concurred the Division of Vehicles has no problem with the amendment as proposed.

Representative Pauls expressed appreciation of working with Mary E. Turkington on the committee as she will be retiring February 1. Ms. Turkington advised she will be working until the end of the Session.

The hearing on **HB 2073** was closed.

REQUEST FOR BILL INTRODUCTION

The Kansas Association of Counties
January 29,1997

I am Judy Moler, General Counsel and Legislative Services Director for the Kansas Association of Counties. I am appearing before you today to request legislation of particular importance to our Kansas Counties.

County roads are in increasingly in need of repair due to trafficusage as well as the age and condition of the roads. The current statutory borrowing limitations do not begin to cover the actual cost of replacement. There is not enough statutory flexibility for counties to finance critical projects that arise because of unforeseen circumstances. The tax lid has left many counties with limited financial reserves to deal with emergency situations thus leaving many counties with unsafe roads or bridges or in the position of having to close those roads and bridges to the public.

The Kansas Association of Counties is requesting legislation which would allow for borrowing authority to finance county road and bridge improvements to be in excess of \$250,000. Currently, K.S.A. 68-1103 limits the expenditure of funds to \$250,000 per project to build or repair bridges and culverts. We believe that this is an unrealistic limitation on bridges and culverts as well as upon road projects. In 1988 the statute was amended to give Jewell Courte expanded authority for road repair. The KAC would ask the same option for all counties to reflect the present day cost of projects to repair roads, bridges or culverts.

I have attached a copy of the legislation we are requesting. I would be glad to answer any questions at this time.

- 68-1103. Bridges and culverts on county roads; county roads, construction and repair; limitation; bonds, when; reconstruction; tax levies. (a) Whenever the board of county commissioners of any county shall determine that it is necessary to build or repair any road, bridge or culvert, the county's there of the cost of which shall be less than the sum of \$250,000, the board shall board may appropriate an amount equal to its share and shall immediately make all contracts for labor, material and all other expense necessary for the construction or repair of such work in the manner provided by law or chall may make and let a contract for the construction or the repair thereof, but the amount appropriated shall not exceed the county engineer's estimated cost to the county for the work.
- (b) In any country having a population of more than 25,000 and containing two or more cities of the second class; the board of country commissioners shall determine the necessity of building or repairing any bridge or bridges; shall pass a resolution declaring that such a necessity exists and shall immediately build such bridge or bridges at a cost to be determined by the country engineer's estimate of not to exceed \$100,000 per bridge and appropriate money therefor. The lawy for such purpose shall not exceed two mills upon the assessed valuation of the country.
- (b) In any such county or counties where there has been constructed prior to the passage of this act or shall be hereafter constructed any road, bridge or bridges culverts which shall have been destroyed or rendered impassable, or shall be hereafter destroyed or rendered impassable by flood, high water, fire or other casualty, or where there is any road, bridge or bridges condemned culvert determined by the board of county commissioners and the county engineer as unsafe and and/or inadequate to meet the demands of present day traffic, or where the board of county commissioners has made a determination under section (a) of this act, then such board of county commissioners may immediately thereafter construct, repair and or reconstruct such road, bridge or bridges culvert; may adopt a resolution finding and determining a necessity for such construction, repair or reconstruction and may at once proceed to construct, repair or rebuild reconstruct the same at a cost to be determined by the county engineer's estimate not exceeding \$250,000 per bridge and shall appropriate a sufficient amount of money therefor, or if there be not a sufficient amount of money therefor in the proper funds of the county, such board is hereby authorized and empowered to issue general obligation bonds or warrants of the county to pay the costs for the work herein provided for. Any bonds issued under the authority of the foregoing provision authority of this section shall not be subjected to any limitation on the bonded indebtedness of the county. In Jewell county, bonds also may be issued for the construction and repair of reads in accordance with the provisions of this subsection.

- (c) Such board is hereby authorized and empowered to levy and collect taxes for the purpose herein named or for the purpose of retiring any warrants bonds that have been issued, which shell not exceed two mills upon the assessed valuation of the county.
- (d) Under the provisions of this section those bridges which are situated across any stream on any county read are hareby declared to have a preference over the bridges on other roads and shall be repaired and reconstructed before any other bridges are repaired and reconstructed.

I am Betty McBride, Director of the Kansas Division of Vehicles. I want to express my appreciation to this Committee for the opportunity to appear before you today, seeking your support for House Bill 2073.

In an effort to reduce waiting time for the issuance of a driver's license at our exam stations and to meet our goal to improve customer service to Kansas citizens, the Division of Vehicles is requesting legislation to extend the renewal cycle of driver license for qualifying individuals from four to six years.

House Bill 2073 permits individuals over the age of twenty one and under the age of sixty five, and individuals with no reportable medical conditions, to qualify for the six year license. The bill also extends the non-driver identification card and duplicate licenses from four to six years.

Statistics available through the Department of Revenue indicate that Kansas has 212,300 licensed drivers under the age of twenty one, 296,093 licensed drivers over the age of sixty five, and 11,000 individuals with reportable medical conditions. have 1.8 million licensed drivers in Kansas. The Division renews approximately 453,000 driver licenses annually. Passage of House Bill 2073 would mean that approximately 128,000 would remain on a four year cycle and 325,000 would be eligible for a six year license. Currently 700,000 individuals utilize the services provided at Kansas driver license examining stations each year. At the end of four years we will be able to actually determine the impact by the actual count of renewal applicants.

Fees have been amended to coincide with the additional two year extension. would result in revenue increases for a four year period. During this time, the Department of Transportation will realize an increase in revenue. Revenue will decrease in the fifth and sixth year of registration. However, the total amount of revenue collected by the Division will remain the same at the end of the sixth year.

The intent of House Bill 2073 is to reduce lines and waiting time at all driver license stations throughout the state. The Division must continue to maintain current staffing levels in order to offer the same level of service. Any reduction in examiners would defeat the purpose of the bill.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

I am Mary E. Turkington, Executive Director of the Kansas Motor Carriers Association with offices in Topeka. I appear here today along with Mike Kelley who will succeed me as KMCA's Executive Director on February 1, and with Tom Whitaker, our Governmental Relations Director; representing our member-firms and the highway transportation industry.

We are here respectfully to ask this Committee to consider an important amendment to House Bill 2073 which proposes revisions in the expiration date of certain driver's licenses.

Our amendment, as outlined on the balloon prepared by the revisor, simply would retain the Commercial Drivers License (CDL) as a four-year license as provided by current law.

Initially adopted in 1989 to conform with federal requirements, the Kansas CDL, we believe, should be uniform with other states in its 4-year renewal cycle. Such renewal requirements are consistent with sound safety practices, with enforcement policies and with industry compliance.

Attachment 3 1-29-97 We have reviewed the proposed amendment with the Division of Vehicles and understand that this amendment would pose no problem for the Division as CDL information currently is retained separately.

The heart of the amendment appears on page four of the balloon which, in subsection (3), states "any commercial drivers license shall expire on the fourth anniversary of the date of birth of the licensee which is nearest the date of application."

Page 3 of the balloon simply restores the present commercial drivers license fee at the \$14 currently charged for the four-year license, and restores the \$10 charge for each CDL "endorsement." Endorsements involve special skills for operating a tank vehicle for example or for hauling hazardous materials, operating a passenger vehicle (bus), et al. Part 383 of the Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) sets out in great detail the regulations governing the issuance and renewal of a commercial drivers license. Our industry believes current Kansas law serves us well in meeting those CDL obligations.

We ask the Committee to adopt the amendment as reflected in the revisor's balloon thereby retaining current Kansas law for commercial drivers licenses.

We will be pleased to respond to your questions and thank you for the opportunity to present this important amendment to House Bill 2073.

AN ACT relating to the division of vehicles; concerning the expiration date of driver's licenses and nondriver identification cards; amending K.S.A. 8-1325 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 8-240, 8-246 and 8-247 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 8-240 is hereby amended to read as follows: 8-240. (a) Every application for an instruction permit shall be made upon a form furnished by the division of vehicles and accompanied by a fee of \$2 for class A, B or C, and \$5 for all commercial classes. Every other application shall be made upon a form furnished by the division and accompanied by an examination fee of \$3, unless a different fee is required by K.S.A. 8-241, and amendments thereto, and by the proper fee for the license for which the application is made. If the applicant is not required to take an examination the examination fee shall not be required. The examination shall consist of three tests, as follows: (1) Vision; (2) written; and (3) driving. If the applicant fails the vision test, the applicant may have correction of vision made and take the vision test again without any additional fee. If an applicant fails the written test, the applicant may take such test again upon the payment of an additional examination fee of \$1.50. If an applicant fails the driving test, the applicant may take such test again upon the payment of an additional examination fee of \$1.50. If an applicant fails to pass all three of the tests within a period of six months from the date of original application and desires to take additional tests, the applicant shall file an application for reexamination upon a form furnished by the division, which shall be accompanied by a reexamination fee of \$3, except that any applicant who fails to pass the written or driving portion of an examination four times within a sixmonth period, shall be required to wait a period of six months from the date of the last failed examination before additional examinations may be given. Upon the filing of such application and the payment of such reexamination fee, the applicant shall be entitled to reexamination in like manner and subject to the additional fees and time limitation as provided for examination on an original application. If the applicant passes the

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for which the applicant originally applied, which license shall be issued to expire as if the applicant had passed the original examination.

- (b) For the purposes of obtaining any driver's license, an applicant, except for any applicant under 16 years of age, shall provide at least two of the documents specified in K.S.A. 8-246, and amendments thereto. Any applicant under 16 years of age shall provide at least one of the documents specified in K.S.A. 8-246, and amendments thereto, which shall contain the date of birth of the applicant and such applicant's parent or guardian shall sign the application for any driver's license.
- (c) Every application shall state the name, date of birth, sex and residence address of the applicant, and briefly describe the applicant, and shall state whether the applicant has theretofore been licensed as a driver, and, if so, when and by what state or country, and whether any such license has ever been suspended or revoked, or whether an application has ever been refused, and, if so, the date of and reason for such suspension, revocation or refusal. In addition to the above criteria, applications for commercial drivers' licenses and instruction permits for commercial licenses must include the following: The applicant's social security number; the person's signature; the person's color photograph; certifications, including those required by 49 C.F.R. 383.71(a), effective January 1, 1991; a consent to release driving record information; and, any other information required by the division.
- (d) When an application is received from a person previously licensed in another jurisdiction, the division shall request a copy of the driver's record from the other jurisdiction. When received, the driver's record shall become a part of the driver's record in this state with the same force and effect as though entered on the driver's record in this state in the original instance.
- (e) When the division receives a request for a driver's record from another licensing jurisdiction the record shall be forwarded without charge.
- (f) A fee of \$8 shall be charged for a class G driver's license or farm permit, a fee of \$5 shall be charged for a class M driver's license and a fee of \$12 shall be charged for a class A or B driver's license and a fee of \$14 for any class of commercial license.

A fee shall be charged as follows:

- (1) For a class C driver's license issued to a person at least 21 years of age, but less than 65 years of age, \$12;
- (2) for a class C driver's license issued to a person less than 21 years of age or 65 years of age or older, or a farm permit, \$8;
