MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Carlos Mayans, at 1:30 p.m. on February 16, 1998 in Room 423-S-of the State Capitol.

Chairperson Mayans noted that testimony from Denise Maus, on behalf of the Kansas Dental Hygienists' Association, opposing **HB** 2724 (practice of dental hygiene), has been distributed to each committee member (see <u>Attachment 2</u>).

The Chairperson then opened the meeting to consideration of **HB 2724** and **HB 2725** (authorized practices under the dental practices act). He noted that Representatives Powell, Henry and Cook served as the Subcommittee on Dental Practices and have attempted to find a compromise for the legislation.

Representative Powell explained the subcommittee's recommended amendments to **HB** 2724, as shown on page 3 of Attachment 3. The subcommittee's intent was to broaden the scope of practices for hygienists and felt that the law should reflect their increased training. The bill's language on page 2, allowing hygienists to perform certain procedures, was not altered by the subcommittee; and Representative Powell called that to the committee's attention.

Representative Geringer asked about the suggested change on page 3, noting that it does not require the dentist to be present at the time local anesthesia is administered. Chairperson Mayans indicated that the subcommittee recommends changing "direct" to "general" supervision. Representative Showalter questioned the required training for hygienists to administer local block and infiltration anesthesia. Representative Powell noted that the current law allows those procedures under "direct" supervision; the suggested amendment permits it under "general" supervision. Barbara Burkendine, President of The Kansas Dental Hygienists' Association, noted the difference in administering the two types of anesthesia has to do with where it is injected. She noted hygienists are extensively trained in anesthesia practices. Representative Horst, because of the nurses comments during the hearing on the bills, questioned the differences in training of hygienists and nurses. Chairperson Mayans noted that education standards were not the nurses concern; it is the supervision that is being questioned. Representative Powell stated he discussed this point with dentists and hygienists and they felt hygienists are capable to administer anesthesia.

Chairperson Mayans then moved that on page 3, line 16 on the balloon to **HB** 2724 (Attachment 3) the word "general" be stricken and the word "direct" inserted; and delete the words "at the office of the licensed dentist." Representative Morrison seconded the motion; the motion carried.

Representative Powell then related the subcommittee's recommendations concerning **HB** 2725. The first recommendation is to amend the provisions of the bill into **HB** 2724 in order to alleviate some of the concerns expressed during the hearings on the bills (heard on February 2 and 3). Representative Powell stated the suggested amendments on page 2, line 28 (deletion of "on site" and inserting "direct") was a means to strengthen the intent of the bill. He noted the suggested amendment to line 30, in terms of giving confidence to the public, there needed to be a restructuring to forebid certain patients from being worked on by dental assistants. Also in section (B) concerning training, the subcommittee felt the actual training curriculum needs to be set by the Kansas Dental Board, but the subcommittee did include a minimum requirement; and by section (C), the subcommittee felt it was important to molify concerns about the quality of care.

Representative Hutchins asked if the proposed amendments grandfathered the dental assistants with several

years of service. Representative Powell answered that grandfathering was not in the bill; however, dental assistants (if they want to perform above-the-gum line procedures) would be required to get the training mandated in the bill. He indicated they would not lose their jobs if they did not, but would be required to adhere to the law. The Kansas Dental Board could establish a different course of study for persons who have different experience levels. Chairperson Mayans asked if the Legislature usually requires the various boards to set standards through their rules and regulations. Representative Powell indicated the subcommittee discussed that and decided it was better left to the experience of the board. Norman Furse affirmed that it was usually required of the various boards.

Chairperson Mayans asked if there was any other questions or comments. There were none. <u>Chairperson Mayans then moved that, with reference to the balloon amendment to HB 2725 (Attachment 3) on page 2, line 31(A), that the words "or a patient who has above type II or moderate periodontitis" be deleted. Representative Morrison seconded the motion; the motion carried.</u>

Representative Powell stated that because of the concern expressed that schools were not graduating enough dental hygienists, the subcommittee added a new section 3 to cause the State Board of Education and State Board of Regents to report to the 1999 Legislature their plan to increase the number of persons being trained as dental hygienists. Also, the subcommittee added a new section 4 to require the Kansas Dental Board to develop a wall placque to be posted in each dental office, detailing the procedures that can be performed there, and require dental personnel to wear a name tag and their title. He stated the new section 5 provides immunity from civil action for damages as a result of filing complaints with the Kansas Dental Board by The Kansas Dental Hygienists' Association or a licensed dental hygienist.

Representative Henry noted that he strongly supports the recommended amendments. He stated that Delta Dental, the state's dental insurance carrier, told the subcommittee they pay for 150,000 cleanings each year. Representative Henry asked their representative if the bill would cause them concerns; and the answer was the company had no concerns about it. Representative Henry stated he had a proposed amendment to section 4, to require the Kansas Dental Board to provide a brochure outlining the educational requirements and scope of practice of dental personnel for distribution at dental offices. (See Attachment 4.) Representative Powell noted he concurred with the amendment. Representative Henry moved, and Representative Powell seconded, that the committee approve the proposed new amendment shown as subsection (b), and that subsection (b) be renumbered (c), all in section 4. The motion carried.

Chairperson Mayans then moved that HB 2725, as amended by the committee, be incorporated into HB 2724. Representative Cook seconded the motion; the motion carried.

<u>Chairperson Mayans moved that HB 2724</u> be passed as amended. Representative Henry seconded the motion; the motion carried.

Representative Morrison stated he has given each committee member a listing of his thoughts on House Bills 2724 and 2725 (see Attachment 5). He explained his discourse was in no way meant to undermine the work of Representative Powell, which was exceptional; it was only to express some concerns.

Representative Morrison then moved that HB 2724 be tabled. Representative Storm seconded the motion. On show of hands on the motion; HB 2724 was tabled.

Chairperson Mayans then thanked the subcommittee members for their excellent work on the two bills.

The Chairperson then noted that due to time, possible action on **HB 2630** (concerning behavioral science regulatory board; relating to qualified mental health professionals) will be considered at tomorrow's meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for February 17, 1998.

Jane A. Criser Trustee The Kansas Dental Hygienists' Association opposes any bill which would allow unlicensed persons to scale above the gum line. Nearly all registered dental hygienists believe that this would compromise the quality of care that patients would receive, as well as, scaling and polishing above the gum line has no therapeutic value.

Since the licensing of dental hygienist in the State of Kansas back in 1943, dentistry has made great strides in the area of prevention of periodontal disease. It is a fact that people are keeping their teeth longer. Why would we want to change a statute that appears to be beneficial and has shown great success? The ADA Council on Accreditation concluded that it was not in the best interest of patient safety or quality care to try to train dental assistants to provide these intraoral services. In fact, they concluded that the training to assure competence would take an educational program off approximately 2 years in length. That is a dental hygiene program! The Attorney General has also stated the laws which are in place now are there to protect the safety of the patient and that these services should only be performed by licensed persons, dental hygienists and dentists.

The issue of the shortage of dental hygienists is one that concerns me. The Kansas Dental Association says that they need more hygienists in the State of Kansas, then the answer is to train more hygienists. The last survey that was completed was done in 1994. How valid is that survey today? Since then, we have graduated over 150 dental hygienists in Kansas alone (not including UMKC and Southern MO State which both supply hygienists to Kansas). In a few months from now at least another 50 students will be graduating from WSU and JCCC. I believe that the shortage issue should be re-evaluated for the needs of today! We have heard from many hygienists that can not find jobs in rural areas. The KDA would like to allow dental assistants to do scaling and polishing above the gum line. Over the last 9 months, KDHA has been tracking Want Ads in several newspapers and has consistently found that there is almost double the ads for dental assistants than dental hygienists. If there is a greater need for dental assistants, where are they going to find persons to assist the dentist if assistants are going to be doing scaling and polishing?

The opening of Colby County Community College distance education program this Fall will help increase the number of hygienists in rural areas along with the expansion of Southwest MO State's program in Joplin. Measures have been taken by the Kansas Dental Board to expand the regional board that dentists and hygienists have to pass in order to be licensed in Kansas to include the Western Regional Examination Board. This will open the doors for people moving into Kansas to find it easier to obtain a license to practice here. These things will provide more dental hygienists HOUSE HHS COMMITTEE

to Kansas!

It has also been noted in testimony that there is also a shortage of dentists and I feel that this issue should be taken into consideration as well. Neither a hygienist or an assistant can work without a dentist also being there. General supervision of dental hygienists would allow us to work in the dental office when the dentist is not present. This would definitely increase access to care! If a rural dentist had two offices in different towns, the hygienist could continue to see patients in that office while he was at his other office treating patients. Dentists would no longer have to cancel patients when he was ill, attending funerals and meetings, or simply on vacation.

Periodontal disease is not reversible. Dental hygienists provide thorough scaling (both above and below the gum line) and polishing in order to prevent this disease. Patient education and adequate home care also aid in preventing bone loss and tissue recession (periodontal disease). Once the patient exhibits signs of periodontal disease it is the hopes of the hygienist that it can be maintained with more frequent dental hygiene visits and thorough cleanings below the gum line. Scaling and polishing above the gum line as noted by Dr. Cobb and Dr. Killoy (both periodontists who presented testimony on Feb. 2nd) accomplishes little and provides patients with increased access to inadequate care. We believe that this bill does not place the patient's welfare above all else!

Lastly, I feel that this bill does not place in it adequate safe guards when it comes to enforcement issues. I hear from the dental board that it is difficult to enforce the current law due to funding, etc., I feel that this bill provides no protection for anyone that the law will be enforced! And if it is the opinion of the dental board that the law be changed because they have not been able to enforce the one we have, I find little confidence that anything will change by making legal what people in some areas are doing illegally now. Laws are there to protect the public!

I would appreciate your serious consideration in this matter. Public safety and access to quality dental hygiene care by adequately trained and educated individuals is what is needed.

HOUSE BILL No. 2724

AN ACT concerning the dental practices act; relating to the practice of dental hygiene; amending K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1456 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1456 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-1456. (a) The board may suspend or revoke the license, license certificate and renewal certificate of any registered and licensed dentist who shall permit any dental hygienist operating under such dentist's supervision to perform any operation other than that permitted under the provisions of article 14 of chapter 65 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, or acts amendatory thereof, and may suspend or revoke the license of any hygienist found guilty of performing any operation other than those permitted under article 14 of chapter 65 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, or acts amendatory thereof. No license or certificate of any dentist or dental hygienist shall be suspended or revoked in any administrative proceedings without first complying with the notice and hearing requirements of the Kansas administrative procedure act.

(b) The practice of dental hygiene shall include those educational, preventive, and therapeutic procedures which result in the removal of extraneous deposits, stains and debris from the teeth and the rendering of smooth surfaces of the teeth to the depths of the gingival sulci. Included among those educational, preventive and therapeutic procedures are the instruction of the patient as to daily personal care, protecting the teeth from dental caries, the scaling and polishing of the crown surfaces and the planing of the root surfaces, in addition to the curettage of those soft tissues lining the free gingiva to the depth of the gingival sulcus and such additional educational, preventive and therapeutic procedures as the board may establish by rules and regulations.

(c) Subject to such prohibitions, limitations and conditions as the board may prescribe by rules and regulations, any licensed dental hygienist may practice dental hygiene and may also perform such dental service as may be performed by a dental assistant under the provisions of K.S.A. 65-1423 and amendments thereto.

(d) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the practice of dental

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hygiene shall be performed under the direct or general supervision of a licensed dentist at the office of such licensed dentist. The board may designate by rules and regulations the procedures which may be performed by a dental hygienist under direct supervision and the proeedures which may be performed under the indirect supervision of a licensed dentist. As used in this section, (1) "Indirect supervision" means that the dentist is in the dental office, authorizes the procedures and remains in the dental office while the procedures are being performed and; (2) "direct supervision" means that the dentist is in the dental office, personally diagnoses the condition to be treated, personally authorizes the procedure and before dismissal of the patient evaluates the performance; and (3) "general supervision" means a licensed dentist may delegate verbally or by written authorization the performance of a service, task or procedure to a licensed dental hygienist under the supervision and responsibility of the dentist, if the dental hygienist is licensed to perform the function, and the supervising dentist examines the patient at the time the dental hygiene procedure is performed, or during the 12 calendar months preceding the performance of the procedure, except that the licensed hygienist shall not be permitted to diagnose a dental disease or ailment, prescribe any treatment or a regimen thereof, prescribe, order or dispense medication or perform any procedure which is irreversible or which involves the intentional cutting of the soft or hard tissue by any means. A dentist is not required to be on the premises at the time a hygienist performs a function delegated under part (3) of this subsection.

(e) The practice of dental hygiene may be performed at an adult care home, hospital long-term care unit, state institution, local health department or indigent health care clinic on a resident of a facility, client or patient thereof so long as:

(1) A licensed dentist has delegated the performance of the service, task or procedure;

(2) the dental hygienist is under the supervision and responsibility of the dentist;

(3) either the supervising dentist is personally present or the services, tasks and procedures are limited to the cleaning of teeth, education and preventive care;

(4) the supervising dentist examines the patient at the time the dental hygiene procedure is performed or has examined the patient during the 12 calendar months preceding performance of the procedure;

(5) nothing in this subsection (e) shall be construed to prevent a dental hygienist from providing dental education in a school setting; and

(6) the provisions of this subsection (e) shall expire on July 1, 1998.

(f) The board may issue a permit to a licensed dental hygienist to provide dental screening as an employee of the state of Kansas, or any

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ubdivision thereof, at any public institution or facility under the supervision of the governing body of such public institution or facility under such terms and conditions as the board may reasonably establish in such permit. Such permit shall be for a period of one year and shall be subject to renewal annually at the time the license for dental hygiene is renewed.

- (g) In addition to the duties specifically mentioned in subsection (b) of K.S.A. 65-1456, and amendments thereto, any duly licensed and registered dental hygienist may:
- Give fluoride treatments as a prophylactic measure, as defined by the United States public health service and as recommended for use in dentistry;
- (2) remove overhanging restoration margins and periodontal surgery materials by hand scaling instruments; and
- (3) administer local block and infiltration anaesthesia and nitrous oxide. (A) The administration of local anaesthesia shall be performed only under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist at the office of the licensed dentist (B) Each dental hygienist who administers local anaesthesia shall have completed courses of instruction in local anaesthesia and nitrous oxide which have been approved by the board
- (h) (1) The courses of instruction required in subsection (g)(3)(B) of K S.A 65-1456, and amendments thereto, shall provide a minimum of 12 hours of instruction at a teaching institution accredited by the American dental association.
- (2) The courses of instruction shall include courses which provide both didactic and clinical instruction in: (A) Theory of pain control; (B) anatomy; (C) medical history; (D) pharmacology; and (E) emergencies and complications.
- (3) Certification in cardiac pulmonary resuscitation shall be required in all cases.
- 30 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1456 is hereby repealed.
- 31 Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 32 publication in the statute book.

HOUSE BILL No. 2725

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AN ACT concerning the dental practices act; relating to authorized practices; amending K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423 and 65-1456 and repealing the existing sections.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-1423. Nothing in this act shall apply to the following practices, acts and operations:

(a) To the practice of a person licensed to practice medicine and surgery under the laws of this state, unless such person practices dentistry as a specialty; or

(b) to the performance by a licensed nurse of a task as part of the administration of an anaesthetic for a dental operation under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist or person licensed to practice medicine and surgery so long as the anaesthetic given under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist is consistent with the anaesthetic the dentist is authorized to administer under K.S.A. 65-1444 and amendments thereto and consistent with subsection (a) of K.S.A. 65-1162 and amendments

thereto and subsection (e) of K.S.A. 65-1163 and amendments thereto; (c) to the giving by a registered nurse anesthetist of an anaesthetic for a dental operation in an interdependent role as a member of a phy-

sician or dentist directed health care team;

(d) the practice of dentistry in the discharge of their official duties by graduate dentists or dental surgeons in the United States army, navy, air force, marines, public health service, coast guard or veterans' bureau;

(e) the practice of dentistry by a licensed dentist of other states or countries at meetings of the Kansas state dental association or components thereof, or other like dental organizations approved by the board, while appearing as clinicians.

(f) to the filling of prescriptions of a licensed and registered dentist as hereinafter provided by any person or persons, association, corporation or other entity, for the construction, reproduction or repair of prosthetic dentures, bridges, plates or appliances to be used or worn as substitutes for natural teeth, provided that such person or persons, associations, corporation or other entity, shall not solicit or advertise, directly or indirectly

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by mail, card, newspaper, pamphlet, radio or otherwise, to the general public to construct, reproduce or repair prosthetic dentures, bridges, plates or other appliances to be used or worn as substitutes for natural teeth;

- (g) to the use of roentgen or x-ray machines or other rays for making radiograms or similar records, of dental or oral tissues under the supervision of a licensed dentist or physician except that such service shall not be advertised by any name whatever as an aid or inducement to secure dental patronage, and no person shall advertise that such person has, leases, owns or operates a roentgen or x-ray machine for the purpose of making dental radiograms of the human teeth or tissues or the oral cavity, or administering treatment thereto for any disease thereof;
- (h) except as hereinafter limited to the performance of any dental service of any kind by any person who is not licensed under this act, if such service is performed under the supervision of a dentist licensed under this act at the office of such licensed dentist except that such non-licensed person shall not be allowed to perform or attempt to perform the following dental operations or services:
- (1) Any and all removal of or addition to the hard or soft tissue of the oral cavity;
- (2) any and all diagnosis of or prescription for treatment for disease, pain, deformity, deficiency, injury or physical condition of the human teeth or jaws, or adjacent structure;
 - (3) any and all correction of malformation of teeth or of the jaws;
- (4) any and all administration of general or local anaesthesia of any nature in connection with a dental operation; or
- (5) a prophylaxis, except that individuals who are not licensed but who are operating under the en site supervision of a dentist may remove extraneous deposits, stains and debris from the teeth above the gum line so long as they have completed necessary training as established by the board.
 - (i) As used in this section:
- (1) "Removal of or addition to the hard or soft tissue of the oral cavity" means: (A) A surgical or cutting procedure on hard or soft tissues; (B) the grafting of hard or soft tissues; (C) the final placement or intraoral adjustment of a fixed crown or fixed bridge; and (D) root planing or the smoothing of roughened root surfaces.
- (2) "Diagnosis of or prescription for treatment for disease, pain, deformity, deficiency, injury or physical condition of the human teeth or jaws or adjacent structure" means: (A) A comprehensive examination; (B) diagnosis and treatment planning; and (C) the prescription of a drug, medication or work authorization.
 - (3) "Correction of malformation of teeth or the jaws" means surgery,

- (d) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the practice of dental hygiene shall be performed under the direct or indirect supervision of a licensed dentist at the office of such licensed dentist. The board may designate by rules and regulations the procedures which may be performed by a dental hygienist under direct supervision and the procedures which may be performed under the indirect supervision of a licensed dentist. As used in this section, "indirect supervision" means that the dentist is in the dental office, authorizes the procedures and remains in the dental office while the procedures are being performed and "direct

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supervision" means that the dentist is in the dental office, personally diagnoses the condition to be treated, personally authorizes the procedure and before dismissal of the patient evaluates the performance.

- (e) The practice of dental hygiene may be performed at an adult care home, hospital long-term care unit, state institution, local health department or indigent health care clinic on a resident of a facility, client or patient thereof so long as:
- (1) A licensed dentist has delegated the performance of the service, task or procedure;
- (2) the dental hygienist is under the supervision and responsibility of the dentist:
- (3) either the supervising dentist is personally present or the services, tasks and procedures are limited to the cleaning of teeth, education and preventive care;
- (4) the supervising dentist examines the patient at the time the dental hygiene procedure is performed or has examined the patient during the 12 calendar months preceding performance of the procedure;
- (5) nothing in this subsection (e) shall be construed to prevent a dental hygienist from providing dental education in a school setting; and
 - (6) the provisions of this subsection (e) shall expire on July 1, 1998.
- (f) The board may issue a permit to a licensed dental hygienist to provide dental screening as an employee of the state of Kansas, or any subdivision thereof, at any public institution or facility under the supervision of the governing body of such public institution or facility under such terms and conditions as the board may reasonably establish in such permit. Such permit shall be for a period of one year and shall be subject to renewal annually at the time the license for dental hygiene is renewed.
- (g) In addition to the duties specifically mentioned in subsection (b) of K.S.A. 65-1456, and amendments thereto, any duly licensed and registered dental hygienist may:
- (1) Give fluoride treatments as a prophylactic measure, as defined by the United States public health service and as recommended for use in dentistry;
- (2) remove overhanging restoration margins and periodontal surgery materials by hand scaling instruments; and
- (3) administer local block and infiltration anaesthesia and nitrous oxide. (A) The administration of local anaesthesia shall be performed only under the direct supervision of a licensed dentist at the office of the licensed dentist. (B) Each dental hygienist who administers local anaesthesia shall have completed courses of instruction in local anaesthesia and nitrous oxide which have been approved by the board.
- (h) (1) The courses of instruction required in subsection (g)(3)(B) of K.S.A. 65-1456, and amendments thereto, shall provide a minimum of 12

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hours of instruction at a teaching institution accredited by the American dental association.

- (2) The courses of instruction shall include courses which provide both didactic and clinical instruction in: (A) Theory of pain control; (B) anatomy; (C) medical history; (D) pharmacology; and (E) emergencies and complications.
- (3) Certification in cardiac pulmonary resuscitation shall be required in all cases.
- Sec. 3. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423 and 65-1456 are hereby repealed. Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

New Sec. 3. The state board of education and the state board of regents shall report to the legislature on or before January 11, 1999, on plans for increasing the number of persons in this state being trained as dental hygienists.

New Sec. 4. (a) The Kansas dental board shall develop a wall plaque detailing who in the dental office is allowed to provide dental services and the services which such persons may provide. The wall plaque shall be displayed in a conspicuous place for public viewing in all dental offices. Each person who provides patient services in a dental office shall wear a name tag which identifies the individual and their appropriate title as specified by the board.

Here are some of my thoughts concerning HB 2724 &HB 2725

- 1. Is "general supervision" in the public's best interest? Hygienists did not request this bill, dentists did.
- The sub-committee version still allows non-licensed persons to do scaling and polishing of teeth.
- 3. The "shortage" of Hygienists is less now than it was 4 years ago and another program is opening in August. If we pass this bill and in a few years have a surplus of Hygienists, will we then repeal it?
- 4. The training required is not defined. Will it be more, less, the same as that required for Hygienists?
- There still is concern for public safety or there would be no need for "New Section 4."
- 6. If some parts of the state are medically underserved why pass legislation that affects the whole state? Why not put a county population of say 10,000 and under for this bill to apply?
- 7. We are going to allow non-licensed persons to "remove extraneous deposits, stains and debris" without defining any limits on how this is done. Not good policy.
- 8. How many Dental Assistants can be hired by one Dentist? One or Ten?
- 9. HB2724 changes law relative to administration of anesthesia. The KSNA is opposed to these changes. Why are we now deciding to pass legislation that most in this room really do not understand? More thought needs to be going into what we are considering.
- 10. Dentists in my district have gone on record opposing the bills. They have done so in local newspapers. Not ALL have done so but the large majority support withdrawing the legislation, which they at first supported.
