Representative Weber, sponsor of the bill explained it to the Committee and introduced Kenneth Wetzel, City of Abilene. (Attachment #1)

The bill also would change names of political action committees so you will know who the political action committee is representing and it also will require identification on brochures and flyers and require disclosure reports by persons who expressly advocate the nomination, election or defeat of a clearly identified candidate. The Committee discussed the changes in the campaign finance act and the governmental ethics laws.

Chairman Hardenburger advised the Committee that the hearing on **HB 2662** would be resumed tomorrow March 19.

Testimony for Senate Elections and Local Government

Hearing: March 18, 1998

Thank you, Madame Chairman Hardenburger, and members of the committee, for the opportunity to appear before the committee today. I am pleased to present you with some background regarding this bill and to make introduction of Mr. Kenneth Wetzel of Abilene, who will present you with the bulk of testimony supporting this bill.

I was contacted by the City Manager of Abilene, Mark Arbuthnot, who requested my help with legislation to empower the city of Abilene to take on the responsibility of an existing cemetery. Current law provides for several ways to address the creation of a cemetery district, but the most common practice is geared toward rural township areas whose population is small in comparison to the City of Abilene. The voter signature requirement placed a burden on the city's willingness to accept responsibility for this cemetery which has been in existence since 1910.

With those facts in mind, I introduced HB# 2838 which is an additional way to form a cemetery district. This creates a simplified process whereby the county commission would hold a hearing, adopt a resolution to create a cemetery district, publish notice, and allow the public opportunity to respond and protest if desired.

The House Governmental Organization and Elections Committee added an amendment that placed language in the bill requiring a cemetery association located within the district to convey all property, including any money in its permanent maintenance fund, to the cemetery district created under this act. I believe this amendment made the bill better.

I thank you for your time and consideration to HB # 2838. I advocate for your favorable consideration and I would be pleased to answer any questions.

HOUSE BILL No. 2838

AN ACT concerning cemetery districts: relating to the creation thereof.

Testimony by Kenneth Wetzel of the Abilene Cemetery Association, Inc. Abilene, Kansas

Mr. Chairman, Members of the committee. I speak to you today urging you to support

the passage of House Bill No. 2838.

In support of this action, I state that in the fall of 1996 the Abilene Cemetery Association,

Inc. was found to be near financial insolvency. The available cash was projected not to be

sufficient to cover immediately due bills.

The Abilene Cemetery Association, Inc., is a private, not for profit corporation, organized

in the year 1910 to operate a cemetery to serve the City of Abilene, Kansas and surrounding

community. The Association is made up of persons owning burial spaces in the then existing

cemetery and is governed by a board of directors, made up of seven persons without

compensation.

The primary sources of income being interest from an investment pool required by the

State of Kansas, sale of burial spaces, fees for opening and closing graves, and gifts from

individuals. The income from the investment pool has over the years decreased due to the lower

interest rates being paid on bond investments, and the expense of operating the pool. Some

decrease has also been seen in the number of services held each year, and thus a decrease in the

sale of lots and fees for services.

At the same time, general costs of operating the cemetery have increased. Labor and

repairs to equipment being a large portion of the expense.

The cemetery had attempted to hold in reserve some funds which were received as a bequest of a deceased board member. Such funds were earmarked to be used for larger one-time expenses which might be incurred.

In the fall of 1996, when the cash flow problem presented itself, we made a review of income and expenses for the five year period of 1991 to 1995. Said review showed that the five year average cost of operating the cemetery was about \$57,000 annually, with an average shortfall of \$3,590.00. The highest shortfall being \$9,136.37, and the lowest \$730.96. This included \$6,000 per year the City of Abilene was presently providing.

The cemetery also identified long-range capital needs over the next five years in the sum of \$54,000.00.

Numerous meetings were held between the Abilene City Commission and Board of Directors of the Abilene Cemetery Association. It became obvious that the solution to the problem was to form a public cemetery district. A review of the statutes relating to the organization of a cemetery district would require the following:

Presentation of a petition in legal form to the Board of County Commissioners, containing the signatures of not less than 51% of the electors of the proposed district at the most recent general election.

With the assistance of the county election officer (County Clerk), it was determined that said petition would have to contain the signatures of at least 2,000 registered voters. Many of said voters would be elderly persons, who we doubted would be willing to sign a petition which would increase their property taxes. It would also take a great deal of time and effort to circulate the petitions to form a district to benefit the public as a whole.

We have asked Representative Shari Weber to introduce House Bill No. 2838, to create a simplified process to organize a cemetery district. A process which would give the public notice and an opportunity to respond and protest if desired. A process which we believe to be fair and equitable to all persons affected.

HOUSE BILL 2662

Section 1:

Changes the name of the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct to the Governmental Ethics Commission.

Section 2:

As a result of Section 1, the Governmental Ethics Commission feed fund is created—and the Governmental Standards and Conduct fee fund is abolished.

Section 3:

Reconciles K.S.A. 25-4119f to allow deposit of filing fee funds to be deposited into the newly-named fee fund.

 - (g) (1) Expenditure definition changed in (A)

- Section 5: Requires the name of each party and political committee to reflect the full name of the organization with which the committee is connected or affiliated or sufficiently describe such affiliation. If the political committee is not connected or affiliated with an organization, the name should reflect the trade, profession or primary interest.
- Section 6: Removal of a treasurer of a candidate, party or political committee.

Clarifying definition "the major purpose of which is to support or oppose" by replacing with "receiving contributions or making expenditures for" through out the section.

- (c) Requires the appointment of a chairperson and treasurer of a party or political committee before each may receive contributions or make expenditures.
- Section 7: Duties of the treasurer and reporting
 - (d) remove redundant language

Requires reporting of a county candidate to be filed in the county in which the candidate is running rather than their resident county (county attorneys and county treasurers)

Regarding Corrupt political advertising:

- (6) expenses incurred in the purchase and mailing of greeting cards to voters and constituents.
- (b) No moneys received by any candidate or candidate committee of any candidate as a contribution shall be used to pay interest or any other finance charges upon moneys loaned to the campaign by such candidate or the spouse of such candidate.
