The committee continued to discuss the issues pertaining to higher education in the State of Kansas. "Rough Draft Notes" had been taken by Representative Farmer while the committee was on the 15 city tour of the State of Kansas to explain the proposed Kansas Council on Higher education. These notes are attached. (Attachment 1). Most of the balance of the discussion for this meeting centered around financing of Community Colleges for the proposed Kansas Council on Higher Education. To the House Select Committee on Higher Education:

The Kansas Legislative Research Department reports that more than 60 percent of the freshmen and sophomores in Kansas colleges and universities attend community colleges.

A closer look at those students reveals that community college students represent the Kansas populace better than any other segment of higher education.

We greatly admire the House Select Committee's efforts because they appear to truly respect the higher education needs of the entire populace. The shift in funding responsibility is an overdue recognition of the statewide service provided by Kansas community colleges.

But while the select committee and its plan show an increase in legislative knowledge of community colleges, its action could demonstrate much more understanding. The nuances of 19 locally controlled colleges are not easily grasped.

We welcome your invitation to make suggestions and we hope in the process, we can help improve the plan you have proposed. We believe our suggestions fall well within the intents and purposes of the select committee's plan.

The funding mechanisms currently included in the select committee's plan will have a variety of financial effects within the higher education community. Some will prosper while others will be hurt.

Eight community colleges would begin the "new century in higher education" already capped at 15 mills. Any state revenue increase would go directly to buying down the local mill levy.

In fact, the planned four percent increase to the base year (1996-97) would be diverted as well. Those community colleges with the four percent increase in their actual 1997-98 revenues would see it diverted from their revenues into local property tax relief in 1998-99.

Of the eight colleges already at the cap, seven also would have to increase tuition, some substantially, to pay all or a portion of any operating grant.

Additionally, the three community colleges that would receive funds through the 30 percent guarantee, would be receiving less than 15 mills in local support.

Such a variance should raise red flags. Should a plan to begin a new century in higher education have a negative effect on any institutions? How can they retain the responsiveness the committee values and "develop the capacity to meet peak demands of business, industry, and consumers" if they have no flexibility regarding revenues.

And should a plan that is "not designed to accommodate the individual needs of any institution, sector of higher education, or community," bring substantial increases in revenues to those who need them the least?

Following are our suggestions for improving the select committee's plan.

Use a different definition of local support.

The use of mills to define local support is inequitable and contrary to maintaining local control. Because each community's local economy is different, the use of mills is like using different currencies. Would you rather have one peso or one dollar? Would you rather have one Barton mill (\$150,000) or one Johnson mill (\$3.8 million)?

Likewise, each college's financial history is different. Barton, for example, has survived a decade of declining local property valuations, unstable state funding, and substantial enrollment increases.

In Barton's first year (1969-70), one mill was worth about \$121,000. The economy grew into the 1980s when the value of a mill peaked at nearly \$228,000. The subsequent oil bust brought the value of a mill to a low of less than \$135,000 in 1992.

Today one mill is worth \$150,000 with projections that it will fall to \$145,000 next year. If the county's valuation had kept pace with inflation, one mill would raise \$584,502 today.

By contrast, enrollment has continuously increased. In Barton's first year, students took 17,275 credit hours compared to 82,023 credit hours last year - a 475 percent increase.

In 1989-90, state academic aid was \$31.10 per credit hour. It was supposed to be the first year in a five year plan to increase the state's contribution to community colleges. Instead, in each successive year, the state paid less than that rate including a low of \$27.45 in 1991-92. As a result, Barton lost nearly \$1.5 million in state support between 1990 and 1996.

In addition, Barton is one of 14 community colleges that receive one-third less funding for teaching the same vocational programs as the five community colleges designated as area vocational technical schools. For Barton, the inequity in vocational funding costs approximately \$500,000 per year.

For those reasons, Barton has been forced to rely more on local property taxes and is at a disadvantage in the select committee's current funding plan.

We suggest that the committee consider using a percentage of budget, or specifying costs such as maintenance of the physical plant to define local support. This would more fairly consider the differences between colleges and their local economies. It also would show more true support for local control by allowing communities to decide the extent of their investment.

Use current state procedures to define student contribution.

Currently, the select committee's plan calls for 20 percent of a community college's budget to come from student tuition. Already the select committee has become aware of the difficulties this causes several community colleges and their students.

It would not be in the best interests of the students to have the wide variation in community college tuition rates that this definition would cause. No other segment of higher education has to face such extreme differences.

Making some community colleges increase their tuition to higher levels, also would be counterproductive to the select committee's desire to reduce competition for students. It would only lead to the unfair use of tuition as a competitive edge.

The use of tuition as the definition for student contribution is likely based on Regents traditions and practices, but community colleges follow different state statutes and procedures in relation to tuition and fees.

Largely due to size, community colleges also tend to make the majority of their expenditures through their general, vocational, and employee benefit funds. Because of that practice, there is little difference between revenue generated by tuition and revenue generated by fees when it comes to operating expenditures.

We believe that until the establishment and use of tuition and fees can be standardized throughout higher education, current practices would best be used in the initial phases of this plan. This would be easily accomplished by using the State of Kansas Budget Form CC-B which defines a community college's total student contribution to its general fund.

Modify state procedures on distributing general state aid.

The nature of community college funding makes financial planning difficult at best. While the state has no more control than the individual colleges in predicting enrollment and therefore state credit hour aid, it can help through general state aid.

As the state's use of general state aid has increased, its unpredictability has become more challenging to financial planning efforts. We suggest that the committee include in its plan, a change in the disbursement of general state aid. Using the prior year's calculations in determining current year payments would clarify planning both for the state and for the community colleges.

Determine a more equitable starting budget.

Like many of the other community colleges, Barton is at a disadvantage, not so much by the intent of the select committee's plan but by its implementation. Because of its recent financial history and the committee's selection of 1996-97 as the base year, Barton will lose the 4 percent increase already in its current budget and will already be at the state imposed mill levy cap.

While we favor the reduction in local property taxes, the redistribution of our resources and the inflexibility in our potential resources will prevent us from fulfilling the committee's desire for community college performance. We will be unable to retain the responsiveness needed to meet the "peak demands of area business, industry, and consumers."

There is undeniable evidence, as you have learned and acknowledged, that community colleges have not received equitable state support in the past. We are sure we have provided further evidence in this document.

Our concern over how state governance will treat community colleges has less to do with institutional mistrust than it does with political and economic bias whether intended or not. Witness the current plan which appears to use valuable state financial resources not in "the best interest of students" nor in "the most effective and cost-efficient method of governance" but rather to ensure political votes.

It does not bode well for those of us with less state power and local wealth when the beginning of "a new century" makes the rich richer and the poor poorer.

Regardless of the outcome of the committee's efforts, we implore you to continue the leadership you have initiated by supporting three legislative actions that are included in separate bills as well as your own. These actions fall within the desires of the select committee's plan and would move the entire system in the right direction should your effort be extended to the next legislative session.

 Abolish vocational funding inequity by approving two for one vocational funding for all community colleges

2. Abolish the 64/72 limit on out-district aid and show unquestioned support of lifelong learning.

Remove the use of minutes in the statutory definition of credit hour. This
definition is the state's most significant barrier to distance learning and
adult retraining.

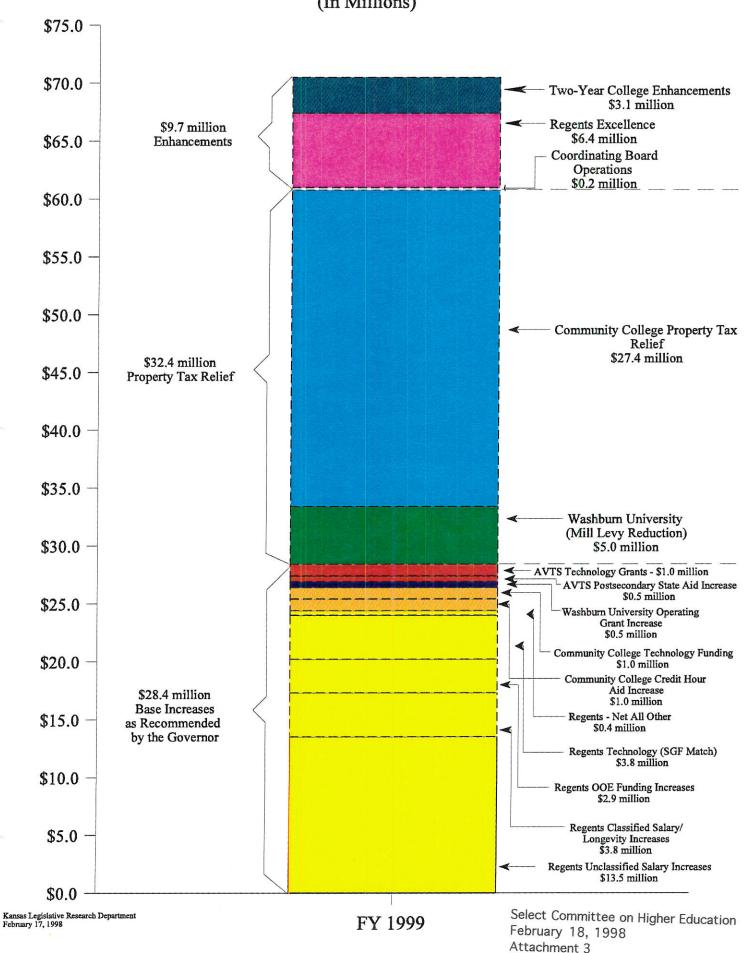

Provides for an operating grant to the community colleges whose state aid increase results in a mill levy of more than 15 mills. The state aid increase, less out-district tuition, divided by the assessed valuation, provides a millage equivalency equal to the state aid increase. This millage equivalency, subtracted from the current mill rate for the general, vocational, and employee benefit funds, results in a proposed mill rate. This mill rate (based on prior year data) times the assessed valuation, less the increase in student tuition as a result of increasing student tuition to 20 percent of the operating budget, determines the operating grant.

The operating grant amount is frozen at the dollar amount computed. All mill levies for the general, vocational, and employee benefit funds would be capped at 15 mills.
