GBA No. 2, Item 65, makes reductions in various executive branch agencies for FY 1999 and FY 2000 to reflect savings resulting from retirement reductions. Referred to table on last page of pink document distributed to committee at a prior meeting which breaks out the savings in each agency..

(P. 40) - Alan Conroy explained the Children's Health Care Funds and its relation to the tobacco money. He explained the disposition of monies and reimbursement by tobacco money funds from a chart showing Children's Health Care Programs Fund FY 2000 Expenditures. (Attachment 8)

Add \$690, 000 from the State General Fund for a pilot project in <u>FY 2000</u> called "Project Success/Wraparound Kansas." Funding would be for a competitive grants program for school districts in Sedgwick, Shawnee, Grant, and Finney Counties.

School districts in those counties (two urban and two rural) could apply to the State Board of Education for grants to implement, on a collaborative basis, mental health support services in the school setting that focus on violence prevention. In order to be eligible for a grant, the school district must show evidence of a collaborate effort with a local Community Mental Health Center and a local Communities in Schools Program.

An assessment of the success of each grant awarded would be made by the State Department of Education and a report and evaluation of the pilot project would be made by the State Department to the 2000 Legislature.

Additional Items for Rep. Pottorff's Budget Committee.

### Department of Administration

Add \$190,000 from the State General Fund for security equipment for Memorial Hall.

(Includes monitoring station \$75,000, exterior and interior keycard systems \$85,000, and security cameras, monitors and alarms \$30,000).

### **Board of Regents**

Add \$220,000 EDIF to the Board Office to support the institutions' international exchange programs. The institutions would be required to match the funding on a dollar for dollar basis.

### House Budget Committee Recommendations for Juvenile Correctional Facility Planning and Construction

The House Budget Committee held extensive hearings during the 1999 Legislative session to understand the impact of reform on the Juvenile Justice system. The Budget Committee toured each facility, held budget hearings at two of the facilities and met with community planning teams and members of the concerned public in regards to the successful implementation of Juvenile Justice Reform.

Expectations and concerns of the implementation of community plans center not only on initial funding for implementation, but on the long-term funding streams to fully implement the plans. The Budget Committee notes the agency's lack of an implementation strategy and requests the agency provide additional information to appropriate legislative committees before the new fiscal year begins.

Juvenile Justice reform is a holistic approach to preventing juvenile delinquency and responding to juvenile delinquency and crime with swift and appropriate responses. The expectation is that juveniles, their families, and their communities will be held responsible for their actions. Communities are responsible for prevention and initial sanctions that graduate in intensity for an appropriate response to delinquency and crime. They are also responsible for developing an reintegration plan back into the community when a juvenile returns from a state facility.

It is the responsibility of the state to provide the secure facility space when it becomes necessary to remove a child from the community. As such, facilities that were built as tuberculosis wards at the start of the 20<sup>th</sup> century are inappropriate and inadequate to meet the needs of juveniles and staff in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

The House Budget Committee has based its facilities recommendations on three philosophies:

- 1. Violent juvenile offenders require state-of-the-art maximum security space.
- 2. Juvenile facilities should not be overcrowded.
- 3. Facilities should be safe and appropriate for juvenile offenders and staff.

In support of these three philosophies, the House Budget Committee offers the following observations:

- Kansas currently does not have any maximum security space.
- Overcrowded facilities are unsafe and do not provide the environment envisioned by Juvenile Justice Reform to return juvenile offenders to the community.
- Kansas' facilities are all being currently operated over their capacity. While proposals in the Governor's budget meet a portion of immediate needs, they are temporary. In between these temporary solutions and the completion of additional maximum space, there is additional need for space that is not addressed in the Governor's budget, specifically for FY 2001-2002. It is the Budget Committee's expectation that these temporary beds could be replaced by appropriate space with the full implementation of this facility recommendation.
  - Much of our current space, in particular the Larned juvenile correctional facility in its entirety and portions of Topeka, do not meet the expectations of safety and appropriateness. The resolution of this is not addressed in the Governor's budget.

Attachment 5-1 House Appropriations Committee April 26, 1999 The House Budget Committee recommends adding a total of \$5,000,000 (SIBF) (\$1,000,000 in FY 1999, and \$4,000,000 in FY 2000) for facility planning to meet monthly high capacity needs as targeted by the end of FY 2004. The House Budget Committee recommends that the \$5.0 million be appropriated for the preliminary architectural planning of the space expansion priorities identified by the agency. The agency should present those preliminary plans to the Joint Committee on State Building Construction and then may expend the remaining money for final construction plans for the agency's highest priorities. The agency may need to request additional planning money for FY 2000 during the 2000 Legislature to meet expected construction needs. The House Budget Committee further recommends that:

- the facility plan expand the four existing juvenile correctional facilities into larger facilities;
- that the planning include no new facility site, but at one or more of the existing facilities with maximum capacity expansion, planning be made to provide the necessary maximum custody beds by 2004;
- that the facility expansion be age-, gender-, and program-specific rather than classification-specific; and,
- that the plan include replacing any existing deficient facilities, such as the entire Larned Juvenile Correctional Facility and four buildings at the Topeka Juvenile Correctional Facility—Arapahoe, Cheyenne, Chippewa, and Jayhawk. A deficient facility is a facility that does not comply with American Correctional Association (ACA) standards, that lacks in physical hardware to prevent it from being able to adequately handle the most difficult classifications of juveniles, that would be unconsciously expensive to rehabilitate, that serves functions not originally designed to handle, and that is not operationally efficient and thereby constitutes a real risk to safety and exposure to liability.

The House notes that the agency's cost models for the proposed facilities may not be entirely reflective of local building costs. The House expects that plans developed with initial planning money meet the existing population crisis and follow already established population housing patterns found in the existing facilities, such as:

- housing female offenders at Beloit Juvenile Correctional Facility; do confidence of the department of the confidence of the c
- younger-age offenders male at Atchison Juvenile Correctional Facility;
- older male offenders at the Topeka Juvenile Correctional Facility, and offenders with mental health;
- and male offenders with substance abuse problems at the Larned Juvenile
   Correctional Facility.

The House Budget Committee's recommendation includes no funds for construction, but recommends that the communities in which the institutions are situated consider creating public building commissions to assist with the construction of the facilities and then lease them back to the state. The Budget Committee also recommends that, by FY 2003, the total number of beds in juvenile correctional facilities meet the capacity of 690 of juvenile offenders (which represents a net change of 171 beds from FY 2000). By FY 2004, the bed capacity should meet the needs of 760 juvenile offenders.

#### OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR

Message to the Senate of the State of Kansas:

Pursuant to Article 2, Section 14 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, I hereby return Senate Bill 325 with my signature approving the bill, except for the item enumerated below:

The portion of Section 53 that reads as follows has been line item vetoed:

"And provided further, That expenditures of not to exceed \$300,000 may be made from the aid to local units account for a contract or contracts between the secretary of health and environment and not-for-profit organizations for programs that provide services for women which enable them to carry their pregnancies to term: And provided further, That such contracted services may include an array of social services relating to pregnancy maintenance and that no individuals who are unable to pay shall be denied the delivery or provision of pregnancy maintenance services: And provided further, That no contract or contracts under pregnancy maintenance programs shall be entered into with any group performing, promoting, referring for or educating in favor of abortion: And provided further, That a not-for-profit organization awarded a contract under this proviso shall match state moneys under this contract on the basis of a 50% match from a not-for-profit organization and a 50% match from the department of health and environment: And provided further, That the secretary of health and environment shall submit a report to the legislature at the beginning of the regular session of the legislature in 2000 on the results and outcomes of such pregnancy maintenance programs: And provided further, That no part of the grant moneys shall be used for any political purposes."

I am vetoing the proviso creating a pregnancy maintenance program. Currently, financially needy women are afforded financial assistance through the state for prenatal care, food, housing, nutrition and child care. State funds should support a range of programs, such as these, beneficial to woman. This proviso discriminates against certain facilities already providing these valuable prenatal services and duplicates current public and private efforts. For these reasons, I am line-item vetoing this provision of SB 325,

# Sec. —State Employee, Legislative and Statewide Elected Officials Salary Increases

1. 

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#### INTRODUCTION

As a society, we can't afford to let our children's mental health needs go unmet;

Not when one in five children has a mental, emotional or behavioral problem;

Not when one in 20 children has serious mental health problems and are not getting the help they need.

— Donna Shalala, Secretary

In response to growing concerns about a need for increased mental health services in the school system, Legislators recently issued a request for Kansas communities to create a proposal for a collaborative effort between Community Mental Health Centers and local Communities In Schools programs to prevent and reduce school violence.

According to the Social Development Strategy, a research-based framework created by J. David Hawkins and Richard F. Catalano, many child problem behaviors, such as substance abuse, violence, school dropouts, and delinquency, result from the same underlying risk factors. Those risk factors are grouped into four areas: Community, Family, School, and Individual/Peer. Those factors which are prevalent in all five problem behaviors and in the children and families served by Community Mental Health Centers and Communities In Schools include: poverty, family management problems, family conflict, early and persistent antisocial behavior, academic failure beginning in elementary school, lack of commitment to school, friends who engage in problem behavior, and early initiation of the problem behavior.

Research consistently demonstrates that when schools collaborate with mental health systems in the care and guidance of children, student success improves across all domains. Hawkins and Catalano suggest that a baseline of good prevention activities that address multiple risks through multiple strategies is the most effective approach. Children with special needs benefit from support and training in a variety of areas, including skills building, alternatives to violence, problem solving training, behavior management, effective communication, and self-care. Parents also need support that focuses on helping them to provide their children with the best chance for academic, social, and personal success. Teachers and school administrators benefit from support and guidance from mental health teams, which allows school personnel to focus their energies on school goals.

#### **CURRENT PROGRAMS**

#### COMMUNITY MENTAL HEALTH CENTERS

The mission of the 30 Kansas Community Mental Health Centers is to wrap services around children with special needs so that they can be successfully maintained in their own homes, schools, and communities. When children who display behavioral and emotional problems receive an array of services and supports. their chances of remaining in the community dramatically improve. Community-based wraparound services include attendant care, case management, respite care, in-home family therapy, psychiatric care, outpatient therapy, and parent support. These services are available throughout the state, commensurate with the level of funding available. As an example, during the past five years, COMCARE of Sedgwick County, along with other community partners and a five-year Federal grant which has now ended, has been able to reduce the average state hospital census of 35 - 40 children daily, to one child daily currently. In addition to successfully keeping children in the community, over the course of the program, our children show improvement in EVERY measure of functioning. The areas with the most dramatic improvement within the first six months of children's involvement in services include functioning in the improved school performance and in a reduced number of contacts with the juvenile justice system. The impact of improvement in so many concurrent domains has had a positive effect not only on the families served but on the community as well, by a decrease in the contacts with law enforcement, an increase in school functioning, and relationships with peers and the added effect of prevention for siblings in these families.

#### COMMUNITIES IN SCHOOLS OF WICHITA/SEDGWICK COUNTY

The mission is to champion the connection of needed community resources with schools to help young people successfully learn, stay in school, and prepare for life. CIS of Wichita/Sedgwick County, Inc. established in 1990, is the oldest CIS program in the state. It currently serves 12 schools in USD 259 and USD 260, including eight elementary, two middle schools, and two high schools. CIS of Wichita/Sedgwick County has shown steady growth in the number of sites served (1 to twelve), the number of clients served (365 to 3605); and the number of volunteers and loaned staff (150 to 760); and the number of hours they commit (11,000 to 46,000). Further CIS has developed a comprehensive evaluation plan with eleven outcomes addressing academics, behavior, and attendance, which indicates that CIS is working. CIS has established a positive track record of bringing services into the school. CIS serves as a connector—to connect community services/resources with the children and families who need them. There is no other community agency that serves this role or which collaborates to the extent that CIS does. CIS does not duplicate services; we arrange for them....whatever it takes to address the needs of the children and their families...tutoring, mentoring, counseling, health services, recreational activities, community service, and parental involvement. CIS arranges for the majority of services listed on the attached chart. CIS hires site coordinators, each of whom serves one school. With the help of teachers and support staff, each coordinator identifies the needs of a targeted group of at-risk children and their families and arranges for those needs to be addressed by public and voluntary organizations.

An array of mental health services is crucial to helping children and their families. Although we offer some of those services now, our children and families would greatly benefit from a more formalized approach involving more services. Our site coordinators have expressed the need for a much more intensive approach.

At a recent staff meeting, all of them indicated a need for more individual and family counseling and the majority requested more parenting education, groups on violence and gang prevention, and assistance with domestic violence. Communities In Schools of Kansas, Inc. replicates local programs state-wide by offering communities, free-of-charge, technical assistance in coordinating and making services accessible for children and families in need. CISK will assist with community mobilization in support of the four county pilot project where needed.

#### THE PROBLEM

The escalation of school violence presents a grave concern to Kansas communities, schools, families, and children. A solution must be found to address this growing epidemic. The good news is that when schools intervene early with children who demonstrate behavioral and emotional problems, they are able to positively improve academic performance. The bad news is that despite efforts, these same children continue to have difficulty making progress in other areas including behavioral and social functioning. Although some effective programs are currently in place, a number of issues prevent efficient and timely prevention, referral, and intervention for at-risk youth. Another aspect of the problem is that once these children are identified as having difficulties, there are a number of barriers to helping children connect with the services and supports that they need. The social service delivery system presents major barriers for at-risk children and their families:

- Service delivery often is poorly coordinated.
- Services are frequently inaccessible for a variety of reasons, including transportation and hours of operation.
- Families often are unaware of the services and resources that do exist to help them.

This project will not be a duplication of other current efforts. The focus will be on those students in elementary and middle school. The prevention funds budgeted for SRS are targeted for the 0-7 age range. Mental health funds currently in the budget are for children with a serious emotional disturbance (SED). The population for this proposed project are those children who are at risk of potentially developing a serious mental illness, and consequently concentrates more on prevention. The juvenile justice prevention funds have focused on the development of services in the community, not on these mental health needs identified, delivered, or accessed through the school system. This project fills an important gap in taking care of our children.

#### THE SOLUTION

The partnership between Communities In Schools and the Mental Health Centers in Kansas proposes the development of an array of services designed to create a collaborative bridge between our community mental health center and the schools in Sedgwick County. We believe that such a venture could be successful in identifying and helping children with behavioral problems earlier in the cycle, before those problems become so severe that the children are at risk of out-of-home placement. Our vision of this collaborative multi-agency effort between the mental health system of care and the schools the following vision:

### THE VISION

#### **DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES**

- \* Mental Health Liaison: The goal of a mental health liaison will be to increase mental health services at CIS project schools and to ensure their effective utilization. The liaison will serve as an ambassador for mental health providers. Activities include:
- using the funds available to increase services offered by existing mental health providers (a leveraging approach) and to recruit additional providers and college/university interns;
- providing orientation and training for the mental health providers and school staff (principal, support team, and teachers);
- creating and implementing training for mental health providers and school support staff;
- creating and implementing agreements between the providers, CIS, and the schools;
- determining and implementing evaluation outcomes and procedures.

- \*\* Training and Evaluation: Funding for training and evaluation includes:
- providing for staff costs associated with arranging and offering training (preparation, travel, food & lodging in rural Kansas);
- compiling evaluation data (CIS of Wichita/Sedgwick County has a program evaluator who can assist the rural Kansas initiative. Additional evaluation outcomes must be developed.)
- creating a replication document to assist other sites.
- Qualified Mental Health Professionals: These positions are master's level clinicians who will provide much needed consultation to teachers and other school personnel on how to work more effectively with disruptive and problem students. They will also provide individual and group therapy services to students in the school setting.
- Psychoeducation: This line item helps purchase an array of services which may include gang awareness, a Saturday Academy for Success (which provides a weekend setting which helps youth deal with academics, problem-solving, etc.), after school programs which include a substance abuse prevention component, etc.
- In-Home Family Therapists: When families are identified in the school setting who require more intensive intervention, it can be critical to have therapy occur in the home.
- Parent Support Services: Parents receiving support from other parents, especially those that have "been there," can be a very powerful intervention, particularly for parents who have been skeptical of the system.
- tittt Translation Services: These services would probably be contracted for and are necessary to communicate with the diverse populations.
