Rep. Grant made a motion to accept the minutes of March 11, 1999. The motion was seconded by Rep. Humerickhouse. The motion carried and the minutes were approved as written.

Roger Aeschliman, Acting Secretary of the Kansas Department of Human Resources (KDHR), appeared before the committee to introduce Heather M. Whitley, the new Director of Employment and Training, KDHR.

Ms. Whitley gave an update of the development of "Kansas One Stop". Their mission is to develop a "One Stop" system of information and service delivery that is customer driven and designed to provide maximum choices in employment, education and training services. The goals are: 1) common points of access, 2) information sharing capability, 3) comprehensive and integrated workforce development system, and 4) invisible agency and program boundaries. She gave the committee an example of a center in Independence, Kansas, which is now open with several agencies sharing the same building. By July 1, 1999, there must be one "One Stop" up and running in each of the five service delivery areas in Kansas. She finished her presentation by answering questions from the committee. (See Attachment 1) Also included in her handouts is a booklet, Workforce Investment Act of 1998, published by the U.S. Department of Labor Employment and Training Administration, September 1998, which is available from KDHR, 401 SW Topeka, Topeka, Kansas, 66603-3182.

Mr. Aeschliman told the committee that "One Stop" will be available to everyone in Kansas. Most people will use this service in a self-service environment or if needed can ask for help. Others who are critically underserved and unemployed will need to qualify for training, education and other programs and services. Even if the KDHR or SRS doesn't have an office in a certain location, "One Stop" services will be available in partnership with other agencies with people who are trained to provide them. An ideal way to use "One Stop" may be sometime in the future when you can sit down at a computer with a camera and you can see and talk with a person over the Internet, and he/she can answer you and provide you with services.

Chairman Lane adjourned the meeting at 9:52 a.m.



■ In the early 1980's KDHR had 55 offices throughout the state.

- Due to budget constraints, KDHR began to co-locate intra-agency programs and in 1984 there were 33 offices.
- Nearly 10 years later, the USDOL offered grant money to "one-stop" intra-agency functions. Kansas was denied funds in 1993 because we were ahead of the trend.
- In 1994 the USDOL began discussing partnering and co-locating. The "one-stop government" concept was born.
- 1998 WIA was signed into law.
- In 1999 KDHR has 23 offices serving the state, all of which have partnerships.




One-Stop Government



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
