Discussion on SB 345 - Kansas higher education coordination act

TIME LINE TO IMPLEMENT COMMUNITY COLLEGE OPERATING GRANTS AND PERFORMANCE FUNDING

The proposed time line is compatible with the community college funding proposal contained in H.B. 2439. Under H.B. 2439, the present credit hour basis for community college funding would be replaced with an operating grant that would be a percentage of the per pupil cost for undergraduates at Regents institutions. Under H.B. 2439, operating grant funding would begin in FY 2000. However, the following time line delays the conversion until FY 2001 in order to allow sufficient time to develop and implement performance indicators. The time line makes reference to policy changes that are not included in H.B. 2439 to show how H.B. 2439 would mesh with other policy options. The time line also addresses the extension of principles contained in H.B. 2439 to the Regents institutions and Washburn University.

FY 2000

• Legislation would be enacted to fund all vocational education courses offered by community colleges at two times the academic hour rate. (H.B. 2061, currently in the House Appropriations Committee, would make this change.)

FY 2001

- Community college funding would be on the basis of operating grants equal to 50 percent of the per pupil cost for undergraduates at the Regents institutions. The credit hour, out-district, and general state aid programs would be eliminated. County out-district tuition would continue, but would be phased out by FY 2005 and replaced with state aid as part of the operating grant.
- Performance indicators would be established. One purpose of the indicators would be to serve as a basis for performance funding, scheduled to begin in FY 2003.

FY 2002

- Operating grants for community colleges would be increased by an amount determined by the Legislature. (One option would be to increase them by the same percentage increase as the budgets for Regents institutions. Also, the operating grants would be adjusted annually to reflect changes in the per pupil cost for undergraduates at the Regents institutions.)
- Performance indicators would be implemented and community colleges would be responsible for developing ways to measure their success in relation to the indicators, in preparation for performance funding to begin in FY 2003.

FY 2003 (and thereafter)

- Operating grants would be increased by an amount determined by the Legislature. (The process would be the same as in FY 2002.)
- Of the operating grant increase, 2 percent would be allocated among the community colleges on the basis of performance indicators. Any money allocated to an institution on the basis of performance indicators would become part of the institution's base budget for the purpose of calculating the amount of money the institution would receive the following year.

Other Institutions

• In order to develop a coordinated system of higher education, changes proposed for community colleges would be applied to Regents institutions and Washburn University. By FY 2002, Regents institutions and Washburn University would be required to implement performance indicators that would serve as the basis for performance funding. Beginning in FY 2003, 2 percent of the State General Fund appropriation for these institutions would be allocated on the basis of performance indicators. Any money so allocated to a Regents institution or to Washburn University would become part of the institution's base budget for succeeding fiscal years.

Dear Chairman Tanner and members of the House Education Committee:

This letter represents Washburn University's endorsement of Senate Bill 345 as amended by the Senate Committee on Education. I regret that my schedule will not allow me to appear before you to discuss this matter, but if you have any questions, please refer them to Mr. David Monical, Executive Director of Governmental and University Relations.

Since my arrival in Kansas in the summer of 1997 there have been three initiatives to reorganize the state's higher education system. I was pleased to participate with the House Special Committee activities, to be a member of the Governor's Task Force on Higher Education Restructuring for Excellence, and to have been consulted by you and others in the Kansas Legislature as you consider the "Kansas Higher Education Coordination Act."

With each of these opportunities I have urged and supported coordination of all post-secondary education. Because Senate Bill 345 provides for a single coordination entity, I, therefore, support the provisions contained within the bill. Clearly the most elegant solution to more effectively coordinating the state's post-secondary education institutions would be a constitutional amendment to allow greater structural flexibility. However, if such an amendment is not deemed to be feasible, the concepts embodied in Senate Bill 345 represent an acceptable alternative.

As drafted, the bill will include Washburn University in the coordinated provision to ensure that it, along with the other post-secondary institutions of the state, are more effectively coordinated through a reconstituted board of regents. We welcome the opportunity to be a part of this revised structure and look forward to working with you and our colleagues in other institutions to ensure its successful implementation. Other than this change, the bill does not materially change Washburn University's status.

We hope you will be able to endorse the provisions of Senate Bill 345 and will do whatever we can to assist in improving coordination of Kansas post-secondary education.
