# MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Garry Boston at 1:30 p.m. on January 20,1999 in Room 423-S of the Capitol.

Chairperson Boston welcomed Clyde Graeber, Acting Secretary, Kansas Department of Health and Environment to the meeting.

Clyde Graeber, Acting Secretary, KDHE, stated he had just been appointed to this position and already realized that a lot more goes on at KDHE than first thought. Mr. Graeber introduced Don Brown, Public Information Officer, KDHE, who gave an overview of the organizational structure of KDHE.

Don Brown, Public Information Officer, KDHE, stated there are four divisions, i.e., Division of Health, Division of Environment, Division of Health and Environmental Laboratories, and the Center for Health and Environmental Statistics. Mr. Brown reviewed the functions of each of the divisions, bureaus and programs in the agency. (See Attachment 1)

Joe Fund, Legislative Liaison, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, stated the purpose of KDHE is empowered by the Kansas Legislature to enhance the public health and environment of Kansas. KDHE seeks to prevent disease, unintentional injury, and pollution, while promoting healthier and safer lifestyles and environmentally sound practices.

Public health work is different than the kind of work done by family physicians or local hospitals. Public health works from a community-wide perspective to prevent disease and injury from occurring in the first place. Also, public health promotes healthy lifestyle practices.

There are some public health functions which the law reserves exclusively for KDHE. These include maintaining birth, death, marriage, and divorce records; screening all Kansas newborns for lifethreatening but preventable neonatal diseases; addressing disease outbreaks statewide; inspecting nursing homes and restaurants for proper sanitation and health practices; administering certain federally funded programs at the state level, such as WIC and some rural health programs; and more.

The goals of KDHE when it comes to pollution are first, prevention, and second remediation or clean-up. Many of our efforts focus on not only minimizing pollution sources, but on ensuring that approved waste disposal sites are safely maintained. KDHE works closely with small and large companies, farmers, ranchers, local water districts, and others to achieve compliance with state and federal environmental laws.

KDHE is authorized to have 834.6 full time equivalent (FTE) positions (total of 975 employees including unclassified) to carry out the mission and spends about \$170 million per year, with \$27 million of that being State General Fund dollars. The balance, or nearly 80 percent of the agency's budget (\$142 million) is Federal money and grants from private foundations.

It was asked where rural health was and Mr. Graeber stated that rural health was not overlooked but the name was changed and that is an important area that would be looked at.

It was asked where the 2.5 million of waste tires were going. KDHE stated there are efforts being made to

recycle tires. There are some other materials made from tires, like floor mats. Some are used for landfill and efforts are being made to find uses for tires, but it is difficult to find use for 2.5 million tires.

It was asked how long bioterrorism in KDHE. Mr. Brown stated there are a number of state emergency responses. If this is a real threat there needs lab for testing. If bioterrorism does occur need to track with the laboratories and epidemiology. These cases are referred to the FBI, Department of Defense, etc.

Secretary Graeber replied they are concerned about bioterrorism and that will be addressed. That has recently become a real threat and KDHE is working on this and hope to have better answer in a month and would come back and give an update.

Representative Morrison moved and Representative Swenson seconded introduction of a bill concerning the optometry laws and drugs. The motion carried.

Representative Gilmore moved and Representative Landwehr seconded to introduce a bill for universal hearing screening on newborns. The motion carried.

The Chairperson announced the cancellation of the meeting for Thursday, January 21.

The meeting adjourned at 2:45 p.m. The next meeting will be January 25.

Mr. Chairman and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to appear this afternoon for a brief overview of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. As you are all aware, Secretary Graeber is just getting acclimated to his role at KDHE, so he has asked me to give you a quick run-through of the agency's structure and describe some of the roles and functions of KDHE.

This presentation will be somewhat informal. If you don't understand something or if you have a question, please speak up; I'm here to answer your questions and provide any information you need. What will follow is an "outline" approach to the KDHE organizational structure. I will try to touch briefly on all of the divisions, bureaus, and programs in this agency, and in doing so, I will try to give examples of the day-to-day activities carried out in each of these areas.

KDHE is divided into four Divisions: Division of Health, Division of Environment, Division of Health and Environmental Laboratories, and the Center for Health and Environmental Statistics.
