#### MINUTES OF THE HOUSE KANSAS 2000 SELECT COMMITTEE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Kenny Wilk at 1:30 p.m. on January 12, 1999 in Room 526-S of the Capitol.

Chairperson Wilk introduced Speaker Robin Jennison who wished to share his vision for the committee. Speaker Jennison began by noting that the uniqueness of a select commit is that it allows an opportunity to look at an issue or idea and to offer suggestions and solutions. The composition of the Kansas 2000 Select Committee was chosen to be geographically and philosophically well-balanced. Composed of Representatives chosen because of their interest in government and their individual expertise, it is not a committee to move an agenda but rather one of individuals willing to discuss issues and be fair with those issues and with people. In order to receive maximum input, it is important for the committee to function while the legislature is in session. While it is the prerogative of the committee to choose its agenda, Speaker Jennison hoped that two issues would be considered. First, alternative ways to compensate state employees using a performance pay plan. At the very least, he would like the committee to look at the pay matrix because of the belief that it has too many steps and it does not allow for market rate pay. Secondly, because of the flexibility it offers, he would like the committee to look into the area of a defined contribution pension plan . Speaker Jennison concluded by wishing the committee an enjoyable two years.

Chairperson Wilk then welcomed the committee. Each committee member and committee staff introduced themselves.

Chairperson Wilk then told the committee that he, Representative Deena Horst, Vice Chair, and Representative Bonnie Sharp, Ranking Minority, had discussed the agenda and decided that performance based pay would be the first issue reviewed. In order to gather information, a series of briefings are planned. Chairperson Wilk emphasized that this is a "blue sky" committee so if there are ideas members want to pursue, now is the time. He emphasized that "no idea is a bad idea."

Paul West and Alan Conroy, Legislative Research Department, provided background information on the existing state employee work force (<u>Attachment 1</u>).

Chairperson Wilk adjourned the meeting at 2:40 p.m.

The next meeting is scheduled for January 13, 1999.

Full-Time Equivalent State Employees

The attached table summarize full-time equivalent (FTE) state employees by function of government for the period of FY 1990 to FY 1999.

- Due to a definition change in FY 1996 which increased the number of FTE employees by 2.6 percent, the pre-FY 1996 numbers are not directly comparable to the post-FY 1996 period.
- Since FY 1996 the number of FTE state employees has decreased by 2,512 FTE (5.7 percent).
- Numerous factors are responsible for this reduction, with major forces including the closure of two state hospitals, privatization of services formerly performed by state agencies, and retirement reductions associated with state law that require the elimination of at least 25 percent of positions vacated due to retirement under the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System.

Re: State Payroll Expenditures

The attached table summarizes state payroll expenditures for the period of FY 1993 through FY 1997 and comparable data for the approved budgets for FY 1998 and FY 1999.

- Total payroll expenditures increased by \$147.8 million (10.0 percent) during the FY 1993-FY 1997 time frame—an average of \$36.9 million (2.5 percent) per year.
  - State General Fund expenditures increased by \$48.8 million (6.7 percent) during the same time period—an average of \$12.2 million (1.7 percent) per year.
- The assessment for sick and vacation leave paid on retirement had the greatest percentage growth during this time frame, primarily due to the expansion of the assessment to cover vacation leave in FY 1994. Since FY 1995, however, the assessment has been relatively stable.
- The relatively large growth in retirement contributions between FY 1993 and FY 1997 (25.1 percent) reflects enhanced benefits passed by the 1993 Legislature and increased state financial contributions to reduce the unfunded liability in the Kansas Public Employers Retirement System (KPERS).
- Health insurance contributions have shown the greatest variability, with an actual decline in the FY 1993 to FY 1997 time frame. The approved budgets for FY 1998 and FY 1999, however, indicate that costs are increasing again.
- Payroll taxes have remained relatively constant, representing approximately 40.0 percent of fringe benefit costs in most years.

Re:

State Pay Plan

The state's base pay delivery system for classified employees consists of a pay plan, or pay matrix, with 36 pay grades and 15 steps per range. All job classifications are assigned to a salary range and salary advancement is based on time on step and satisfactory performance evaluation ratings. Attached is the current pay matrix which includes the 1.5 percent base adjustment approved by the 1998 Legislature.

- Each step on the pay grade is approximately 2.5 percent above the preceding step, and each pay represents an increase of approximately 5.0 percent above the previous pay grade.
- A typical new employee will start on step A of a pay grade and after successfully completing a six-month probationary period will advance to step B. After an additional six months of satisfactory service the employee progresses to step C. Subsequent step movement occurs annually, assuming continued satisfactory service.
- An employee who does not change jobs or advance to a higher pay range will reach the end of the pay grade after 13 years of employment.
- Step 5 of the pay grade is designated as the market rate. Market rate may be defined as the average rate of pay in the labor market for an employee performing similar duties.
- Base pay adjustments and other factors in the private and public employment sectors would affect whether the pay matrix market continues to reflect the average rate of pay for comparable positions over a period of time.
- In addition, employees with ten years or more of service are eligible for annual longevity bonuses. The bonus equals \$40 per year of service up to a maximum of \$1,000.

#### **Employer Paid Health Insurance Costs**

For FY 1999 the employer's paid health insurance costs in the *Governor's Budget Report* contains an annual single member health insurance premium of \$2,342, plus an annual dependent health insurance premium of \$1,209. The FY 1999 total budgeted health insurance premium for each state employee with dependents that the state pays is \$3,551.

On the average classified state employee's salary of \$26,775, the above employer costs for fringe benefits would total an average of \$3,558. These employer cost when combined with employer health insurance (member and dependent) would bring the total fringe benefits costs for an average state employee to \$7,109.

#### Vacation and Sick Leave

State employees earn vacation leave hours based on the number of years of service with the state. For an employee with less than five years of service the individual earns 12 days a year. For an employee with 15 or more years of service the individual earns 21 days of vacation leave a year. State employees all earn 12 days of sick leave a year. Employees when they retire who have at least eight years of service and who have accumulated 100 days or more of sick leave may receive compensation for their sick leave upon retirement. The compensation ranges from 30 days to 60 days of salary depending on the years of service with the state.

#### **Paid Vacation Days**

For calendar year 1999 state employees receive ten paid holidays, including a discretionary day.

The Work Force Report for Fiscal Year 1997 profiles statistics, trends, and characteristics of the Kansas state government work force. For several years, the Division of Personnel Services, Department of Administration, has published an annual report with limited statistical information. The following information for Fiscal Year 1997, and prior years when used to show trends, is the Division's first compilation of data separate from the annual report.

In December of 1995, the State of Kansas implemented a new automated personnel and payroll system -- Statewide Human Resource and Payroll (SHARP). This new system replaced KIPPS (Kansas Integrated Personnel and Payroll System). The information presented in this report was gathered from SHARP; annual reports containing KIPPS data; information published by the Division of the Budget, State of Kansas; Kansas Department of Human Resources; and the U.S. Census Bureau.

Section I provides graphs and tables showing positions in state government. It is important to note the difference between positions and employees. Legislature authorizes the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for agencies to provide services and perform functions. While the number of positions normally remains constant during a fiscal year, the number of employees filling those positions varies from day-to-day. Therefore, the employee data provided in the other sections will not precisely match with the position data presented in Section I.

- Positions are placed in classified service or unclassified service. The two types of service are depicted in "Position Reference Table" for each category.
- The reported number of positions in Fiscal Year 1996 increased from the previous year as part of the Governor's intent to report the full size of the state workforce. In prior years, certain positions were not included in determining the number of FTE positions. In Fiscal Year 1996, some of these positions were converted to FTE positions.
- In September 1995, Governor Bill Graves initiated a plan to decrease the number FTE positions based on a reduction of 2% by the end of FY 1996 and an additional 3% (a total of 5%) by the end of FY 1997.
- Another factor affecting the size of the state workforce results from a law passed by the 1993 Legislature which requires that at least 25% of positions vacated by state employees who retire be eliminated.



#### **Kansas State Government Functions**





Section II shows either cumulative Fiscal Year 1997 figures or data as of the end of the fiscal year (June 30, 1997). In some graphs, data from previous years is used to depict trends. Most of the information provided pertains to employees in the classified service, unless otherwise noted. Temporary and student employees were excluded from all data.

- The total number of state employees on the last day of the fiscal year decreased 5% from Fiscal Year 1993 to Fiscal Year 1997. The number of classified employees decreased 11% and the number of unclassified employees increased 9%.
- Full-time employment has risen 10% in the last four fiscal years, with a corresponding decrease in part-time employment.
- Factors affecting increases in average salaries for classified employees include general increases in the basic pay plan, employees eligible for step movement, more employees in upper salary ranges, and more employees with over 20 years of service.
- Employees in agencies performing transportation and public safety functions had the most overtime.
- According to U.S. Census Bureau 1995 data, Kansas ranked below national averages for both FTE per 10,000 population and annual salary.



### **Number of State Government Employees**







### **Average Salaries for Classified Employees**



Various factors contribute to changes in the average annual salary. General increases in the basic pay plan totalled 3.5% from FY93 to FY97. Also, many employees are eligible for step movement within the pay plan each year, a 2.5% increase. Correspondingly, the number of classified employees has steadily increased in the upper salary ranges (see graph "Percentage of Classified Employees by Annual Salary") and the number of classified employees with 20-29 years of service increased in FY97.



Based on Census Bureau reports, the average FTE per 10,000 population for all states in 1995 was 224 and the average annual salary was \$31,392. The Bureau relies on government reports, financial statements, and state accounting or payroll systems as a major statistical source. Governments differ in size, activities, organization, responsibilities and internal reporting methods. They include data drawn not only from the central records of a government's finance or payroll office but also those of dependent educational institutions, semi-autonomous boards, special authorities, and the like. The Bureau recategorizes the original data within a standard framework based on the common nature of particular activities or transactions. Thus, Census Bureau statistics often do not agree with those issued by the governments themselves.

Section III reviews characteristics of state employment in greater detail than in the previous sections. Information is provided on topics such as ethnic and gender distribution, average years of service, sick leave use and occupational categories.

- Minorities comprise 14% of employees in the classified service.
- The number of classified employees with less than 10 years of services declined 17% from Fiscal Year 1995 to Fiscal Year 1997.
- The number of classified employees from 40 49 years of age has steadily increased since Fiscal Year 1992. Those under the age of 40 remained fairly constant, while the number of employees over the age of 60 gradually decreased during the same time period.
- Classified employees averaged 9 days of sick leave for Fiscal Year 1997.
- 28% of classified employees work in Shawnee County, home of the state capitol in Topeka.
- 23% of the classified work force are office support workers and 91% of them are female.









#### Established position

a position which is in the budget as approved by the legislature, and which has been allocated

#### Fiscal Year

the time period from July 1 to June 30

### Full-Time Equivalency (FTE)

a unit of measurement equivalent to one full-time position

#### KIPPS

Kansas Integrated Personnel and Payroll System, replaced by SHARP in December of 1995

#### Length of Service

total time worked in the classified service or unclassified service, with certain exclusions

#### Pay Grade

a salary and wage range in the pay plan prepared by the director of personnel services as required by K.S.A. 75-2938

#### Position

a group of duties and responsibilities, assigned or delegated by an appointing authority, requiring the services of an employee on a full-time basis or, in some cases, on a less than full-time basis

#### Promotion

a change of an employee from a position in one class to a position in another class having a higher pay grade, by an employee who meets the required selection criteria for promotion

#### Rehire

any person hired by the state who was previously employed by the state

#### Resignation

the voluntary termination of employment by an employee

#### SHARP

Statewide Human Resource and Payroll system implemented in December, 1995

### Temporary position (classified service)

a position which is limited to not more than 999 hours of employment in a 12-month period. Does not affect the position limitation of an agency

#### Transfer

a change by an employee from one position to another position with a close similarity of duties, essentially the same basic qualifications, and the same pay grade

#### **Unclassified Service**

those positions specifically designated as unclassified by K.S.A. 75-2935, as amended, or other sections of the statutes
