RESPONSE TO FY97 WORKFORCE REPORT QUESTIONS

Page 15 Percent of Full-Time and Part-Time Filled Classified Positions

Why the decrease in the number of part-time positions?

- Legislative mandates and program changes can affect the number of part-time employees. For example, 1995 legislation moved long-term care workers (more than 800 part-time employees) from the classified to the unclassified service. Another example is privatization of foster care and adoption from Fiscal Years 1995 to 1997, which affected part-time employees.
- State temporary services contract, which helps with cyclical work in agencies, was established in March, 1996 (FY96). Agencies do not have to maintain part-time workers for work load fluctuation.
- FY98 numbers leveled out and the number of part-time employees remained at 4%. Sharpest decline was from FY93 FY96.

Page 20 Average Salaries for Classified Employees

Is this just base? (FY97 salary coincides with gold sheet distributed yesterday)

 Average annual salary was calculated based on annual salaries derived by multiplying hourly rates by 2080 hours. In other words, average annual salary is based on the employee's hourly rate, not actual salary received.

Page 26 Employment & Average Salaries in All States

What does this include? Why does it differ from Legislative Research's gold sheet?

- Chart is based on 1995 U.S. Census Bureau data (the most recent at time of publication), not FY1997 Kansas data.
- Allows comparison of states listed within the chart; not with other individual state workforce data.
- Represents employment and average salaries in governments in **all** other states, which may include county and city government.
- U.S. Census Bureau states that their statistics often do not agree with those issued by the governments themselves because they recategorize data into a standard framework.
