<u>HB 2945 - Task force to make recommendations to legislature regarding 911 and E911 telephone</u> service

Major General Greg Gardner, Adjutant General, testified in support of <u>HB 2945</u> (Attachment 2). His presentation also included the request that his office be removed from the task force.

Judy Moler, Legislative Services Director for the Kansas Association of Counties, testified as a proponent of **HB 2945** (Attachment 3). This bill is similar to SCR 1641, which was requested by the Association.

Ms. Rebecca Aranda, Executive Director of the Kansas Commission for the Deaf & Hard of Hearing, testified in support of **HB 2945**. She stated that this was the first step in improving the training for persons working with the deaf and hard of hearing and facilitating their use of 911 services.

Mr. David Lake, Director of the Board of Emergency Medical Services, provided testimony in favor of <u>HB</u> 2945 (Attachment 4). Mr. Lake asked for consideration in adding a representative of pre-hospital emergency medical services to the task force membership.

Diane Gage, Director of the Sedgwick County Department of Emergency Communications, testified as a proponent of the bill (Attachment 5). Her testimony included a request to expand the membership of the task force to include local government and legislators.

Ms. Kim Gulley, Director of Policy Development for the League of Kansas Municipalities, appeared in support of <u>HB 2945</u> (Attachment 6). The League believes that it is vital that the task force be balanced in its representation and would oppose altering the balance that is currently in the bill.

Dana Fenton, Intergovernmental Relations Coordinator for Johnson County, testified in support of <u>HB 2945</u> (<u>Attachment 7</u>). Mr. Fenton also recommended that the task force be expanded to include members of the legislature.



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How to get your name off telemarketing lists.

Many people enjoy receiving information about products or services in their homes over the telephone. Many consumers find telephone shopping to be a convenient way to shop. However, some consumers would like to receive fewer telephone marketing calls at home. The Telephone Preference Service (TPS), a do-not-call service, is a free service to assist those consumers in decreasing the number of national commercial calls received at home.

The Telephone Preference Service (TPS) is a free consumer service sponsored by the Direct Marketing Association (DMA). Established in 1917, DMA is the oldest and largest national trade association serving the direct marketing field. (DMA is not the source of calling lists, and does not sell calling lists to other companies).

requests for inclusion on the MPS and TPS files. This is because, as much as possible, we need to verify that the person who submits the request is the person whose name is being removed from marketing lists. Receipt of a signed request via the Postal Service provides The DMA, MPS user companies, and consumers with a practical method for verification. E-mail does not provide safeguards to protect your privacy or a means to verify your identity.

What happens after I register with TPS?

When you register with TPS, your name, address and telephone number are placed on a do-not-call file. This "delete file" is updated four times a year -- January, April, July, and October -- and made available to telephone marketing companies who choose to use it. Your name remains on file for five years.

Typically you will see the number of calls you receive begin to decrease approximately two months after your name is entered onto the quarterly file.

Does registration with TPS mean an end to all advertising calls?

No. Although registration with TPS will help reduce the number of telemarketing calls you receive, it will not stop all telemarketing calls. You may continue to receive calls from local merchants, religious and charitable organizations, professional and alumni associations, and political candidates and office holders.

Calls of a business-to-business nature received at your place of employment are also not affected through registration with TPS. Business names, addresses and telephone numbers are not accepted on TPS, and companies that market to other companies do not use this consumer-oriented do-not-call



file.

Note: Registration with TPS will not affect sequentially dialed automated recorded message (computerized) calls. If you receive a computerized call from a company you do not wish to hear from again, listen to the automated message to obtain the telemarketer's name and address or phone number. Then, contact the company directly and ask to be placed on the company's do-not-call list.

Can I register my FAX number with TPS?
No. FAX numbers are not included on TPS.

It is against the law to send an unsolicited FAX to anyone [the Telephone Consumer Protection Act]. You may wish to report companies sending unsolicited FAXes to the nearest office of the Federal Communications Commission [FCC]-look in the US Government pages of your local telephone directory.

If you prefer not to receive FAXes from a company or person with whom you have an already established business relationship, advise that person or company directly so that it may take steps to comply with your request and adhere to the law.

What happens when I move or get a new telephone number?

You may write again to register your new address and telephone number with the service. Or, if you turn in a change-of-address card at the Post Office, your old address will be removed from the TPS file and the new address and telephone number will replace it.

Can I request deletion from specific lists



through TPS?

No. Name removal through TPS is general in nature. You may reduce the number of telephone marketing calls you receive from a specific company by asking the company to place your name and telephone number on the company's do-not-call list the next time the company calls you.

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The DMA Telephone Preference Service

If you want to reduce the number of unsolicited national telemarketing calls you receive at home, you may register with TPS, a free service, by printing out this form, filling it in and mailing it to:

The DMA does not provide marketers with consumer telemarketing lists. The TPS file is available to companies for the sole purpose of removing your name, address and home telephone number from their calling lists. Your information will remain on TPS for 5 years. This service does not apply to telemarketing calls coming to your business phone.

After several months you will begin receiving fewer telemarketing calls. Local businesses and organizations usually do not use this program. You will continue to receive calls from companies with which you already do business.

Not all companies use TPS to purge their calling lists, therefore, you may continue to receive some companies' calls. If you are sure you do not want to do business with the company now or in the near future, ask to be placed on the company's do-not-call file.





TESTIMONY ON HB 2945 House Utilities Committee By Judy A. Moler, Legislative Services Director February 16, 2000

Chairman Holmes and Members of the Committee, thank you for allowing me to speak in support of HB 2945 on behalf of the Kansas Association of Counties. As proposed, this bill is similar to Senate Concurrent Resolution 1641which was requested by the Kansas Association of Counties (attached).

The KAC has for several years requested legislation that would expand tax currently collected on hard wired telephones for 9-1-1 services to wireless, mobile and cellular phones. The KAC has felt that extension of this tax is a matter of tax equity

Because of the questions raised by testimony on this issue, a Legislative Post Audit reviewing the 9-1-1 emergency phone systems in Kansas was requested by the Senate Commerce Committee. The Post Audit Report was well done but questions still remain. For this reason, the KAC at its Annual Meeting decided to ask for the formulation of a task force as one of the KAC 2000 Platform priorities. We decided to take this set of education before moving toward our priority position to working toward tax equity. We felt this should be done in order that some of the questions raised by the post audit could be answered. One of those questions was the result of the other bill being considered by this committee today....that is the statutory limitation on the use of the funds.

We support the concept and the charge contained in HB 2945. The Kansas Association of Counties also appreciates the number of local officials that would serve on the Task Force contained in the HB 2945. The difference between HB 2945 and SCR 1641 is primarily the addition of legislators in the Senate version. We feel it is important that legislators be a part of this Task Force as legislation will most likely be a result of the study. For this reason, we would urge you add legislators to the Task Force.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak on this bill.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1641

By Committee on Commerce

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION forming the enhanced 911 task force.

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WHEREAS, The ability of the public to contact police, fire and emergency medical services by dialing the three digit 911 number has contributed greatly to the public's safety, health and welfare; and

WHEREAS, Advances in telecommunications technology have made enhanced 911 services available to users of wireless telephones; and

WHEREAS, The deployment of enhanced 911 services has created several important public policy issues including the method of its deployment, the amount and means of revenue used to support it and the need for coordination between local governments: Now, therefore,

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Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: That there shall be established an enhanced 911 task force which shall develop a strategy for funding and deploying wireless emergency telephone services. Such plan shall include suggestions for future action by the Legislature with respect to deploying efficient and economical enhanced 911 services; implementing equitable and adequate means to fund such services. Specifically, the task force shall make recommendations and propose legislation, if appropriate, concerning the following: The mechanism for administering wireless 911 service, with a focus on whether such service shall be administered on a centralized basis; the possible formation of an oversight board to address future technological, coordination and regulatory issues related to deployment of wireless emergency telephone service; the fairness and adequacy of the mechanism for funding such service; the method for recovering costs incurred by public safety answering points and the mechanism, if any, by wireless telecommunications service providers in providing emergency telephone service; and any other issues the task force deems relevant to the deployment of emergency telephone service.

Be it further resolved: The the task force consist of 15 members. Two members shall be representatives of wireless telecommunications carriers to be appointed by the Legislative Coordinating Council. One member representing a local exchange carrier other than a rural telephone com-

pany to be designated by the Kansas Telecommunications Association. 1 One member representing a rural telephone company to be appointed 3 by the Legislative Coordinating Council. Two members appointed by the Kansas Association of Counties. Two members designated by the League 4 of Kansas Municipalities. The Adjutant General or the Adjutant General's designee. The Superintendent of the Highway Patrol or the Superintendent's designee. The Secretary of Revenue or the Secretary's designee. 8 Four legislators as follows: one member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; one member appointed by the House Minority 10 Leader; one member appointed by the President of the Senate; and one 11 member appointed by the Senate minority Leader. The Legislative Co-12 ordinating Council shall appoint one legislative member as chair of the 13 task force. All meetings shall be on call of the chair. Legislators serving on the taskforce shall be compensated at the rate prescribed in K.S.A. 14 15 75-3223 and amendments thereto for each day of actual attendance at 16 task force meetings and any subcommittee meeting approved by the 17 chair. All other task force members shall serve without compensation. Legislative members shall be compensated from funds appropriated for 18 19 legislative operating expenses pursuant to vouchers prepared by the Di-20 rector of Legislative and Administrative Services and approved by the 21 Legislative Coordinating Council pursuant to law; and 22 Be it further resolved: That the task force shall report its findings and 23 conclusion to the House Committee on Utilities and the Senate Com-24

Be it further resolved: That the task force shall report its findings and conclusion to the House Committee on Utilities and the Senate Committee on Commerce during the first week of the 2001 legislative session. The Legislative Research Department and the Office of the Revisor of Statutes shall provide staff support to the task force as necessary. Such legislative staff shall prepare the report and any legislation recommended

During our policy development process last Fall, League member cities discussed the 911 issue and the following was adopted as a priority by our Governing Body and Convention of Voting Delegates:



TESTIMONY REGARDING HB 2945 HOUSE UTILITIES COMMITTEE FEBRUARY 16, 2000

DANA FENTON, INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS COORDINATOR

Mister Chairman and members of the committee, my name is Dana Fenton, Intergovernmental Relations Coordinator for Johnson County, Kansas. Thank you for this opportunity to appear in front of the committee. I am here to express the SUPPORT of the Johnson County Board of Commissioners for the task force concept embodied in HB 2945.

HB 2945 would authorize the formation of and the appointment of private and public sector professionals to a task force for the purpose of studying the emergency 911-phone system in the State of Kansas. The task force would study the best way to implement enhanced 911 services for wireless telephone users. Specifically, the committee would examine and make a recommendation concerning the best technology available for locating wireless telephone users in the event of an emergency. Furthermore, the task force would also examine and make a recommendation as to the fairest method of financing the development and implementation of wireless locator technology.

The task force concept was proposed by the Legislative Post Audit Department in its report to the Legislative Post Audit Committee in 1999 on the state of 911 services in Kansas. The audit report was well done and the members of the Post Audit Department contributing to this study should be complimented for their hard work and cogent analysis. It also appears that the size and composition of the task force embodied in HB 2945 closely follows the recommendations of the audit report. The task force would be composed of private sector telecommunications providers and public sector personnel (both state and local). However, one major constituency was not considered in the composition of the task force – the State Legislature.

Many task forces are formed to study issues of concern to the legislature. Most, if not all of these task forces include members of the Legislature. I don't need to say to this committee that the voters choose legislators. We believe a task force with legislators, private sector telecommunications providers, and public sector personnel (both state and local) will bring the major constituencies involved in this issue to the table. Thus, we respectfully request that the House Utilities Committee consider adding legislators to the task force.
