Rep. Kuether moved to approve the minutes from the February 18, February 21, February 22, and February 23 meetings. Rep. Loyd seconded the motion. Motion carried.

#### Continued Hearing on Sub HB 2591 - State education technology network, establishment

Copies of responses, by the previous day's conferees, to requests by the committee were distributed. They were: Memorandum to Morey Sullivan from Mark Braun regarding the legal opinion on a proposed amendment to <a href="https://example.com/HB 2591">HB 2591</a> (Attachment 1); copies of the K.S.A.'s that are referenced in the bill (Attachment 2); and information from the Kansas Department of Education regarding enrollment, state-to-state comparisons, National Profile and KSDE's E-rate application (Attachment 3).

Duane Johnson, State Librarian, testified in support of <u>Sub HB 2591</u> (Attachment 4). Mr. Johnson stated that KAN-ED would help Kansas stay competitive in this global information economy. Mr. Johnson also distributed copies of the State Library's E-rate application (<u>Attachment 5</u>).

Craig Grant, speaking on behalf of the Unified School Finance Coalition, testified as a proponent of <u>Sub HB</u> <u>2591 (Attachment 6)</u>. Mr. Grant stated that the coalition hoped the committee would support the schools in finding the best way to create the backbone in technology they believe is desperately needed.

Mr. Mike Reecht, representing A. T. & T., spoke in support of <u>Sub HB 2591</u> (<u>Attachment 7</u>). Mr. Reecht explained that, in today's world of advancing technology, the options to provide connectivity include traditional land line and cable technologies as well as the newer wireless and satellite solutions.

Mike Murray, Director of Governmental Affairs for Sprint, appeared in support of <u>Sub HB 2591</u> (Attachment 8). Mr. Murray stated that Sprint recommends that <u>HB 2591</u> be the subject of an interim study to include representation from industry.

Mr. John Federico, on behalf of the Kansas Cable Telecommunications Assn., presented testimony in support of <u>Sub HB 2591</u> (Attachment 9). Mr. Federico stated that the cable television industry's actions speak volumes about their commitment to connecting Kansas schools and libraries.

Jay Allbaugh, Cox Communications, presented information to the committee about their just released offer of free high speed Internet access to Kansas schools in Cox's service areas (Attachment 10).

The conferees responded to questions from Rep. Vining, Rep. Kuether, Rep. Dahl, Rep. Krehbiel, Rep. Toelkes, Rep. McClure, Rep. Klein, Rep. Alldritt, Rep. Morrison, Rep. Loyd and Rep. Sloan.

#### **QUESTION PRESENTED**

Whether legislation that would allow private not-for-profit schools to receive interconnectivity services that would be provided public schools is constitutionally permissible if the private schools will be paying for the service, with "no cost to the state?"

#### **DISCUSSION**

Based on the first Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, it is a well-grounded rule of law that public funds may not be appropriated or used for the benefit of private or sectarian schools. While aid to nonpublic schools may not "impermissibly entangle" church and state, it has been found that as part of general legislation a state may include parochial schools in programs that provide secular type functions such as bus transportation, school lunches, and public health.

The U.S. Supreme Court in <u>Meek v. Pittenger</u>, 421 U.S. 349(1975), in dicta, specifically addressed these programs stating that "the indirect and incidental benefits to church-related schools from these programs do not offend the constitutional prohibition against establishment of religion." <u>Id.</u> at 365. The Court found these programs both "secular and nonideological services unrelated to the primary, religion-oriented educational functions of the sectarian schools." <u>Id.</u> at 364.

Applying this to the case at hand, it seems that the provision allowing for interconnectivity to private schools would likely be permissible. Analogizing this to bus transportation or public health, the likelihood of passing constitutional muster weighs even stronger. With bus transportation, the state directly participates in the financing. Cases are replete with situations where the state involved does not charge the private schools for this service, but merely provides it to the students, at full cost to the state. The same is true of other services. However, with the Internet connectivity, the amendment specifically states that private schools will not be denied access "as long as there is no cost to the state for providing the connectivity." The language is clear that the state will not be financing the connection. It will merely not discriminate among public and private schools for access to the network.

One may argue that in the case of bus transportation, school lunches, or public health, the student is directly receiving a benefit unlike with the Internet connectivity in which the private school is primarily involved and not the student. Even so, the student who attends a private school allowed to connect does stand to benefit. Without this connection option, many schools may not be able to obtain an adequate Internet connection at a reasonable price.

Both the Federal Telecommunications Act, as well as the Kansas telecommunications statutes make clear that public policy favors non-discrimination when it comes to access to telecommunications services. The federal code states that services should be provided "without discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex." 47 U.S.C. §151(1998). K.S.A. 66-2001, subsection (a), states that the public policy regarding telecommunications is to "ensure that every Kansan will have access to a first class telecommunications infrastructure that provides excellent services at an affordable price." K.S.A. 66-

2001(Supp. 1999). Subsection (d) goes on further to state that it is the state's goal to "advance the development of a statewide telecommunications infrastructure" to include various applications including "access to internet providers and others." K.S.A. 66-2001(d)(Supp. 1999). Based on both state and federal laws, it seems clear that public policy dictates the allowance of private schools to interconnect utilizing KAN-ED. To do otherwise could be construed as discrimination based on religion, specifically prohibited by the federal act, and discouraged by the Kansas statutes. Also see 47 U.S.C. §202(making it unlawful to discriminate as a common carrier), and §157(encouraging the provision of new technology and services to the public).

#### CONCLUSION

It appears fairly clear that allowing a private school the ability to interconnect with KAN-ED, provided such connection is not financed by the State of Kansas, would be deemed constitutionally permissible. Since the state will not be involved in financing, likely the courts would not even view this as an entanglement between church and state, especially in view of the current public policy regarding telecommunications. Even if arguably this was viewed as an entanglement, the Supreme Court has been clear that not all entanglements advance or inhibit religion. Some interaction between church and state is inevitable. Entanglement, to be unconstitutional, must be "excessive." See Agostini v. Felton, 117 S. Ct. 1997(1997). Allowing this interconnection simply does not rise to this level.

# Chapter 75.--STATE DEPARTMENTS; PUBLIC OFFICERSAND EMPLOYEES Article 47.--INFORMATION SYSTEMSAND COMMUNICATIONS

**75-4709.** Telecommunications services of certain state agencies; extension to certain private, nonprofit agencies or governmental entities; records of services. (a) The secretary of administration shall provide for and coordinate all telecommunications services for all divisions, departments and agencies of the state pursuant to policies established by the information technology executive council. The secretary of administration shall have the authority to control the acquisition, retention and use of all telecommunications services for all divisions, departments and agencies of the state, and to develop and review plans and specifications for telecommunications services throughout the state.

(b) The secretary of administration, when feasible, may enter into agreements with any entity defined in this subsection extending to such entity the use of state intercity telecommunications facilities and services under the control of the secretary.

As used in this subsection, an "entity" means:

- (1) Any governmental unit, including any state agency, taxing subdivision of the state or municipality; or
- (2) any hospital or nonprofit corporation which the secretary determines to be performing any state function on an ongoing basis through agreement or otherwise, or any function which will assist a governmental unit in attaining an objective or goal, bearing a valid relationship to powers and functions of such unit.
- (c) Every record made, maintained or kept by the secretary of administration or the division of information systems and communications, or any agency or instrumentality thereof, which relates to the acquisition, retention or use of telecommunications services provided to any division, department or agency of the state, state officer or governmental unit and which pertains to individually identifiable individuals using such telecommunication services shall constitute for purposes of the open records act a record of the division, department or agency of the state, state officer or governmental unit to which such records relate. The official custodian of such records for the purposes of the open records act shall be the official custodian of the records of such division, department or agency of the state, state officer or governmental unit.

# Chapter 75.--STATE DEPARTMENTS; PUBLIC OFFICERSAND EMPLOYEES Article 72.--INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

**75-7201. Definitions.** As used in K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 75-7201 through 75-7212, and amendments thereto:

- (a) "Cumulative cost" means the total expenditures, from all sources, for any information technology project by one or more state agencies to meet project objectives from project start to project completion or the date and time the project is terminated if it is not completed.
  - (b) "Executive agency" means any state agency in the executive branch of government.
- (c) "Information technology project" means a project for a major computer, telecommunications or other information technology improvement with an estimated cumulative cost of \$250,000 or more and includes any such project that has proposed expenditures for: (1) New or replacement equipment or software; (2) upgrade improvements to existing equipment and any computer systems, programs or software upgrades therefor; or (3) data or consulting or other professional services for such a project.
  - (d) "Information technology project change or overrun" means any of the following:
- (1) Any change in planned expenditures for an information technology project that would result in the total authorized cost of the project being increased above the currently authorized cost of such project by more than either \$1,000,000 or 10% of such currently authorized cost of such project, whichever is lower;
- (2) any change in the scope of an information technology project, as such scope was presented to and reviewed by the joint committee or the chief information technology officer to whom the project was submitted pursuant to K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 75-7209 and amendments thereto; or
- (3) any change in the proposed use of any new or replacement information technology equipment or in the use of any existing information technology equipment that has been significantly upgraded.
  - (e) "Joint committee" means the joint committee on information technology.
  - (f) "Judicial agency" means any state agency in the judicial branch of government.
  - (g) "Legislative agency" means any state agency in the legislative branch of government.
- (h) "Project" means a planned series of events or activities that is intended to accomplish a specified outcome in a specified time period, under consistent management direction within a state agency or shared among two or more state agencies, and that has an identifiable budget for

anticipated expenses.

- (i) "Project completion" means the date and time when the head of a state agency having primary responsibility for an information technology project certifies that the improvement being produced or altered under the project is ready for operational use.
- (j) "Project start" means the date and time when a state agency begins a formal study of a business process or technology concept to assess the needs of the state agency, determines project feasibility or prepares an information technology project budget estimate under K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 75-7209 and amendments thereto.
- (k) "State agency" means any state office or officer, department, board, commission, institution or bureau, or any agency, division or unit thereof.

# Chapter 75.--STATE DEPARTMENTS; PUBLIC OFFICERSAND EMPLOYEES Article 72.--INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

**75-7209. Information technology projects; procedures.** (a) Whenever an agency proposes an information technology project, such agency shall prepare and submit to the chief information technology officer of the branch of state government of which the agency is a part of a project budget estimate therefor, and for each amendment or revision thereof, in accordance with this section. Each information technology project budget estimate shall be in such form as required by the director of the budget, in consultation with the chief information technology architect, and by this section. In each case, the agency shall prepare and include as a part of such project budget estimate a plan consisting of a written program statement describing the project. The program statement shall:

- (1) Include a detailed description of and justification for the project, including: (A) An analysis of the programs, activities and other needs and intended uses for the additional or improved information technology; (B) a statement of project scope including identification of the organizations and individuals to be affected by the project and a definition of the functionality to result from the project; and (C) an analysis of the alternative means by which such information technology needs and uses could be satisfied;
- (2) describe the tasks and schedule for the project and for each phase of the project, if the project is to be completed in more than one phase;
- (3) include a financial plan showing: (A) The proposed source of funding and categorized expenditures for each phase of the project; and (B) cost estimates for any needs analyses or other investigations, consulting or other professional services, computer programs, data, equipment, buildings or major repairs or improvements to buildings and other items or services necessary for the project; and
- (4) include a cost-benefit statement based on an analysis of qualitative as well as financial benefits.
- (b) (1) Before one or more state agencies proposing an information technology project begin implementation of the project, the project plan, including the architecture and the cost-benefit analysis, shall be approved by the head of each state agency proposing the project and by the chief information technology officer of each branch of state government of which the agency or agencies are a part. Approval of those projects that involve telecommunications services shall also be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4709, 75-4710 and 75-4712, and amendments thereto.
- (2) All specifications for bids or proposals related to an approved information technology project of one or more state agencies shall be reviewed by the chief information technology officer of each branch of state government of which the agency or agencies are a part.
  - (c) Annually at the time specified by the chief information technology officer of the branch of

state government of which the agency is a part, each agency shall submit to such officer:

- (1) A copy of a three-year strategic information technology plan that sets forth the agency's current and future information technology needs and utilization plans for the next three ensuing fiscal years, in such form and containing such additional information as prescribed by the chief information technology officer; and
- (2) any deviations from the state information technology architecture adopted by the information technology executive council.
  - (d) The provisions of this section shall not apply to the information network of Kansas (INK).

Non-accredited schools are not required to report their attendance/enrollment figures, however, in a 1998 voluntary survey, with 55% of the schools reporting, enrollment was reported as 8961 in non-accredited private schools.
- 2. How many students are in "Accredited Private Schools"? KSDE reports 143 accredited private schools with an enrollment of 30,852.


For reference information there are 469,850 students enrolled in **public schools** in Kansas.



#### INTRODUCTION

In 1998, the National Center for Education Statistics reported that 89 percent of schools and 51 percent of classrooms now have access to the Internet, and teachers reported that "...access to the Internet and CD-ROM affects the quality of students' research projects, allows for greater variety of assignments, and enhances student ability to analyze information." (Anytime, Anywhere Learning Research, 1998)

Statewide education networks play a critical role in providing K-12 public and non-public schools with access to the Internet and information technologies. With the rising reliance on the Internet and information technologies to support learning in schools, these networks deserve thoughtful examination to ensure that they are able to respond to current and future information needs of K-12 schools. *National Profile of Statewide Education Networks* provides a framework to begin this examination offering a national "snapshot" of statewide education networks and raising important questions that should be considered for both existing and future networks.

Throughout this report, the term *statewide education network* refers to a computer-based telecommunications infrastructure that provides K-12 schools access to the Internet and information technology services. Statewide education networks exist in many, but not all, states and are one of the most important elements in the information technology environment for schools in the United States. These networks enable K-12 public and non-public schools to access a vast array of resources through information technology components like computer networks, the Internet, and applications like email and the World Wide Web.

Over the past decade, the number of statewide education networks, and the services that they provide to public and non-public K-12 schools, has increased dramatically. In many cases, they have emerged in response to needs identified nearly a decade ago. One of the more common needs identified was that of ensuring that K-12 schools have equitable access to the Internet and emerging information technologies. Given the differing situations, resources, and traditions within each state, existing statewide education networks vary widely in their governance, structure, and operation.

The existence of statewide education networks was first documented in 1995 in the pioneering report, *Network for Goals 2000 Reform: Bringing the Internet to K-12 Schools.* However, this report did not address issues related to the governance, operation, or structure of these networks. The intervening years have shown considerable development in statewide education networks — both in terms of the number that exist and the services they offer – as well as computer-based technologies.

Focusing on organizational and operational aspects of the statewide networks, the *National Profile* of *Statewide Education Networks* maps the current terrain of statewide networks; highlights the issues that statewide education networks face; and offers a framework for subsequent analysis.

#### This report provides:

- Descriptive information about the governance, structure and operations of existing statewide education networks. States that are developing new statewide networks, or evaluating existing networks, can use this information to consider a variety of approaches and options.
- Increased visibility of the services and benefits that statewide networks provide to K-12 schools. Each statewide network offers a unique array of services enabling K-12 schools in their states to achieve educational goals supported with information technology.
- A framework for discussing governance, operational, and structural issues of statewide education networks. Informed discussions will guide the long term development and sustainability of the statewide education networks to support K-12 schools.

Data for the *National Profile of Statewide Networks* was collected via a survey developed with input from a panel of statewide network directors. Collecting this data was not easy! Not every state has a statewide network, and those that do are often difficult to locate since they can be part of the state department of education, another state agency, or even run by a non-profit organization unaffiliated with the state government. Survey respondents, culled from several lists and confirmed with follow-up phone calls, ranged from directors of the statewide networks to administrators in the state department of education. Each respondent was asked to verify the accuracy of the data that is being reported here.

#### **FINDINGS**

#### **NETWORKS - HOW MANY ARE THERE?**

Surveys were distributed to all the states and the District of Columbia in early January. Forty-eight surveys (94%) were returned, and thirty-four respondents (71%), including the District of Columbia, report having a statewide education network that serves the K-12 community.

#### **GOVERNANCE**

State education networks have diverse governance structures. Sometimes they are autonomous, stand alone entities, and other times they fall under the aegis of other agencies such as the state department of education, higher education, the state legislature, or the state public service commission, and even private non-profit corporations.

Table 1 provides an overview of the statewide education networks, their names and URL, the chief operating officer, and the person with overall responsibility. It is clear that the majority of statewide networks are found in the state departments of education; however, it is also clear that there are nearly as many governance models as there are statewide education networks!

#### **FUNDING SOURCE**

Funding sources for statewide networks vary. The dominant source of funding for statewide education networks is state funds appropriated by the legislature, followed closely by fees from school districts or end-users that statewide networks charge for their services. However, several states have multiple funding sources.



#### Public and Non-public School Eligibility

Most public and non-public K-12 schools are eligible to use the services offered by the statewide networks. When asked whether their services were available to non-public as well as public schools, three-quarters (75%) of the statewide education networks reported that at least some or all of their services were available to non-public schools. Eight (24%) of the statewide education networks reported that the services were available only to public schools.



#### **OPERATIONS**

Less than half of the statewide education networks operate as stand-alone networks. Fifty-six percent of the statewide education networks are part of a broader network such as higher education or multi-purpose statewide education network.

#### **INVESTMENTS**

A statewide education network requires considerable investment in computers and infrastructure to make the Internet accessible from the K-12 school building. Many states opt to purchase or lease services from vendors, for example an Internet Service Provider (ISP), rather than invest the capital in buying the necessary hardware. Some (11) manage their network infrastructure through a combination of the two.

#### NETWORK CONTROL OF DISTRICT HARDWARE PURCHASES

Another important aspect of the statewide education networks is their role in the networking hardware purchases of the local schools. A delicate balance must be struck between the district and statewide networks — a balance between local control and systems management. Some statewide networks exert more influence than others over the purchasing decisions of the districts in their states. Some

statewide networks actually make purchases while others simply set voluntary standards or have no involvement at all.

#### INTERNET ACCESS FROM HOME

All state education networks provide Internet access from schools. Additionally, 44% of the statewide networks offer teachers dial-in access from home in telephone calling areas throughout the state and 29% offer this access to both teachers and students.

#### OTHER SERVICES

Conditions, needs, and resources vary from state to state. Consequently, statewide education networks vary with regard to the services they provide. Careful review of Table 7 highlights the diversity and range of services provided by statewide education networks. Even those services that have the most appeal are provided by only 68% of the statewide education networks. Some states may provide services that were not captured through the survey.

#### IN CONCLUSION...

Statewide education networks provide the access point to the Internet and other information resources and opportunities for many of the students and teachers in American schools - both public and non-public. As such, they are very important elements in continuing efforts to expand access in K-12 schools and to improve the environment for learning in the schools.

Statewide education networks have received less visibility and attention in national policy formation in technology than is warranted. The amount of empirical study and analysis that has been devoted to statewide education networks has been minimal. It is worth mentioning that in developing this study one of the initial tasks was to construct the list of leaders of statewide education networks. No accurate and upto-date list existed and no answer based on data could be given to the question, "How many statewide education networks serving the K-12 community are there and where are they located?" With the exception of the five states for which we were unable to obtain data, we now have an answer to that question.

As expected, the survey revealed considerable diversity with regard to the practices and operations of the statewide education networks. On most issues covered by the survey, the responses were fairly evenly distributed among the response options. Such was the case on issues pertaining to public and non-public school eligibility, type of network, control over hardware purchases at the district level, and provision of dial-up access. There was even considerable variation with regard to services with no service achieving higher than 68%. Only when asked about the source of funding was there a high degree of similarity among the responses. Most statewide education networks reported that they are funded with state monies or fees. It is not clear why so few states indicated the e-rate as a source of funding.

This report plots the general topography of statewide education networks and provides a basis for delving into policy and practice issues. Important questions that need to be answered touch on issues of scalability, evaluation and integration:

- To what extent do statewide education networks have an effective business plan that provides for long term funding and for expansion of clientele and services?
- What approaches are being taken by the statewide education networks to solve the problem of equitable access?
- To what extent and in what ways do the statewide education networks work in tandem with the state technology plan?
- What are the advantages and disadvantages of the various types of governance?
- In what ways can the experience of those who have implemented statewide education networks inform those who are developing new statewide education networks or making improvements on existing networks?
- What role can, or should, statewide education networks have in providing professional development and ongoing technical support in K-12 schools?
- How could statewide education networks standardize or aggregate data collection for schools?

Statewide education networks continue to play a critical role in efforts to bring the benefits of information technology to American students. Over the past decade or so, network leaders have struggled to keep pace with rapidly escalating needs for information technology. The next decade will place similar if not expanded pressure on statewide networks. It is essential that those charged with the responsibility for statewide education networks have the opportunity to share practices and policies and to benefit from systematic study and assessment in order to increase effectiveness.



The KAN-ED proposal results from a useful collaboration of schools, libraries, universities, DISC, and KANREN, ably assisted by the leadership of KTEC, working together to design the network that will serve Kansas education effectively in the twenty-first century.

In addition to the State Library and Department of Education and many groups associated with the DOE,

KAN-ED has been endorsed by -

The Kansas Library Association
The Kansas Association of School Librarians
The State Library Commission
The Kansas Library Network Board

Speaking to the benefits of the proposed network:

#### KAN-ED will equalize people's access to educational information and services.

Through this state-assisted network, every Kansan can have adequate access, near at hand, to local and distance education and related information services that will support the individual's education and life pursuits.

Learners in every classroom - by way of the schools, and learners in every community - by way of the local library, will have access to this education network. K through 12, vocational, college and university, and in fact any Kansan who wants access to this learning system will have access. With libraries, schools, and higher education working together, KAN-ED will effectively remove most geographic and economic barriers to educational information.

Current Internet access to Kansas libraries needs the improvement KAN-ED can give: 14% (37) of our public libraries have no Internet connection.

62% (166) of libraries must use low speed access to the Internet.

KAN-ED will improve connectivity by replacing inadequate modem connections with broadband access.

Broadband connection provides adequate speed of data transmission to effectively support education and information service. Some schools and more than 90% of libraries can afford only the modem connection that cannot effectively support information service for education.

Craig Grant Testimony House Utilities Committee Monday, March 13, 2000

Thank you Mr. Chairman. I am Craig Grant and today I am speaking for the Unified School Finance Coalition. The coalition is made up of the Kansas Association of School Boards, the Kansas NEA, Unified School Administrators of Kansas, Schools for Quality Education, the Kansas Education Coalition, Kansans for Local Control, the Kansas Association of Educational Services Agencies, and the individual school districts of Blue Valley, Kansas City, Shawnee Mission, Topeka, and Wichita.

The coalition supports the **KAN-ED** proposal from the interim committee that is supported by the Governor. Technology is now a vital part of education, but no direct state support is currently available. The proposed statewide technology backbone would ensure every Kansas school district has equal access to the Internet.

While Kansas schools are leading the country in providing up-to-date computers, they are seriously lacking in Internet connectivity. Currently, Kansas ranks 36<sup>th</sup> in the nation in the percent of classrooms with Internet access. Our neighbor Nebraska ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> with over 80% of the classrooms connected. Colorado ranks 13<sup>th</sup>, Iowa ranks 7<sup>th</sup>, Missouri ranks 17<sup>th</sup>, and Arkansas ranks 27<sup>th</sup>. Only Oklahoma ranks below us in this category.

As far as expenditures for education technology, in the last five years, the following amounts have been appropriated by the states indicated:

- Oklahoma -- \$18.8 million
- Nebraska -- \$22.0 million
- Missouri -- \$130.0 million
- Iowa -- \$90.0 million
- Arkansas -- \$59.0 million
- Kansas -- \$12.5 million

This trend should not continue if our students in Kansas are to compete with students from other states in the coming years.

The coalition hopes this committee and the entire legislature will support the schools in finding the best way to create the "backbone" in technology we desperately need.

Craig Grant Testimony House Utilities Committee Monday, March 13, 2000

Thank you Mr. Chairman. I am Craig Grant and today I am speaking for the Unified School Finance Coalition. The coalition is made up of the Kansas Association of School Boards, the Kansas NEA, Unified School Administrators of Kansas, Schools for Quality Education, the Kansas Education Coalition, Kansans for Local Control, the Kansas Association of Educational Services Agencies, and the individual school districts of Blue Valley, Kansas City, Shawnee Mission, Topeka, and Wichita.

The coalition supports the **KAN-ED** proposal from the interim committee that is supported by the Governor. Technology is now a vital part of education, but no direct state support is currently available. The proposed statewide technology backbone would ensure every Kansas school district has equal access to the Internet.

While Kansas schools are leading the country in providing up-to-date computers, they are seriously lacking in Internet connectivity. Currently, Kansas ranks 36<sup>th</sup> in the nation in the percent of classrooms with Internet access. Our neighbor Nebraska ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> with over 80% of the classrooms connected. Colorado ranks 13<sup>th</sup>, Iowa ranks 7<sup>th</sup>, Missouri ranks 17<sup>th</sup>, and Arkansas ranks 27<sup>th</sup>. Only Oklahoma ranks below us in this category.

As far as expenditures for education technology, in the last five years, the following amounts have been appropriated by the states indicated:

- Oklahoma -- \$18.8 million
- Nebraska -- \$22.0 million
- Missouri -- \$130.0 million
- Iowa -- \$90.0 million
- Arkansas -- \$59.0 million
- Kansas -- \$12.5 million

This trend should not continue if our students in Kansas are to compete with students from other states in the coming years.

The coalition hopes this committee and the entire legislature will support the schools in finding the best way to create the "backbone" in technology we desperately need.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

My name is Mike Reecht and I represent AT&T before the Kansas Legislature.

AT&T supports the concept that would bring connectivity and Internet capability to all schools and libraries in the state. While such a concept is an important goal for the state's educational system, the details necessary to accomplish it must be approached with caution.

It is important in today's world of advancing technology that the options to provide that interconnectivity consider not only traditional landline and cable technologies, but also the newer wireless and satellite solutions, as well.

Any bidding process must insure an analysis of the existing LEC investment and infrastructure, while not ignoring newer technology that is capable of providing the same or better service to our students and citizens.

Any funding considerations should rely on the general populace, rather than any specific reliance on existing telephone subscribers. Funding has been described as coming from three sources--E-rate, state general fund, and private/public contributions. Specifics of these funding mechanisms should also be a subject of close consideration.

AT&T understands the importance of establishing the concept of statewide interconnectivity during this legislative session, if for no other reason than to begin accumulating private/public contributions into the KAN-ED fund. However, we would recommend details relating to technology deployment, bidding process, and ongoing funding considerations be examined by a summer interim task force, including members of the industry, DISC, Department of Education, and legislature at a minimum. The task force recommendations would be the basis of a comprehensive solution for a statewide internet and connectivity plan.

I would be glad to answer any questions that you might have.

#### **Testimony In Support of Sub HB 2591**

Presented By John Federico; Federico Consulting On Behalf of the Kansas Cable Telecommunications Assn.

#### House Utilities Committee March 13, 2000

Thank you Mr. Chairman for the opportunity to offer our "qualified" support of Sub HB 2591. I appear before you today on behalf of the Kansas Cable Telecommunications Association to state that both our "support" and "concerns" related to the Kan-Ed Initiative remain the same. From the earliest discussion of implementing a statewide technology "backbone," the cable television industry has been supportive of the "policy" behind the effort to connect schools and libraries across the state. But, we remain concerned about the details of the project. More specifically, the extent of the involvement of the state, and/or the impact the Kan-Ed project will have on cable companies who have invested millions of private dollars in system-upgrades in an effort to bring the newest technology, including broadband connections, to both small and large communities across Kansas.

It is my belief that the actions of the cable television industry speaks volumes about their commitment to "connecting" our Kansas schools and libraries. I have attached a sampling of schools and school districts "wired" if you will, by the two largest providers of cable television services in the state, Cox Communications and Time Warner Cable. It serves as proof that on a daily basis, the cable industry is responding to the needs of school districts by providing **free** cable connections which will allow them to deliver the technology that best suits the schools needs.

The technology the cable industry is deploying currently allows us to provide high speed internet access and interactive distance learning through a variety of wide-area-networks to school districts of various sizes and locations. We are anxious to continue our expansion into other communities in the state, both small and large, and we are hopeful that legislation such as Sub HB 2591 does not serve as an impediment to our commitment to our customers.

I reiterate the KCTA's support of the noble concept of bringing the latest technology to schools and libraries across the state. It is our contention though, that through a competitive bidding process among private, competing entities,...schools <u>are</u> being connected. Further indicative of our commitment to this initiative, is the extensive effort of Kansas cable companies to help school districts access and utilize <u>federal</u>

Universal Service Fund monies to help pay for the technology upgrades they desire for their schools.

Again, although supportive of the concept and the unarguable need to connect Kansas schools and libraries, we as an industry still have many questions that we hope can be answered before consideration of the bill before you today. Will private industry be competing against the state to deliver internet access? Will the unique technology that the cable industry utilizes be included for consideration in the technology backbone? What of stranded investments? What is the timeline? Will passage of a Kan-Ed bill dissuade private investment to upgrade cable systems?

In closing, we applaud your efforts, and we certainly do not envy the difficult decisions you will have to make as you piece this initiative together. The Kansas cable industry remains committed to our efforts to bring the best technology to all four corners of the state and stand ready to partner with the State to achieve the same.
