MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON NEW ECONOMY.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Bill Mason at 3:30 p.m. on January 25, 2001 in Room 522-S of the Capitol.

Representative Cox moved, seconded by Representative Beggs that the minutes from the January 23 meeting be approved. The motion carried.

Representative Dennis McKinney requested introduction of HB 2204 - a bill about workforce development. The bill would establish the workforce development loan program by creating a fund and providing for loan repayment, forgiveness and administration of the program. Without objection, it will be introduced as a bill.

Representative Doug Patterson requested the introduction of a concept bill concerning community improvement districts; concerning the issuance of revenue bonds to be used as a re-development tool. Without objection, the concept bill will be introduced as a bill.

Representative Aday requested that the housing bill that passed out of the House last year be introduced as a committee bill this year. HB 2205 relates to housing, administration of a state housing program and establishing a state housing corporation. Without objection, it will be introduced as a bill.

The Chairman introduced Lt. Governor Sherrer, KDOCH who in turn introduced his staff: Fred Schwien, Connie Fischer, Steve Kelly, Ned Webb, Randy Speaker, John Watson and Mary Lou McPhail. A packet was given to the committee members which included data on the location of national and international field offices (Attachment 1), Expenditures by Divisions FY 2001: Administration, Agriculture Products, Business Development, Trade Development, Travel and Tourism, Community Development and Division of Housing (Attachment 2), Expenditures by Category FY 2001: Operations and Services and Aid and Assistance to Communities, Business and Individuals (Attachment 3) and Expenditures by Source of Funds FY 2001: FEE Funds, EDIF Funds and Federal Funds (Attachment 4). He reviewed the Mission, Major Programs and FY 2000 Highlights of the Agriculture, Business Development, Community Development, Housing, Trade Development and Travel and Tourism Development Divisions (Attachment 5). He stated that the highlights of last year's programs are listed in the Fiscal Year 2000 Annual Report Executive Summary, copy on file at KDOC&H. A complete list of grant recipients are listed in their complete 2000 Annual Report. He explained the purpose and usefulness of the Resource Directory. Other materials given to the committee members included the Kansas 2001 Getaway Guide and three pages of favorable comments made by constituents on the quality of service given by the department. Copies of data on the KDOCH Awards, 1998 through 2000, were distributed listing the awards in each of the Representative's House Districts. All the materials listed above are on file at KDOC&H.

Discussion followed regarding the tour center in Olathe and the new tour center being built close to Interstate 435 at the Raceway. Several committee members expressed gratitude regarding the activities of KDOC&H in their communities. Secretary Sherrer explained the Department's procedure for analysis for businesses that need to change or expand and the community service tax credit program. Andrea Glenn's death was acknowledged and Secretary Sherrer stated that as the Editor of "Kansas Magazine" she played a significant role in its evolution to a world class magazine. There will be a tribute to her in the next issue.

The Kansas advertising budget was compared to that of the surrounding states and the vacancy of several positions within Travel & Tourism was questioned. In response to a request for information on counties not applying for grants, Secretary Sherrer agreed to furnish the committee with data on the grant requests from the individual counties as well as the kinds of jobs being created for Kansas broken down by urban and rural communities. He described the kinds of jobs being created and the definition of a "good job" in today's economy. He described some of the tourist attractions he saw last year, when he visited 55 Kansas counties in five days to see and promote 65-75 tourist attractions. The importance of tourism to Kansas was discussed. The issues of re-training for businesses and the emergency assistance program in Kansas were explained.

Chairman Mason stated that the funding mechanism for the departments is totally outdated and needs to be addressed by the Legislature and asked the Secretary for his view on the subject. The Secretary stated that he had always liked the dedicated fund, however that fund had been frozen and narrowed down to the point that it is no longer feasible to operate effectively from that fund. It should come out of the general fund, especially since they have proven the success of their programs with ROI figures. However history does not support that process, evidenced by the erosion of the EDIF funds. Their theories are good but he questioned whether they would be sustained over the years. He suggested that if they dedicate EDIF to 100 % Economic Development, there would be an additional \$17 to\$18 million dollars for economic development with sustained growth over the decades. Discussion followed regarding the will of the people verses the actual programs that are funded by EDIF. All agreed that it will be an important topic for this year.

The next meeting is January 30, 2001.









FY2001 EXPENDITURES BY DIVISION



Major Programs:

✓ Agricultural Value Added Center

Loans to businesses to assist with development and commercialization of agricultural products and processes.

✓ International Marketing Program

Promotion of Kansas agricultural products sales abroad through trade missions, technical assistance and market analysis.

✓ Market Development Services

Producer assistance through identifying new markets for Kansas products, and research and promotion of cooperative efforts between agribusiness, commodity and trade organizations, producer groups and others.

✓ From the Land of Kansas

Marketing and technical assistance to producers to help them establish viable companies; financial assistance is also available to defray some of the costs of attending trade show.

- Value Added Center clients reported sales, patronage and premiums totaling \$14.7 million.

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

Major Programs:

✓ Kansas Economic Opportunity Initiatives Fund (KEOIF)

Funding to address opportunities or emergencies that may have substantial impact on the Kansas economy. Projects may include major expansions, location of a major new employer, matching a federal or private sector grant, or mitigating the effects of a loss of a major employer.

√ Kansas Existing Industry Expansion Program (KEIEF)

Addresses the expansion needs of existing Kansas businesses. KEIEP is a performance-based program that stresses business growth and job retention and creation. The funds have a high level of flexibility that allows the state to participate as a funding source when other options have been exhausted.

✓ Kansas Enterprise Zone Act

Incentives are available to qualified businesses throughout Kansas, based on the location of the facility, the type of facility, the capital investment made, and the number of jobs created.

√ Kansas Partnership Fund

Provides financial assistance to Kansas cities and counties by making low-interest loans for infrastructure projects necessary to attract new business or expand existing local businesses.

✓ Investments In Major Projects And Comprehensive Training (IMPACT)

Provides training assistance through tax-exempt and public-purpose bonds. Targets large firms or projects involving several smaller firms with common skill requirements.

- State of Kansas Investments in Lifelong Learning (SKILL)
- The Major Project Investment fund (MPI)

√ Kansas Industrial Training (KIT)

Provides training assistance to manufacturing, distribution, and regional or national service firms in the process of adding five or more new jobs to a new or existing Kansas facility.

√ Kansas Industrial Retraining (KIR)

Provides retraining assistance to employees who are likely to be displaced due to obsolete or inadequate job skills.

✓ Training Equipment Grant Program

Provides community colleges and area technical schools an opportunity to purchase instructional equipment to train or retrain Kansas workers.

√ High Performance Incentive Program (HPIP)

Provides tax and other incentives to companies that pay above-average wages and have a strong commitment to skills development for their workers.

✓ Kansas Business First

Assist communities in establishing a customized local retention and expansion program by assessing the business climate in their area with a survey software program.

✓ Office of Minority and Women Business Development / Single Source Certification Program

Promotes and assists in the development of minority- and women-owned businesses in Kansas. The program provides assistance in procurement and contracting, financing resources, business planning, and identification of business opportunities. The Single Source Certification program certifies minority and women-owned businesses by verifying ownership and control of a company.

✓ Certified Development Companies (CDC)

The state provides financial support to a network of Certified Development Companies throughout the state that assist the small business communities with financial packaging services, using a variety of private and government sources.

✓ Small Business Development Centers (SBDC)

Provide support to help small businesses succeed through free professional consultation services and low-cost seminars. The centers provide assistance in a variety of business management areas including accounting, business planning, market analysis, personnel, and procurement.

- Business recruitment efforts helped bring 5,851 new jobs to Kansas.
- New businesses attracted to the state will make \$416 million in capital investments.
- Nearly 14,500 employees from 111 Kansas companies will receive training as a result of grants awarded.
- Jobs added with the help of KEOIF and KEIEP loans will generate a projected payroll of \$169 million.
- Small Business Development Centers counseled 14,000 clients.

✓ Community Development Block Grant

Federal grant program to benefit low- and moderate-income individuals; remove or prevent slums and blight; or resolve an urgent need created by a severe or natural disaster. Grants are made to cities and counties under 50,000 for:

- -- Loans to private businesses that create or retain jobs.
- --Community improvements projects, such as fire protection, water or sewer improvements, senior centers, etc.
- -- Urgent needs
- --Housing and neighborhood rehabilitation
- -- Downtown revitalization
- --Comprehensive development

Actively recruit Kansas companies to attend trade shows and missions in regions around the world.

✓ Educational Seminars

Educational programs are offered periodically to address general export activities, specific issues, and market information.

✓ Kansas Export Loan Guarantee Program

Loan guarantees are available for companies that have the ability to export products, but lack sufficient working capital.

✓ Kansas Trade Show Assistance Program (KTSAP)

Provides financial support for Kansas businesses exhibiting in foreign and domestic trade show attracting international buyers.

✓ Overseas Offices

Publications are one of the major tools to promote Kansas as a tourist attraction.

✓ Media Relations

Generate Kansas travel-related feature articles by working directly with travel journalists from regional, national, and international consumer and travel trade publications.

Provides financial assistance for the development of new tourist attractions and the enhancement of existing ones.

√ Kansas Film Commission

- Almost 450,000 visitors stopped at the Travel Information Centers.
- Sites featured in the *KANSAS! Magazine* experienced a 21 percent increase in visitors.
- Feature stories on Kansas in national consumer and travel publications produced the equivalent of \$4.3 million in print advertising.
- The Film Commission assisted 25 projects, filmed in 15 counties, accounting for over \$13.2 million in production expenditures.
