MINUTES OF THE SENATE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Les Donovan at 8:30 a.m. on January 25, 2001 in Room 245-N of the Capitol.

Overview of Kansas Turnpike Authority

Chairman Donovan welcomed all the guests at the meeting and extended congratulations to Bill Whim for his 49 years and five million miles of accident-free commercial driving. He introduced Mike Johnston, President/CEO Kansas Turnpike Authority. Mr. Johnston also congratulated Mr. Whim for his excellent Turnpike driving record.

Members received information on the development of the turnpike conception and enabling legislation. President Johnston's overview covered the period from construction to the present (Attachment 1). The Electronic Toll Collection K-Tag Program cost about ten million dollars to initiate and has been far more successful than originally anticipated. Members discussed continued operations of toll collectors and the problems involved in installing mechanical ticket issuing devices and/or "bucket" collecting devices. Approximately 50% of the Turnpike users are non-state residents. Many of these customers require services that can only be provided by people. The possibility of constructing additional toll roads within the state at this time would be very difficult. For one thing, the financing framework available in the 50's would not work in today's market. For example, making Highway 54 West a toll road with the sparse population and the need for farmers to have frequent access and egress to that highway would make it a cost prohibitive project.

The subject of turning the Turnpike over to the state was raised. Mr. Johnston advised that the 1953 enabling legislation did not mandate turning the toll road over to the state. The stated condition was that it could be returned to KDOT when it is debt free and in good condition. It also authorized the Secretary to continue to collect tolls. It costs approximately 65 million dollars annually to operate the turnpike and Kansas taxpayers would have to pick up this cost. Presently, at least half of this revenue is paid by non-Kansans.

Approval of minutes

Senator Salmans moved to approve minutes of the January 24, 2001 meeting. Senator Jackson seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Announcements

Tom Whitaker, Executive Director, Kansas Motor Carriers Association, announced planned program to honor Bill Whim, National Truck Driver of the year, and other activities association with Kansas Trucking Industry Day at the Capitol and invited everyone to participate in these activities. He also advised that Kansas has had three of the last five year's National Truck Driver of the year.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 a.m.

KANSAS TURNPIKE AUTHORITY FACT SHEET

Groundbreaking:

December 31, 1954

Opened to traffic:

October 25, 1956

Construction statistics:

The Turnpike was built in 22 months in 1955 and 1956.

Cost was \$147 million, plus \$9 million in Capitalized Interest.

Original cost translated to \$660,000 per mile.

 Over 20 engineering and construction firms were successful bidders for the projects.

Length:

236.5 miles

Interchanges:

The Turnpike has 20 interchanges for entry and exit located at

strategic points along the route.

Service Areas:

A total of six, located near Lawrence, Topeka, Emporia,

Matfield Green, Towanda, and Belle Plaine.

Bridges: 345

Median Barrier:

- Concrete median barrier that runs the entire length of the roadway; all but eliminates head-on collisions. Completed in 1992 at a total cost of \$32 million, or \$143,000 per mile.
- Estimated to save ten lives per year and countless serious injuries.

Traffic:

- Grown from 3.6 million vehicles in 1957 to 29.2 million vehicles in 2000.
- 25.7 million passenger cars used the Turnpike last year.
- 3.9 million commercial vehicles used the Turnpike last year, but commercial vehicles account for approximately 40.16 percent of revenue.

Employees:

516 employees, including 100 part-time.

Revenue:

- Grown from \$3.9 million in 1957 to \$64.8 million in 1999.
- Out-of-state travelers generate approximately 50 percent of the toll revenue and account for approximately 50 percent of the miles traveled because they average longer trips, although they represent slightly less than 30 percent of all vehicles.

Patrol:

The Kansas Turnpike, by contract with the state, employs 47 highway patrol personnel. The Turnpike has more frequent and 24-hour coverage, mile-per-mile, with the exception of the metro areas, then the remainder of the state.

Electronic Toll Collection K-TAG program:

The electronic toll collection program was officially dedicated October 25, 1995. There are currently over 55,000 accounts with over 126,000 transponders in use.

Travel Advisory Radio (TAR) 1610 AM:

The Kansas Turnpike Authority has a network of radio stations that constantly broadcast weather information, roadway conditions, and general information about the Turnpike.
