Chairman Morris opened the public hearing on:

HB 2189--Public safety officers, educational benefits for dependents

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

Chairman Morris welcomed Dick Carter, Jr., Director for External Relations, Kansas Board of Regents, who spoke in support of <u>HB 2189</u> (<u>Attachment 11</u>). Mr. Carter noted in his closing testimony that they do not anticipate a deluge of participants in the program should the bill be passed in its amended form; the Regents would request that the committee consider the potential budget implications that these changes could have and would request appropriate additional revenue to support the program.

Mr. Carter also distributed copies of the Kansas Board of Regents, Tuition and Fee Waiver, Dependents of Slain Public Safety Officers, FY 2001 (Attachment 12).

Chairman Morris welcomed Patrick T. Lehman on behalf of the Kansas Fire Service Alliance, who spoke in support of <u>HB 2189</u> (Attachment 13). Mr. Lehman noted that they request that the committee amend the bill to include dependents of volunteer firefighters in the eligibility specified by this legislation.

Chairman Morris welcomed Jason White, Kansas Emergency Medical Services Association, who spoke in support of **HB 2189** (Attachment 14). Mr. White mentioned that these types of programs provide assurance to EMS personnel that their community service will provide important benefits to their families if tragedy occurs.

Chairman Morris welcomed David Lake, Administrator, Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services, who spoke in support of <u>HB 2189</u> (<u>Attachment 15</u>). Mr. Lake mentioned that if an attendant dies or becomes permanently disabled in the performance of his job as an EMS attendant, <u>SB 2189</u> allows for the dependents to receive tuition to the state-supported colleges and universities.

Written testimony in support of <u>HB 2189</u> was received from R. E. "Tuck" Duncan, American Medical Response (<u>Attachment 16</u>).

The Chairman thanked the conferees for appearing before the committee. There being no further conferees to come before the committee, the Chairman closed the public hearing on <u>HB 2189</u>.

Senator Jackson moved, with a second by Senator Kerr, to remove the amendment the House added in regard to the injuries going beyond the original scope of the program on **HB 2189**. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Senator Adkins moved, with a second by Senator Downey, to pass **HB 2189** favorable as amended. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

Chairman Morris turned the Committee's attention to discussion of:

SB 304--Providing additional bonding authority to the secretary of transportation

Staff briefed the committee on the bill. Alan Conroy, Chief Fiscal Analyst, Kansas Legislative Research Department, explained that <u>SB 304</u> is the Governor's Pay Plan and the items in each of the two subcommittee reports that the Committee worked.

Senator Feleciano moved, with a second by Senator Jordan, to direct staff to make technical corrections to the bill and pass SB 304 favorable as amended. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

SB 85--Compensation for certain nonjudicial employees, docket fees

Senator Adkins explained a proposed <u>Substitute for SB 85</u>. Committee questions and discussion followed.

Agency Request/Governor's Recommendation

Change from 2000 Session Approved Budget. The revised FY 2001 estimate of operating expenditures totals \$94,154,840 (\$78,125,632 SGF), a reduction of \$316,335 or 0.3 percent from the amount approved by the 2000 Legislature.

- The Secretary of Corrections has the authority to transfer, with the approval of the Governor, State General Fund moneys from the Department of Corrections or any facility to the DOC or any other facility
- Agency reports a number of non-SGF funding shifts for FY 2000 to FY 2001 and new funds in the current year
 - \$186,629 in special revenue funds from the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, Kansas Sentencing Commission, and Department of Education
- The 2000 Legislature provided the agency with 12.0 FTE and \$250,000 in special revenue funds to supervise inmate work crews after the Governor removed them from the budget. The positions were given to the Department of Correction. Using the authority granted by the Legislature, the Secretary shifted the positions to the Lansing and Norton facilities.
- Additionally, the agency has shifted positions from the facilities to the central office to staff a new sentence computation unit. Funding of \$147,884 and 6.0 FTE were transferred from facilities to the central office to review offender files and maintain a centralized sentencing schedule unit for offenders.

Salaries and Wages

- Request for salaries and wages total \$16,684,943 for 314.0 FTE.
- Includes \$109,1200 for longevity payments
- An average 2.6 percent shrinkage
- Includes 1.0 FTE increase for positions shifted to the Central Office from the correctional facilities
- 13.0 unclassified FTE including 6.0 FTE parole officers, 4.0 computer support, 1.0 in administration, and 2.0 crime victims notification program funded with federal and fee funds

Governor's Recommendation

The Governor recommends FY 2001 revised expenditures of \$94,429,840 (\$78,400,632 SGF), a reduction of \$41,335 from the amount approved by the 2000 Legislature.

- Concur with the agency's revised request, with the following adjustments.
- Add \$1,000,000 SGF supplemental appropriation for local jail payments.
 - Currently, the agency pays the costs for offenders in the custody of the Secretary of Corrections, but housed on a conditional release revocation in a local jail before they are moved to a state correctional facility
 - Costs for local jail payments in the last several fiscal years have been over \$1.0 million over the budgeted amount, and payments have been delayed from one fiscal year to the next for several years
 - \$1,925,000 SGF is already budgeted for FY 2001
- Reductions based on Substitute for Senate Bill 323.
 - \$725,000 SGF is reduced for the inmate food service contract (\$307,000) and inmate medical and mental health care (\$418,000)
 - o Inmate food and medical contracts are based on the average daily inmate population, which will decline from 8,382 in the approved FY 2001 budget to 7,740 in FY 2002.

House Budget Committee Recommendations

The House Budget Committee concurs with the following adjustment.

 Reappropriate \$69,378 SGF from the Day Reporting Center SGF match due to delayed opening of the program. Additionally, reappropriate \$100,000 SGF from unexpended funds in the community corrections grants from FY 2000, which were carried forward to FY 2001. The agency reports there were unexpended funds totaling \$395,860. Of that amount, community corrections programs requested and were awarded \$286,525, and the balance \$100,000 SGF remains. The funds will be combined with FY 2002 savings and shifted to fund offender programs in FY 2002.

House Committee Recommendation

The House Committee concurs.

Department of Corrections FY 2002 operating expenditures requesttotals \$111,948,196 (including \$94,451,600 SGF), an increase of \$17,793,356 (18.9 percent) over the agency's revised FY 2001 estimate

- Includes \$14,756,186 for salaries and wages for 327.0 FTE
- Includes full funding of longevity (\$121,720) and an averaged 2.6 percent shrinkage rate
- Includes request for 13.0 new FTE. Includes: 2.0 FTE computer programmer positions; 6.0 FTE special enforcement parole officer, 5.0 are currently Unclassified Temporary positions funded by parole supervision fee funds and Byrne Grants and 1.0 new special enforcement parole; 4.0 FTE for the correctional industries program

Agency Requested Enhancements for FY 2002

- Request totals \$18,352,735 including \$1,751,000 in capital improvement requests, all but \$983,424 from SGF.
- Absent the Enhancement request, the budget request represents an increase of \$1,746,843 or 1.6 percent

Governor's Recommendation

The Governor recommends FY 2002 operating expenditures of \$95,788,497, (\$78,228,288 SGF)

- A reduction of \$16.1 million from the agency's request and a \$1,358,657 (or 1.4 percent) increase from the FY 2001 recommendation
- \$14.3 million for salaries and wages
- \$53.1 million for contractual services
- \$5.4 million for commodities
- \$1.8 million capital outlay
- \$3.5 million for debt service principal
- \$13.0 million for capital improvements
- \$17.7 million for aid to local units
- Includes 4.0 FTE requested as enhancements for correctional industries
- Includes \$1.0 million SGF enhancements for offender programs and \$855,800
 SGF enhancement for community corrections.
- A \$273,047 reduction in the inmate food contract due to decreased average daily population as a result of substitute for Senate Bill 323.

House Committee Recommendations

The House Committee concurs with the following adjustments.

1. The Budget Committee shifts funding and spends for special revenue fund ending balances and SGF to add \$1,745,998 all funds (\$545,998 SGF) for programs.

The Subcommittee directs \$1,000,000 funding to inmate education programs and \$745,998 for substance abuse programs. The Subcommittee recommends spending \$150,000 from the ending balance of Kansas Correctional Industries. reducing the ending balance from \$3,297,780 to \$3,147,780. The Subcommittee further recommends spending \$1,050,000 from the Inmate Benefits Fund. reducing the ending balance from \$1,334,000 to \$284,000. These ending balance expenditures will not impact any approved programs or projects from these funds. The Subcommittee also recommends shifting \$300,000 from the Corrections Institutions Building Fund ending balance (currently \$380,000) to debt service payments, and shifting \$300,000 SGF in the Governor's budget for debt service to offender programs. Additionally, the agency reported the opening of the Day Reporting Centers will be delayed and State General Fund savings in the recommended Governor's budget are available, \$69,378 in FY 2001 and \$76,620 in FY 2002. The Subcommittee recommends carrying forward the 2001 savings and combined with the 2002 savings, resulting in a total of \$145,998 SGF from Day Reporting Centers available for programs. The SGF recommendation from the community corrections fund and day reporting centers will show a \$169,378 SGF increase in FY 2002 over the Governor's recommendation, but a reduction of \$169,378 SGF will appear in the FY 2001 recommendation. The Subcommittee recommendations are reflected in the following table:

The Governor's FY 2002 budget reduced expenditures for offender programs by \$2.1 million, a 14.9 percent reduction from FY 2001. The Governor's FY 2001 recommendation was a reduction of \$2.7 million or 20.1 percent below the FY 2000 approved limit. The Subcommittee is concerned about these cuts which eliminated all academic education in the facilities and reduce substance abuse treatment programs in the correctional facilities by 78.8 percent, reducing the number of contracted treatment slots from 232 to 48. The Subcommittee's recommendation will not restore all the reductions in the Governor's budget, but within existing resources, a \$2.1 million shortfall is lessened by \$1.7 million.

2. The Budget Committee notes the Governor's budget recommendation includes \$1.4 million SGF for uniformed correctional officer salaries in addition to the 3.0

percent annualized classified salary adjustment. The salary enhancements are very helpful, but insufficient to address the need to recruit and retain employees who can receive higher pay in other public and private public safety job. The Department of Corrections requested a 5.0 percent pay increase for \$3.4 million and a 6.0 percent bonus for \$3.6 million, as well as the transfer of all Corrections-KPERS members to Kansas Police and Fire Retirement for \$1.2 million. The Governor did not recommend these enhancements. Review of Omnibus.

3. The Budget Committee commends the Department of Corrections and all the correctional facilities for the contributions of inmate labor to communities in Kansas. The work of inmate work crews provide significant savings to communities and their value is often only noted when their labor is lost. The following table portrays by facility the amount of inmate hours for community service and the monetary value (factored at minimum wage) of the work crews in FY 2000, the last full year.

Senate Subcommittee Recommendations

The Subcommittee concurs with the Governor's recommendation, with the following adjustments and comments:

- 1. Delete \$419,270 (\$314,304 SGF) to remove the Governor's pay plan, including \$134,852 for longevity bonuses, \$31,293 for unclassified merit, and \$235,125 for a classified base salary increase.
- 2. The Subcommittee shifts funding and spends from special revenue fund ending balances and SGF to add \$1,800,000 all funds (\$1,220,998 SGF) for offender programs The Subcommittee directs \$1.8 million for offender programs targeted in the following manner: \$800,000 for academic education; \$350,000 for vocational education; and \$650,000 for substance abuse treatment. Funding for the recommendation is reflected in the following table:

The Subcommittee recommended spending comes from the following sources. The agency reported the opening of the Day Reporting Centers in FY 2001 and FY 2002 will be delayed and SGF savings in the Governor's budget recommendation are available, \$69,378 in FY 2001 and \$76,620 in FY 2002. A total of \$100,000 SGF is available in community corrections grants which were not expended in FY 2000 and carried forward to FY 2001. Additional SGF savings due to reduced prison populations as the result of Senate Bill 323, produced additional savings of \$234,000 in the food contract and \$40,000 in the medical contract. The Governor had also recommended \$840,463 SGF funding for the operation of the female correctional conservation camp. Federal VOITIS funds are available, however, and can be used to fund 48.0 percent of the program's cost, thus VOITIS funds are used to supplant 48.0 percent of the SGF recommendation, producing \$401,000 SGF. Finally, the Subcommittee recommends \$579,002 from the Inmate Benefits Fund, reducing the ending balance in the fund from \$1,334,000 to \$754,998.

The Governor's FY 2002 budget reduced expenditures for offender programs by \$2.1 million, a 14.9 percent reduction from FY 2001. The Governor's FY 2001

recommendation was a reduction of \$2.7 million or 20.1 percent below the FY 2000 approved amount. The Subcommittee is concerned about these cuts which eliminate all academic education in the facilities and reduces substance abuse treatment programs in the prisons by 78.8 percent, reducing the number of contracted slots from 232 to 48.

The Subcommittee believes programs for offenders in prison and on postrelease supervision are important and worth funding. Included in the report is the Department of Corrections' evaluation of the outcomes of offender programs, which conveys one measure of the effectiveness of various programs on recidivism rates (Attachment A). The Subcommittee notes vocational education appears to be one of the most effective programs, while academic education is less clearly a success, basic skills including literacy should be supported. The Subcommittee commends the agency for collecting data on the effectiveness of programs, and encourages them to continue collecting and using the data.

3. The Subcommittee notes the Department of Corrections has chosen not to renew the contract with the academic educational provider, Correctional Programs Management (CPM) at the end of FY 2001. The agency expressed disappointment and problems with the business practices of the vendor, as well as disappointment at the quality of education provided. The Subcommittee notes for the life of the contract with CPM, which began in July 1997, problems were often reported to the Legislature and questions were raised each year regarding the quality of service with the provider and the Subcommittee was continually reassured by the Department of Corrections they were satisfied with the vendor. The Subcommittee report from March 1998 notes "its continued concern regarding the contracted provider of educational services [and]. . . that CPM is not an accredited educational provider and that some employees have complained about CPM's lack of professionalism."

The Governor's recommendation provided no funding in FY 2002 for academic education, and the agency must now find volunteer basic educational services, or continue its negotiations with a variety of potential service providers including the Board of Regents, community colleges, and Southeast Kansas Education Service Center. The Subcommittee will monitor carefully the agency's efforts to obtain suitable academic education programs.

4. The Subcommittee reviewed the impact on the Department of Corrections' budgets of Senate Bill 323. The bill, which was implemented in stages during the later half of calender 2000, has had a significant impact on the prison population as well as the population on postrelease supervision. The prison population has been reduced from 8,784 to 8,352 (432 reduction) between June 2000 and December 31, 2000. The number of offenders on postrelease supervision has also been reduced from 5,385 to 3,787 (1,598 reduction) during the same period. Because of reductions in the inmate population, the agency has gained savings of \$725,000 in FY 2001 and \$2.5 million in FY 2002, primarily in the food service and inmate medical and mental health contracts. The Subcommittee notes,

however, the savings are not as great as they might have been for the inmate medical and mental health contract. During the Subcommittee review, it was revealed that the agency's contract with Prison Health Services, the contracted medical provider, makes adjustments to the contract payments if the inmate population fluctuates up or down in 10 percent increments. The cost for exceeding the contracted levels escalates upward with each incremental change, while savings due to decreased population are only reduced at a flat rate. Every year of the contract, the agency has had to make additional per capita payments for increased population, but when the population declines, the State does not receive proportional savings. The Subcommittee encourages the agency, when contract renewal begins in four years, to remedy this inequity.

- 5. The Subcommittee heard testimony for the agency and many of the wardens who participated in the systemwide efforts to manage the disruption related to the nature gas problems in Hutchinson in late January 2001. Because of the natural gas leaks and explosions, the Hutchinson Correctional Facility was compelled to plan for the emergency evacuation of the 1,000 bed Central Unit on very short In anticipation of an evacuation, 200 inmates were redistributed throughout the other facilities and contingencies were prepared to remove the other 800. The Subcommittee commends the agency's preparation for the crisis and notes the entire system was presented with the opportunity to gain valuable emergency preparedness experience. The correctional facilities were compelled to absorb excess prisoners and cover the additional costs out of their existing budgets. The Secretary reports the movement of offenders increased costs at all the facilities, but he has imposed spending restrictions on all the wardens and will be able to cover all associated costs within the existing budget. The Subcommittee encourages the agency to continue its efforts to recover costs from Kansas Gas Service.
- 6. The Subcommittee recommends the Ways and Means Capital Improvements Subcommittee review the request for a new 10,000 sq. foot building at the Topeka Correctional Facility. The agency requests \$527,000 from the Kansas Correctional Industries Fund for the building which would include 8,000 sq. feet for industries and 2,000 sq. feet for an industries warehouse. The agency reports limited opportunities for correctional industry employment for female offenders at the Topeka facility under current circumstances.

Referring to the agency program evaluation, Attachment A, work release programs are the most effective at reducing recidivism rates.

Senate Subcommittee Recommendation

The Subcommittee concurs with the Governor's recommendation with the following adjustment:

1. Delete \$165,480 SGF to remove the Governor's pay plan, including \$39,262 for longevity bonuses and \$126,218 for a classified base salary increase.

- 2. The Subcommittee commends the correctional facility for the contributions of inmates to communities in Kansas. The work of inmate work crews provide significant savings to communities and agencies and their value is often only noted when their labor is lost. The subcommittee notes that at the Governor's recommendation inmate work crews were reduced in FY 2001 but the 2002 budget continues their funding. At Larned in FY 2000, the last full year, the inmates contribute 176,286 hours of work valued at \$918,941.
- 3. The Subcommittee notes with satisfaction the transfer of the sexual predator unit for patients in the Social and Rehabilitation Services treatment program who were moved out of the correctional facility in October 2000. The prison has reoccupied the 30-bed wing with inmates who have serious mental illness. Additionally, the Chemical Dependency Recovery Program has been transferred from the State Hospital as directed by the 2000 Legislature and now provides substance abuse treatment services to offenders at the correctional facility.
- 4. The Subcommittee commends the correctional facility for continuing to maintain American Correctional Association accreditation. Accreditation remains a valuable measure of the high standards and safe operation of the correctional facilities. The committee singles out Larned for their most recent audit. The agency report noted the 100 percent mandatory standards and 99.8 percent non-mandatory standards and the facility "received an 'Outstanding' Quality of Life rating during the May 1999 audit. This quality of life rating is very rarely given by ACA auditors throughout the United States and is the highest rating possible. The auditors were very impressed with the mental health program and the positive, humane staff treatment of and interactions with the mentally ill inmates."
- The Subcommittee recommends the agency's future reports to the Subcommittees share a common date of inmate population compilation so each correctional facility reflects the total inmate population from a date certain.
- 6. The Subcommittee notes that turnover, particularly for uniformed staff, remains a problem at some of the correctional facilities. Each correctional facility reported on their turnover rates, and Larned reported a turnover rate in FY 2000, the last full year, of 27.0 percent. The systemwide average was 21.4 percent. The Subcommittee hopes enhanced pay in the Governor's budget will help recruit new and retain qualified staff.

Chairman Morris and members of the Committee, my name is Dick Carter and I am the Director

for External Relations for the Kansas Board of Regents. I appear before you today in support of

HB 2189.

As a result of the Kansas Higher Education Coordination Act (SB 345) there were a number of

statutory clean-up measures necessary to maintain compliance with the law – this is one of those

changes.

In 1996, the Legislature passed a law that provides that Kansas public postsecondary institutions

shall waive tuition and fees for the dependents of Kansas public safety officers who died as a

result of injury sustained in the line of duty. The institution may file a claim with the applicable

state board (now the Kansas Board of Regents) for reimbursement of the tuition and fees waived.

The current statute divides responsibility for administration of this statute between the Board of

Regents and the State Board of Education, depending on the type of institution. Since all of

higher education now comes under the Kansas Board of Regents, all responsibility should be

shifted to the Board of Regents. HB 2189, in its original form, does just that in regard to public

safety officers.

It is important to note that the bill was amended in the House to include "emergency medical services attendants," commonly referred to as first responders, EMT's and so on. The bill was further amended to allow for benefits to be distributed to those who were permanently, totally disabled.

With respect to the first amendment, the Kansas Board of Regents appreciates the intent of the House Committee and does not disagree that emergency medical services attendants fall under the parameter of those employees engaged in a public service that potentially puts them at personal risk. It does raise the question, however, as to "what other group may claim that they were missed?" Regarding the amendment allowing for education benefits for those who are permanently, totally disabled, we would suggest that benefits under workers compensation law exist and that this amendment goes beyond the intent of the tuition and fee waiver program as it was formulated in 1996.

Finally, I have compiled some figures of the current fiscal impact to the Kansas Board of Regents. Currently, there are four persons receiving benefit from this tuition and fee waiver program for a total of \$7,049.31. This amount has been absorbed by the system-wide budget in the past and does not present a monumental problem. While, we do not anticipate a deluge of participants in the program, should the bill be passed in its amended form; we would request that the committee consider the potential budget implications that these changes could have and would request appropriate additional revenue to support the program.

Thank you Mr. Chairman and members of the committee. I am Pat Lehman and I represent the Kansas Fire Service Alliance. I am speaking on behalf of the Alliance in support of HB 2189.

The House amended the bill to include emergency medical services attendants in the definition of public safety officers. It also amended the bill to include dependents of public safety officers who are permanently and totally disabled to be provided enrollment without charge of tuition or fees to a Kansas educational institution. The Kansas Fire Service supports these amendments.

Because it is becoming more and more difficult to attract volunteer firefighters, we believe that including the word "volunteer" as part of the definition of firefighter in this bill could serve as a small incentive. For that reason, we request that the committee amend the bill to include dependents of volunteer firefighters in the eligibility specified by this legislation.

The Kansas Fire Service Alliance urges you to pass the amended bill out favorably. Thank you and I would be glad to stand for any questions.

My testimony this morning is offered in support of HB 2189 as amended by House Committee to include Emergency Medical Service Attendants. Of the 183 licensed ambulance services in Kansas, 140 are identified as part-time/volunteer services. Of the 9,395 certified attendants, approximately 55% report they are actually providing patient care and 66% of those are volunteers.

The Board of EMS has identified as a major concern the recruitment and retention of attendants, especially in the rural setting which is mostly volunteer. To become an EMT requires an average of 185 clock hours of school, passing a National Certification Exam, and gaining mandatory continuing education hours on a yearly basis. Once you become an EMT, your work is done in an environment of high-risk for injury and exposure to serious illness. When recruiting personnel to serve your community what can you offer as incentive?

HB2189 does offer some incentive. If an attendant dies or becomes permanently disabled in the performance of his job as and EMS attendant, this bill allows for the dependents to receive tuition to the state-supported Colleges and Universities. Fortunately, this is a very infrequent occurrence. A fundamental segment of the training program is stressing the importance of assuring a scene is safe, to reduce the risk of injury, and the use of personal protective equipment to prevent accidental exposure to bloodborne pathogens and other medical conditions.

Please consider favorably the passage of HB2189. Thank You for the opportunity to provide this testimony.

I have been asked on behalf of the Kansas Emergency Medical Services Association, the Emergency Medical Technicians Association and American Medical Response which provides ambulance services in Shawnee, Osage and Johnson counties Kansas to express their support of HB2189. We ask that you act favorably on the bill.

HB 2189 concerns post secondary education tuition and fees waivers for dependents of public safety officers who die in the line of duty. The bill would expand the program to include emergency medical services attendants, in addition to law enforcement officers and firefighters, and would expand eligibility to include dependents of law enforcement officers, firefighters, and emergency medical services attendants who suffer a fatal injury or a permanent, total disability in the line of duty, in addition to persons who are killed.

The House Higher Education Committee amended the bill at the request of the Kansas Emergency Medical Services Association to extend the benefits of the program to dependents of emergency medical service workers who are killed in the line of duty. Emergency medical services attendant is defined to include first responders, emergency medical technicians, emergency medical technician-intermediates, emergency medical technician-defibrillators, or mobile intensive care technicians who are certified by the Emergency Medical Services Board.

Dear Senator Feleciano:

At yesterday's Senate Ways and Means Committee meeting, you asked about the new judge added by the 2000 Legislature for the 18th Judicial District (Wichita) and why that judge has no support staff. Although both an administrative assistant and a court reporter were requested for the judge, the Legislature appropriated funding only for the judge for half of the fiscal year. That judge joins 44 other district judges statewide who do not have assigned administrative assistants to perform clerical and administrative functions. Statewide, there are 160 district judge positions, and 116 administrative assistant positions. Of the 44 judges without administrative assistants, 15 judges have either Secretary I or Secretary II positions serving as confidential employees who work either part or full time performing administrative and clerical work for judges. The remaining 29 judges have neither administrative assistants nor secretaries serving as confidential employees.

At the time of court unification in the 1970s, all district judges did not have administrative assistants. In the years since that time, the Judicial Branch has requested additional personnel to meet this need. Although some positions have been added, the need has never been fully addressed. When the Judicial Branch requests new judge positions, an administrative assistant and court reporter are always requested together with the judge. However, some judge positions have been created without the accompanying support staff.

A similar situation exists with court reporters. Currently, there are 128.5 court reporters employed for the 160 district judges statewide. Additionally, none of the 74 district magistrate judges statewide have either administrative assistants or court reporters for support staff.

Dear Senator Adkins:

You requested we review the turnover in judicial positions. I looked at this in a couple of different ways. One reviews the number of judges who left the bench. Data was readily available from the beginning of FY 1999. If you want this analysis to go back further, please let me know and I will either contact the Department of Administration for access to their computer files or review our paper files.

This data is reflected in the first attachment and is broken down by type of judge and reason for leaving. Most of the "other" category are due to the normal election process. In those cases there are no turnover savings and in fact create a negative one day of savings since both the incumbent and the new judge are on for part of the day. Also shown for each year is the average length of time the position was vacant.

The second attachment shows amounts budgeted and expended on judges of the district court over the past 12 fiscal years. In each case the amount budgeted is from the current year estimate in our budget and the actual is from amount shown in the following year. While there may be some modest, mid-year changes in the benefit rates which make the numbers not perfectly comparable (e.g. the one quarter suspension of KPERS death and disability premiums during FY 1999) this reflects the long-term turnover savings that can be expected in this area. I believe you can see why I assert 1% is about all that can be expected.

I hope these two analyses explain judicial turnover sufficiently. If you would like more data or an additional analysis, please let me know.

For Consideration By Committee on Ways and Means as Recommended by Subcommittee on Judicial Branch

AN ACT concerning docket fees; relating to compensation for certain nonjudicial employees in the judicial branch; amending K.S.A. 21-4610a, 28-170 and 60-3005 and K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 20-lal4, 20-367, 21-4619, 22-2410, 59-104, 60-1621, 60-2001 and 60-4001 and repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 20-367b and 61-2501.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Moneys in the fund shall be used only to pay for that portion of the cost of salaries and wages of nonjudicial personnel of the judicial branch, including associated employer contributions, which shall not exceed the difference between the amount of expenditures that would be required under the judicial branch pay plan for nonjudicial personnel in effect prior to the effective date of this act and the amount of expenditures required under the judicial branch pay plan for nonjudicial personnel after the cost-of-living adjustments and the adjustments for upgrades in pay rates for nonjudicial personnel approved by the chief justice of the Kansas supreme court for fiscal year 2001. For fiscal years commencing on and after June 30, 2001, moneys in such fund shall be used only for the amount attributable to maintenance of the judicial branch pay plan for nonjudicial personnel for such adjustments and upgrades approved by the chief justice of the supreme court for fiscal year 2001 and for any reclassifications and salary initiatives that may be necessary for the judicial branch to hire and retain qualified employees.

salary initiative fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts and upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to payrolls approved by the chief justice of the Kansas supreme court or by a person or persons designated by the chief justice.

 - (3) the expungement is consistent with the public welfare.
- or diversion expunged, the order of expungement shall state the information required to be contained in the petition. - (8) the Kansas lottery, and the request is accompanied by a statement that the request is being made to aid in determining qualifications for employment with the Kansas lottery or for work in sensitive areas within the Kansas lottery as deemed appropriate by the executive director of the Kansas lottery;

- (4) the expungement would be in the best interests of justice and (A) Charges have been dismissed; or (B) no charges have been or are likely to be filed.
- (d) When the court has ordered expungement of an arrest record and subsequent court proceedings, if any, the order shall state the information required to be stated in the petition and shall state the grounds for expungement under subsection (c). - (b) Poverty affidavit in lieu of docket fee and exemptions. The provisions of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 60-2001 and K.S.A. 60-2005, and amendments thereto, shall apply to probate docket fees prescribed by this section.
- (c) <u>Disposition of docket fee.</u> Statutory charges for the law library and for the prosecuting attorneys' training fund shall be paid from the docket fee. The remainder of the docket fee shall be paid to the state treasurer in accordance with K.S.A. 20-362, and amendments thereto.
- (d) Additional court costs. Other fees and expenses to be assessed as additional court costs shall be approved by the court, unless specifically fixed by statute. Other fees shall include, but not be limited to, witness fees, appraiser fees, fees for service of process outside the state, fees for depositions, transcripts and publication of legal notice, executor or administrator fees, attorney fees, court costs from other courts and any other fees and expenses required by statute. All additional court costs shall be taxed and billed against the parties or estate as directed by the court. No sheriff in this state shall charge any district court in this state a fee or mileage for serving any paper or process.
- Sec. 8. K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 60-1621 is hereby amended to read as follows: 60-1621. (a) No post-decree motion petitioning for a change in legal custody, residency, visitation rights or parenting time, any modification of an agreed order or for a modification of child support shall be filed or docketed in the district court without payment of a docket fee in the amount of \$20 \$40 to the clerk of the district court.
 - (b) A poverty affidavit may be filed in lieu of a docket fee

as established in K.S.A. 60-2001, and amendments thereto.

(a) <u>Docket fee.</u> Except as otherwise provided by law, no case shall be filed or docketed in the district court, whether original or appealed, without payment of a docket fee in the amount of \$101 \$150 to the clerk of the district court.
- (b) Poverty affidavit in lieu of docket fee. (1) Effect. any case where a plaintiff by reason of poverty is unable to pay a docket fee, and an affidavit so stating is filed, no fee will be required. An inmate in the custody of the secretary of corrections may file a poverty affidavit only if the inmate attaches a statement disclosing the average account balance, or the total deposits, whichever is less, in the inmate's trust fund for each month in (A) the six-month period preceding the filing of the action; or (B) the current period of incarceration, whichever is shorter. Such statement shall be certified by the secretary. On receipt of the affidavit and attached statement, the court shall determine the initial fee to be assessed for filing the action and in no event shall the court require an inmate to pay less than \$3. If the inmate has a zero balance in such inmate's account, the secretary shall debit such account in the amount of \$3 per filing fee as established by the court until money is credited to the account to pay such docket fee.  - (2) Form of affidavit. The affidavit provided for in this

subsection shall be in the following form and attached to the petition:

State of Kansas, County.

In the district court of the county: I do solemnly swear that the claim set forth in the petition herein is just, and I do further swear that, by reason of my poverty, I am unable to pay a docket fee.

- (c) <u>Disposition of docket fee.</u> The docket fee shall be the only costs assessed in each case for services of the clerk of the district court and the sheriff. The docket fee shall be disbursed in accordance with K.S.A. 20-362 and amendments thereto.
- (d) Additional court costs. Other fees and expenses to be assessed as additional court costs shall be approved by the court, unless specifically fixed by statute. Other fees shall include, but not be limited to, witness fees, appraiser fees, fees for service of process outside the state, fees for depositions, alternative dispute resolution fees, transcripts and publication, attorney fees, court costs from other courts and any other fees and expenses required by statute. All additional court costs shall be taxed and billed against the parties as directed by the court. No sheriff in this state shall charge any district court in this state a fee or mileage for serving any paper or process.

Sec. 10. K.S.A. 60-3005 is hereby amended to read as follows: 60-3005. Any person filing a foreign judgment shall pay to the clerk of the district court a docket fee as-prescribed--by K.S.A.-60-2001, and amendments-thereto in the amount of \$150. Any additional fees or charges not specifically covered by the docket fee shall be assessed as additional court costs in the same manner and to the same extent as if the action had been originally commenced in the court where the foreign judgment is filed.

Sec. 11. K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 61-4001 is hereby amended to read as follows: 61-4001. (a) Docket fee. No case shall be filed or docketed pursuant to the code of civil procedure for limited actions without the payment of a docket fee in the amount of \$19.50 \$26, if the amount in controversy or claimed does not

exceed \$500; \$39.50 \$50, if the amount in controversy or claimed exceeds \$500 but does not exceed \$5,000; or \$64.50 \$80, if the amount in controversy or claimed exceeds \$5,000. If judgment is rendered for the plaintiff, the court also may enter judgment for the plaintiff for the amount of the docket fee paid by the plaintiff.

- (b) Poverty affidavit; additional court costs. The provisions of subsections (b), (c) and (d) of K.S.A. 60-2001, and amendments thereto, shall be applicable to lawsuits brought under the code of civil procedure for limited actions.
