



Kansas is tied for fourth place in the nation for having the highest percentage of students graduate from high school. Currently, 92 percent of Kansas' young people complete high school or its equivalency. <u>National</u> Education Goals Panel

Kansas high school students continue to excel on the ACT national college entrance exam. In 2001, the composite score for students taking the test was 22.6 which tops the national average of 21.4. Kansas' results are even more impressive when compared to other states. In 2001, Kansas students once again exceeded the national averages on the SAT national college entrance test which measures verbal and mathematical reasoning.
