MINUTES OF THE SENATE FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Senator Nancey Harrington at 10:30 a.m. on February 5, 2002 in Room 245-N of the Capitol.

Chairperson Harrington stated that Alcoholic Beverage Control had introduced some bills to the committee, and they would be subcommitteed by Senators Brungardt, Gooch, and Teichman.

Chairperson Harrington stated that the Adjutant General would be introducing some bills to the committee at 11:00 a.m. She then began the confirmation hearing for Joyce Glasscock.

Joyce Glasscock presented testimony to the committee. (<u>Attachment 1</u>) She then presented Senate Confirmation Information Summary. (<u>Attachment 2</u>)

Chairperson Harrington then asked the committee for questions. Senator John Vratil stated that he has heard a great deal about waste and inefficiency in state government, and he would like to know Ms. Glasscock's opinion. Ms. Glasscock then stated that different departments have different experiences. She stated that because the Legislature has not faced a truly difficult budget year before, some agencies have not sought out the painful but necessary cuts. In response to a question from Senator Gooch regarding minority employment, Ms. Glasscock stated that after seeking out what the state was doing to actively encourage minority employment, she learned that only a couple agencies have been actively promoting opportunities for minorities, including KDOT and the Highway Patrol. She stated that other agencies on the whole have not gone to any extreme measures to accomplish this end. She stated that she has asked the employment union at the division of personnel services to put together a plan for her to show how her department can aggressively pursue communicating to minority organizations and publications the opportunity that is in state government. Senator Gooch responded that in his conversations with her, he had spoken about qualified people getting an opportunity to perform in this manner. Ms. Glasscock stated that she would keep the Senator apprised of the situation. Senator Gooch stated that there are only six full-time employees in the Capitol who are minorities, so he does not have to look very far to see the problem.

Senator Lyon asked if Ms. Glasscock were to be responsible for the Department of Administration for the next three to five years, would her goal be to see that the services it provides increase or decrease. She responded that her appointment was only for one year. She stated that over the years the budget of the department had declined due to advances in technology. She stated that there are a number of efforts within the department to move off of State General Fund funding, and that has been encouraged by Division of the Budget. She stated that this move has made the department search very hard for Federal funds. She stated that from 2002-2003, she anticipates an increase in the budget of 0.3% overall, 4% paid out on the SGF side. She stated that there are many areas which will still be worked on.

Chairperson Harrington stated that after reviewing the minutes from the confirmation hearing of Dan Stanley, they mentioned that additional responsibilities for the position included being assigned to twenty-seven boards, twenty of which are set by statute. She stated that those responsibilities seemed a little bit visible for someone married to the Speaker of the House, who is also running for state office. Chairperson Harrington stated that considering the salary of \$95,000, she wondered if there had been any other candidates for the

position after Mr. Stanley moved on. She stated that she realized that it was up to the Governor to pick who would fill the position, but as Ms. Glasscock mentioned, she would only be serving for this term. Chairperson Harrington stated that she would like to know if there had been any other less visible appointees considered since Ms. Glasscock had previously been chief of staff. Ms. Glasscock stated that a number of individuals had been considered for the position, but none of them were from the department. She stated that she did not know why that was, but that the Governor typically seeks individuals who he knows well, that he trusts, and that have had some experience. She stated that she is probably one of the few people who he considers to fulfill all of those criteria.

Senator Teichman stated that she would like to say that from what she had stated and from what the Senator had heard, Ms. Glasscock has been doing a good job.

Chairperson Harrington stated that certainly Ms. Glasscock had been a trooper throughout this administration, and that she was to be commended. Chairperson Harrington asked for questions and there were none. The Chair thanked Ms. Glasscock for her appearance.

Adjutant General Greg Gardner asked the committee for the introduction of four bills. He stated that the first dealt with the state's use of active duty national guard, the second dealt with the use of the incident management system across the state, the third with a new regional incident management system, and the fourth with the re-establishment of the position of Deputy Adjutant General.

Senator Barnett made a motion to introduce the bills. Senator Teichman seconded the motion. The motion passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m. The next meeting will be held at 10:30 a.m. on February 6, 2002.

TESTIMONY TO SENATE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS BY JOYCE GLASSCOCK ACTING SECRETARY, DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION February 5, 2002

Madam Chair and Members of the Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to appear before you today and to put forth my qualifications for Secretary of Administration.

I bring to this job a great respect for those who serve in government. Having myself served for a combined total of 13 years in both the legislative and executive branches of government, I appreciate the roles that both play in delivering government programs well.

I've had the opportunity to work for outstanding elected officials during my career, including:

- > as a political appointee in the first George Bush Administration;
- with the former senior U.S. Senator from Missouri, John Danforth;
- with former Senator Bob Dole's 1988 presidential campaign;
- with Republican Congressman Dave Hobson of Ohio; and
- > for over seven years, with Governor Bill Graves.

I appreciate what is demanded of public service. I believe that government at every level requires outstanding people – much like yourselves – who not only commit their time and energy to serving, but who stake their beliefs in what is right for the good of the community, or the state, or the nation they serve.

In my tenure so far at the Department of Administration I have worked with outstanding individuals, many of them decades-long state employees delivering services, ingeniously at times, under-budget and above expectations. I would consider it an honor to lead those individuals. I would work to do justice to their expectations, as well as to yours.

To successfully serve as Secretary of Administration, one must possess some fundamental attributes: first, is a commitment to customer service. The department is responsible for delivering services to other state agencies, local units of government and the citizens of Kansas. Listening to what our customers need and tailoring services accordingly is critical. I consider the Legislature a very important customer. You will find me responsive to any concerns in the future that may be posed to the Department by you, your staff, and constituents whom you represent.

Another critical attribute is a commitment to high ethical standards. As Secretary of Administration, I will approach issues with fairness and integrity. I will make decisions that optimize state resources and protect the interests of Kansas taxpayers.

And finally, leadership is an essential attribute in guiding an agency of this or any size. In these financially challenging times, I will provide leadership by constantly seeking ways to operate the department with greater efficiency. That requires taking strong actions to save taxpayer dollars. As Acting Secretary, I've already begun making hard choices. Two weeks ago with the Governor's approval, I initiated a reorganization which merges the Division of Architectural Services functions into the Division of Facilities Management. Successfully executing that effort will produce savings in the long run for the Department, and allow the agency to more strategically manage the state's building assets through control of design and construction, operation and maintenance.

Another importance task in the short term is to replace Don Heiman, the State's Chief Information Technology Officer, who officially retired yesterday. Under his leadership, Kansas has become the number one most advanced state in the nation for delivering government services through the aid of technology. Kansas also delivers these services at one-third the cost of other states, on average. It is my intention that the next CITO will also be an individual dedicated to aggressively implementing advances in technology that will help Kansas continue to achieve greater efficiencies.

As background, the Department of Administration consists of 886 FTEs, and has a total budget of \$133 million. Our services include accounting support, information systems and telecommunications service, personnel guidance, purchasing, printing, and building management and maintenance. The Department's primary responsibility is to provide services and support to other agencies so those agencies, in turn, may deliver their programs well.

My goal is to deliver our services as effectively as possible, as efficiently as possible, and as invisibly as possible.

Madam Chair, I am happy to stand for questions.

75-3702a. Secretary of administration; appointment and confirmation; creation and administration of the department of administration; application of K-GOAL. (a) There is hereby created a department of administration, the head of which shall be the secretary of administration. The governor shall appoint the secretary of administration, subject to confirmation by the senate as provided in K.S.A. 75-4315b, and amendments thereto. The secretary of administration shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. The department of administration shall be administered under the direction and supervision of the secretary of administration. The secretary of administration shall receive an annual salary fixed by the governor.

(b) The provisions of the Kansas governmental operations accountability law apply to the office of secretary of administration and the department of administration, and the office and department are subject to audit, review and evalu-

ation under such law.

(a) All the powers, duties and functions of the existing state department of administration and the existing executive director of the department of administration are hereby transferred to and conferred and imposed, respectively, upon the department of administration and the secretary of administration created by this act, except as is

herein otherwise provided.

(b) The department of administration and the secretary of administration created by this act shall be the successors in every way, respectively, to the powers, duties and functions of the state department of administration and executive director of the department of administration in which the same were vested prior to the effective date of this act, except as herein otherwise provided. Every act performed in the exercise of such powers, duties and functions by or under the authority of the department of administration or secretary of administration created by this act, respectively, shall be deemed to have the same force and effect as if performed by the state department of administration or executive director of the department of administration, respectively, in which such functions were vested prior to the effective date of this act.

(c) Whenever the state department of administration, or words of like effect, is referred to or designated by a statute, contract or other document, such reference or designation shall be deemed to apply to the department of adminis-

tration created by this act.

(d) Whenever the executive director of the department of administration, or words of like effect, is referred to or designated by a statute, contract or other document, such reference or designation shall be deemed to apply to the secretary

of administration created by this act.

(e) All rules and regulations and all orders and directives of the department of administration or the executive director of the department of administration in existence on the effective date of this act, shall continue to be effective and shall be deemed to be the duly adopted rules and regulations or orders and directives of the secretary of administration created by this act, until revised, amended or revoked as provided in K.S.A. 75-
