The minutes of the May 8<sup>th</sup> meeting were approved on a motion by Senator Schmidt, seconded by Senator Donovan. Carried.

#### Sub HB 2183-authorizing electronic gaming machines at certain locations

The Chair noted a distributed letter from Lottery Director, Ed Van Petten, which clarified his testimony from the May 9<sup>th</sup> meeting.(attachment 1) Mr. Van Petten stood for questions and explained incorrect assumptions he had made the previous day.

The Chair categorized all of the amendments to <u>Sub HB 2183</u> as follows: expedite the bidding process; change the distribution of net machine income; remove the "at large" facility provision; change the Crawford County distribution; clarifying amendments; ethics provision (section 18) of the bill.

Following lengthy discussion of the first category regarding the bidding process (see May 9<sup>th</sup> minutes-attachment 1), Senator Gilstrap moved the amendment, Senator Haley seconded. Motion failed.

Following discussion regarding the second category regarding a change in the distribution of net machine income (see May 9<sup>th</sup> minutes-attachment 5). Senator Schmidt moved his amendment. Motion died for lack of second.

Following discussion regarding the greyhound amendment (see May 9<sup>th</sup> minutes-attachment 6), Senator Adkins moved the amendment, Senator Gilstrap seconded. Motion fails.

Following discussion regarding changes to the Crawford County distribution amendment (see May 9<sup>th</sup> minutes-attachment 8) and explanation of the changes by Senator Umbarger (attachment 2), Senator Umbarger moved the amendment, Senator Schmidt seconded. Carried.

A request was made by Senator Oleen to reconsider Senator Schmidt's amendment. <u>Following discussion</u>, Senator Schmidt moved his amendment, Senator Oleen seconded. <u>Carried</u>.

Following discussion regarding the removal of the "at large" facility <u>amendment(see May 9<sup>th</sup> minutes-attachment 3)</u>, <u>Senator Goodwin moved her amendment</u>, <u>Senator Schmidt seconded</u>. Senator Gilstrap stated why he opposed the amendment. <u>Motion carried</u>.

The Chair informed Committee that an opinion from the attorney general regarding "home rule" had not been received yet. He stated that he may consider a further meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 a.m.

May 9, 2002

Chairman Vratil and members of the committee:

After answering questions this morning, I found that I made assumptions that I was told were incorrect.

Sen. Oleen asked if I had input in the drafting of this legislation. I believed that the legislation was drafted by, or the drafting was directed by, Rep. Clay Aurand and Rep. John Ballou as chair and vice-chair of the House Tourism Sub-committee on Gaming Issues. I did meet with both Representatives in the office of Rep. Aurand on one occasion for about 30 minutes during the time period I believed they were drafting this legislation. Subsequent to that, both the Assistant Attorney General for the Lottery and I have made a number of suggestions in committee meetings for technical corrections.

I have been informed that, in fact, the bill was drafted by representatives of the track owners, and then modified in the committee process. I have met with Brad Smoot, John Bottenberg and Robin Jennison on a number of occasions, in my office and in the Capitol. In addition, on one occasion, in my office I met with these three and two other gentlemen who I understand were employees of Bill Grace. We discussed proposed legislation at all of these meetings.

These individuals have been receptive to concerns talked about regarding the routing of information from the electronic gaming machines to the central system that must be controlled by the Lottery. In my opinion, the machines must first be linked to the Lottery controlled central system, before the information is transmitted to any system controlled by the facility. This legislation does this.

I remain available for any assistance I can give.

## Substitute for HOUSE BILL No. 2183

By Committee on Tourism

4-10

AN ACT concerning lotteries; authorizing electronic gaming machines at certain locations; amending K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 19-101a, 74-8702, 74-8710, 74-8711 and 79-4805 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 74-8702 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-8702.As used in the Kansas lottery act, unless the context otherwise requires:

"Commission" means the Kansas lottery commission.

- "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery.
- (c) "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic or mechanical device or other equipment unique to the Kansas lottery used directly in the operation of any lottery and in the determination of winners pursuant to this act.
- (c) . "Gaming equipment" means any electric, electronic, computerized or electromechanical machine, mechanism, supply or device, or any other equipment, which is: (1) Unique to the Kansas lottery and used pursuant to the Kansas lottery act; (2) integral to the operation of an electronic gaming machine; or (3) affects the results of an electronic gaming machine by determining win or loss.
- (d) "Kansas lottery" means the state agency created by this act to operate a lottery or lotteries pursuant to this act.
- (e) "Lottery retailer" means any person with whom the Kansas lottery has contracted to sell lottery tickets or shares, or both, to the public.
- "Lottery" or "state lottery" means the lottery or lotteries operated pursuant to this act.
- "Major procurement" means any gaming product or service, including but not limited to facilities, advertising and promotional services, onnuity contracts, prize payment agreements, consulting services, equipent, tickets and other products and services unique to the Kansas lotcery, but not including materials, supplies, equipment and services common to the ordinary operations of state agencies.
  - "Person" means any natural person, association, limited liability

tion of electronic gaming machines. Moneys in such fund may be expended only pursuant to appropriation and moneys in excess of those appropriated to the Kansas lottery and the Kansas racing and gaming commission may be transferred to the state general fund and expended as provided by appropriation.

New Sec. 8. (a) The executive director shall collect and remit to the state treasurer in accordance with K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto, all net machine income received from lottery gaming machine contractors. Upon receipt of the remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in the state treasury and credit it to the electronic gaming machine fund, established pursuant to section 7, and amendments thereto. Separate accounts shall be maintained in the electronic gaming machine fund for receipt of moneys from each lottery gaming machine contractor.

(b) Not less than once each week, the state treasurer shall transfer the following percentages of the balance remaining, after transfer of moneys pursuant to subsection (b), in each account in the electronic gaming machine fund for receipt of moneys from lottery gaming machine contractors which are parimutuel licensees:

(1) To the lottery gaming machine contractors, 66%[, except that at the parimutuel licensee location located in Crawford county, the lottery gaming machine contractor shall receive 65.80%, 0.10% of the money credited to the account of the electronic gaming machine contractor located in Crawford county shall be deposited to the credit of the Frontenac bison maintenance fund created pursuant to section 27, and amendments thereto and 0.10% of the money credited to the account of the electronic gaming machine contractor located in Crawford county shall be deposited to the credit of the U.S. 69 highway maintenance fund created pursuant to section 28, and amendments thereto;

(2) to the problem gambling grant fund established pursuant to K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 79-4805, and amendments thereto, 0.5%, except that such transfer shall be to the credit of the state general fund at such time as the balance in such fund is equal to the amount of \$4,000,000, but if the balance in such fund falls below the amount of \$3,000,000, such transfers shall resume;

to the state general fund, 25%;

- to the nonprofit organization licensed by the Kansas racing and gaming commission to conduct races at the parimutuel licensee location,
- (5) to the fund established for restoration and repair of the statehouse pursuant to K.S.A. 75-2262; and amendments thereto, 0.5%;

to the city where the parimutuel location is located, 1%;

; 1% of the money credited to the account of the electronic gaming machine contractor located in Crawford county shall be deposited to the credit of the southeast Kansas, Inc. regional economic development fund pursuant to section 32, and amendments thereto; and .5% of the money credited to the account of the electronic gaming machine contractor located in Crawford county shall be deposited to the credit of the bison park and bike trail fund pursuant to section 33, and amendments thereto

cation, treatment and prevention efforts on the prevalence of pathological gambling in Kansas. All grants shall be made after open solicitation of proposals and evaluation of proposals against criteria established in rules and regulations adopted by the secretary of the department of social and rehabilitation services. Both public and private entities shall be eligible to apply for and receive grants under the provisions of this section.

(d) The secretary of the department of social and rehabilitation services is hereby authorized to receive moneys from any grants, gifts, contributions or bequests made for the purpose of funding grants under this section and to expend such moneys for the purpose for which received.

(e) All grants made in accordance with this section shall be made from the problem gambling grant fund. The secretary shall administer the provisions of this section and shall adopt rules and regulations establishing criteria for qualification to receive grants and such other matters deemed necessary by the secretary for the administration of this section. Such rules and regulations shall include, but need not be limited to, a requirement that each recipient of a grant to provide treatment for pathological gamblers report at least annually to the secretary the grantee's measurable achievement of specific outcome goals.

New Sec. 32. (a) There is hereby created within the state treasury the southeast Kansas, Inc. regional economic development fund. All expenditures from the fund shall be made for the purpose of providing for economic development and tourism in southeast Kansas through a grant to southeast Kansas, Inc.

(b) All expenditures from the fund shall be upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the secretary of commerce and housing or the secretary's designee.

New Sec. 33. (a) There is hereby created within the state treasury the bison park and bike trail fund. All expenditures from the fund shall be made for the purpose of maintaining and developing the bison park and bike trail in Parsons and other tourism in southeast Kansas.

(b) All expenditures from the fund shall be upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the secretary of wildlife and parks or the secretary's designee.
