# MINUTES OF THE SENATE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Senator Les Donovan at 8:30 a.m. on January 23, 2002 in Room 245-N of the Capitol.

### Introduction of bill(s)

Richard Cram, Director, Office of Policy & Research, Kansas Department of Revenue, requested introduction of a bill relating to motor fuel taxation. The bill would move point of responsibility for remitting such tax (<u>Attachment 1</u>). <u>Senator Goodwin moved to introduce this bill. Senator Salmans seconded the motion. Motion carried.</u>

Trista C. Beadles, Assistant Legal Counsel, Office of the Governor, presented a bill relating to child passenger safety belts, "booster seat", etc. Discussion revealed this bill contains different wording than a similar bill already in the Legislature. Senator Goodwin moved to introduce the bill. Senator Schodorf seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Sheila Walker, Director, Division of Motor Vehicles, Kansas Department of Revenue, requested introduction of two bills. The first one would increase vehicle dealer and salesperson's license fees by \$10 to cover costs of KBI background checks. It would also increase main dealer fees by \$20 to cover on-going costs of National Motor Vehicle Titling Information System. Members raised several questions. Senator Schodorf moved to introduce the bill. Senator Goodwin seconded the motion. Motion carried. The second bill deals with release of confidential records where there is a "proper judicial order" (Attachment 2). Members asked several questions about this requested introduction. Members were advised the bill's intent simply is to clarify present law. The language was taken from current federal law. Senator Schodorf moved to introduce the bill. Senator Harrington seconded the motion. Motion carried.

SB 21: School transportation, relating to school buses definition

SB 72: Re motor vehicles, defining farm custom harvesters

SB 243: Enacting the pedestrian safety act

These three bills were carried over from last year. Members reviewed information available on each bill. Following discussion <u>Senator Salmans moved SB 21, SB 72, and SB 243 be not passed.</u> Senator Harrington seconded the motion. Motion carried.

# SB 249: Re highways; systems enhancements qualifications

This bill is another carryover from the 2001 Session. Senator Gooch requested more time to review the information before recommending any action.

#### **Approval of minutes**

Senator Jackson moved to approved the January 16,2002 minutes. Senator Salmans seconded the motion. Motion carried.

## Motor Fuel Tax "At The Rack"

This proposal would move the point of motor fuel taxation from the distributor of first receipt to the position holder/supplier. The incidence of tax (the fuel crossing the terminal rack) remains the same, but the person responsible for remitting the tax changes. The Department will be authorized to enter into agreements with other jurisdictions for the collection of taxes to allow for the base state reporting and collection of motor fuel taxes.

Kansas Division of Vehicles' 2002 Legislative Proposals

The Kansas Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) respectfully presents two bills today for introduction to the Senate Transportation Committee. Here is a brief summary of each bill:

Increase all dealer license fees, including the vehicle salesperson's fee, by \$10 to cover the costs of KBI background checks to deny the license of any applicant convicted of a felony or any crime involving moral turpitude or found guilty of a state or U.S. law. By statute, we have a public policy interest in denying applications from convicted felons. It is our responsibility to protect the public as they buy and trade vehicles.

In addition, this proposal increases the main dealer fees by an additional \$20 to cover on-going costs of the National Motor Vehicle Titling Information System (NMVTIS). NMVTIS is used to instantly verify information on a vehicle prior to accepting a title or issuing a new one.

The cost for these main dealer fees (for new, used, auction, and salvage dealers, as well as first and second stage manufacturers) would increase to a total of \$80, compared to the current \$50. The increase also brings Kansas in line with other states' dealer licensing fees:

> Missouri - \$150 Colorado - \$300 Nebraska - \$200 California - \$150

These increased funds would be deposited in the existing Dealer Fee Fund.

Allows for vehicle records to be provided where there is a "proper judicial order" and to assist other state and federal governmental agencies in carrying out their functions, provided that such records are not re-disclosed. SENATE TRANSPORTATION
