## MINUTES OF THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FEDERAL AND STATE AFFAIRS.

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Bill Mason at 1:35 p.m. on March 25, 2003 in Room 313-S of the Capitol.

SB 205 - Kansas Commemorative Coin Design Act

<u>Representative Williams made a motion to move SB 205 favorable for passage. Representative Wilson seconded the motion.</u>

Representative Williams offered a balloon amendment, submitted by Representative Horst, and made a motion to adopt the amendment (Attachment 1). Representative Hutchins seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Representative Hutchins made a motion to amend the vote to include all Kansans residents (Attachment 2). Representative Novascone seconded the motion. The motion failed 9-11.

Representative Dahl made a motion to move SB 205, as amended, favorable for passage, The motion was seconded by Representative Hutchins. The motion carried.

<u>SB 2</u> - Agricultural remediation board and board of directors of KU hospital authority; members, terms of office. (This bill would be the vehicle used to move amendments out of committee regarding the Liquor Control Act).

Staff reviewed a matrix reflecting current law, two proposed bills and two alternatives (<u>Attachment 3</u>). Staff was given authorization to review the statutes for additional non-conform provisions in the Liquor Control Act.

Representative Rehorn made the motion to adopt 3rs0982 version favorable, which would bring the Liquor Control Act into conformity. Representative Ruff seconded,

Representative Rehorn made the motion to amend Alternative 1, which would allow cities that have package sales presently to continue business as usual and require cities that currently do not have package sales to pass a simple ordinance to opt out, into 3rs0982. Representative Ruff seconded. The motion carried 12-9.

Representative Rehorn made a substitute motion that the language of 3rs0982 be placed in SB 2. Representative Ruff seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Representative Freeborn made the motion to delete Section 3 and 4, which would prohibit Sunday sales statewide, from the new substitute bill. Representative Hutchins seconded the motion.

Representative Wilson offered a substitute motion to take the language currently in SB 2 which would leave the bill the same, including Sunday sales option, and pass it out favorably. Representative Loganbill seconded. The motion failed 10-11.

Representative Freeborn moved her original motion to delete Sections 3 and 4, The motion carried 12-10. The revisor was given authorization to make necessary technical changes in the language.

Representative Freeborn moved that they recommend for passage House Substitute for SB 2, as amended, for favorable passage. Representative Hutchins seconded the motion. The motion carried 12-9.

The meeting adjourned at 3:15, with future meetings on call of the Chair.

AN ACT enacting the Kansas commemorative coin design *concept* act.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the Kansas commemorative coin design concept act. The purpose of the act is to provide a means whereby the state through cooperation of its governor, arts community and high school students selects the design concepts and recommends the final design of the quarter dollar that is emblematic of the state of Kansas, its history, geography and rich heritage for submission to the United States secretary of the treasury in accordance with the 50 states commemorative coin program act (P.L. 105-124).

- Sec. 2. (a) There is established the Kansas commemorative coin design commission. The commission shall consist of 16 members, as follows:
- The members of the joint legislative committee on the arts and cultural resources:
- a member of the Kansas state historical society, selected by the members of the society;
- (3) a member of the Kansas arts commission, selected by the members of the commission;
- a member of the Kansas humanities council, selected by the members of the council; and
- three members of the general public who shall be representative of the arts, selected by the governor. One of the members selected pursuant to this paragraph shall be skilled in coin design or metal [knowledge ble of]
- (b) The chairperson of the joint legislative committee on the arts and cultural resources shall serve as chairperson of the commission. The commission shall meet on call of the chairperson or at the request of a majority of the members of the commission.
  - The commission shall:
- Adopt procedures and guidelines for selection of the design concepts of the quarter dollar that is emblematic of the state of Kansas; such guidelines shall be consistent with the guidelines prescribed by the 50 states commemorative coin program act and shall be publicized by the

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commission; (2) invite Kansas artists to submit design sketches for the Kansas com- Kansas rtists to submit design sketches for the Kansas commemorative quarter dollar that are broadly appealing to the citizens of the state and that maintain a dignity befitting the state's history and diversity; such design sketches must be submitted to the commission on or before June 1, 2004;. Each design sketch shall be accompanied by a narrative that explains why the concept is emblematic of the state and what the concept represents to the citizens of the state. Each design sketch shall be submitted to the commission on or before

June 30, 2003; (3) review the design sketches submitted by Kansas artists and choose four designs and narratives submitted by Kansas artists and choose + Kansans five submissions as finalists in the design selection process;

(4) forward only the selected narratives to the United States mint and collaborate with the United States mint in the preparation of artwork of the concepts;

(5) upon approval by the secretary of the treasury, the design on Expression the secretary candidate finalists shall collaborate with the state board of education and the secretary of state in submission of the four five finalist designs to an election in which all students enrolled in accredited public and accredited nonpublic high schools of the state may participate and by majority vote select the design for the Kansas commemorative quarter dollar that the commission shall submit to the governor; the election shall be held during the last week of January 2005 April 2004 Such election may be conducted by internet ballot.

Sec. 3. The governor shall submit the design selected by vote of Kansas high school students to the United States mint for review of coinability. After consultation with and approval of the selected design by the United States secretary of the treasury, the governor shall designate the design as commemorative of the state of Kansas for coinage for presentment to the secretary of treasury for final approval.

Sec. 4. The Kansas arts commission, the Kansas humanities council, and the Kansas historical society shall publicize the Kansas commemorative coin design act and shall provide such assistance to the Kansas commemorative coin design commission as may be requested by the commission.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book Kansas register.

- (5) upon approval by the secretary of the treasury, the design candidate finalists shall collaborate with the state board of education and the secretary of state in submission of the four five finalist designs to an election in which all students enrolled in accredited public and accredited nonpublic high schools of the state may participate and by majority vote select the design for the Kansas commemorative quarter dollar that the commission shall submit to the governor: the election shall be held during the last week of January 2005 April 2001. Such election may be conducted by internet ballot.
