Representative Feuerborn moved to introduce legislation concerning health care. The motion was seconded by Representative Shriver. Motion carried.

#### Hearing on HB 2671 - Direct deposit of employee pay.

Leah Robinson, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2671** removes the requirement that employers obtain written authorization from employees before using direct deposit of employee wages. The bill would cover state government as well as other businesses within the State.

The Chair recognized Carol Foreman, Deputy Secretary of the Department of Administration, who presented testimony in support of **HB 2671** (Attachment 1) and an amendment to clarify language in the bill (Attachment 2). Ms. Foreman stated that the bill was introduced as a result of a Budget Efficiency Savings Team (BEST) recommendation as being a cost-saving measure.

The Committee voiced concern regarding language in the bill that appeared to mandate the process to every employer and the cost of implementation. Responding to a question from the Committee regarding pay documentation, Ms. Foreman stated that the payroll information would be available "on-line" for the employee to view. Janice Magathan, Department of Administration Accounts and Reports, was present to answer questions from the Committee. Chuck Peterson, US Bank, stated that US Bank has banks in Kansas, but only as far west as Rossville, Kansas. The Committee also voiced concern with the use of the pay card for those employees who do not have a bank account. The Committee questioned that if an account is set up at a US Bank for the pay card, this account could be subject to liens.

Terry Forsyth, Kansas National Education Association (KNEA), presented testimony in opposition to **HB 2671** (<u>Attachment 3</u>). Mr. Forsyth felt that the legislation would be an unwarranted act on the part of the government into the lives of its citizens.

The Chair closed the hearing on HB 2671.

<u>Discussion and Action on HB 2748 - Allowing federal law enforcement officers arrest powers in certain situations; deemed to be within the scope of their employment.</u>

Leah Robinson, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2748** transfers the responsibility for the operations of the surplus property program for the state from the Department of Corrections to the Department of Administration (Attachment 4).

Representative Pottorff moved to adopt the Budget Committee Report on HB 2748 and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Shriver. Motion carried.

<u>Discussion and Action on HB 2749 - Statehouse art and history committee amended to include memorials.</u>

Leah Robinson, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2749** expands the duties of the existing Statehouse Art and History Committee to include memorials on the grounds of the Capitol complex. The bill would change the name of the committee to the Statehouse Art, History and Memorials Committee composed of the Secretary of Administration or the Secretary's designee, Director of Legislative Administrative Services and the Executive Director of the State Historical Society (<u>Attachment 5</u>). An amendment is proposed to clarify language concerning the review process (<u>Attachment 6</u>).

Representative Pottorff moved to adopt the amendment on HB 2749. The motion was seconded by Representative Shriver. Motion carried.

Representative Pottorff moved to adopt the Budget Committee report on HB 2749 as amended and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Howell. Motion carried.

# <u>Discussion and Action on HB 2752 - Capital improvement projects, architectural, engineering and land surveying services.</u>

Leah Robinson, Legislative Research Department, explained that under current law, the Secretary of Administration must convene a negotiating committee to select a contractor for general construction services on a capital project for a state facility if the project is expected to cost more than \$500,000. **HB 2752** raises the dollar amount to \$750,000. For engineering or land surveying services, the dollar threshold would be increased from \$250,000 to \$500,000 (Attachment 7).

Responding to a question from the Committee, Joe Fritton, Facilities Management, stated that the bill allows the Department of Administration to use in-house staff or the use of an on-call firm for smaller projects at a lesser cost than an outside firm.

Representative Pottorff moved to adopt the Budget Committee report on **HB 2752** and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Shriver. Motion carried.

# <u>Discussion and Action on HB 2901 - Kansas public broadcasting council act, prescribing grant recipients execute a lien on certain equipment.</u>

Leah Robinson, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2901**, as amended, would require that, on and after the effective date of the bill, any public broadcasting facility receiving an equipment grant under the Kansas Public Broadcasting Council Act would file a lien assuring the state's reversionary interest in all equipment purchased with the grant (<u>Attachment 8</u>). A proposed amendment addressing concerns with regard to priority lien to the federal government is recommended by the Budget Committee (<u>Attachment 9</u>).

Representative Shriver moved to adopt the amendment, the Budget Committee report on **HB 2901** as amended, and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Pottorff. Motion carried.

# <u>Discussion and Action on HB 2902 - Kansas guardianship program, volunteers under the Kansas torts claims act.</u>

Melissa Calderwood, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2902** would add court-appointed guardians and conservators contracted by the Kansas Guardianship Program to the definition of "employee" in the Kansas Tort Claims Act. This expanded definition would allow the program guardians and conservators to be protected in cases of negligence or acts of omission, but not for cases of fraud or acts of malice (Attachment 10).

Representative Pottorff moved to adopt the Budget Committee report on **HB 2902** and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Shriver. Motion carried.

# Discussion and Action on HB 2705 - State water plan fund, transfers from the state general fund

Amy VanHouse, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2705** restores into law the annual transfer of \$6 million from the State General Fund to the State Water Plan Fund (<u>Attachment 11</u>).

Representative Schwartz moved to adopt the Budget Committee report on HB 2705 and recommend the bill favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Gatewood. Motion carried.

# Discussion and Action on HB 2734 - Tuition waiver for foster care children.

Deb Hollon, Legislative Research Department, explained that **HB 2734** amends provisions dealing with the tuition waiver for children in the foster care system. The bill would increase the number of new tuition waivers provided by an educational institution from three per year to five. In addition, Washburn University would be added to the list of participating educational institutions (<u>Attachment 12</u>).

Representative Neufeld moved to amend **HB 2734** to add language adding former prisoners of war to the bill (Attachment 13). The motion was seconded by Representative Feuerborn.

Representative Minor moved to amend the amendment by adding language stating that the former prisoner of war must have been a resident of Kansas at the time they became a prisoner of war. The motion was seconded by Representative Campbell. Motion carried.

Representative Landwehr moved to adopt the amended amendment and recommend HB 2734 favorable for passage as amended. The motion was seconded by Representative Bethell. Motion carried.

<u>Discussion and Action on House Substitute for SB 272 - Social welfare, recovery of state medical assistance payments.</u>

Audrey Dunkel, Legislative Research Department, explained that **House Substitute for SB 272**, removes the original language from **SB 272** and inserts language, including a provision from **HB 2067** as amended by the Senate, creating and imposing a lien on real property of certain recipients of medical assistance (<u>Attachment 14</u>). The bill is a method of recovery for Medicaid payments from the estate of a Medicaid recipient.

Responding to a question from the Committee concerning the enforcement if a parent of the recipient is living in the home, Dennis Priest, Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, indicated that there are no provisions in the bill for a parent living in the home. The provisions in the bill are based on federal provisions.

Representative Bethell provided information to support House Substitute for SB 272 (Attachment 15).

Representative Bethell moved to recommend House Substitute for SB 272 favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Landwehr. Motion carried.

SB 336 was referred to the Social Services Budget Committee.

SB 487 and SB 527 was referred to the Agriculture and Natural Resources Budget Committee.

<u>Discussion and Action on HB 2783 - Governors budget report, excluding certain transfers from special</u> revenue funds to the state general fund.

Jim Wilson, Revisor of Statutes, explained a proposed substitute bill for **HB 2783** with language addressing what the Governor's budget report could include (<u>Attachment 16</u>). The new language would limit what could be included in the Governor's budget amendment of moneys from any special revenue fund to the state general fund (SGF). Mr. Wilson stated that "any special revenue fund" refers to all funds other than the SGF.

Representative Neufeld moved to adopt the language in **Substitute Bill for HB 2783**. The motion was seconded by Representative Bethell. Motion carried.

Representative Landwehr moved to recommend **Substitute for HB 2783** favorable for passage. The motion was seconded by Representative Schwartz. Motion carried.

The meeting was recessed at 10:40 a.m.

### House Appropriations Committee HB 2671 – Direct Deposit of Employee Pay

#### Carol Foreman, Deputy Secretary of Administration March 16, 2004

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee. I appreciate the opportunity to discuss with you House Bill 2671 proposed by the Department of Administration.

House Bill 2671 provides the option for the Secretary of Administration or future administrators, as well as private sector leaders, to require a payroll direct deposit program for all employees, if deemed to be in the best interest of the State or business. For the State, such a decision would allow for potential savings through the elimination of paper paychecks, printing and postage. A successful, voluntary direct deposit program is currently in place for State of Kansas employees, with participation levels at the highest since the program's inception, ranging from 85-88% or over 46,000 employees. Additionally, a Paycard program was implemented in October 2003 to allow an electronic salary and wage payment method for those employees without bank accounts. This program has a current enrollment of 55 employees.

This bill was previously heard before the House General Government and Commerce Budget Committee. Several committee members expressed concerns about aspects of the bill, particularly concerning private sector employers. The Department has considered those comments and offers an amendment to alleviate such concerns. The amendment allows direct deposit of pay without the written consent of the employee for any Kansas employer with 50 or more employees. This addresses the committee's concerns about small businesses perhaps taking advantage of employees, specifically one committee member's comments regarding the ability of a small employer of day-laborers to never truly make payment of wages to those without bank accounts.

Again, thank you for allowing me to appear before you today and for considering House Bill 2671 and the proposed amendment. I welcome the opportunity to respond to any questions you may have.

AN ACT concerning wage payment; relating to electronic deposit thereof; amending K.S.A. 44-314 and 75-5540 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

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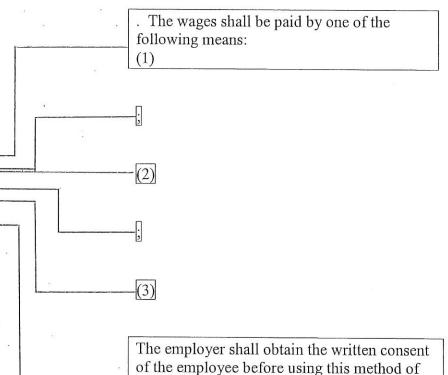
37 38 39 Section 1. K.S.A. 44-314 is hereby amended to read as follows: 44-314. (a) Every employer shall pay all wages due to the employees of the employer at least once during each calendar month, on regular paydays designated in advance by the employer in lawful money of the United States of with checks or drafts which are negotiable in the community wherein the place of employment is located or, with the written consent of the employee; by electronic deposit to an employee's account at a financial institution.

(b) The end of the pay period for which payment is made on a regular payday shall be not more than 15 days before such regular payday unless a variance in such requirement is authorized by state or federal law.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 75-5540 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-5540. As part of the system of payroll accounting formulated under K.S.A. 75-5501, and amendments thereto, the director of accounts and reports shall develop and authorize a payroll remittance plan which will allow the salaries and wages of state officers or employees to be deposited directly to the accounts of such officers or employees, in banks, savings and loan associations or credit unions. Such direct deposits shall be made only upon—the written—authorization—and—direction—of such state—officers—or employees:

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 44-314 and 75-5540 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

Terry Forsyth House Appropriations Committee March 16, 2004 **House Bill 2671** 

Mr. Chairman, members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to address the committee regarding **HB 2671**. My name is Terry Forsyth and I represent KNEA.

We stand opposed to the bill. This bill would allow an employer to directly deposit an employee's wages into a bank account without written authorization. We believe that this would be an unwarranted act on the part of the government into the lives of its citizens.

While many of us, myself included, use many of the programs available through electronic banking, we were not forced to do so by state statute, but rather by our own free choice. By removing employee authorization, **HB 2671** takes the choice away from the employee and gives it to the employer. The relationship that a person has with their financial institution is personal. Employees may not want their employer in this relationship.

While many of us now participate in some or all of the programs available through modern technology, to do so is a personal choice. How long did it take you to trust technology and purchase an item on line? It's not easy to hand over your credit card or bank account number for some electronic purpose. The reluctance to trust a new technology must be respected. People will move to technology as their comfort permits.

There are many people in Kansas who live from paycheck to paycheck in minimum wage jobs. They are not able to afford a bank account with all of the attached fees in order to maintain a zero account. The state should not require these people to open and maintain a bank account for the mere convenience of the employer.

We urge you to reject HB 2671.

#### House Bill No. 2748

#### **Brief**

HB 2748, as recommended, would transfer responsibility for the operations of the surplus property program for the state from the Department of Corrections to the Department of Administration. As a result of HB 2748, all fund balances for the program would be transferred to the Department of Administration. In addition, all rules and regulations currently in place would be continued until amended revised, revoked, or nullified, and all outstanding property would be transferred to the Department of Administration. The bill would also allow for the continuance of all legal action commenced by or against the parties affected by the transfer of responsibilities. Employees of the surplus property program as of the transfer date would be retained with all retirement benefits, leave balances, and rights preserved.

#### Background

The Director of the Division of Facilities Management of the Department of Administration and the Secretary of Corrections testified in support of the bill.

The fiscal note from the Division of the Budget indicates that HB 2748 would be fiscally neutral. The program is self funding and would continue to be operated by the Department of Administration.

#### House Bill No. 2749

#### **Brief**

HB 2749 expands the duties of the Statehouse Art and History Committee to include memorials on the grounds of the Capitol Complex. Currently there are two separate committees composed of similar membership but created by different statutes to address displays and memorials inside and outside of the Statehouse.

The bill designates the existing Statehouse Art and History Committee as the Statehouse Art, History, and Memorials Committee. The Committee would be composed of:

- the Secretary of Administration or the Secretary's designee;
- the Director of Legislative Administrative Services; and
- the Executive Director of the State Historical Society.

In addition to its current responsibilities, the Committee would be charged with reviewing each proposal for a memorial to be constructed or placed on the grounds of the Capitol and make recommendations regarding the memorials to the Capitol Area Plaza Authority.

Each proposal for a memorial on the grounds would be submitted to the Statehouse Art, History, and Memorials Committee, and before being adopted or rejected by the Committee, would be reviewed by the State Historic Preservation Officer and the Director of Facilities Management who would review and consider the proposal.

#### Background

The Director of the Division of Facilities Management of the Department of Administration testified in support of the bill.

The House Budget Committee on General Government and Commerce recommended amendments are technical in nature.

No fiscal note was available.

# **HOUSE BILL No. 2749**

AN ACT concerning the state capitol and surrounding areas; relating to memorials; amending K.S.A. 75-2266 and K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-36,104 and 75-36,105 and repealing the existing sections.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 75-2266 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-2266. (a) There is hereby established the statehouse art <del>and</del>, history and memorials committee. The committee shall consist of three members, as follows:

- (1) The secretary of administration or the secretary's designee;
- (2) the director of legislative administrative services; and
- (3) the executive director of the state historical society.
- (b) The secretary of administration or the secretary's designee shall serve as chairperson of the committee. The committee shall meet on call of the chairperson or at the request of a majority of the members of the committee.
  - (c) The committee shall:
- Develop a long-range plan for displays in the capitol to represent the art, history and culture of all Kansas citizens;
- (2) adopt procedures and criteria for evaluating and approving art work for display in the capitol, based on the excellence and aesthetics of the work and its representation of the multicultural art and history of the state;
- (3) adopt procedures and criteria for evaluating and approving removal of art work displayed in the capitol, based on the criteria specified in subsection (c)(2), and disposition and preservation of such art work;
- (4) adopt procedures and criteria for evaluating and approving special events and displays to be held in the capitol, based on the quality of the event or display and its relevance to the history and culture of Kansas citizens; and
- (5) adopt and implement procedures and criteria for the display, maintenance and preservation of art works in the capitol: and
- (6) review each proposal for a memorial to be constructed or placed on the grounds of the capitol and make recommendations to the capitol area plaza authority in accordance with K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-36.104 and

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- 75-36,105, and amendments thereto.
- (d) Requests for display of art works in the capitol shall be submitted to the secretary of administration or the secretary's designee. The secretary of administration or the secretary's designee, the director of legislative administrative services and the executive director of the state historical society shall evaluate and approve or disapprove those requests in accordance with the procedures and criteria adopted by the committee.
- (e) Requests for displays or special events in the capitol shall be submitted to the following for approval or disapproval in accordance with the procedures and criteria adopted by the committee:
- (1) The director of legislative administrative services, for displays or special events to be held in areas assigned to the legislature or to a legislative staff office, department or agency; and
- (2) the secretary of administration or the secretary's designee, for displays or special events to be held in other areas.
- Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-36,104 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-36,104. (a) The secretary of administration statehouse art, history and memorials committee shall review the historic structure report on the capitol and shall develop and maintain a preservation plan for the capitol grounds. In addition, the secretary of administration statehouse art, history and memorials committee shall develop guidelines and standards for memorials on the grounds of the capitol. All guidelines and standards for memorials on the grounds of the capitol shall be consistent with the statement of purpose and use for the capitol grounds and shall be designed to:
- (1) Ensure the subjects of memorials are of historic and lasting significance for Kausas;
- (2) ensure the design excellence of all memorials on the grounds of the capitol;
- (3) preserve, protect and enhance the limited amount of available space on the capitol grounds;
- (4) preserve and further the implementation of the long-range plan of development for the capitol area;
- (5) ensure that memorials proposed for the grounds of the capitol are appropriately planned, designed and sited and are reviewed, funded and constructed in a timely manner:
- (6) ensure that adequate and appropriate opportunities are provided for the involvement of or comment by interested members of the public throughout the development of the proposal for the memorial; and
- (7) ensure that individuals, groups and organizations have a clear understanding of the process that must be completed in order to propose and to have a memorial constructed or placed on the grounds of the capitol.

(a) No memorial shall be constructed or placed on the grounds of the capitol except in accordance with the procedures and subject to the conditions and limitations prescribed by this act. Each proposal for a memorial to be constructed or placed on the grounds of the capitol shall be consistent with the statement of purpose and use adopted for the grounds of the capitol and shall be subject to the guidelines and standards for memorials on the grounds of the capitol adopted by the capitol area plaza authority.
- (b) In addition to other requirements or provisions of law applicable thereto, each proposal for a memorial to be constructed or placed on the grounds of the capitol shall be submitted to the secretary of administration statehouse art, history and memorials committee for consideration in accordance with this act. Prior to being adopted or rejected by the secretary of administration statehouse art, history and memorials committee, each such proposal shall be submitted to and reviewed and considered by the following officials:
- -(1)—the state historic preservation officer of the state historical society: 27 and the director of facilities management of the department of administration; and
- (3)—the director of legislative administrative services.

#### House Bill No. 2752

#### **Brief**

Under current law, the Secretary of Administration must convene a negotiating committee to select a contractor for general construction services on a capital project for a state facility if the project is expected to cost more than \$500,000. HB 2752 raises the dollar amount to \$750,000. For engineering or land surveying services, the dollar threshold would be increased from \$250,000 to \$500,000.

Currently, the Department of Administration is authorized to charge fees of 1.0 percent of the approved budget of capital projects, by statute from the Educational Building Fund or the State Institutions Building Fund and by appropriations bill from all other funding sources. The Department can also charge 8.0 percent for in-house design architectural services on capital projects under authority included each year in the appropriations bill. HB 2752 establishes in statute a negotiating process for determining the appropriate fee for the services provided by the Department of Administration. All or part of the projects financed from private gifts, bequests, or donations would be excluded from the fees, because the services ordinarily provided by the Department of Administration could be provided by other firms in the case of these projects.

#### Background

The Director of the Division of Facilities Management of the Department of Administration and the Executive Director of the American Institute of Architects in Kansas (AIA Kansas) testified in support of the bill.

The fiscal note submitted by the Division of the Budget indicates that the fiscal effect of any new fee scale cannot be determined at this time, because the number and scope of approved projects is currently unknown. However, the in-house design section would be able to undertake projects of larger scope because of the higher design limits, thereby producing a slight increase in design fees that would be charged against a larger fee base. The Division of Facilities Management of the Department of Administration states that it would develop a fee schedule with the passage of HB 2752 for architectural, engineering, and project management services.

#### House Bill No. 2901

#### **Brief**

HB 2901, as amended, would require that, from the effective date of the bill, any public broadcasting facility receiving an equipment grant under the Kansas Public Broadcasting Council Act would file a lien assuring the state's reversionary interest in all equipment purchased with the grant. The lien would be subordinate to any priority lien granted to the United States government under provisions of the Public Telecommunications Act of 1992. The lien would be in effect for ten years from the date of the purchase of the equipment. The state would exercise the lien only in situations in which stations have used state grant funds to purchase equipment under the Kansas Public Broadcasting Council Act and then ceased broadcasting as a Kansas public television or Kansas public radio station. Current law allows stations that have discontinued service as a Kansas public television or Kansas public radio station to keep or dispose of equipment by the managing or sponsoring organization of the television or radio station.

#### Background

Representative Shriver testified in support of the bill, and offered an amendment suggested by the Public Broadcasting Council.

The bill as introduced did not give a priority lien to the federal government.

According to the fiscal note submitted by the Division of the Budget, HB 2901 would have a fiscal impact only if a public television or radio station closed operations and only to the extent that the state recouped any part of the value of property or equipment originally purchased with grant funds.

AN ACT concerning the Kansas public broadcasting council act; relating to grants to stations; prescribing certain restrictions on grant agreements; amending K.S.A. 75-4915 and repealing the existing section.

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Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 75-4915 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-4915. (a) Each eligible station shall certify to the secretary of administration, in such form and at such time as the secretary shall require, its nonfederal, nonlicensee financial support for the second prior fiscal year. Upon acceptance by the secretary of administration, such certification shall constitute the basis for grants provided under this act. The secretary of administration shall have the authority to ascertain that the amounts certified as nonfederal, nonlicensee financial support are accurate, audited and comparable in method of calculation.

- (b) Funds appropriated for allocation and distribution under this act shall be appropriated for fiscal years commencing on and after July 1, 1904, and shall be appropriated to the department of administration for distribution in accordance with this act. The provisions of the Kansus public broadcasting council act relating to appropriations, distributions, grants and expenditures of funds shall become effective with fiscal years commencing on and after July 1, 1994. The provisions of the Kansus public broadcasting council act relating to appropriations, distributions, grants and expenditures of funds shall not apply to appropriations, distributions, grants and expenditures of funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1994.
- (c) On and after the effective date of this act, each eligible station which is awarded a grant under the Kansas public broadcasting council act, shall as a condition precedent to receiving such grant, execute and record a final priority lien assuring the state government's recersionary interest in all equipment purchased for such eligible station, in such form and at such time as the secretary may require, if such eligible station ceases to be used as a Kansas public television station or a Kansas public radio station. The lien shall not be released except upon approval of the Kansas public broadcasting council, except that such lien shall be released ten years after the date the project for which the equipment was pur-

#### HB 2902

#### Brief

HB 2902 would add court-appointed guardians and conservators contracted by the Kansas Guardianship Program to the definition of "employee" in the Kansas Tort Claims Act (K.S.A. 75-6101 et seq). This expanded definition would allow the program guardians and conservators to be protected in cases of negligence or acts of omission, but not for cases of fraud of acts of malice.

The General Government Budget Committee, as approved by the House Committee, recommended introduction of this legislation to provide liability protection to the volunteers of the Kansas Guardianship Program and specifically cited its concern that liability issues may hinder the agency's volunteer recruitment efforts. As of June 30, 2003, approximately 825 volunteers were serving in the program.

#### Background

The agency testified in support of the bill, indicating that while no lawsuits have been filed, threats and innuendos have been heard throughout the years, and the concern exists for the agency's volunteer recruitment efforts and protection for its current volunteers. The Kansas Trial Lawyers Association appeared in the support of the bill, noting that the enhanced definition of "employee" is narrow for this group, allowing for protection within the scope of the volunteers' duties. In addition, the agency and association indicated that safeguards are in place, including supervision from the court, bond surety, and additional oversight including monitoring reports provided by the agency.

The Office of the Attorney General indicated that the bill could have the effect of increasing the volume of litigation in which the office defends the state and its employees. The Attorney General stated that additional salary costs, litigation expenses and other operating expenditures could occur under this expanded definition. The fiscal impact was not estimated, as no information exists on which to base a reliable estimate of additional expenditures. Any fiscal effect resulting from the enactment of HB 2902 would be in addition to the amounts contained in *The FY 2005 Governor's Budget Report*.

# House Agriculture and Natural Resources Budget Committee Recommendation on HB 2705

HB 2705 restores into law the annual transfer of \$6 million from the State General Fund to the State Water Plan Fund. During the 2002 Legislative Session, the transfer was reduced through the appropriations process; however, the language used in the bill inadvertently made permanent what was intended to be an amendment for one year. The Assistant Director of the Kansas Water Office appeared in favor of the bill.

The Budget Committee recommends this bill favorably for passage.

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#### **HOUSE BILL 2734**

#### **Brief**

House Bill 2734 amends provisions dealing with the tuition waiver for children in the foster care system. The bill would increase the number of new tuition waivers provided by an educational institution from three per year to five. In addition, Washburn University would be added to the list of participating educational institutions.

Current eligibility requirements require that the participant must have been in the foster care system on his or her 18<sup>th</sup> birthday and have graduated from high school or attained a general education development (GED) certificate while in foster care. Eligibility requirements for participation would be expanded to include:

- an individual who left the foster care system prior to his or her 18<sup>th</sup> birthday and graduated from high school or attained a GED certificate while in foster care; and
- an individual who was adopted out of the foster care system on or after the individual's 16<sup>th</sup> birthday.

A student would be eligible for the tuition waiver until the semester he or she turns 21 years old. Current law sets no such limit.

The bill would require that refunds when an eligible student discontinues attendance be returned to the original source of funding. If the original source is federal funding transferred from the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, the funding will be returned to the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. Refunds are currently credited to a tuition waiver reimbursement fund within the Board of Regents.

HB 2734 would require that the Board of Regents certify that 20 percent of the total amount required to pay the claims received from the educational institutions be in cash, in-kind contributions, State General Fund moneys, or non-federal funds not used to match other funds.

Annual expenditures of the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services for the tuition waiver program would be limited to no more than 30 percent of the amount of the total federal award. Current statute has no expenditure limitation. The bill would also require that the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services approve the eligibility of each candidate.

HB 2734 also would amend one of the eligibility criteria for the Workforce Development Loan Act by requiring that an individual seeking the foster care priority for receipt of loans be in the foster care system on his or her 18<sup>th</sup> birthday. Current statute allows the granting of priority status if the individual is in the foster care system prior to his or her 18<sup>th</sup> birthday.

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AN ACT concerning postsecondary education; relating to tuition waivers for foster care children, amending K.S.A. 74-32,161 and K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 74-32,151 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 74-32,151 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-32,151. (a) This section and K.S.A. 74-32,152 through 74-32,159, and amendments thereto, shall be known and may be cited as the workforce development loan program act.

- (b) As used in the workforce development loan act, "postsecondary educational institution" shall have the meaning ascribed thereto by K.S.A. 74-3201b, and amendments thereto.
- (c) Within the limits of appropriations and private contributions therefor, and in accordance with the provisions of this act, the state board of regents may award such loans to Kansas residents who are enrolled in or admitted to an area vocational technical school, technical college, community college, vocational school coordinated under the state board of regents or associate degree programs at postsecondary educational institutions and who enter into a written agreement with the state board of regents as provided in K.S.A. 74-32,152 and amendments thereto.
- (d) The board of regents may accept any private contributions to the program. The chief executive officer of the board of regents shall turn such contributions over to the state treasurer who shall deposit such moneys into the workforce development loan fund.
- (e) After consultation with the secretaries of the departments of human resources, social and rehabilitation services and commerce, the board may establish a list of education programs in which an applicant must enroll to be eligible for a loan under this program.
- (f) The loans shall be awarded on a priority basis to qualified applicants who have the greatest financial need with the highest priority given to those applicants with the greatest financial need who were in foster care on or before their 18th birthday or were released from foster care prior to their 18th birthday after having graduated from high school or completing the requirements for a general educational development (CED) certificate while in foster care. All loans shall be awarded to res-

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ident students attending area vocational technical schools, technical colleges, community colleges, area vocational schools or associate degree programs at postsecondary educational institutions. Special preference shall also be established for residents drawing unemployment compensation or such residents who were laid off from employment within the prior six months. The board may also establish preferences for workers deemed to be eligible for North American free trade agreement transition assistance under United States department of labor standards or the Kansas department of human resources standards.

(g) Loans awarded under this program shall be awarded on an annual basis and shall be in effect for one year unless otherwise terminated before the expiration of such period of time. Such loans shall be awarded for the payment of tuition, fees, books, room and board and any other necessary school related expenses.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 74-32,161 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-32,161. (a) As used in this section:

(1) "Kansas educational institution" means and includes area vocational schools, area vocational-technical schools, community colleges, state educational institutions, Washburn university of Topeka and technical colleges.

(2) "State board" means the state board of regents.

Subject to appropriations therefor and except as otherwise provided by this section, every Kansas educational institution shall provide for enrollment without charge of tuition, undergraduate fees, including registration, matriculation and laboratory fees for any eligible applicant. No Kansas educational institution shall be required by this section to provide for the enrollment of more than three five new applicants in any academic year. An applicant who was in the custody of social and rehabilitation services on the date such applicant reached 18 years of age, who has graduated from a high school or fulfilled the requirements for a general educational development (GED) certificate while in foster care, was released from the custody of the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services prior to age 18 after having graduated from a high school or fulfilled the requirements for a general educational development (CED) certificate while in foster care placement and in the custody of the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services, or an applicant who was adopted from a foster care placement on or after such applicant's 16th birthday, and who is accepted to a Kansas educational institution within two years following the date such applicant graduated from a high school or fulfilled the requirements for a general educational development (CED) certificate shall be eligible for enrollment at a Kansas educational institution without charge of tuition or such fees through the semester the eligible applicant reaches 21 years of age not to exceed eight

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semesters of undergraduate instruction, or the equivalent thereof, at all such institutions.

- (c) Subject to appropriations therefor, any Kansas educational institution which at the time of enrollment did not charge tuition or fees as prescribed by subsection (b), and amendments thereto, of the eligible applicant may file a claim with the state board for reimbursement of the amount of such tuition and fees. The state board shall be responsible for payment of reimbursements to Kansas educational institutions upon certification by each such institution of the amount of reimbursement to which the educational institution is entitled. Such payments to Kansas educational institutions shall be made upon vouchers approved by the state board and upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports. Payments may be made by issuance of a single warrant to each Kansas educational institution at which one or more eligible applicants are enrolled for the total amount of tuition and fees not charged eligible applicants for enrollment at that institution. The director of accounts and reports shall cause such warrant to be delivered to the Kansas educational institution at which such eligible applicant or applicants are enrolled. If an eligible applicant discontinues attendance before the end of any semester, after the Kansas educational institution has received payment under this subsection, the institution shall pay to the state the entire amount which such eligible applicant would otherwise qualify to have refunded, not to exceed the amount of the payment made by the state on behalf of such applicant for the semester. All amounts paid to the state by Kansas educational institutions under this subsection shall be deposited in the state treasury and credited to the tuition waiver gifts, grants and reimbursements fund unless such amount was from federal funds transferred under the authority of subsection (g) which funds shall be returned to the director of accounts and reports for reposit to the originating federal funding source.
- (d) The chief executive officer of the state board shall submit a report to the house and senate committees on education during the  $\frac{2004}{2005}$  and  $\frac{2006}{2007}$  regular session of the legislature on the results, outcomes and effectiveness of the tuition waiver program authorized by this section.
- (e) The state board is authorized to receive any grants, gifts, contributions or bequests made for the purpose of supporting the tuition waiver program authorized by this section and to expend the same.
- (f) There is hereby established in the state treasury the tuition waiver gifts, grants and reimbursements fund. Expenditures from the fund may be made for the purpose of payment of claims of Kansas educational institutions pursuant to this section and for such purposes as may be specified with regard to any grant, gift, contribution or bequest. All such expenditures shall be authorized by the chief executive officer of the state

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board, or such officer's designee and made upon warrants of the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved by the chief executive officer of the state board, or such officer's designee.

(g) During each year, the chief executive officer of the state board shall make one or more certifications of the amount or amounts required to pay claims received from Kansas educational institutions for tuition and fees under this section to the director of accounts and reports and the secretary of social and rehabilitation services. Each certification made by the chief executive officer shall include a provision stating that 20% of the total amount or amounts required to pay claims received from Kansas educational institutions for tuition and fees under this section are either cash, in-kind contributions, state general funds or other non-federal sources not used to match other funds, and that the remaining 80% shall be paid from the federal award from the foster care assistance federal fund. Upon receipt of each such certification, the director of accounts shall transfer the amount certified from moneys received under the federal Chafee foster care independence grant and credited to the foster care assistance federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the tuition waiver gifts, grants and reimbursements fund of the state board. Annual expenditures for the tuition waiver program made by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services shall not exceed a maximum of more than 30% of the amount of the federal award in effect on July 1 of each state fiscal year.

(h) On or before the 10th of each month, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer from the state general fund to the tuition waiver

gifts and grants fund interest earnings based on:

(1) The average daily balance of moneys in the tuition waiver gifts and grants fund for the preceding month; and

the net earnings rate for the pooled money investment portfolio for the preceding month.

(i) Applicants eligible for the benefits under this section shall be exempt from the provisions of K.S.A. 76-717, and amendments thereto.

(j) The state board shall adopt rules and regulations requiring eligible applicants to be enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student in good academic standing and to maintain part-time employment to remain eligible and other rules and regulations, as appropriate, for administration of the applicable provisions of this section and shall determine the cligibility of applicants for the benefits provided under this section. When there is a candidate that appears to meet the eligibility guidelines for federal Chafee funding administered by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services, the state board shall notify the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services. The Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services shall notify the state board of approval of the candidate's eligibility.

(k) The provisions of this section shall expire on June 30, 2006, except that any eligible applicant who received a tuition waiver before June 30, 2006, and is deemed by the state board to be eligible pursuant to this section shall be allowed to remain eligible until such applicant completes such applicant's course of study or becomes ineligible pursuant to the provisions of this section.

Sec. 9. K.S.A. 74-32,161 and K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 74-32,151 are

hereby repealed.

Sec. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

New Sec. 3. (a) State educational institutions under the control and supervision of the state board of regents shall provide a waiver of all tuition and fees required as a condition of enrollment for each person who was a prisoner of war while serving in any military service of the United States of America, who is a resident of Kansas, and who is enrolled at a state educational institution. The waiver shall be provided for not more than 12 semesters of instruction, or the equivalent thereof.

(b) Prior to providing this waiver, each state educational institution shall require each person applying for this waiver to provide official documentation verifying the person's military service and prisoner of war status.

(c) As used in this section: (1) "Military service" means any active service in any armed service of the United States and any active federal service in the Kansas army or air national guard;

(2) "prisoner of war" means a person who was a prisoner of war under Article 4 of the third Geneva Convention and any individual who was in military service in an armed conflict and who was taken prisoner by opposing forces, whether or not under an official declaration of war; and

(3) "resident of Kansas" means a person who is determined by the state educational institution to be a resident for tuition purposes.

AN ACT concerning medical assistance; concerning the repayment thereof; creating and imposing a lien on real property of certain recipients of medical assistance; making certain transfers of property voidable; amending K.S.A. 39-709 and repealing the existing section.

# Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section. 1. K.S.A. 39-709 is hereby amended to read as follows: 39-709. (a) General eligibility requirements for assistance for which federal moneys are expended. Subject to the additional requirements below, assistance in accordance with plans under which federal moneys are expended may be granted to any needy person who:

(1) Has insufficient income or resources to provide a reasonable subsistence compatible with decency and health. Where husband and wife are living together, the combined income or resources of both shall be considered in determining the eligibility of either or both for such assistance unless otherwise prohibited by law. The secretary, in determining need of any applicant for or recipient of assistance shall not take into account the financial responsibility of any individual for any applicant or recipient of assistance unless such applicant or recipient is such individual's spouse or such individual's minor child or minor stepchild if the stepchild is living with such The secretary in determining need of an individual individual. may provide such income and resource exemptions as may be permitted by federal law. For purposes of eligibility for aid for families with dependent children, for food stamp assistance and for any other assistance provided through the department of social and rehabilitation services under which federal moneys are expended, the secretary of social and rehabilitation services shall consider one motor vehicle owned by the applicant assistance, regardless of the value of such vehicle, as exempt personal property and shall consider any equity in any additional motor vehicle owned by the applicant for assistance to be a nonexempt resource of the applicant for assistance.

- (c) Aid to families with dependent children; assignment of support rights and limited power of attorney. By applying for or receiving aid to families with dependent children such applicant or recipient shall be deemed to have assigned to the secretary on behalf of the state any accrued, present or future rights to support from any other person such applicant may have in such person's own behalf or in behalf of any other family member for whom the applicant is applying for or receiving aid. In any case in which an order for child support has been established and the legal custodian and obligee under the order surrenders physical custody of the child to a caretaker relative without obtaining a modification of legal custody and support rights on behalf of the child are assigned pursuant to this section, the surrender of physical custody and the assignment shall transfer, by operation of law, the child's support rights under the order to the secretary on behalf of the state. Such assignment shall be of all accrued, present or future rights to support of the child surrendered to the caretaker relative. The assignment of support rights shall automatically become effective upon the date of approval for or receipt of such aid without the requirement that any document be signed by the applicant, recipient or obligee. By

applying for or receiving aid to families with dependent children, or by surrendering physical custody of a child to a caretaker relative who is an applicant or recipient of such assistance on the child's behalf, the applicant, recipient or obligee is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective from the date the secretary approves the application for aid and shall remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated in full.

- (d) Eligibility requirements for general assistance, the cost of which is not shared by the federal government. (1) General assistance may be granted to eligible persons who do not qualify for financial assistance in a program in which the federal government participates and who satisfy the additional requirements prescribed by or under this subsection (d).
- (A) To qualify for general assistance in any form a needy person must have insufficient income or resources to provide a reasonable subsistence compatible with decency and health and, except as provided for transitional assistance, be a member of a family in which a minor child or a pregnant woman resides or be unable to engage in employment. The secretary shall adopt rules and regulations prescribing criteria for establishing when a minor child may be considered to be living with a family and whether a person is able to engage in employment, including such factors as age or physical or mental condition. Eligibility for general assistance, other than transitional assistance, is limited to families in which a minor child or a pregnant woman resides or to an adult or family in which all legally responsible family members are unable to engage in employment. Where a husband and wife are living together the combined income or

resources of both shall be considered in determining the eligibility of either or both for such assistance unless otherwise prohibited by law. The secretary in determining need of any applicant for or recipient of general assistance shall not take into account the financial responsibility of any individual for any applicant or recipient of general assistance unless such applicant or recipient is such individual's spouse or such individual's minor child or a minor stepchild if the stepchild is living with such individual. In determining the need of an individual, the secretary may provide for income and resource exemptions.

- (B) To qualify for general assistance in any form a needy person must be a citizen of the United States or an alien lawfully admitted to the United States and must be residing in the state of Kansas.
- (2) General assistance in the form of transitional assistance may be granted to eligible persons who do not qualify for financial assistance in a program in which the federal government participates and who satisfy the additional requirements prescribed by or under this subsection (d), but who do not meet the criteria prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary relating to inability to engage in employment or are not a member of a family in which a minor or a pregnant woman resides.
- (3) In addition to the other requirements prescribed under this subsection (d), the secretary shall adopt rules and regulations which establish community work experience program requirements for eligibility for the receipt of general assistance in any form and which establish penalties to be imposed when a work assignment under a community work experience program requirement is not completed without good cause. The secretary may adopt rules and regulations establishing exemptions from any such community work experience program requirements. A first time failure to complete such a work assignment requirement shall result in ineligibility to receive general assistance for a

period fixed by such rules and regulations of not more than three calendar months. A subsequent failure to complete such a work assignment requirement shall result in a period fixed by such rules and regulations of ineligibility of not more than six calendar months.

- (4) If any person is found guilty of the crime of theft under the provisions of K.S.A. 39-720, and amendments thereto, such person shall thereby become forever ineligible to receive any form of general assistance under the provisions of this subsection (d) unless the conviction is the person's first conviction under the provisions of K.S.A. 39-720, and amendments thereto, or the law of any other state concerning welfare fraud. First time offenders convicted of a misdemeanor under the provisions of such statute shall become ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for a period of 12 calendar months from the date of conviction. First time offenders convicted of a felony under the provisions of such statute shall become ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for a period of 60 calendar months from the date of conviction. If any person is found guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction of any state other than the state of Kansas of a crime involving welfare fraud, such person shall thereby become forever ineligible to receive any form of general assistance under the provisions of this subsection (d) unless the conviction is the person's first conviction under the law of any other state concerning welfare fraud. First time offenders convicted of a misdemeanor under the law of any other state concerning welfare fraud shall become ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for a period of 12 calendar months from the date of conviction. First time offenders convicted of a felony under the law of any other state concerning welfare fraud shall become ineligible to receive any form of general assistance for a period of 60 calendar months from the date of conviction.
- (e) Requirements for medical assistance for which federal moneys or state moneys or both are expended. (1) When the

secretary has adopted a medical care plan under which federal moneys or state moneys or both are expended, medical assistance in accordance with such plan shall be granted to any person who is a citizen of the United States or who is an alien lawfully admitted to the United States and who is residing in the state of Kansas, whose resources and income do not exceed the levels prescribed by the secretary. In determining the need of an individual, the secretary may provide for income and resource exemptions and protected income and resource levels. Resources from inheritance shall be counted. A disclaimer of an inheritance pursuant to K.S.A. 59-2291, and amendments thereto, shall constitute a transfer of resources. The secretary shall exempt principal and interest held in irrevocable trust pursuant to subsection (c) of K.S.A. 16-303, and amendments thereto, from the eligibility requirements of applicants for and recipients of medical assistance. Such assistance shall be known as medical assistance.

- (2) For the purposes of medical assistance eligibility determinations on or after July 1, 2004, if an applicant or recipient owns property in joint tenancy with some other party and the applicant or recipient of medical assistance has restricted or conditioned their interest in such property to a specific and discrete property interest less than 100%, then such designation will cause the full value of the property to be considered an available resource to the applicant or recipient.
- (3) Resources from trusts shall be considered when determining eligibility of a trust beneficiary for medical assistance. Medical assistance is to be secondary to all resources, including trusts, that may be available to an applicant or recipient of medical assistance. If a trust has discretionary language, the trust shall be considered to be an available resource to the extent, using the full extent of discretion, the trustee may make any of the income or principal available to the applicant or recipient of medical assistance. Any such discretionary trust shall be considered an available

resource unless: (1) The trust is funded exclusively from resources of a person who, at the time of creation of the trust, owed no duty of support to the applicant or recipient; and (2) the trust contains specific contemporaneous language that states an intent that the trust be supplemental to public assistance and the trust makes specific reference to medicaid, medical assistance or title XIX of the social security act.

- (4) (A) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party to a contract, agreement or accord for personal services being provided by a nonlicensed individual or provider and such contract, agreement or accord involves health and welfare monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case management, communication with medical, health or other professionals, or other activities related to home health care, long term care, medical assistance benefits, or other related issues, any moneys paid under such contract, agreement or accord shall be considered to be an available resource unless the following restrictions are met: (i) The contract, agreement or accord must be in writing and executed prior to any services being provided; (ii) the moneys paid are in direct relationship with the fair market value of such services being provided by similarly situated and trained nonlicensed individuals; (iii) if no similarly situated nonlicensed individuals or situations can be found, the value of services will be based on federal hourly minimum wage standards; (iv) such individual providing the services will report all receipts of moneys as income to the appropriate state and federal governmental revenue agencies; (v) any amounts due under such contract, agreement or accord shall be paid after the services are rendered; (vi) the applicant or recipient shall have the power to revoke the contract, agreement or accord; and (vii) upon the death of the applicant or recipient, the contract, agreement or accord ceases.
- (B) When an applicant or recipient of medical assistance is a party to a written contract for personal services being provided by a licensed health professional or facility and such

contract involves health and welfare monitoring, pharmacy assistance, case management, communication with medical, health or other professionals, or other activities related to home health care, long term care, medical assistance benefits or other related issues, any moneys paid in advance of receipt of services for such contracts shall be considered to be an available resource.

- (f) Eligibility for medical assistance of resident receiving medical care outside state. A person who is receiving medical care including long-term care outside of Kansas whose health would be endangered by the postponement of medical care until return to the state or by travel to return to Kansas, may be determined eligible for medical assistance if such individual is a resident of Kansas and all other eligibility factors are met. Persons who are receiving medical care on an ongoing basis in a long-term medical care facility in a state other than Kansas and who do not return to a care facility in Kansas when they are able to do so, shall no longer be eligible to receive assistance in Kansas unless such medical care is not available in a comparable facility or program providing such medical care in Kansas. persons who are minors or who are under guardianship, the actions of the parent or guardian shall be deemed to be the actions of the child or ward in determining whether or not the person is remaining outside the state voluntarily.
- support and limited power of attorney; recovery from estates of deceased recipients. (1) Except as otherwise provided in K.S.A. 39-786 and 39-787, and amendments thereto, or as otherwise authorized on and after September 30, 1989, under section 303 and amendments thereto of the federal medicare catastrophic coverage act of 1988, whichever is applicable, by applying for or receiving medical assistance under a medical care plan in which federal funds are expended, any accrued, present or future rights to support and any rights to payment for medical care from a third party of an applicant or recipient and any other family

member for whom the applicant is applying shall be deemed to have been assigned to the secretary on behalf of the state. The assignment shall automatically become effective upon the date of approval for such assistance without the requirement that any document be signed by the applicant or recipient. By applying for or receiving medical assistance the applicant or recipient is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other negotiable instruments, representing payments received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective from the date the secretary approves the application for assistance and shall remain in effect until the assignment has been terminated in full. The assignment of any rights to payment for medical care from a third party under this subsection shall not prohibit a health care provider from directly billing an insurance carrier for services rendered if the provider has not submitted a claim covering such services to the secretary for payment. Support amounts collected on behalf of persons whose rights to support are assigned to the secretary only under this subsection and no other shall be distributed pursuant to subsection (d) of K.S.A. 39-756, and amendments thereto, except that any amounts designated as medical support shall be retained by the secretary for repayment of the unreimbursed portion of assistance. Amounts collected pursuant to the assignment of rights to payment for medical care from a third party shall also be retained by the secretary for repayment of the unreimbursed portion of assistance.

(2) The amount of any medical assistance paid after June 30, 1992, under the provisions of subsection (e) is (A) a claim against the property or any interest therein belonging to and a part of the estate of any deceased recipient or, if there is no estate, the estate of the surviving spouse, if any, shall be charged for such medical assistance paid to either or both, and

- (B) a claim against any funds of such recipient or spouse in any account under K.S.A. 9-1215, 9-1216, 17-2263, 17-2264, 17-5828 or 17-5829, and amendments thereto. There shall be no recovery of medical assistance correctly paid to or on behalf of individual under subsection (e) except after the death of the surviving spouse of the individual, if any, and only at a time when the individual has no surviving child who is under 21 years of age or is blind or permanently and totally disabled. Transfers of real or personal property by recipients of medical assistance without adequate consideration are voidable and may be set aside. Except where there is a surviving spouse, or a surviving child who is under 21 years of age or is blind or permanently and totally disabled, the amount of any medical assistance paid under subsection (e) is a claim against the estate in any guardianship or conservatorship proceeding. The monetary value of any benefits received by the recipient of such medical assistance under long-term care insurance, as defined by K.S.A. 40-2227, and amendments thereto, shall be a credit against the amount of the claim provided for such medical assistance under this subsection (g). The secretary is authorized to enforce each claim provided for under this subsection (g). The secretary shall not be required to pursue every claim, but is granted discretion to determine which claims to pursue. All moneys received by the secretary from claims under this subsection (g) shall deposited in the social welfare fund. The secretary may adopt rules and regulations for the implementation and administration of the medical assistance recovery program under this subsection (g).
- (3) By applying for or receiving medical assistance under the provisions of article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, such individual or such individual's agent, fiduciary, guardian conservator, representative payee or other person acting on behalf of the individual consents to the following definitions of estate and the results therefrom:
  - (A) If an individual receives any medical assistance before

- July 1, 2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, which forms the basis for a claim under subsection (g)(2), such claim is limited to the individual's probatable estate as defined by applicable law; and
- (B) if an individual receives any medical assistance on or after July 1, 2004, pursuant to article 7 of chapter 39 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, which forms the basis for a claim under subsection (g)(2), such claim shall apply to the individual's medical assistance estate. The medical assistance estate is defined as including all real and personal property and other assets in which the deceased individual had any legal title or interest at the time of death including assets conveyed to a survivor, heir or assign of the deceased individual through joint tenancy, tenancy in common, survivorship, transfer-on-death deed, payable-on-death contract, life estate, trust, annuities or similar arrangement.
- (4) The secretary of social and rehabilitation services or the secretary's designee is authorized to file and enforce a lien against the real property of a recipient of medical assistance in certain situations, subject to all prior liens of record. The lien must be filed in the office of the register of deeds of the county where the real property is located and must contain the legal description of all real property in the county subject to the lien. This lien is for payments of medical assistance made by the department of social and rehabilitation services to the recipient who is an inpatient in a nursing home or other medical institution. Such lien may be filed only after notice and an opportunity for a hearing has been given. Such lien may be enforced only upon competent medical testimony that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be discharged and returned home. A six-month period of compensated inpatient care at a nursing home, nursing homes or other medical institution shall constitute a determination by the department of social and rehabilitation services that the recipient cannot reasonably be expected to be discharged and returned home. To return home means the recipient

leaves the nursing or medical facility and resides in the home on which the lien has been placed for a period of at least 90 days without being readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or medical facility. The amount of the lien shall be for the amount of assistance paid by the department of social and rehabilitation services after the expiration of six months from the date the recipient became eligible for compensated inpatient care at a nursing home, nursing homes or other medical institution until the time of the filing of the lien and for any amount paid thereafter for such medical assistance to the recipient.

- designee for medical assistance correctly received may be enforced before or after the death of the recipient by the filing of an action to foreclose such lien in the Kansas district court or through an estate probate court action in the county where the real property of the recipient is located. However, it may be enforced only:
- (A) After the death of the surviving spouse of the recipient;
- (B) when there is no child of the recipient, natural or adopted, who is 20 years of age or less residing in the home;
- (C) when there is no adult child of the recipient, natural or adopted, who is blind or disabled residing in the home; or
- (D) when no brother or sister of the recipient is lawfully residing in the home, who has resided there for at least one year immediately before the date of the recipient's admission to the nursing or medical facility, and has resided there on a continuous basis since that time.
- (6) The lien remains on the property even after a transfer of the title by conveyance, sale, succession, inheritance or will unless one of the following events occur:
- (A) The lien is satisfied. The recipient, the heirs, personal representative or assigns of the recipient may discharge such lien at any time by paying the amount of the lien to the secretary or the secretary's designee;

- (B) The lien is terminated by foreclosure of prior lien of record;
- (C) the value of the real property is consumed by the lien, at which time the secretary or the secretary's designee may force the sale for the real property to satisfy the lien; or
- (D) after a lien is filed against the real property, it will be dissolved if the recipient leaves the nursing or medical facility and resides in the property to which the lien is attached for a period of more than 90 days without being readmitted as an inpatient to a nursing or medical facility, even though there may have been no reasonable expectation that this would occur. If the recipient is readmitted to a nursing or medical facility during this period, and does return home after being released, another 90 days must be completed before the lien can be dissolved.
- or the secretary's designee has not filed an action to foreclose the lien in the Kansas district court in the county where the real property is located within 10 years from the date of the filing of the lien, then the lien shall become dormant, and shall cease to operate as a lien on the real estate of the recipient. Such dormant lien may be revived in the same manner as a dormant judgment lien is revived under K.S.A. 60-2403 et seq., and amendments thereto.
- (h) Placement under code for care of children or juvenile offenders code; assignment of support rights and limited power of attorney. In any case in which the secretary of social and rehabilitation services pays for the expenses of care and custody of a child pursuant to K.S.A. 38-1501 et seq. or 38-1601 et seq., and amendments thereto, including the expenses of any foster care placement, an assignment of all past, present and future support rights of the child in custody possessed by either parent or other person entitled to receive support payments for the child is, by operation of law, conveyed to the secretary. Such assignment shall become effective upon placement of a child in

the custody of the secretary or upon payment of the expenses of care and custody of a child by the secretary without the requirement that any document be signed by the parent or other person entitled to receive support payments for the child. When the secretary pays for the expenses of care and custody of a child or a child is placed in the custody of the secretary, the parent or other person entitled to receive support payments for the child is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as attorney in fact to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other negotiable instruments representing support payments received by the secretary on behalf of the child. This limited power of attorney shall be effective from the date the assignment to support rights becomes effective and shall remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated in full.

- (i) No person who voluntarily quits employment or who is fired from employment due to gross misconduct as defined by rules and regulations of the secretary or who is a fugitive from justice by reason of a felony conviction or charge shall be eligible to receive public assistance benefits in this state. Any recipient of public assistance who fails to timely comply with monthly reporting requirements under criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary shall be subject to a penalty established by the secretary by rules and regulations.
- (j) If the applicant or recipient of aid to families with dependent children is a mother of the dependent child, as a condition of the mother's eligibility for aid to families with dependent children the mother shall identify by name and, if known, by current address the father of the dependent child except that the secretary may adopt by rules and regulations exceptions to this requirement in cases of undue hardship. Any recipient of aid to families with dependent children who fails to cooperate with requirements relating to child support enforcement

under criteria and guidelines prescribed by rules and regulations of the secretary shall be subject to a penalty established by the secretary by rules and regulations which penalty shall progress to ineligibility for the family after three months of noncooperation.

(k) By applying for or receiving child care benefits or food stamps, the applicant or recipient shall be deemed to have assigned, pursuant to K.S.A. 39-756 and amendments thereto, to the secretary on behalf of the state only accrued, present or future rights to support from any other person such applicant may have in such person's own behalf or in behalf of any other family member for whom the applicant is applying for or receiving aid. The assignment of support rights shall automatically become effective upon the date of approval for or receipt of such aid without the requirement that any document be signed by the applicant or recipient. By applying for or receiving child care benefits or food stamps, the applicant or recipient is also deemed to have appointed the secretary, or the secretary's designee, as an attorney in fact to perform the specific act of negotiating and endorsing all drafts, checks, money orders or other negotiable instruments representing support received by the secretary in behalf of any person applying for, receiving or having received such assistance. This limited power of attorney shall be effective from the date the secretary approves the application for aid and shall remain in effect until the assignment of support rights has been terminated in full. applicant or recipient who has assigned support rights to the secretary pursuant to this subsection shall cooperate establishing and enforcing support obligations to the same extent required of applicants for or recipients of aid to families with dependent children.

New Sec. 2. On or before the first day of each regular session of the legislature, the secretary shall prepare and submit to the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives a report of the total amount of moneys

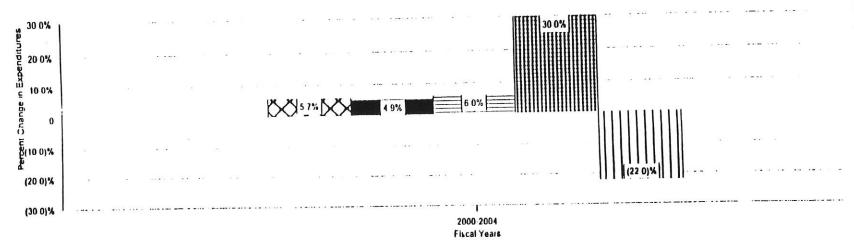
expended by the department for medical assistance, the amount of moneys recovered pursuant to subsection (g) of K.S.A. 39-709, and amendments thereto, and any recommendations for legislation necessary to insure that the factors or methods used to determine eligibility for medical assistance more accurately represent the resources of an applicant for, or recipient of, medical assistance.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 39-709 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

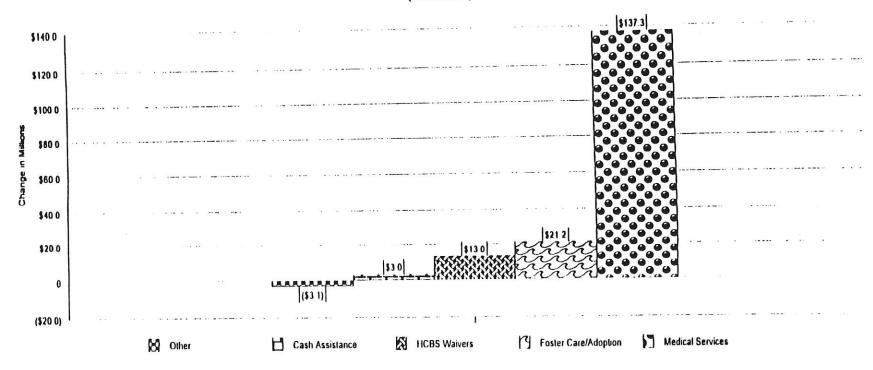

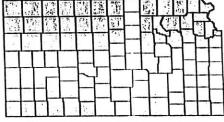

#### By Committee on Appropriations

AN ACT concerning the governor's budget report; excluding certain transfers from special revenue funds to state general fund; amending K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-3721 and repealing the existing section.

#### Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-3721 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-3721. (a) On or before the eighth calendar day of each regular legislative session, the governor shall submit the budget report to the legislature, except that in the case of the regular legislative session immediately following the election of a governor who was elected to the office of governor for the first time, that governor shall submit the budget report to the legislature on or before the 21st calendar day of that regular legislative session.

- (b) The budget report of the governor shall be set up in three parts, the nature and contents of which shall include the following:
- (1) Part one shall consist of a budget message by such governor, including the governor's recommendations with reference to the fiscal policy of the state government for the current fiscal year and the ensuing fiscal year, describing the important features of the budget plan for each of the fiscal years included, embracing a general budget summary setting forth the aggregate figures of the budget so as to show the balanced relation between the total proposed expenditures and the total anticipated income for the current fiscal year and the ensuing fiscal year, with the basis and factors upon which the estimates were made, and the means of financing the budget plan for the included, compared with the each of the fiscal years corresponding figures for at least the last completed fiscal year, and the director of the budget shall prepare the figures for the governor for such comparisons.
- (A) The budget plan shall not include (i) any proposed expenditures of anticipated income attributable to proposed legislation that would provide additional revenues from either

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current or new sources of revenue, of (ii) any proposed expenditures of moneys in the ending balance in the state general fund required by K.S.A. 75-6702, and amendments thereto, or (iii) any transfer, including any authorization or direction to transfer, of any moneys from any special revenue fund to the state general fund if existing law does not provide for moneys in such special revenue fund to be transferred.

- (B) The general budget summary may be supported by explanatory schedules or statements, classifying the expenditures contained therein by state agencies, objects, and funds, and the income by state agencies, funds, sources and types. The general budget summary shall include all special or fee funds as well as the state general fund, and shall include the estimated amounts of federal aids, for whatever purpose provided, together with estimated expenditures therefrom.
- (2) Part two shall embrace the detailed budget estimates for each of the fiscal years included, both of expenditures and revenues, showing the requests of the state agencies, if any, and the incoming governor's recommendations thereon. It shall also include statements of the bonded indebtedness of the state, showing the actual amount of the debt service for at least the last completed fiscal year, and the estimated amount for the current fiscal year and for each of the ensuing fiscal years included, the debt authorized and unissued, and the condition of the sinking funds.
- (3) Part three shall consist of a draft of a legislative measure or measures reflecting the incoming governor's budget for all of the fiscal years included in the budget report.
- (c) The division of the budget shall compile a children's budget document consisting of the information contained in agency budget estimates regarding programs that provide services for children and their families. Such document shall be provided to the Kansas commission on children, youth and families, established by the governor's executive order number 91-145, and other persons or entities on request.

- (d) The division of the budget, upon request, shall furnish the governor or the legislature with any further information required concerning the budget.
- (e) Nothing in this section shall be construed to restrict or limit the privilege of the governor to present supplemental budget messages or amendments to previous budget messages, which may include proposals for expenditure of new or increased sources of revenue derived from proposed legislation or transfers from special revenue funds to the state general fund that are not provided for in existing law.
- (f) The budget estimate for the judicial branch of state government as submitted to the director of the budget pursuant to K.S.A. 20-158, and amendments thereto, shall be included in the governor's budget report.
  - Sec. 2. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 75-3721 is hereby repealed.
- Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

#### **Department of Administration**

The House Committee asked the Joint Committee on State Building Construction to review the issue of using the state building funds to pay insurance costs. The Joint Committee looked at the issue, and its finding that this was an appropriate use of the funding was reflected in the House Capital Improvements report.

#### **Board of Regents**

The supplemental bill needs to include expenditure authority for the Other Federal Grants Fund including a proviso limiting use of the fund to grants less than \$750,000 which do not require a state match. The fund and proviso were included in the Mega Bill, but was inadvertently omitted from the Supplemental Bill.

#### **Additional Items for Senate Committee Consideration**

#### **Department of Administration**

The Senate Subcommittee on the Department of Administration recommended reconsidering the issue of utilizing building funds to pay insurance costs at Omnibus. The Senate Capital Improvements Committee concurred with the Governor's recommendation to use the funds in that manner. (An interim study on the issue was also requested.)

#### Department on Aging/Department of Human Resources/Department of Commerce

The Senate Subcommittee on Aging, as approved by Senate Committee, recommended the transfer of two senior employment programs, the Older Kansans Employment Program (OKEP) and Senior Community Services Employment Program (SCSEP) to the Department on Aging. No SGF was recommended by the Governor in FY 2005 for OKEP, so the funding of this program remains unresolved and was flagged for Omnibus consideration. The Senate subcommittee on Human Resources, as approved by Senate Committee, recommended funding OKEP with SGF in the KDHR budget. In addition, ERO 31, which was set to go into effect on March 14, moves the two senior employment programs to the Department of Commerce.

#### **Department of Agriculture**

Did not consider GBA No. 1, Item 12, which adjusts the salary plan

#### **Animal Health Department**

Did not consider GBA No. 1, Item 13, which corrects FTE limitation

#### **Board of Regents**

The supplemental bill needs to include expenditure authority for the Other Federal Grants Fund including a proviso limiting use of the fund to grants less than \$750,000 which do not require a state match. The fund and proviso were included in the Mega Bill, but was inadvertently omitted from the Supplemental Bill.

#### Department of Wildlife and Parks

The Senate Capital Improvements Subcommittee recommended deleted \$440,491 in funding for Circle K Ranch. The Senate Subcommittee on the budget left the funding in the budget.
