MINUTES OF THE HOUSE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Kenny Wilk at 3:30 p.m. on February 12, 2004, in Room 526-S of the Capitol.

Chairman Wilk opened the meeting of the House Economic Development Committee February 12, 2004, at 3:30 p.m. The Chair announced that it was the intent to work HB 2647 in committee next Tuesday, February 17, 2004. He requested committee members who have amendments to please have a balloon, if possible. The Chair also said he knew of at least two or three balloons and some technical changes and cleanup.

The Chair asked Ms. Sparks if she had brought her fighting gloves for the briefing on **HB 2713**.

HB 2713 - Establishing a boxing commissioner, athletic commission, athletic fee fund, licensing, procedures for complaints

Ms. Sparks briefed the committee and the Chair then opened the Public Hearing on HB 2713. The Chair welcomed Representative Burroughs who spoke as a proponent and said the bill would eliminate a state law giving local governments licensing control over prize fighting, boxing sparring, and mixed martial arts. Instead, the industry participants would be licensed by a boxing commission and/or commissioner. This would establish uniform guidelines for promoting and conducting professional bouts in Kansas. He gave a brief history of how the Kansas Athletic Commission was abolished in June, 1980 because Legislative Post Audit thought there were too few boxing events in Kansas. Legislative Post Audit thought there were not enough tax receipts for boxing to support the operation of a regulatory agency. However, the audit found that there was a definite need for some type of regulation. Rep. Burroughs said that Kansas has a rich boxing history and should join the majority of other states who provide an opportunity for their athletes to fight in their home state. (Attachment 1)

Chairman Wilk thanked Rep. Burroughs and asked him to introduce the conferees. Rep. Burroughs gave an overview of the presenters and then introduced Mr. Tim Lueckenhoff, President, Association of Boxing Commission and Missouri Boxing Commissioner. Mr. Lueckenhoff provided no written testimony, but stated that the federal government is almost prohibiting boxing in Kansas because regulators have no power. He said

an association can come in and regulate, but this is much different than when a commissioner regulates. He stated that Kansas needs to develop a regulatory agency to regulate mixed martial arts. He believes that this legislation would provide an opportunity for economic growth due to increased gate receipts, etc.

Mr. Lueckenhoff stood for questions and Chairman Wilk thanked him. Rep Burroughs next introduced Mr. Richard Herring, Vice President, Governmental Affairs, World Wrestling Entertainment. Rep. Burroughs said that World Wrestling Entertainment is the largest promoter of wrestling in the world. Mr. Herring provided a handout giving an overview of World Wrestling Entertainment and thanked Rep. Burroughs for addressing this issue. He said there is a definite difference between independent entertainment which is not considered to be a sport, but rather intended to be strictly entertainment. He said sell-out crowds have become the catalyst to support an athletic commission or a commissioner. He said television is their catalyst, and when television promoters are looking for a location, they go where it is advantageous to promote. Kansas naturally loses because of logistics, but Kansas needs to minimize its loss. He said most states have an athletic tax and have eliminated their sales tax. He said the bill as it is now written does not address this issue, but adds on 5% up to 20% as an athletic tax. He stated that they do not support this concept and that the bill must be drafted to pay only one tax. Promoters would never pay both these taxes. His final point addressed Pay for View TV tax. He said most states do not charge this. He said they support the creation of a boxing commission and would have no trouble with paying a licensing fee, but do not like the tax structure as it is currently written in the bill. Chairman Wilk thanked Mr. Herring, and then Rep. Burroughs introduced Mr. Damon Reed, Professional Boxer/Promoter. Mr. Reed provided no written testimony and said that he did not support a five member commission. He said other states do not want to come to Kansas and be liable for the shows in Kansas. He mentioned he was speaking about the old bill and that the new bill has had most of his concerns addressed.

Chairman Wilk thanked Mr. Reed, and Rep. Burroughs introduced Mr. George Clark, Boxing Promoter and Fire Fighter, who provided no written testimony, but said he was here today to support and protect participants and people involved with this sport. He stated that at the present time there is currently no safety precautions and he wants the people he cares for protected. Following Mr. Clark's testimony, Rep. Burroughs said that George Clark is modest because he is one individual who encourages all and that he really knows the business.

Chairman Wilk thanked Mr. Clark, and Rep. Burroughs introduced Sumya Anani, 4 time World Champion. She stood for recognition, but did not testify. Rep. Burroughs then introduced Ms. Franchesca Alcanter, Professional Boxer. Ms. Alcanter said that Kansas has been deprived of having recognition. She stressed the importance of working with kids who are our future. She said she was very involved with the Police Athletic League (PAL), and she hopes this legislation passes so she can fight in her home town. Her testimony was an outline of her concerns. (Attachment 3)

Chairman Wilk thanked Ms. Alcanter, and said that he was sorry that he had an appointment and it was necessary for him to leave the meeting. He asked Vice Chair Lana Gordon to take over the meeting.

Representative Burroughs introduced Mr. Carlos Pacheco, Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, International Association of Fire Fighters Human Relations Board, who spoke as a proponent. He stressed that it was a way to help kids stay out of trouble because they were busy learning the sport. He mentioned that lots of Hispanic kids want to be involved in fighting. He added that there are 45 commissioners in 45 states, and Kansas is not one of them. No written testimony was provided.

Vice Chair Gordon thanked Mr. Pacheco and asked Rep. Burroughs to introduce the next conferee. Rep. Burroughs welcomed Mr. Greg Gorrell, Wichita Retired Prize Fighter, who spoke as a proponent. Mr. Gorrell said there had been no fight in Wichita since 2001, and that it is difficult to get neighboring states to provide a commissioner. He said actually Colorado was the only adjourning state that allows its commissioner to leave the state. No written testimony was provided.

Vice Chair Gordon asked Rep. Burroughs to introduce the next conferee. Rep. Burroughs welcomed Mr. William K. Rork, Attorney at Law, who testified as a proponent of **HB 2713**. Mr. Rork said that he has been associated with boxing since 1971 in various capacities such as judging, announcing, organizing, and phases

of Golden Gloves Boxing. For the last ten years he has been involved as a judge. He said it was necessary to have a Boxing Commissioner in Kansas so the state will not lose events to other states. His testimony included a suggestion for a candidate for the first boxing commissioner. (Attachment 4)

Vice Chair Gordon thanked Rep. Burroughs and all the conferees. She welcomed Mr. H.R. Cook, General Manager of the Kansas Expocentre, Topeka, Kansas, who spoke as an opponent of <u>HB 2713</u>. Mr. Cook mentioned the following concerns with <u>HB 2713</u>:

- Would limit ability of present local promoters to successfully promote events, as the bill requires a percentage of the gross receipts and concession revenue
- The revenues generated by a percentage of the gate receipts would not pay for a full time Commissioner
- Bundling Professional Wrestling into the bill will not increase the revenue generated by the boxing commission, but will drive entities such as World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) to other states that do not require a commission, license or surrender of 25% of broadcast rights for performances
- Difficult time competing with casinos and densely populated cities in neighboring states with larger facilities (<u>Attachment 6</u>)

He concluded by saying that he was not opposed to a Commissioner, but was opposed to the way the revenues are paid right now.

Vice Chair Gordon thanked Mr. Cook, and said since there were not additional conferees, the Public Hearing on **HB 2713** was closed.

Representative Hill made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 10, 2004 meeting, and Rep. Brunk seconded. Motion passed.

The meeting adjourned at 5:17 p.m.

CHAIRMAN WILK AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE

THANK YOU FOR THIS OPPORTUNITY TO BRING BEFORE YOU TODAY HB 2713. HB2713 ESTABLISHES AN ATHLETIC COMMISSION AND THE POSITION OF BOXING COMMISSIONER.

IN JUNE 1980 THE LEGISLATURE ABOLISHED THE KANSAS ATHLETIC COMMISSION. THE MAIN REASON GIVEN BY LEGISLATIVE POST AUDIT WAS "SO FEW PROFESSIONAL BOXING MATCHES IN KANSAS (17 EVENTS DURING 1978) THAT ADMISSION TAX RECEIPTS FOR BOXING COULD NOT SUPPORT THE OPERATIONS OF A REGULATORY AGENCY." HOWEVER, THE AUDIT FOUND THERE WAS A DEFINITE NEED FOR SOME TYPE OF REGULATION.

OUR BILL WOULD ELIMINATE A STATE LAW GIVING LOCAL GOVERNMENTS LICENSING CONTROL OVER PRIZE FIGHTING, BOXING SPARRING, AND MIXED MARTIAL ARTS. INDUSTRY PARTICIPANTS WOULD INSTEAD BE LICENSED BY A BOXING COMMISSION AND/OR COMMISSIONER. IT ESTABLISHES UNIFORM GUIDELINES FOR PROMOTING AND CONDUCTING PROFESSIONAL BOUTS IN KANSAS.

OUR PRESENT SYSTEM IS TOO CUMBERSOME. CENTRALIZING AND STREAMLINING THE LICENSING PROCESS WILL HELP DRAW PROMOTERS AND ALLOW KANSAS TO COMPETE FOR TOP-FLIGHT EVENTS INCLUDING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS. ESTABLISHING A STRONG REGULATORY CLIMATE WILL INCREASE THE SAFETY FOR FIGHTERS AND CREATE A STRICT MANAGEMENT GUIDELINE FOR PROMOTERS.



I know that there is interest in the promotion of professional boxing, mixed martial arts, and other combat arts in the state of Kansas and the commission again will be able to regulate and insure the safety of the participants.

I think this commission will have a positive economic impact on the state of Kansas eventually and I wish you the best of luck with the passage of your bill.

In terms of number of shows, professional boxing in the United States and Canada had its biggest year in the last decade. According to a detailed analysis broken down by commission, 2003 saw a total of 856 pro boxing shows (an increase of 4.5% from 2002). The total represented the largest number of shows since 1993.

My name is Don Meyers, I am asking you to bring new legislation to the sport of amateur boxing in your state. Specifically you must look at Art Dore's Toughman Contest. Since my sister-in-law was killed in Sarasota, June 2003, I have been active in bringing attention to the issues surrounding Toughman. Her story was featured in People magazine in the December 8th edition.

On January 14, 2004, Illinois's Governor outlawed Toughman by emergency amendment, I was present at the announcement. Washington State, Idaho, Florida to name a few states will soon be taking action. Be apart of the change!

You already have heard that Toughman will put the contest on an Indian reservation to avoid state boxing commission regulations. Toughman will also use their own nonprofit organization the American Boxing and Athletic Association (ABAA), or their Professional American Kickboxing Association (PAKA) to sponsor the event to avoid state statutes as has been occurring in Illinois and Wisconsin.

We all know that the Toughman organization will not follow its published rules. For the promoters of Toughman this behavior is acceptable. If a boxer had this behavior, the boxer would have been disciplined and banned from the sport long ago. Even USA Boxing will not allow its boxers to participate in a Toughman contest because of its risks.

Maybe you need moral cause to take action or to ban the promoter. Art Dore has been sited in several legal issues and scandals, stemming from sales tax misreporting to money laundering.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Honorary Committee members for allowing me to speak in behalf of State Economic Development regarding current testimony in opposition of House Bill No. 2713.

I am H.R. Cook, General Manager of the Kansas Expocentre, Topeka, Kansas.

As General Manager of one of the major arenas in Kansas, I have several concerns with House Bill No. 2713, the creation of an Athletic Commission. More specifically, my concern lies with the formation of a full-time Boxing Commissioner.

Presently, there is a handful of boxing promoters in the State of Kansas. Damon Reed, an aspiring local promoter, successfully brings boxing events to the Kansas Expocentre. He continues to grow as a promoter and to lay the groundwork in becoming affiliated with HBO, Don King and others. House Bill No. 2713 would effectively limit his ability to successfully promote events, as the bill requires a percentage of the gross receipts and concession revenue. As a result, Mr. Reid will face changing venues to buildings out-of-state or he will be forced into abandoning this career route altogether.

The Kansas Expocentre hosts an average of two professional boxing events and one professional wrestling event each year. Total gate receipts for all categories listed in House Bill No. 2713 totaled no more than \$65,000 in 2003. Having managed arenas in states with a Boxing Commission, I have experienced the practice of up to 5% of gate receipts going to the Boxing Commission. Given the amount of boxing type events in the State of Kansas, the revenues generated by a percentage of the gate receipts would not pay for a full time Commissioner. Most promoters who rent the Kansas Expocentre operate with very thin profit margins. Although highly valued by local enthusiasts, these types of sporting events do not draw the crowds as in other states. Many times arenas must "co-promote" the events and share a percentage of concessions, which would normally stay in the hands of the arenas and contracted concessionaires. If the commission was to receive a share of concessions and other novelties, a "fourth hand" now takes another piece of the pie - further eroding profit margins for all involved. This greatly sacrifices the variety of events available locally that the patrons have demanded as a result of their taxpayer dollars. Therefore, they may also choose to go out-of-state to events as a rule.

I am not opposed to the formation of the position of Boxing Commissioner to oversee the sport of boxing and the strict control of "toughman" type events. Based on experience and extensive knowledge of this industry, I feel that bundling Professional Wrestling into House Bill No. 2713 will not increase

the revenue generated by the boxing commission. It will, however, drive entities such as World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) to other states that do not require a commission, license or surrender of 25% of broadcast rights for these performances.

Kansas arenas and coliseums currently have a difficult time competing with casinos and densely populated cities in neighboring states with larger facilities. The casinos can afford to use events as a "loss leader" to draw people to their buildings where they can make up any losses through the gain from gambling. Large buildings generally have big name acts coming to them as the seating capacity and population warrants the risk of putting an event at their venue. Locally, we have to balance the risk with the possible gain and walk a fine line when we attract larger events. Our margins are tighter than larger venues and we cannot afford to lose or even break even on events. Restrictions and fees imposed on venues for events outlined in House Bill No. 2713, will force us to reevaluate and turn away potential promoters to other states, as these fees will erode or erase our profit potential.

As employers leave, Topeka has recently seen substantial losses to their economy. Statewide we are currently preparing task forces to prevent even larger losses as military base closings loom in the shadows. With these things in mind, careful consideration should be given to amending House Bill 2713, so we are not purposefully voting in additional losses to our economic growth.
