The meeting adjourned at 9:35 a.m.



Before the Joint Meeting of the Senate Commerce Committee, House Utilities Committee and the Joint Committee on Information Technology January 30, 2004

Chairpersons Brownlee, Holmes and Huelskamp and Committee Members:

The Special Committee on Utilities requested that the Kansas Corporation Commission attempt to develop a map that better illustrates the availability of broadband services in Kansas. Additionally, the Special Committee on Utilities requested that the Commission work with Kan-Ed to indicate where broadband had been deployed to schools and libraries with the use of Kan-Ed funds.

According to the FCC's December 2003 report on the availability of high-speed services, there were 248,796 high-speed lines in service in Kansas. Of those lines in service, 93% were provided over DSL or coaxial cable. The FCC also indicated that incumbent local exchange carriers provide 95% of the DSL lines in service. Thus, the Commission believed that if it could gather more specific information from the incumbent local exchange carriers and cable companies, it could develop a map that would capture the majority of broadband deployment and provide Legislators with a more detailed representation of the locations where broadband has been deployed. The Commission requested specific information regarding the location of the broadband facilities each company had deployed as of December 2003 from the incumbent local exchange carriers. Information for the rural independent local exchange carriers had been consolidated by Pioneer Communications and was made available to the Commission. Additionally many of the independent companies provided the information to the Commission in individual responses. SWBT and Sprint also provided information regarding their broadband service deployment. The Commission also requested similar information from the Mid-America Cable Association. While the Association was able to provide information regarding the location and boundaries of cable franchises, information regarding the deployment of broadband was not readily available. Thus, attached you will find a map indicating the deployment of only the incumbent local exchange carriers.


The next map indicates the locations of schools and libraries that have received Kan-Ed funding for broadband services as well as the locations of broadband deployment by the incumbent local exchange carriers.

DSL Coverage by Company







