Senator Jordan moved, with a second by Senator Downey, that the committee reconsider it's action on SCR 1622 (3rs1708) which was introduced in committee on March 22, 2004, because the number 1622 had already been used for another resolution. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Chairman Morris opened the public hearing on:

HB 2673--Increased payment authority for prior year claims for services or purchases by state agencies

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

Chairman Morris welcomed Dale Brunton, Director, Division of Accounts and Reports, Kansas Department of Administration, who testified in support of HB 2673 (Attachment 1). Mr. Brunton explained that the bill was proposed by the Department of Administration. The bill would allow the Director of Accounts and Reports to pay, from current fiscal year funds, a valid claim up to \$5,000 for goods or services purchased in the prior fiscal year. The current limit is \$500. Mr. Brunten explained that the \$5,000 limit is in accordance with other authority limits for state agencies, such as delegated audit, purchasing and asset capitalization.

There being no further conferees to come before the committee, the Chairman closed the public hearing on HB 2673.

The Chairman opened the public hearing on:

HB 2675--Claims against the state

Dr. Bill Wolff, Associate Director, Kansas Legislative Research Department, presented a briefing on the bill.

Senator Jackson moved, with a second by Senator Helgerson, a balloon amendment regarding **HB 2675** concerning the Board of Nursing, Section 9 of the bill (Attachment 2). Motion carried on a voice vote.

Chairman Morris opened the public hearing on:

HB 2706--State finance council, voting procedures

Staff briefed the committee on the bill.

The Chairman welcomed Duane Goossen, Director, Division of the Budget, who spoke in favor of the bill. Director Goossen explained that the reason for the bill is the difficulty in getting all nine members of the State Finance Council hooked up either in person or by telephone to make decisions so emergency dollars can be released. The bill allows an absentee vote. (No written testimony was submitted.)

There being no further conferees to come before the committee, the Chairman Morris closed the public hearing on <u>HB 2706</u>.

Senator Downey moved, with a second by Senator Jackson, to recommend **HB 2706** favorable for passage. Motion carried on a roll call vote.

Chairman Morris called the committee's attention to discussion of:

SB 351--Emergency medical services providers; grants for training and education expenses

Chairman Morris recognized Senator Jay Emler who explained a proposed substitute bill for <u>SB 351</u> and noted that the fiscal note had been parred down to \$200,000. The Chairman recognized David Lake, Administrator, Board of Emergency Medical Services, provided additional comments regarding the proposed substitute bill for <u>SB 351</u>.

Senator Downey moved, with a second by Senator Helgerson, to amend SB 351 with a Senate Substitute for SB 351. Motion carried on a voice vote.

Senator Downey moved, with a second by Senator Jackson, to recommend **Senate Substitute for SB 351** favorable for passage as amended. Motion carried on a roll call vote.

Chairman Morris called the committee's attention to discussion of HB 2886.

Senate Ways & Means Committee HB 2673 – Authority to Pay Prior Year Claims

> Dale Brunton, Director Division of Accounts and Reports March 23, 2004

Good morning Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee. I appreciate the opportunity to discuss with you House Bill 2673 proposed by the Department of Administration.

House Bill 2673 allows the Director of Accounts and Reports to pay, from current fiscal year funds, a valid claim up to \$5,000 for goods or services purchased in the prior fiscal year. The current limit is \$500. Generally, a state agency must either pay for goods and services within the fiscal year incurred, or encumber funds to allow payment in the subsequent fiscal year. Otherwise, state vendors must file a claim through the annual legislative claims process, even if the vendor was at no fault in the process.

In 1980, K.S.A. 46-923 was enacted to avoid placing an unnecessary burden on state vendors or the Joint Committee on Special Claims Against the State for small dollar claims not presented in the proper fiscal year. House Bill 2673 recognizes a need to increase this threshold after 24 years and align it more closely with other established limits. The \$5,000 limit is in accordance with other authority limits for state agencies, such as delegated audit, purchasing, and asset capitalization. The amendment primarily benefits vendors and state agencies by allowing a quicker payment process with less bureaucracy.

Again, thank you for allowing me to appear before you today and for considering House Bill 2673. I welcome the opportunity to respond to any questions that you may have.

SENATE BILL No. 365

AN ACT concerning legislative post audit; relating to persons subject to audits; amending K.S.A. 46-1114 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 46-1114 is hereby amended to read as follows: 46-1114. (a) The legislative post audit committee is hereby authorized to direct the post auditor and the division of post audit to make an audit of any type described in K.S.A. 46-1106 or 46-1108, and amendments to these sections, of any records or matters of any person specified in this section, and may direct the object in detail of any such audit.

- (b) Upon receiving any such direction, the post auditor with the division of post audit, shall make such audit and shall have access to all books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, to the same extent permitted under subsection (g) of K.S.A. 46-1106 and amendments thereto, except that such access shall be subject to the limitations established under subsection (d) of this section.
 - (c) Audits authorized by this section are the following:
- (1) Audit of any local subdivision of government or agency or instrumentality thereof which receives any distribution of moneys from or through the state.
- (2) Audit of any person who receives any grant or gift from or through the state.
- (3) Audit of the contract relationships and the fiscal records related thereto of any person who contracts with the state.
- (4) Audit of any person who is regulated or licensed by any state agency or who operates or functions for the benefit of any state institution, except that this subsection (e)(4) shall not include audit of any person regulated by the state corporation commission except that any audit of any person regulated by the state corporation commission shall address only compliance with laws or regulations, collection or remittance of taxes or fees, or other matters related directly to state government programs or functions. Any such audit authorized under this subsection shall not address corporate governance or fi-

nancial issues except as they may relate directly to state government programs or functions.

(d) (1) Access to all books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, as authorized under subsection (b) of this section of any nongovernmental person audited under authority of subsection (c)(2) of this section shall be limited to those books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise. of such person to which the state governmental agency which administers the grant or gift and provides for the disbursement thereof is authorized under law to have access.

- (2) Access to all books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, as authorized under subsection (b) of this section of any nongovernmental person audited under authority of subsection (c)(3) of this section shall be limited to those books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, of such person to which the state governmental agency which contracts with such person is authorized under law to have access.
- (3) Access to all books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, as authorized under subsection (b) of this section of any nongovernmental person audited under authority of subsection (c)(4) of this section shall be limited to those books, accounts, records, files, documents and correspondence, confidential or otherwise, of such person to which the state governmental agency which regulates or licenses such person or the state institution on whose behalf such person operates or functions is authorized under law to have access.
- Sec. 2. K.S.A. 46-1114 is hereby repealed.
- Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.

This sub-section shall not apply to public utilities as defined in K. S. A. 66-1, 187 (1).
